SARAH BERNHARDT THE NOTED ACTRESS DIES LATE MONDAY

MESSAGE TO AMERICA

Associated Press. PARIS, March 26.—"I am deeply touched by the sympathetic interest of my beloved American friends." This was Sarah Bernhardt's message to her friends overseas given The Associated Press at 6:15 o'clock this morning by her secretary, Madame Normande.

By Associated Press. PARIS, March 26.—Mme. Sarah Bernhardt is dead. She died at 7:50 p. m., expiring in the arms of her son, Maurice, who had just entered the room at the moment.

By CORINNE HIGH, Universal Service Staff. CORONATION, N. Y., March 26.—With the passing of Sarah Bernhardt the world will lose a wonderful tragedienne, a big souled woman, a friend, I. W. Hope, Mme. Bernhardt's personal representative of the last American tour, told me today.

Travelling all over this country with her for almost two years, Mr. Bernhardt probably knew the "divine Sarah" as she really was, better than anybody else in America. He grew reminiscent.

"She loved America," he said. "She loved her audience, its cities, its people, its reception of her. And that last tour was a veritable struggle for her. A few words of English, and Mr. Hope had command of no more French, but with some great old times." Her lack of English did not keep the great actress from enjoying the society of Americans.

READS THESIS AND RESOLUTIONS FROM COMMUNIST PARTY

ST. JOSEPH, MICH., March 26.—The third international of Moscow advised American communists to form a legal party. Charles E. Rutherford, co-defendant with William Z. Foster on charges of illegal association, testified today in Phoenix.

Reading from thesis and resolutions of the third world congress of the communist international, held at Moscow in 1921, Rutherford found a section which the state had not read when the document was produced in evidence for the prosecution and for this he gave the jury the communist international's explanation that the illegal underground organization in the United States was the outgrowth of persecution.

DIRECT TESTIMONY IS COMPLETED BEFORE LUNCH

Confession is Read to Jury by the County Attorney of McLennan County.

WAGO, March 26.—The jury before which Roy Mitchell, negro, was charged with the murder of Grady Skipworth, on the night of November 26, was selected in 35 minutes Monday morning.

The same speed was shown in the trial of the case, the state completing its direct testimony before adjournment for lunch. It is probable that the case will go to the jury by night.

The confession in which Mitchell admits having killed Skipworth was read to the jury by the county attorney. The confession states that Skipworth was killed with a shotgun by being shot in the left side of his body then being dragged to the cliff at Lovers Leap and thrown over. It then relates how Skipworth's woman companion was kidnapped and of her having run from him and jumped over the cliff.

Defense counsel appointed by the court, made no effort to resist the introduction of the confession, but announced that he would introduce evidence controverting it.

FOUR ARE BURNED TO DEATH IN N. Y. APARTMENT HOUSE

NEW YORK, March 26.—A lighted cigar believed to have been carelessly tossed by an intoxicated man started a fire which swept today through the seventh-story Penton apartments in West Fifty-seventh street, occupied by theatrical and business folk and caused the deaths of four persons.

EXPENSIVE DRESS AND HAT FOUND IN ROOM OF MOTHER

NEW YORK, March 26.—An expensive dress and a hat listed among the articles stolen from the apartment of Dorothy Keenan, slain today, were found by detectives today at the home of Mrs. Anna Keenan, the dead girl's mother.

Detectives who discovered the garments during an interview with Mrs. Keenan said the Broadway butler's mother at first "seemed surprised" but quickly explained that she had gathered together some of Mrs. Keenan's effects when she went to her apartment after Dorothy had been slain and that the last costume she had worn was the one found today.

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KNOW IDENTITY OF PARTY INVOLVED IN BLACKMAILING PLOT

ACTION WITHHELD PENDING EFFORT TO OBTAIN MORE EVIDENCE.

MITCHELL HAS DECLINED TO MAKE A STATEMENT

Mrs. Mitchell Leaves Florida in Special Car to Join Her Husband.

