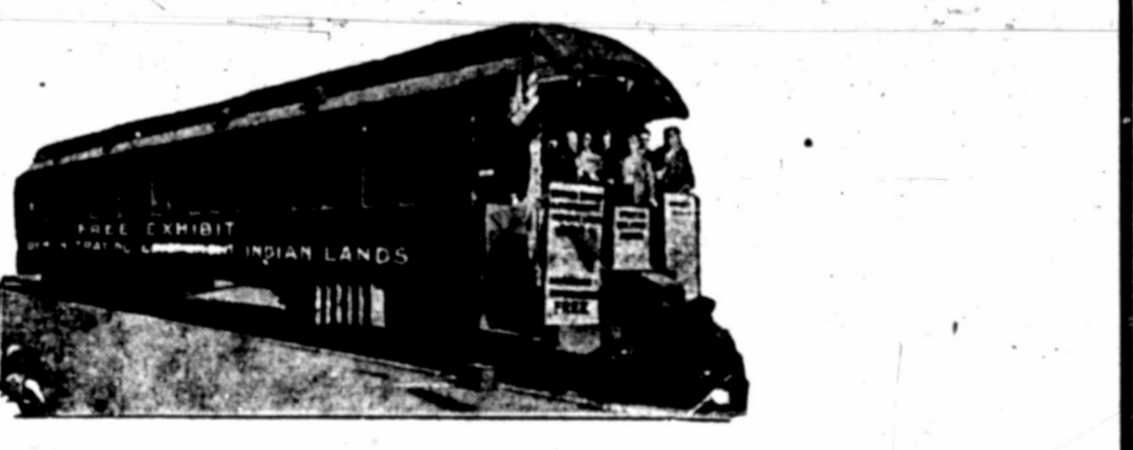

Half Brother of Madame Bernhardt Residing at Ardmore, Oklahoma, Has "No Pity, No Sorrow" Over Her Death

MOOREHEAD, OKLA., March 27.—A story that dates back into the mists that obscure the early life of Mme. Sarah Bernhardt is told by old Joseph Bernhardt, who has headed McAlister's stove and furniture for the last quarter century.

Joseph Bernhardt says the famous actress was his half sister.

They were estranged many years ago—he tells it—and, pottering about his little shop today, he vowed he felt no sorrow at the news of the passing of the "Divine Sarah."

The Bernhardt's are a strong tempered people, says old Joseph, and he declared he cannot forgive Sarah for her treatment of him as a youth when she could have extended to him a helping hand but refused.

"She had an opportunity to make something out of me but she turned me down," the aged Frenchman said with bitterness. "I have no pity, no sorrow."

Joseph Bernhardt told the story of his blood relationship to the famous actress when he came to McAlister 35 years ago and it has stood unrefuted.

Sarah Bernhardt was the second daughter of Pierre Bernhardt, born of his first wife, according to Joseph. He gives the history of the Bernhardt family as follows:

"The father, Pierre Bernhardt, was of Swiss descent. There were two daughters, Jeanne and Sarah, born of his first wife, and Rachel and Marie were born of his second wife. My mother died when I was born. Rachel was two years older than I; Sarah was five years older than myself; Jeanne was two years older than Sarah."

Every Day in Every Way the Race Grows Stronger



This junior Adam and Eve may, if the ratio of increase in the length of life is maintained, wish each other "a Happy New Year" on the first of January in 2000. And the little fellow beneath seems destined to be present at the party, too.



The average span of human life in the sixteenth century was only twenty years.



Two centuries later only five years had been added, bringing the average age to twenty-five.



Progress and science gave the nineteenth century an almost double tenure of life, the average age being forty-eight.

Venice lost 100,000 of her population and Florence 50,000. Half the population of England was wiped out by that epidemic, and London, then a city of 110,000, buried 80,000 of its inhabitants in one cemetery.

