





AN UGLY THING THAT LIES BELOW THE SURFACE.

We are forced to the conclusion from the results of the trials in Williamson county, Illinois, that the citizenship of that county does not condemn the slaying of the non-union miners at Herrin. It must be either this or else the jurors were fearful to return a verdict against the accused men.

Such a condition can only be less shocking than the actual massacre of the miners and must cause concern to all thoughtful citizens. And it is true that there are elements in our citizenship that do preach and practice that might makes right and which do not hesitate to stir up the baser passions in men to gain their end.

We have seen the things that happened at Herrin repeated only on a lesser scale at Mer Rouge. La., and at Harrison, Arkansas. Dominant public sentiment in those communities apparently approves the outrages that have been perpetrated there for the guilty go unpunished. The failure of justice in these cases stand as examples of a fearful thing that hes but a little below the surface of our civiliration and for which we have even open apologists.

STEEL CORPORATION INCREASES WAGES OF COMMON LABORERS.

The United States Steel Corporation will increase the wages of approximately 59,000 day laborers in its employ. These men now receive 36 cents an hour. Their wages are to be increased 11 per cent.

The increase probably results from the restriction of immigration. When immigration was free and unrestricted the great steel companies always had an abundant supply of laborers and as the law of supply and demand operates in wages as well as all other things, wages for common labor were held to a low level. Now with immigrant labor no longer flooding the market in such large numbers competition in the labor market is sending the prices of wages upwards. The revival of business is also a factor in this wage increase. Only last week the wages of thousands of operatives in cotton mills were increased.
