

AWARD CONTRACT TO EXTEND SEWER AT BURKBURNETT

SCHOLASTIC CENSUS SHOWS POPULATION NOW EXCEEDS 5,000.

SERIES OF TRADES DAYS BEGIN NEXT SATURDAY

BURKBURNETT, April 14.—The Burk Burnett Sewer Company has awarded a contract covering an extension to present lines in compliance with a contract entered into with the city which has agreed to purchase same. The extension to be made covers the laying of approximately 1,000 feet of 3-inch tiling from present outlet northeast through the river bluff. Competitive bids were received and contract awarded to J. A. Wallace, of Wichita Falls. Mr. Wallace bid for the contract was \$2,500. The sewer company furnishing the tiling, which will make the extension approximately 1,000 feet.

In connection with the above expenditure the Burk Burnett Sewer Company is required under the terms of the contract to assume and discharge a 12-year lease held by John Vanclave for rental on land occupied by discharge lines of the system. The amount of this contract amounts to a total of \$2,900. The total consideration to be paid for the sewer system by the city is \$40,000 in legal bonds of the city of Burk Burnett or its equivalent. The sewer company contemplates fulfilling their part of the contract in 20 days, at which time the city will take charge, and in the meantime, a plan will be adopted, if possible, in which extensions to present system will be carried out to cover all parts of the city not now being served with present system.

Population Exceeds 5,000. Scholastic census just completed gives 5,131 children of scholastic age in the Burk Burnett independent school district. It is estimated that at least one half of these children reside within the city limits of Burk Burnett and according to the usual way of making computation of percentages of population on the basis of the population of every child Burk Burnett proper would at this time have a population of considerably more than 5,000.

On that date merchants will take advantage of the large crowds to be present by advertising some of their merchandise at special low rates. The third Saturday in each month during this summer has been designated as trade day and efforts will be made to have large crowds present on each of these occasions by the committee having it in charge.

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This Was About \$1,000 Before Fire Discovered Hiding Place And Reduced Value to \$94



It was about \$1,000—part of it the savings of a life-time, part of it given by a son. Now it is \$94.20, that is the value at 46 cents an ounce of the silver chunk that remained after fire visited the secret hiding place which Prince Lewis, aged negro, used in place of a bank. The mass of metal pictured above was all that remained of Lewis' money after his home at 412 Walnut was destroyed by fire on March 29. There had been about \$700 in silver, Lewis told officials of the City National Bank, in addition to some \$200 in currency. The bank forwarded the salvage to the mint at Denver, and last week was advised that it was worth \$24.20, being 142.7 ounces of silver, worth 66 cents an ounce. The currency, of course, was reduced to non-salvageable ashes. And now Lewis has a money order for \$94.20 to show for his

MAY GET \$300,000 FOR NEW BUILDINGS AT INSANE ASYLUM

FOUR NEW DORMITORY UNITS RECOMMENDED BY COMMITTEE. HOME FOR NURSES IS ALSO UPON PROGRAM

Committee Approves Plans For Materially Enlarging Institution's Capacity.

A number of new buildings will be constructed at the Northwest Texas Insane Asylum at Lake Wichita in the next two years, if recommendations of the senate finance committee at Austin are adopted. Four new dormitory units, sim-

ilar in size and appearance to those already in use, a home for the nurses and some smaller buildings, costing approximately \$250,000 are recommended by the committee. Maintenance appropriations of \$20,000 for the first year and \$25,000 for the second are recommended. Dr. Frank S. White, superintendent of the asylum, returned Saturday from a meeting at Austin.

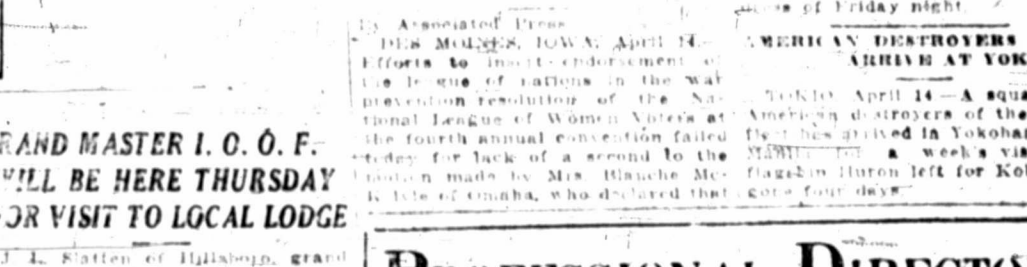

ABOUT THIS THING CALLED BIRTH-CONTROL

"Why don't you ever express yourself about birth control?" a correspondent writes reproachfully. "You've written 15 books and something like a hundred articles closely touching the things that interest and concern women; you've talked from platforms about much less vital subjects. This is the most important issue of them all! Are you afraid of it?"

