WEST TEXAS TRAINS DELAYED BY RAINS; MANY BRIDGES OUT

ADJUTANT GENERAL BLAMED FOR RIOTS AT HERRIN MINES

DALLAS, April 12.—West Texas, drenched last night and this morning with record breaking spring rains, today is facing transportation difficulties because of missing bridges and culverts. In some localities the downpour measured two and one-half inches in 10 hours. The Kansas City, Mexico and Orient Railroad reports the loss of several bridges between Sweetwater and Chillicothe. Creeks and rivers are bank full everywhere. Grain farmers and ranchmen have been greatly benefited. The rains were general over the state. Southern Pacific trains south of Corsicana were being detained today because of a washout at Thornton. Mainfall in Texas for the 24 hours ending at 7 o'clock this morning is reported as follows by the weather bureau from the following stations: Abilene 1.04 inches; Amarillo .64; Dallas 1.12; Del Rio .84; Galveston 1.40; Houston 1.38; Palestine 1.78; San Antonio 1.40; and Taylor 2.14. Near flood conditions were reported at noon in some south Texas streams and Brady creek in McCulloch county came down on a five foot rise. The San Antonio river reported on a seven foot rise. Some hail accompanied the rain and north of Brady along the Frisco right of way was covered in drift. Following a five inch rain at DeWitt, Texas, last night water stood several feet deep in the business part of town this morning. At one time the water was six inches deep in the Citizens bank building. Three miles was struck by a small tornado late yesterday, according to a dispatch from Breckenridge. Some damage was done and water today is standing in the streets.

PRESS CRITICISES BOTH FACTIONS IN PARLIAMENT CLASH

LONDON, April 12.—The government today bowed to the will of the opposition in the house of commons on the question of treatment of war veterans which broke up yesterday afternoon a small division Tuesday. The chancellor of the exchequer announced that a committee would be appointed to investigate the effectiveness of ex-service men in regard to the salaries they are receiving in the civil service. The speaker's answer to a question on the subject was that there were no indications in the early stages of the sitting that there was to be a repetition of last year's disorders in which blows were struck and some members of the radical element in the house chanted "The Red Flag".

Reported From Cairo Howard Carter Is Ill; Was With Carnarvon

By Universal Service. CAIRO, April 12.—Howard Carter, the American archaeologist who now becomes the principal figure in the exploitation headed by the late Lord Carnarvon, was taken ill today. Lady Carnarvon, who had planned to leave for England with the body of her husband, has delayed her departure until next week. Her movements will be contingent upon the condition of Carter's health. Lord Carnarvon's body left Cairo today for Alexandria where it will be placed aboard the steamer Heporus, for London.

A knife wound inflicted Wednesday by a playmate during a quarrel, resulted Tuesday at 11 a. m. in the death of Albert, Caple, 15-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Caple of Thornberry. The boy's father accompanied the body to this city and remained in attendance at the boy's bedside until death came. The knife was reported as having penetrated Caple's breast just above the heart.

ADJUTANT GENERAL SAYS COL. HUNTER TO BLAME

SPRINGFIELD, ILL., April 12.—Blame for the failure to send state troops to HERRIN to prevent the mine war which caused more than a score of deaths was placed on the shoulders of Colonel Sam Hunter, personnel officer of the state guard, by Adjutant General Carlos E. Black, testifying yesterday before the legislative committee investigating the affair. Colonel Hunter is expected to give his version of the events which culminated in the attack on the Lester mine near HERRIN, and the killing of the non-union workmen and guards.

DISPATCH DENIES REPORT HOWARD CARTER IS ILL

LONDON, April 12.—A Reuter dispatch from Cairo today declares there is no truth in the report that Howard Carter, the American Egyptologist, co-discoverer with the late Lord Carnarvon of the tomb of Tutankhamen, has been taken ill. Mr. Carter is reported to be shortly returning from Cairo to Luxor.

FIFTEEN HOUSES WRECKED BY STORM SEVERAL INJURED

ALEXANDRIA, LA., April 12.—Several houses were injured, fifteen houses wrecked and other damage done when a tornado struck Meridian, La., a sawmill town 20 miles south of here, early today, according to meagre reports received here. The injured were Mrs. Woods and Louis Wood, sawmill commissioner. From four to six negroes were hurt. The tornado was slightly felt in other parts of central Louisiana.

They declare that the reparations deliveries of coal and coke under pre-occupation conditions would have amounted to 4,500,000 tons of coal and coke.

Announce That Observations Of Eclipse of Sun Last September Uphold The Theory of Relativity

By Universal Service. LICK OBSERVATORY, MOUNT Hamilton, Cal., April 12.—Dr. W. W. Campbell announces that observations of the eclipse of the sun taken at Wallat, Australia, Sept. 21 last, uphold the Einstein theory of relativity.

This announcement has been awaited by the scientific world as conclusive proof of the theory of the celebrated scientist.