"That epidemic of plague, according to conservative estimates, cost the lives of 25,000,000 of people in Europe—approximately one-eighth of the world's population. It was commonly attributed to the wrath of an angry God, who sought thus to avenge himself for some misdoing on the part of mankind. Extraordinary efforts were made to appease him and it was at that time that the passion plays at Oberammergau and elsewhere originated. According to another theory, the mischief was caused by the Jews, who poisoned the air. Thousands of them were burned at the stake. The faculty of Paris laid it to an unfortunate conjunction of planets; but the faculty of Leipsig decided that it was due to earthquakes.

"That such conditions as I have described could have existed in the Middle Ages, and even within recent centuries, is the more astonishing when it is considered that the civilized ancients lived cleanly and carefully obeyed sanitary laws. The so-called Mosaic code of laws was probably borrowed from the Egyptians. They were health laws, con-

taining minute directions for personal cleanliness, purification of dwellings, avoidance of unwholesome food, isolation of persons suffering from infectious diseases and so forth. As if in recognition of danger from germs, they laid stress upon the care of cooking and drinking utensils and the importance of washing the hands after every action likely to contaminate.

"Athens was provided with sewers at an early period of its history.



In the twentieth century the limit of life for the average was increased to fifty-six years.

The Romans 2400 years ago constructed a sewer system which served not only to carry off wastes but helped to drain great areas of marshes. Aqueducts extended across many miles of the plains surrounding the city. Their splendid ruins—to some extent restored and now in use for their original purpose—attest the abundance with which the first of sanitary requisites, pure water, was supplied. During the reign of Nero the per capita water supply of Rome was about 400 gallons daily. Between 400 B. C. and 180 A. D. about 800 public baths were established in the Eternal City. One of them, that of Caracalla, could alone accommodate 8000 bathers at one time.

"Let us return now to our own times.

Fifty years ago little was known of the cause of infectious or communicable diseases. They were commonly supposed to be due to "miasmas"—mysterious elements afloat in the atmosphere. Thus malaria, for instance, was attributed to a miasma coming from marshes and stagnant ponds. It occurred to nobody to think that mosquitoes bred in such places and that, perhaps, they might carry the infection. According to other theorists, disease-producing matters generated in the bodies of sick persons were capable of engendering the same malady in others.

"With the development of bacteriology, the science of preventive medicine was born. In 1868 the bacillus of anthrax was discovered. The germ of relapsing fever was found ten years later. In 1880 Sternberg, afterward Surgeon General of the United States Army, isolated the pneumonic germ. In the same year the bacillus of typhoid fever was identified. Koch discovered the tubercle bacillus in 1882 and the germ of Asiatic cholera two years later. The microbe of malaria was found in 1880 and the bacillus of bubonic plague in 1894. In 1920 the long-sought yellow fever germ was isolated.

And in the twenty-first century humanity may expect to reach the biblical three score and ten.

"We now know that these diseases, as well as glanders, tetanus, leprosy, erysipelas, wound infections, puerperal fever, influenza, dysentery and typhus, are caused by living organisms. It is believed that the same is true of smallpox, scarlet fever, whooping cough, mumps, infantile paralysis and rabies, although their germs have not yet been isolated.

"The classic experiment of Jenner at the close of the eighteenth century, who inoculated a boy with cowpox and thereby rendered him immune to smallpox, marked the beginning of a new epoch in medicine. Methods of producing artificial immunity by inoculation have within recent years been extended to many diseases successfully, including diphtheria, pneumonia, erysipelas, tetanus and typhoid fever.

"The efficiency of such immunizing treatment was admirably illustrated during the great war. Typhoid has always been a scourge of armies. In the Spanish War one in every six of our soldiers was attacked by it. In the World War, in an army of approximately 4,000,000 men, we had only 8706 cases of typhoid and 213 deaths from that disease. Had the rate of the Spanish War prevailed, there would have been 51,133 deaths from typhoid. The lives of nearly 60,000 of our soldiers were saved by typhoid vaccination.

"During the Civil War, out of every 1000 Union soldiers, sixty-five died annually from disease. In the Spanish War thirty in every 1000 succumbed to disease and in the World War slightly less than half that number.

"In view of what I have said, you will easily understand how it comes about that the average span of human life in this country has so greatly lengthened. In 1870 it was only forty-one years. Now it is fifty-six years.