After a few seconds in which I indignantly repudiated the suggestion of fear, I decided humbly that yes, I really was afraid of it. It is a ticklish matter to put down in harsh black and white, it is rather a subject for the morning room, where mothers and daughters talk together.

One of my fears, I realize now, was that for an article read generally by all sorts and kinds of persons, there was even a certain impropriety in selecting the question of birth control.

But upon second thought, I realize that I was wrong. Birth control is already, and there is at least a possibility that the little high school girl I am instinctively protecting may be discussing it with her group and finding plenty of printed matter to support whatever attitude she takes about it.

One more article can make no special impression in the heavily read press, to little children, a slightly different new point, a slightly different angle, a slightly different emphasis.

But that does not mean that I, as any other reasonable and conscientious person, need be tampering with what is equally natural for the body and the soul.

Our hospitals are full of white-faced women, struggling back to partial health, winning a few years before the inevitable and untimely end, because nature will not be eternally flouted, because delicate flesh and blood must pay the price when great privileges are abused and great purposes balked.

A campaign for the collection of funds for the erection and maintenance of a day nursery for negro children was started at the monthly meeting of the Federation of Colored Women's Missionary Societies. Twenty Acres of Pines Burned in The Production of "Hearts Aflame" At Strand Monday to Wednesday

In staging the tremendous forest fire in Reginald Barker's production, "Hearts Aflame," showing at the Strand Monday to Wednesday, Mr. Barker has created a spectacle that will stand for a long time as one of the really great achievements of the screen, and serve as a standard for similar scenes in cinematograph history. The fire scenes were the first ever swappa across the screen, turning 20 acres of beautiful towering pines to a black-strewn waste. In 10 minutes it destroys what nature took a hundred years to build. It is a sight never to be forgotten. Starting at the top of a ridge in the background and rushing down toward the camera with terrific leaps and bounds, the fire envelopes the entire forest in less than a minute. And through the haze in plain view of the spectator, Anna Q. Nilsson drives a locomotive, attacking courageously the thick line of flames that lick along the top of the ridge and dart in through the windows with every scorching gust of draft of air. The object of her wild ride is to secure powder to dynamite a ridge and save the women and children in the valley settlement beyond, and the fulfillment of her grave mission furnishes one of the greatest thrills in screen history.

Technically, the making of the forest fire scene was a stupendous project. For many and obvious reasons, the conflagration could not be started in the woods, so the forest had to be built especially for "Hearts Aflame." Two months were spent in uprooting the pine trees in the mountains, carrying them down to the location, and replanting them at the mouth of Pecosoua Canyon in the San Fernando Valley. As the trucks traveled in trains of five, all transporting had to be done at night to avoid other traffic.

Twenty cameras, the largest number ever used at one time on a scene, constituted the lens battery and 10 spotlights lit up the players who worked in various parts of the burning forest. Altogether, the electrical equipment employed approximated \$55,000 in value. There were five motor generators, three of the largest transformers in southern California, four miles of cable, hundreds of ordinary studio lamps, and a built-in 15,000 volt high tension line which connected with the main line of the Edison service a mile from the location.

During the five nights required for filming the long shots and close-ups of the fire scenes, there were never less than 200 people engaged on the location. This number included the director and his staff, the production staff, cameramen, electricians, police, forest rangers, laborers, carpenters, drivers for the emergency cars, and the corps of utility men. A medical tent was erected on the grounds and two doctors and a nurse were on hand all night watching the making of the scenes to render first aid.

In order that Mr. Barker might be in constant touch with every camera in the forest station, a field telephone service was installed.