"These results are in exact accord with the requirements of the Einstein theory," Dr. Campbell, director of Lick Observatory and head of the Crocker expedition which went to Australia to make the tests, said tonight in summarizing the intricate calculations which have required months to make.

Dr. Campbell's statement said in part: "These results are in exact accord with the requirements of the Einstein theory and its immediate surroundings were secured in Australia with each of two specially designed and constructed cameras."

"Several years ago Einstein said that his theory of relativity must stand these astronomical tests successfully or be revised, one of the three tests consisting of the eclipse problem with which we are now concerned."

"Director Campbell and Dr. Trumpler of the Lick Observatory, have each in recent months measured three of the four Australian plates and the three corresponding night plates completely and independently."

"The agreement with Einstein's prediction from the theory of relativity is as close as the most ardent proponent of that theory could hope for. In fact, the agreement of one observed value with the predicted value is so satisfactory that the Lick Observatory does not plan to repeat the Einstein test at the total solar eclipse due to occur in extreme southwestern California and in Mexico on September 10, 1925."

"One pair of Australian Thallium plates, apparently excellent, remains unmeasured, but results therefrom, ready a month or two later, are not expected to modify the conclusions appreciably."

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GREAT BRITAIN TO PROTEST GRANTING U. S. CONCESSIONS

OBJECT TO AMERICANS ENTERING THE MOSUL OIL FIELDS.

AGREEMENT MADE WITH TURKISH NATIONALISTS

Washington Believes Controversy Can Be Adjusted By International Tribunal.

Associated Press. LONDON, April 12.—Great Britain protests against the granting by the Turkish nationalists of certain concessions in Anatolia to the American interests headed by Admiral Cobby M. Chester.

It is generally believed in London that in its present form the Chester agreement with the Turks differs materially from the original Turkish-American convention, although no exact details have been received from Constantinople.

In view of the official protest already made by France against these commitments to Americans as being in contravention of the Franco-Turkish railway and ports agreement of 1911, it is considered certain the whole subject will be argued at the approaching peace conference in Lausanne.

How far the Washington government can directly identify itself with the project is regarded here as a problematical proposition. Ankara's government, in awarding these concessions to Americans, are they are alleged to have been previously given a right in part to other countries, will undoubtedly raise issues calling for judicial, not even international settlement.

TOTAL IS 1,942,150 AS COMPARED WITH 1,908,450 BARRELS.

### NORTH TEXAS INCREASE NEAR THREE THOUSAND

Central Texas Is Credited With a Gain of 8,350 For Week Ending April 7.

NEW YORK, April 12.—The daily average crude oil production of the United States increased 33,700 barrels for the week ended April 7, totaling 1,942,150 as compared with 1,908,450 for the preceding week, according to the weekly summary of the American Petroleum Institute. The daily average production east of the Rocky mountains was 1,222,150 barrels, compared with 1,202,450, an increase of 19,700 barrels.

Oklahoma showed a daily average gross production of 316,100 barrels, an increase of 12,100; north Texas an increase of 2,500; central Texas an increase of 3,350; north Texas an increase of 2,500; north Texas an increase of 2,500; north Texas an increase of 2,500.

Mid-continent crude oil was unchanged, being quoted at 1.50 to 2.50 a barrel, according to the weekly summary of the American Petroleum Institute. The daily average production of the Gulf coast field-Hull was reported at 15,000 barrels against 15,000, and West Louisiana 19,000 against 19,000.

According to the institute imports of petroleum crude and refined oils at the principal United States ports for March totaling 2,627,000 barrels, a daily average of 84,900, compared with 2,521,921, a daily average of 81,384 for the month of February. Imports for the week ended April 7 totaled 1,865,000 barrels, a daily average of 266,429, compared with 1,815,000, a daily average of 260,714 for the week ended March 21.

### Tidal Wave of Reaction Against Minimum Wage Decision Spreads Rapidly Increasing In Momentum

WASHINGTON, April 11.—The tidal wave of reaction against the supreme court decision declaring minimum wage laws unconstitutional spread with rapidly increasing momentum among the progressive members of congress and champions of women's rights today.

Representative James A. Frear of Wisconsin, one of the leaders in the house progressive bloc and author of a bill requiring all but one of the justices to concur in a decision nullifying any federal or state statute, declared the minimum wage decision "has reached the climax of judge-made law."

Mary Anderson, director of the women's bureau of the department of labor, said: "To find that the minimum wage law is unconstitutional is nothing short of a calamity to the women workers of this country."

Representative Frear intimated that instead of requiring eight of the justices to concur in an opinion holding a law unconstitutional, he now is inclined to favor a requirement for unanimous decisions. Representative Frear pointed out that while five judges said the minimum wage law was unconstitutional, three justices "are positive it is valid and the position of the remaining justice (Brandeis) is equally certain." The Wisconsin progressive continued:

"Under repeated decisions the court has stated it will act only when unconstitutionality is beyond reasonable doubt. Justice Holmes, one of the strongest members of the court, and one of the oldest in point of service, says the power of congress to act is 'absolutely free from