"It will go on lengthening. Even without further addition to our present knowledge of the causes and prevention of disease, and simply by the application of what is already known."

Science Tells Us That the Average Span of Human Life in the United States Today Is Fifty-six Years and Within the Next Thirty Years May Attain to the Biblical Three Score and Ten

HOW long is a lifetime? At present the average span of human life in the United States is fifty-six years.

In the sixteenth century the average span of human life in Europe was less than twenty years. At the close of the eighteenth century—not much more than a century ago—it was less than twenty-five years.

Right here is the most striking and significant fact in all modern history. The average person today lives much more than twice as long as the average person did a century and a quarter ago. But, in mentioning the above facts, Dr. George M. Kober, dean of the Medical School of Georgetown University, calls attention to the prospect that our great-grandchildren will live much longer lives than we.

"We are beating the game in our fight against death," said Dr. Kober. "Within the next thirty years the average person in this country may reach the biblical three score years and ten. Half a century from now people may live twenty years longer than they do at present.

"Such an expectation is not too bold. The best available figures show that the average span of human life in the United States has been lengthened by fifteen years since 1870. And five of these years have been added since 1900.

"At the close of the nineteenth century the average American survived for a term not exceeding forty-eight years and, perhaps, somewhat less. May it not, then, be said with confidence that we are winning the game?

"We are winning it through the application of medical knowledge, which steadily advances, and through improved sanitation. Even in the present generation people have acquired much cleaner habits; and, needless to say, cleanliness is the chief means of health conservation. Dirt and disease are twins.

"Observe how the idea works out in practice. In 1880 twenty people died out of every 1000—the approximate annual rate. In 1922, out of every 1000 fewer than twelve died. That means a saving of about half a million lives annually.

"MEDICAL science has learned how to fight consumption, which, though still widely prevalent, is no longer the frightful scourge it used to be. Consider the figures. Looking back to 1871, we find that in that year out of every 100,000 of our population 420 died of consumption. In 1922, out of every 100,000 only 108 died of it.

"Look back only thirty-three years, 1890; out of every 100,000 of our people, eighty-three succumbed to typhoid fever. In 1922 the number of deaths from that disease, per 100,000 of population, was

less than seven. Figures for 1923 are, of course, not available.

"The number of deaths in infancy has been scaled down to about one-fourth of what it was in 1878. Supervision of the milk supply by health authorities, insuring its purity and cleanliness, has had largely to do with that. Diarrheal troubles of babies, so often fatal, have been greatly reduced in prevalence.

"At the present time the average span of life in different countries varies from twenty-four years in India to sixty years in New Zealand. You see that, in respect to longevity, we Americans do not stand at the top of the list. I cannot say why the New Zealanders live longer than we do; they may for some reason possess a higher relative immunity to disease—more power of resistance to disease, in other words.

"IN THE midst of the triumphs of medical science over many of the maladies to which human flesh is heir, there is some discouragement in the fact that in the last forty years there has been an increase of over 100 per cent in diseases of the heart and kidneys, apoplexy and cancer. During the same period insanity has increased over 200 per cent.

"The exact causes of these and other chronic 'degenerative' diseases, which carry off a quarter of a million of our people every year, are still obscure. There is reason to believe that poisoning of the blood by infected teeth, tonsils and adenoids may be largely accountable for such maladies. Poisoning from such a source is, of course, a continuous process and may go on for many years without exciting suspicion. It may even affect the delicate tissues of the brain; but the chief recognized causes of insanity are alcohol, drugs, social disease, mental stress and overwork.

"Human life owes the lengthening of its average span largely to the fact that we have got rid of the great epidemic diseases which in earlier centuries killed people by wholesale. In Europe, during the Middle Ages, bubonic plague wiped out whole populations, and smallpox, in the eighteenth century, swept away more than 50,000,000 lives. Not much more than a century ago one in every ten deaths in New York City was from smallpox.

"During the Middle Ages the average human being hardly lived long enough to grow up, and comparatively few survived a sufficient length of time to reach old age. The span of life was short indeed. In the fourteenth century, from 1345 to 1351, the Oriental pest, bubonic plague, popularly known as the 'black death,' carried off in Germany more than a million persons.

