



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Gas Being Exhausted

The United States Bureau of Mines in a recent bulletin gives results of study of the natural gas fields that should prove of interest to all who enjoy this remarkable fuel. This bulletin says:

"This decline and exhaustion of gas fields indicates that new gas is not formed to replace that withdrawn, and suggests that if natural gas is now being generated by nature, it certainly is being generated very slowly, and the quantity is negligible when compared with the amount being used.

"The quantity of natural gas available to any community is determined by the resources of fields lying within a reasonable distance from that community, as the expense of transmitting gas for greater distances is prohibitive."

Only thru the organization of big systems can communities be sure of a gas supply. While for a short time a localsupply may prove adequate, it is inevitable that this source must be exhausted, then the gas must be drawn from widely separated points if the comfort of the public is to be maintained.

Only those who are engaged in this business realize the high costs and the hazards necessary to maintain a supply of natural gas. No other branch of public utility service is handicapped so much by the uncertainty of its supply and the unknown cost of obtaining it.

The country is on such a building boom as has ever been known in its history. Wages of building tradesmen are going up.

Prices of building materials are increasing. oh become so high that building costs will be the ocean its silvered eloquence? ractically prohibitive resulting in a "buyer's strike" hat will have much the same effect as the "buyer's strike" in 1921. To prevent such a situation there are some who are urging the government to take ection of some kind to stop the upward trend of ets. It is even being urged that the government stop all its public work so as to affect the situation. The Manufacturer's Record believes that the gov ernment and banking interests ought to steer clear all efforts at interference. "If the power of the sment or the banking interests," says the ecord, "is to be used at times to halt prosperity and silding activities, merely because prices of mateals or wages are regarded by officials as too high, then we will have fallen under the domination of a ternalism greater than this or any other country s ever known."

"When prices get too high the swing of the penulum in economic affairs will regulate prices betthan they can possibly be regulated by official ion. If prices go beyond what the public of its wa accord thinks reasonable, the public will cease buy or cease to build; but when financial influfaces or government officials undertake, by example or by teaching, to tell the public that prices are too high or too low they are going entirely outside of their province. Economic laws should be left to work out the movements of trade and commerce and siness. The government has not right to bull or star cotton or wheat or sugar or manufactured proets or credits or discount rates. These are beand the province of any government and become ternalism so rank as to ultimately spell ruin."
