#### DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE NOT TO BLAME.

Whoever may be responsible for the abnormal price of sugar, the San Antonio Express declares, no lame is to be attached to Secretary Hoover and the Department of Commerce. It does believe that speculators took advantage of the statement published in the report of the department, that sugar consumption for the year would probably outrun production by something like 700,000 tons. The speculators, says the Express, doubtless relied on the likelihood that comparatively few people would see or analyze the report and in this they were correct. That paper goes ahead to say:

"The Foreign and Domestic Commerce Bureau has helped the nation's business interests too much ger too long. for unjust attacks upon it to go unanswered. The sugar speculators carefully omitted to spread the fact -stated in the same report-that the final carryover at the year's end would be 476,000 tons, on account of a 1,203,000-ton surplus remaining from 1921. tial to a happy experience as exercise is to a healthy 22. Neither did they emphasize that the 1923 in body. crease, from 1922, was but 2 per cent in world sugarconsumption, as compared with a 16 per cent increase in 1922, over 1921-although the bureau's report plainly set forth all these facts.

"For example, the commerce department figures, published February 12, gave Europe's 1922-23 rawsugar production as 4.615,000 long tons. The data for other regions are analyzed just as carefully as Europe's. There would be no reason for doing otherwise, as each sugar-producing area has statisticians who check reports from every

"In February, Cuban producers estimated that the 1923 crop would yield 4,000,000 long tons of raw sugar. Drier weather than usual since then has caused some to deduct 500,000 tons from that estimate. This seems a huge shrinkage, but Java probably will more than account for the difference. Its crop will be at Teast 1.750,000 tons, according to the American consul, Mr. Buhrman, stationed in Soerabaya.

"Besides these great supplies, large quantities are coming even from Argentina and other places generally regarded as unsuitable for profitable cane cultivation. The native cane in Tucuman and other Argentine provinces is about exhausted, but the pardler Java variety is replacing it there. In 1922, Tucuman produced 169,361 long tons, and many other regions will do as well this year. The trouble-hunt ers will have to look elsewhere for the source of the February sugar-speculation, than in the commerce department reports, which are accurate according to official and non-official, but reliable data gathered throughout the world."