NEW YORK, March 25.—(Clipping) To know the identity of the man who sought to engineer a blackmail plot against John Kearsley Mitchell, son-in-law of E. T. Stotesbury of Philadelphia, and the mysterious "Mr. Marshall" of the Dorothy Keenan murder mystery, the police today through the byways of the underworld sought for others believed to have been implicated in the scheme. They said action against the as yet unnamed blackmail principal was being held in abeyance pending efforts to obtain more evidence to support their theory that the blackmailer, backed in his original plan, edged the model with chloroform that he might get Mitchell's letters to her to be used despite her opposition.

As a statement was forthcoming from Mitchell, reported to have seen the model gifts and money representing more than \$50,000, and said to have the last known man to have seen the girl alive. Now, if his confidential attorney, John H. Jackson, who was the "Wilson" of the 70-day mystery surrounding the identity of the two men, give out anything for publication, Mitchell was reported to have returned to his Philadelphia home. Other sources said he was still in New York. Ella Bradford, negro maid, who found her mistress' body 12 days ago, was said to have supplied the authorities with considerable information concerning the blackmail plot for more than \$100,000 which was believed to have brought death to Miss Keenan on her trial in league herself against her wealthy admirer.

The police have been unable to find a letter written to Miss Keenan by Mitchell and mailed from Palm Beach, Fla. This letter, it was said, would have provided blackmailers with a formidable weapon against their intended victim.

Miss Keenan is known to have had it in her possession a short time before her death.

MRS. MITCHELL LEAVES TO JOIN HER HUSBAND

PALE BEACH, Fla., March 25.—Mrs. J. Kearsley Mitchell, wife of a wealthy John Kearsley Mitchell, identified as the mysterious "Mr. Marshall" in the Dorothy Keenan murder case in New York, left here early today about 10 o'clock for Philadelphia to join her husband. She was accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. E. T. Stotesbury of Philadelphia, her father-in-law.

In a statement to the Associated Press last night Mr. Stotesbury declared his faith in his son-in-law was not shaken by the alleged connection with the Keenan girl.

Mrs. Mitchell asserted that she and her husband were the best of friends and she knew that he could not have been unfaithful to her.

TWENTY WITNESSES TO TESTIFY IN CASE OF MRS. ANNA BUZZI

NEW YORK, March 25.—Twenty witnesses awaited appearance before today's session of the grand jury when District Attorney Glennon of the Bronx will ask the return of an indictment charging Mrs. Anna Buzzi with the murder of Frederick Schneider, wealthy contractor, who was shot to death in his automobile February 24.

William Turc, chauffeur, brother in law of Mrs. Buzzi, was expected to be the chief witness against her. Turc, under arrest as a material witness, was said to have told the authorities that Mrs. Buzzi had confessed the murder to him. It was he who loaned the woman the gun with which the authorities say Schneider was slain. The police declare that Turc, brought face to face with his sister-in-law in the Bronx jail, accused her of the murder. This woman withstood the ordeal without apparent emotion.

"I have nothing to say," was her only reply.

LONDON.—Lieut. General Sir Charles Harrington said that the prospects for an early peace with the Turks was excellent.

ROCHESTER, MINN.—Congressman John R. Tyson of Montgomery, Ala., who is ill here, was reported slightly improved.

HOUSTON, TEXAS.—Flavius Nathaniel Gray, United States cotton statistician and pioneer in the rice industry in Texas, died.

SAN MARCOS, TEXAS.—Otto Nami was found guilty of murder in connection with the slaying of John K. Ross in Austin last winter and sentenced to 15 years in the penitentiary.

COLORADO, TEXAS.—Officers are searching for George Taylor, negro wanted in connection with the shooting to death Saturday night of Tom Morrison Jr., aged 22, a settler.

COMPLETE ABOLITION OF DIVORCE IS ADVOCATED

NEW YORK, March 25.—Complete abolition of divorce is urged by Supreme Court Justice Morschauser, who presided over the Stillman case in an article in the April number of Columbia, official organ of the Knights of Columbus, made public today.