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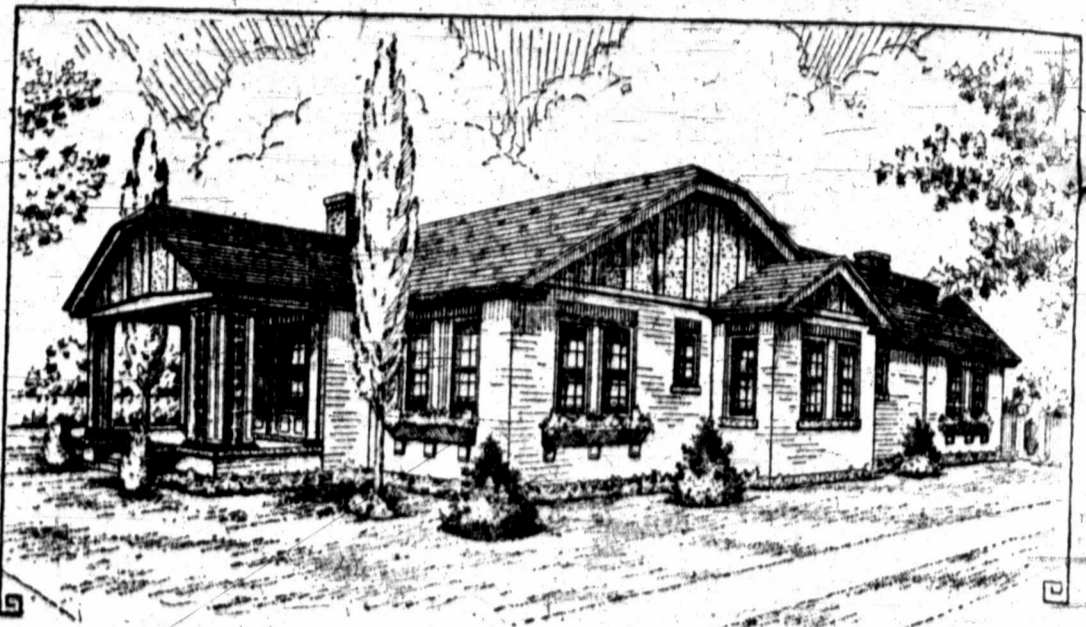

Merchant Marine Problem Like Man Holding a Hot Potato

By THOMAS R. MARSHALL, Former Vice President of the United States.

The sorriest page in the history of American economic life that has appeared upon which is written the legislation will with reference to the American merchant marine—and I write this without criticism of legislators or of the aims that actuated them.

Granting our inability, which is manifestly true, to operate these ships at a profit, it would appear to me that too much stress placed upon the fact that it is calculated to secure away in value in the area of prospective purchasers. But the hot potato must be disposed of in some way.

I myself, am not a ship subsidy man here, because we consider him a purely private character. On the other hand, I do not wish to see our flag disappear from the seas nor this great auxiliary to our navy disappear.

When the great war in Europe came on, President Wilson realized that the United States must enter the war. He asked congress to pass the ship bill of 1918, and congress responded by passing the act.

In a marvelously short period of time we built a most magnificent merchant marine. It cost, perhaps, the greatest amount of money that the world ever saw expended for such a purpose.

GERMAN INTELLECTUALS FACE SERIOUS FINANCIAL PLIGHT

BIG BRAINS OF NATION ON WAY TO POORHOUSE SAYS CARPENTER OUTLOOK FOR FUTURE GLOOMY

Will "Kultur" Disappear?—German Professors and Their Pitiful Salaries—Selling the Family Silver to Pay the Coal Bills—One Hundred Thousand College Boys and How They Exist—University Students on One Cent a Day—Mount Olympus and its Lodgings at Three Cents a Month—In a Students' Restaurant—One Ounce of Meat Makes a Ration—A Talk with Professor Dr. Harnack on the Outlook for the Future.

BERLIN, GERMANY.—"It seems as though the devil was sweeping over the nations in a great tidal wave but nevertheless we know that God lives."



These were the words of Professor Dr. Harnack, the most famous of German theological professors and the foremost of modern church historians, uttered to me today in his study in the great Palace of the Kaiser in the heart of Berlin. Professor Dr. Harnack has something the same position here that Dr. Eliot, president emeritus of Harvard, holds in the United States. He has been writing books which have attracted attention during a period of almost half a century and his name is known throughout the world as the exponent of liberal Christianity.