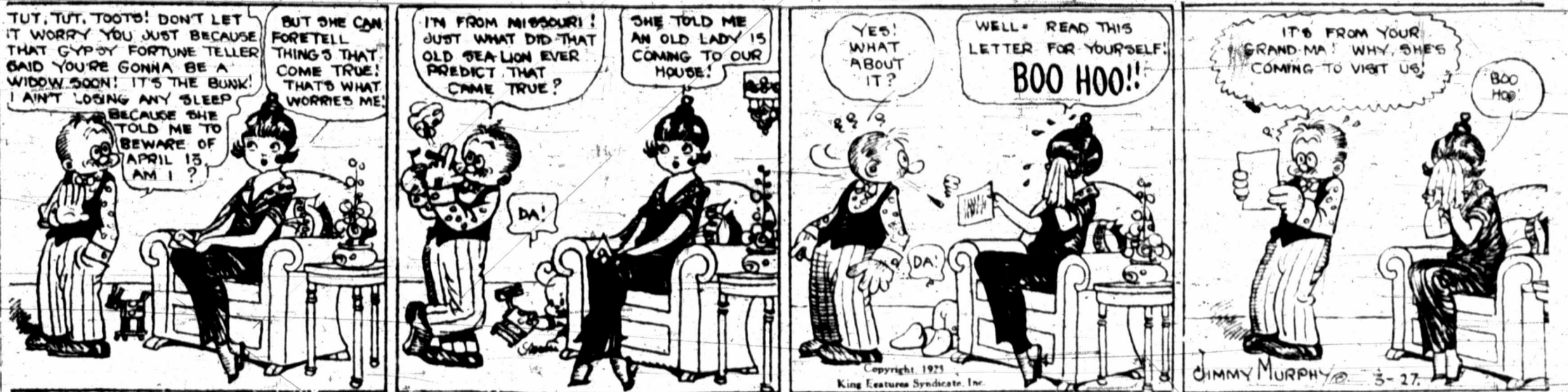

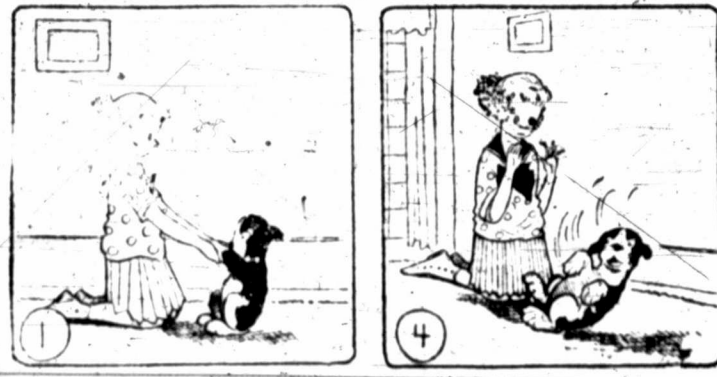

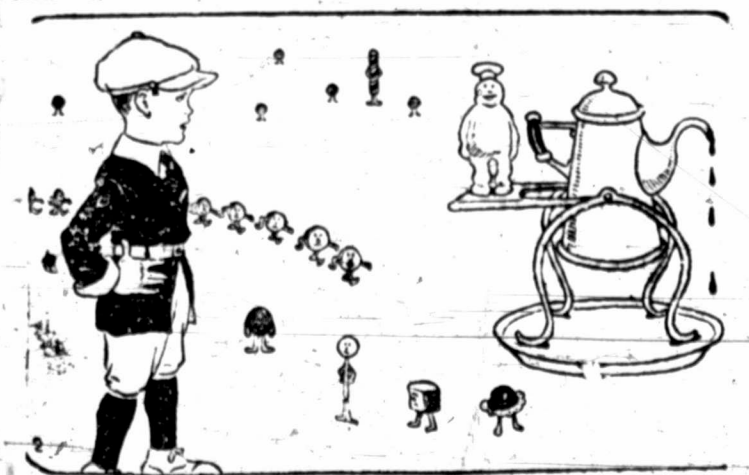