Declaring that he believed the abolition of divorce should be brought about by congressional legislation, he added:

"But that is a long way ahead because there are, unfortunately, so many middle aged and elderly men—and some young ones—who for one reason or another, want new wives."

"But one great practical step which should be taken immediately is the passage of legislation making divorce obtained in Paris or elsewhere in Europe invalid. It is wrong to let rich men or women run off to Paris to get divorces. We should not allow a condition to exist which permits wealthy persons to escape American divorce laws."

PAVING MATTERS TO COME BEFORE COUNCIL MONDAY

Public hearing will be held and contracts let on the paving that has been authorized on Sixth, Lamar, Travis and Taylor streets, at the Monday afternoon session of the council. The contract for the construction of the storm sewer on Taylor will also be awarded at the Monday afternoon session.

The session will be held with the county commissioners in order for them to express themselves on the paving to be laid around the court house square. The hearing Monday afternoon is called to decide on the kind of paving to be laid and is destined to be a stormy one. Property owners concerned are said to disagree widely on their views.

Some disposition will also be made of the question of the purchase of a negro park. The contract for the operation of the incinerator will be awarded at the Monday afternoon session, seven bids for the contract have been received at the office of the city clerk.

The Kiwanis club committee is expected to bring to the council on the progress made toward the establishment of the municipal golf course. If the required number of subscriptions have been received by that time the council will authorize the work to begin on laying off the course.

DANGER IN FLOOD DISTRICT OF IOWA HAS BEEN PASSED

OMAHA, March 25.—Danger of property damage to Iowa farmers from flood waters of the Missouri river opposite Council Bluffs, near where an ice gorge recently formed, had passed this morning as the river cut a channel through the ice on the Nebraska side, but a new menace took its place as the rapid current was cutting a hole in the ice on the Nebraska side, that it was necessary for workmen to begin the work of removing a small number of houses and an abandoned grain elevator to prevent them from being swept away.

A drop in the river accompanied the cutting of the channel though the main part of the gorge was still holding this morning.

Lady Bonham Carter Writes About Ruhr and the French Occupation as Seen During a Visit of One Month

THIS is the first of a series of articles on "What I Saw in the Ruhr," by Lady Carter, daughter of former Premier H. H. Asquith. The articles are the result of impressions gained in occupied Germany during a month's visit, from which Lady Carter has just returned.

LONDON, March 25.—I left Berlin for Cologne by a night train and was amused to find under the pillow in my sleeping berth a German leaflet headed "What is Franco-Prussian War Reparations?" The leaflet was illustrated by course but clever caricatures of a large black soldier straddling the Rhine and of a fat professor who was grabbing the Ruhr coal with one hand and grasping the leaflets being dropped out of the carriage windows. The poster declared that if the distribution continued, the train would be stopped and the trainees with passengers, I got out in a taxi for the Ruhr.

Two people were selected at random in every carriage to see the very published. The German rail-roads to Essen, the home of the

way authorities appealed to all the passengers not to notice the interest shown by the French and to show the greatest possible calm and moderation.

I found it difficult to show either calmness or moderation when I was awakened for the second time out of my sleep in the early hours of morning by French soldiers entering my carriage and informing me that I thought gratuitously that we had now entered occupied territory and demanding to see my passport.

Eight hours later we were in Cologne. The change of atmosphere was almost magical. On all sides one could feel between the British and the Germans the perfect courtesy of good will and strong mutual trust.

I had had an open mind about the withdrawal of the British troops from the Rhine. A day in Cologne made me feel that it would not only be a betrayal of trust, but an abdication of our European position to withdraw our forces now.

The next morning I motored along the Rhine to Düsseldorf. I traveled over a road punctuated by French posts and controls and then up to the train with passengers, I got out in a taxi for the Ruhr.