I had called to ask him as to the condition of the intellectuals in Germany and the conversation drifted to the low morality of the times and the prospects for the future. Speaking of the sinking of the intellects, Dr. Harnack said: "I suppose you refer to the professors, teachers, students and men who make their living out of their brains. I can explain that in a few words. We do not despair, but we do not despair. If you ask me how Germany is faring, I would say I do not know. If you ask me how I am faring, I would give the same answer. I do not know. None of us know. The outlook is dark but we do not despair. We need help, but we expect to keep on hoping and working. I trust the time will soon come when America will stop saying she will not interfere in European matters. We need her help and we feel she could do good. But whether that time comes or not, Germany will surely get on her feet, although without America's aid, it will take her longer to do so."

The Future of "Kultur"

"How are these times affecting the soul of the German people?" I asked. The reply of Professor Dr. Harnack was the words at the beginning of this letter. He continued:

"Here in Germany the luxury and loose life which you see everywhere are a disease which our people have caught. It is not unnatural considering that we have no inducement to thrift. No one will save when he is sure his savings will disappear the next day. Every night the people spend what they have rather than see it swallowed up in the fall of the mark the next morning. As to men of my class, we have no surplus, what we have is trouble is that we have not the means to educate our children along the lines in which we have lived. This will affect the culture of Germany of the future and the outlook for our intellectual life is a dark one."

"The worst of the whole situation," concluded the learned doctor, "it seems to me, is the fate of the young and especially of the children. These hard times may be a punishment and they are perhaps a just punishment but it is not fair that the punishment should fall on the heads of the babies. It makes no difference if we old people die. We have lived our lives and it might be as well if we pass away. I have been here more than three score and 10 years and I am ready to go. So are many others of my age in my class. But our babies are dying for want of milk and our children need the food which they must have to become strong, able men. That surely is not God's promise and I do not believe it can long continue."

Big Brains on the Way to Poorhouse

I have entitled this letter "Big Brains on the Way to the Poorhouse." This expresses the situation among the live, thinking, intellectual Germans of today. The culture and science of the country is on the edge of dissolution, because these men are practically paupers and their means of existence have been wiped out by the fall of the mark. This class includes the lawyers, doctors, artists, musicians, authors and all those who had their own individual fortunes invested in conservative securities. It includes the professors and school teachers of whom Germany has tens of thousands. There are today in the public schools more than 16,000,000 pupils, and of the less than 200,000 teachers about 10,000 are women. There are in the universities more than 100,000 students who are supported by very slender allowances from home, which, by the shrinkage of the mark, have been reduced to practically nothing. The University of Berlin has 11,000 such students, Munich has 7,500, Leipzig has over 5,000 and the Universities of Bonn and Breslau each about as many.

University Professors at 83 a Month

The universities are crowded with professors. Berlin has more than 500, Munich over 200, and Bonn and Heidelberg each 200 and upward. These professors are getting on an average a salary of 110,000 marks a month, the amount having been fixed the first of this year. This is equal, at the present exchange, to about \$5 and it is impossible to see how they can find food for their families. Many of them are selling their books consisting, in some cases, of fine editions which represent the savings of a life-time. Others are selling their furniture, and one whom I met the other day told me how he had sold all his classics and even some reference books and that his wife had had to pawn the family silver to pay a recent coal bill.

University Tutors are Now Getting Ninety Thousand Marks a Month

A little more than four dollars, and public school teachers, who have always received very low wages, are paid so little that it amounts to a comparatively few cents a day. A teacher of Swedish gymnastics, who is well known here, despairing of fixing a mark price for her services, has established a rate of one pound of margarine per hour, by which it means that she takes the equivalent of that price for each hour's work.

A Nation of Scholars

How wide-spread these conditions are can be understood only by those who realize the part education takes in the life of the German people.

was encircled with dog chains fastened with numerous padlocks. I asked what this meant and the manager said the student occupant adds to his income by buying old umbrellas which he patches and repairs and then sells again. The wardrobe contained his stock in trade. The manager tells me the students do all sorts of things to help out on their expenses. Three of them are porters in the theaters, one is a night watchman and others work in banks and offices for a few hours every day. Many teach part of the time and some who are musicians play at night in the cafes, theaters and moving picture shows. Some go to the railroad stations and drum up business for a hotel connected with the home, receiving one-fourth of a cent for each guest they bring in.

In a Students' Restaurant

This home has a general restaurant where about 500 boys and girls are fed daily. The meals are more elaborate than those at the army barracks, and cost more. The actual price of a dinner is one cent and a half, and for this is given a soup, meat, potatoes, vegetables and gravy, but no bread or butter or coffee or beer.

