He found in a study of more than 89,000 cases that of every thousand boys who enter the first grade 970 go on to the second grade, 930 remain through the second grade, 905 the fourth grade, 830 the fifth grade, 735 sixth grade, 630 the seventh grade and 490 the cighth grade.

Of the original thousand 239 entered the high school, 170 finished the second year, 120 the third year and 95 were graduated from the high school Of the 95, 50 men entered college, 40 kept on to the end of the second year, 20 to the end of the junior year and 10 were graduated.

"It is impossible, of course," commented Dr Brigham, "to determine how many of those that leave school leave on account of lack of pecuniary opportunity or on account of lack of intelligence. It is ridiculous to assume that 1,000 men in 10,000 bave sufficient intelligence to graduate from college and equally absurd to assume that only 10 in 1,000 have such a high intellectual endowment that they can graduate from college."

Dr. Brigham's conclusion that "It isn't that too many men go to college, but that some of the wrong kind of men do go to higher institutions of learning," appears reasonable and proper.

MUCH INVESTIGATION OF SUGAR PRICES

The Department of Commerce has investigated the sugar supply. The Department of Justice is investigating the price of sugar. Now comes President Harding with the announcement that he has ordered the Tariff Commission to inquire into the tariff rates on the increased price of sugar.

The Department of Justice has already found that there is no such shortage in the sugar supply as to warrant the great increase in price. The consumer is being gorged. That much is certain. By om and through what means are things that the partment of Justice and the Tariff Commission will seek to ascertain.

Investigations by the Department of Justice into sood prices have generally been futile. Often it has been found that prices have advanced from natural pnomic causes. And on the other hand when the blame has been placed and prosecutions made and guilt even established little relief has come to the trains are using calendars for time tables.