One does not realize until one is very published. The German rail-roads to Essen, the home of the

great Krupp works, what an extraordinary place the Ruhr is. I had never seen anything like it. Great forests of tall chimneys were uncurling dark flags of smoke over the mountains of slag. Not words of cranes, gantries and cables were hanging like festoons of black lace on the sky line spread out before me.

Everywhere the ground was charred up with new effort for new enterprises. New shafts were being sunk into the earth. New buildings were rising out of it. One's brain punts at the demoralized activity and productivity of the Ruhr and at the intricate complexity of its mechanism.

One cannot wonder that the French see in it a treasure with a touch of gold which will make good all past sufferings and losses.

But the fullness needs careful handling. Those who lay ignorant or foolish hands on it are sure to bring down the French upon it. This is exactly what is happening in the Ruhr today.

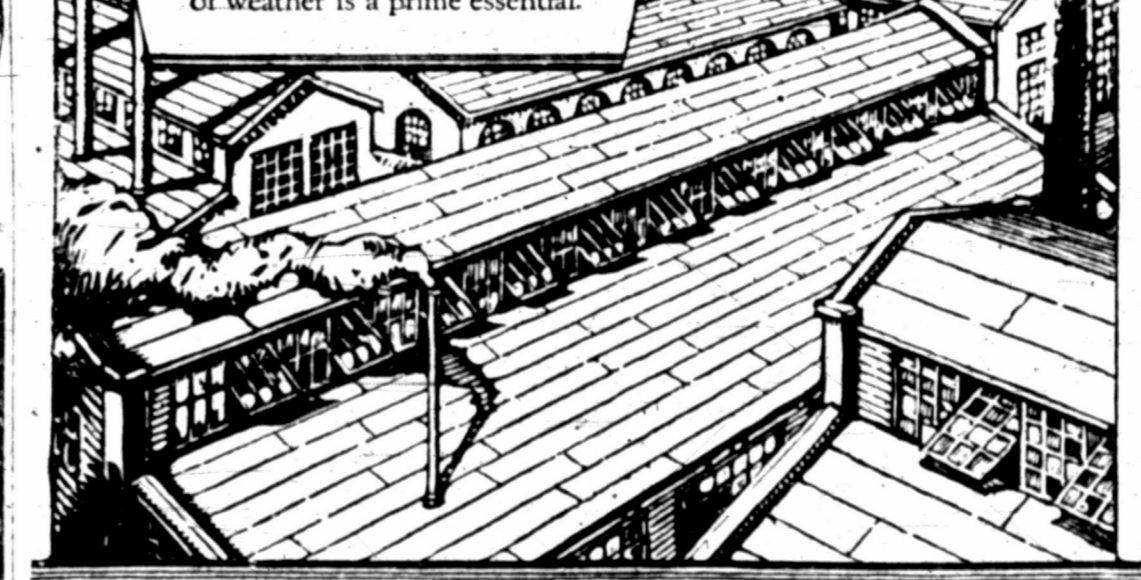

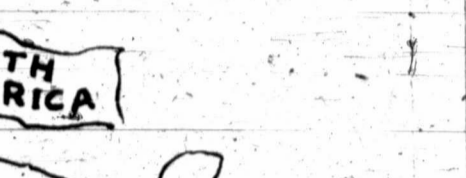

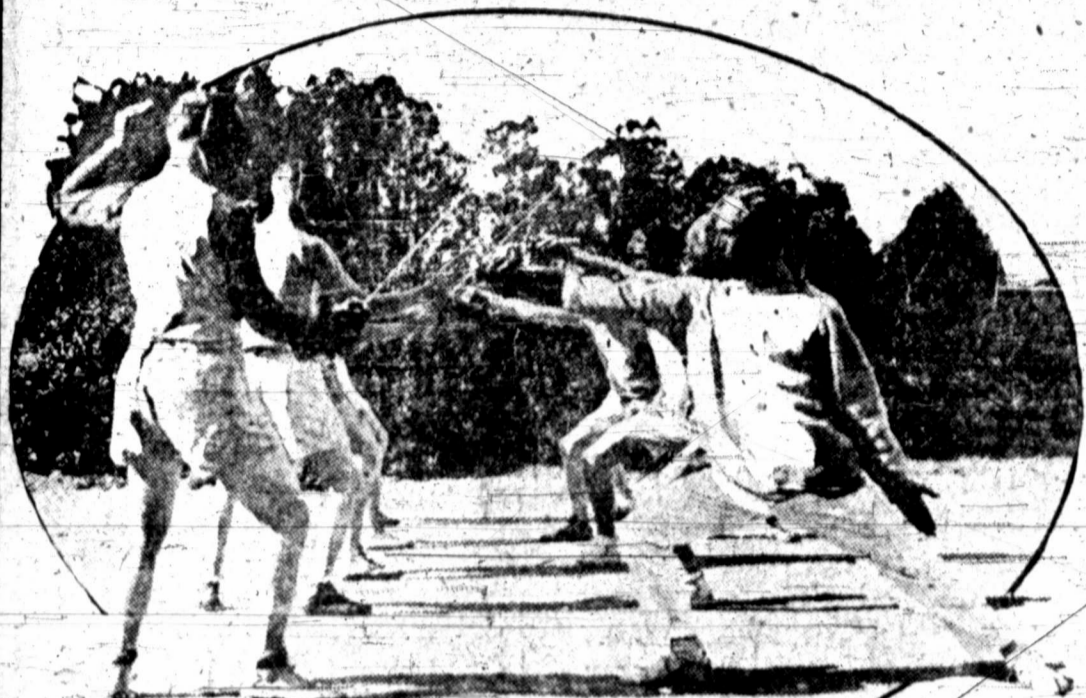

Road Law Procedure Draws
Sharp Criticism from Papers
At Other Points in Country

The action of Wichita Falls in obtaining passage of a new road law for this county, providing for a division of road funds on a basis of valuations, has aroused considerable feeling in up-country communities, judging from articles appearing in the weekly papers at Electra, Iowa Park and Burkburnett last week.

The several editors are rather severe in their criticisms of Wichita Falls' action, and are somewhat sharply upon it. The local chamber of commerce comes in for its share, and Representatives Gilson and Ash are not overlooked.

"It is further pointed out that should this bill become law, it would mean a serious complication to the handling of the entire county's road matters, tax matters, and matters of a similar nature."