They Still Fight Duels

Among these students were both boys and girls. I saw one boy who had a fresh cut of a sword on his face showing that dueling still prevails among the students notwithstanding their poverty. In other homes where the students live, the quarters are more pretentious. I visited one where each boy has to pay a cent a day for his room alone and where the restaurant serves food a la carte at from one to two cents a dish. I was told that the restaurant was frequented chiefly by day laborers, as it was too costly for the intellectuals. In a third restaurant where the boys took their own rooms and doing their own cooking, on each floor was a little kitchen where the boys took turns in preparing their individual meals. A fine-looking young man of 23 was frying a pan of potatoes when I looked into one of the kitchens. It was told that that was all he would eat for his dinner.

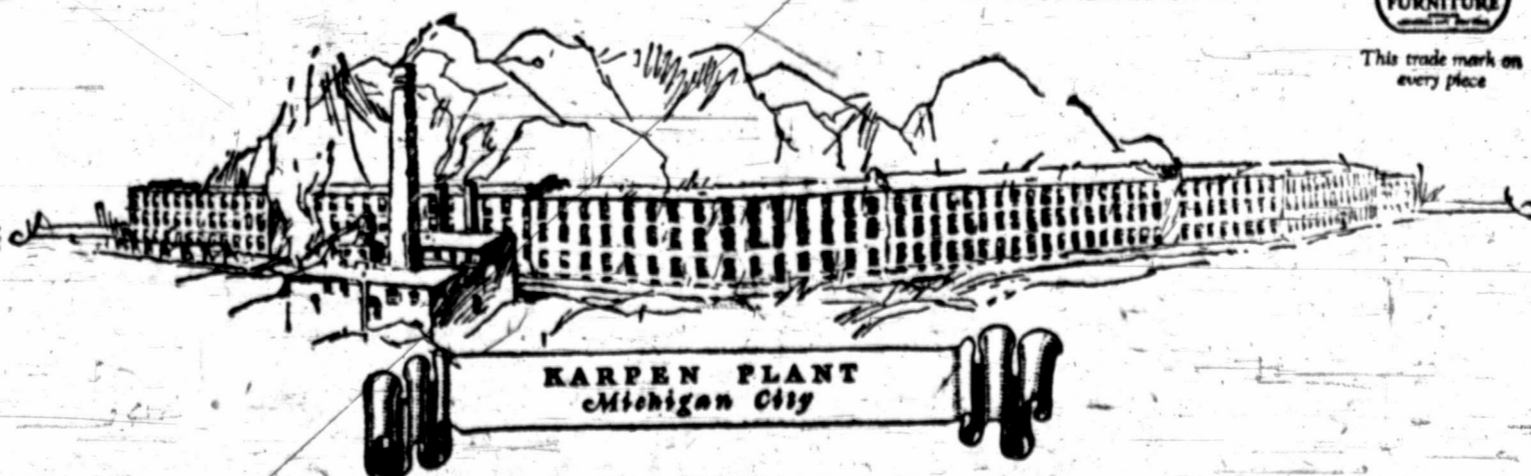

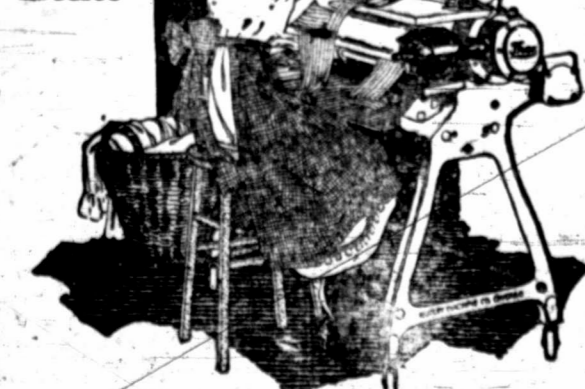

NEW OFFICE HOME ELECTRIC COMPANY TO BE OPEN TO PUBLIC FROM 2:30 TO 9:30 ON MONDAY

A giant electric sign bearing the inscription "Wichita Falls Electric Company" points the way to the new home of Wichita Falls' foremost public utility, which will be opened to the public for inspection Monday, April 16, from 2:30 until 9:30.

Large three candle light lamps are placed as sentinals at the entrance and on either side are display windows, with a depth of 10 feet. These are lighted with X-ray mirror back-reflectors with color screens making possible a change in the lighting effect. A variety of colors, including red, blue, amber or combinations may be most effectively used.

The walls of the interior are warm and soft in a pale tan with a ceiling of oyster white. The fixtures and all of the woodwork are in a light oak which was selected because of its durability and the very attractive finish possible.

An indirect lighting system is used, affording an even distribution of light, no glare and soft shadows. The fixtures are very appropriately dignified and beautifully artistic. The electric fans which are placed intermittently with the lights are trimmed to match the lights, with blades of the light oak.

Near the entrance is a handsome lamp cabinet, designed by the local appliance engineer for the purpose of demonstrating the different power lights and offering a comparison for the benefit of the customer. Adequate storage space for lamps is provided for in the lower part of the cabinet. With this equipment it is possible to keep the lamp stock in an orderly and attractive manner.

More than 40 convenience outlets have been arranged for in the appliance department. Connection for electric range with a special plug making possible immediate change in article demonstrated, and connection for the demonstration of an electric refrigerator are included. An ideal hot water insulation will also be demonstrated.

A horse shoe arrangement of show cases for the display of appliances occupies the central portion of the appliance department. Appliance display tables, wired, may be conveniently moved wherever necessary, and ample cabinet space down the entire length of one wall offers every opportunity for the exhibition of every type of electric convenience.

At the rear of this department will be found the cashier's cage with X-ray bank lights over each window. Two large bricked vaults with air chambers and steel doors have been incorporated for the filing of all records.

The office for the handling of new business, where application for services is made, the office of the appliance manager and that of the commercial manager are all included in the appliance department. The managers office and the room for the regular efficiency meetings, are on the second floor.

Accounting Department
The accounting department is also on this floor. Comfortable, light and unusually well ventilated no detail for the convenience and well being of the companies employees has been overlooked from the Western Union clock to the cooler of filtered water.

The arrangement of these offices is such that the ledger clerks are conveniently grouped. In the location of the ledger racks the convenience of the cash posters and the connect and disconnect clerks was kept in mind. The disbursement and time slips are convenient to all departments of the company. The most modern and efficient equipment has been carefully selected for the promotion of good business methods as well as comfortable working conditions.

The rear of the building downstairs is given over to a large garage space for the storage of the company's cars and trucks. Minor repairs will be cared for here. Locker rooms for the linemen and outside workers are provided in this section of the building. A four ton elevator is incorporated. This facilitates the handling of construction material, which is stored upstairs. A truck can be raised to the second floor, loaded, lowered and driven right out into the street.

"A community is no better than its utilities and it is necessary that they prosper to keep up with the growth of the city in which they are located," declared F. A. Rogers, manager of Wichita Falls Electric Company.

"A public utility should be prepared to give a service that will compare favorably with that offered in the largest town that a citizen may visit, and should give the same attention to every detail that would be the case if there were a hundred competitors in the field," Mr. Rogers said.

The questions arising because a utility has a monopoly should be regulated through just and legally constituted authority by means of city ordinances," Mr. Rogers stated when asked how the people may be assured of fairness and just treatment in this respect.

SAFETY METHODS ARE PROMOTED BY POWER COMPANY

PLANT AND SYSTEM PROVIDED WITH EVERY POSSIBLE SAFETY DEVICE.

ACTIVE STUDY OF SAFETY PROBLEMS

Bi-Monthly Meetings Held at Which Hazards Are Thoroughly Discussed.

The Wichita Falls Electric Company has taken an active course in advancing modern safety methods including the holding of regular meetings of all men employees for the discussion of these problems.

Within the last two decades the railroad companies were the first to adopt safety work and most of us can remember when the slogan "safety first" came before the public.

This movement started by the railroad companies has recently been carried into large manufacturing and industrial organizations, utilities, and organized public institutions, including very effectively the public schools.

The industrial organizations throughout the country have made marked progress in the providing of medical clinics and emergency hospitals in order to care for injured employees.

Guarding devices are being provided on all machines with rotating and revolving mechanisms which protrude into the aisles or in any position to come in contact with the employees. This practice has come to be almost obligatory on industries and manufacturers who employ female labor.

Guards have been placed over all traveling belts, rotating pulleys, sprockets and pinions, which would afford a hazardous condition for drawing in loose clothing.