to keep up roads in the county. In other words, it is insisted that Wichita Falls is taking the attitude described by that classic statement of the late Jay Gould:

"Wichita Falls has had her eye on this money but was unable to stir the commissioners and get control of it. As a last resort a delegation took the measure framed up by them to Austin at the eleventh hour of the legislature and got it through."

"At a meeting of the Wichita Falls chamber of commerce last week some members were frank to admit that they wanted the Sevier road paved because they owned considerable property on that highway. Knowing they could not pass a bond issue for the purpose of half-surfacing the road, because of the unfriendly attitude of the other three precincts, they had to seek other means for aid—hence they linked through the bill which was passed just prior to the adjournment of the legislature and is now before Governor Neff, and which will adjourn on law 20 days after said adjournment, unless it is vetoed by the governor."

"Under this arrangement Burkburnett will fare as well as forms of dirt road in the county."

"Two and three years ago Burkburnett was paying about 42 percent of the cost of the county road, while Wichita Falls did not want this bill changed at that time. Now they have no regard for the people who are involved in securing it."

"The proposition was not even shown them until the last hours of the legislature, and they will lose in the long run."

"It is pointed out that the three county commissioners refused to consider the proposition of Wichita Falls at all of the \$100,000 remaining in the road fund for the building of highways, and that Wichita Falls has been divided equally between the four precincts."

"Most of the owners of old lands in the equity live in Wichita Falls. According to the opinion of the county commissioners from this precinct, such an action seems to bear him out; they wanted everything in and around Wichita Falls paved, but are unwilling to have their property in the county taxed."