Section Covered With Electric Power Lines

The Wichita Falls Electric Company has the largest transmission system in West Texas, serving an extensive territory, including surrounding towns and oil fields.

The local plant is equipped with auxiliaries sufficient to take care of any emergency or breakdown which might occur and other towns realize that this means for them an uninterrupted 24-hour service, and are therefore eager to take advantage of this condition.

Public Educated Also.

The public utility appreciates and realizes its position in the community in which it serves and in following the general safety movement is striving to bring about means and facilities for protection, not only of its own employees, but also general hints to the public with whom it comes in contact.

In order to most effectively bring about these results safety leagues or bureaus have been adopted through which aid and reports reach the public from a national bureau which at all times has before it the one idea of safety.

The Wichita Falls Electric Company has kept pace with this movement in the founding and organization of a safety committee which holds bi-monthly meetings for the instruction and benefit of all its male employees. At these intervals the employees are brought together in the spirit of a get together, more or less social meeting, at which time a program is presented bearing upon the teaching of "safety first."

Reports are submitted by various committees who have investigated new safety devices for the benefit of the construction and maintenance men.

Should any accidents have occurred during the intervening time subsequent to a former meeting, there is a general discussion of conditions bearing upon the cause of such accident, with the one thought in mind to leave a lasting impression, that through care and attentive and possibly watchful waiting the accident could have been avoided.

A wonderful good is derived from such movement. No one appreciates its effects more than those who come in daily contact with hazardous problems either of electrical or mechanical nature.

The lasting impression given carelessness and unskillful individuals by these meetings and discussions are bound to cause them to be more careful in their own work and in most cases save themselves from harm.

The company has endeavored, this year, to broaden its instruction and activities in order that it may be helpful to the community. Representatives of the various city departments, boys' organizations, and public schools are invited to attend the regular meetings held under auspices of the company's safety league.

Ideas may be exchanged between various civic representatives and a great deal of good derived from a broader organization.

Bulletins Posted at Schools.

Through the courtesy of the Wichita Falls Electric Company, bulletins are posted on the bulletin boards of all the public schools each as well as sent out regularly by the National Safety Council with headquarters in Chicago. These bulletins are very instructive and give helpful aid to young students and may remind them of safety cautions which may prevent serious accidents in their play.

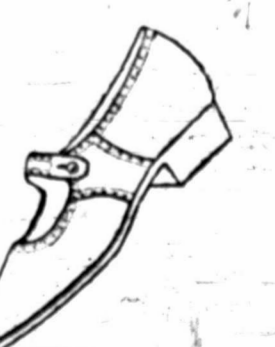

USE OF ELECTRICITY FREEING WOMANKIND FROM DRUDGING WORK

When Mr. Man-of-the-House goes into business great things happen. There is much mention of the word "equipment" and the often heard term "to promote efficiency." Father is fitting up his office. Does he have a guilty feeling of extravagance? Certainly not. It has been proven that good equipment does promote efficiency, and father's business must be made to pay, you know, therefore his time and labor saving equipment is looked upon as an investment. But what about Mrs. Man-of-the-house? How about her equipment? How about making her business pay? Thanks to the inventive genius of our manufacturers, the home has ceased to be a place of exile for woman. The long hours that used to be spent in the kitchen, and the tear and muscle (and nerves) being cut down by labor saving equipment. In connection with labor and time saving machinery for the home the greatest strides have been made in the development of electric equipment and today almost any phase of housework may be lightened by an electric device to meet that need.

Electric Devices in Kitchen. In the kitchen there is almost no end to the variety of table devices that are now in use. The electric mixer, meat grinder, and device to be placed in a receptacle of water for heating. That age-old drudgery, dish washing, is no longer a dismal task to be patiently endured, since the family sized electric dish washer has come into use and is in the financial reach of the most modest income.

Then there is the Grill stove on which three types of cookery can be accomplished at once, toasting, broiling and boiling. Nifty to this are the electric waffle iron.

Washing No Longer Drudgery. The electric washing machine has been perfected longer than most other electric equipment and perhaps has been a greater boon to the housewife than any of the

others will ever be. An electric washer has come to be a necessity, not a luxury, in thousands of homes. The electric iron has been a great labor saver but the mechanically operated ironer, the mangle, has taken a still greater stride ahead. Just as the washing machine has been a boon in washing clothes so the mangle has meant much in lightening the laborious task of ironing them. It not only saves energy used in walking but saves time due to its large area of heated surface.

Many Uses of Vacuum Cleaner. Relatively the broom occupies the vacuum cleaner the same position that the ox cart does to the modern, high-powered automobile as far as efficiency and covering ground are concerned. With reasonable care a good vacuum cleaner will see many years roll by without any expenditure other than the operating expense which is almost negligible, being between one and two cents an hour. Aside from saving of human nerve force the machine is a life saver for fine rugs and carpets.

Its many features offer no ground for controversy as the effect upon our health of dusty air, laden with bacteria is obvious to all. Children, especially the little tots play on the floor and many of the ailments of childhood may be contracted from that source.

The Automatic Refrigerator. Many are already familiar with the great servant, electricity, in its new guise, the automatic refrigerator. The cost of operating an electric refrigerator is low enough to be practical and the convenience of having cubes of ice on hand all the time, the increased keeping quality of the food stored in the refrigerator due to its uniformity and the degree of temperature, and the elimination of the ice man and the many attending inconveniences all tend to make it one of the most welcome of new household equipment.

Until comparatively a few years ago, the sewing machine was the only piece of machinery used by the woman in the house. It was a great time saver but now with the introduction of the electric motor attached it has gone a step further and become a labor saver as well.

The electric fan is more than a luxury for the housewife on hot summer days when she must go right on with numerous household duties regardless of the wearing, weakening pressure of an ever increasing temperature.

And so due to electricity machinery for the household, housekeeping has come to be an interesting, absorbing business, and need no longer be a place of dreary drudgery.

As you have through God been much blest.
Without the aid of any musical instrument and depending entirely upon the dictates of his soul and the utilization of his knowledge of music, the prisoner composed the music, the tune, and the piano accompaniment.

Toussaint has incanted into the music that feeling that soon he will again be free. In the words he has sensed the same feeling and Monday morning when he again steps into the court room to face trial on the murder charge for the second time, he will enter that hall of justice and mercy with the same feeling within his mind and heart he declares.

Toussaint is charged with the murder of his father. He told officers the day after his father's body was found and a short time after he had been placed under arrest that his father and he had quarreled many times over his mother and her death.

At all times has the prisoner expressed a deep regard for his mother who passed away years ago. Toussaint told officers that he had accused his father of mistreating his mother and that one time had held him responsible for her death.

Another source of ill feeling that arose and existed between he and his father, Toussaint told officers was the treatment which Toussaint said his father had subjected Mrs. Toussaint, Jr.

The prisoner's wife has remained in Wichita Falls throughout the time and will without a doubt be present Monday morning when her husband again faces trial.

These few points Toussaint has embodied into the words that he wrote for the music he composed. The words of his follow:

Faith, Work and Righteousness Essential Elements of Success, Judge Kay Tells His Bible Class

Faith and work and righteousness will win for any individual today just as they won for Abraham this day, Judge John C. Kay told his Bible class of the First M. E. church, South, at the Olympic last Sunday. Judge Kay's lecture follows:

Who was vice-president during Roosevelt's first administration? I believe that most of us don't know. But we have here Abraham, a character that has grown with the ages.

Did you ever stop to think how much you owe to your country? I believe we boast about our discoveries, and our civilization, and our inventions, and our improvements, but I believe we are nothing compared to what was done by men before this curtain.

What about the fellow that discovered fire and how to use it? Who was it that discovered for you which plant and weed to eat and which to let alone? And when to plant and when to harvest? What fruits were good and what were not? What plants had medicinal virtues? All that was done before they ever lifted the curtain, and much more that will not stop to relate. The reason that we think we are great is because we are the heir of all those who toiled before us. That makes our responsibilities that much greater, and that much more important.

Now, I used to think when I was a boy, that this man Abraham was a cow man with a little local reputation on the creek where he lived, but I know now that he was a great king and emperor. He ruled that country for twenty-five hundred miles, and his name was known all through Persia, India, China, and up among the snowy hills and mountains of Asia. Why, he went out and captured and slaughtered a whole group of kings. He was a very, very great man.

Now, what is it that shines about him? How is it that his name spread to the ends of the earth, as they know it then? He was what these all men call, and you know, I like some of their phrases, "a square shooter." He everywhere exhibited a disposition and a character for doing right. But, the biggest thing to me in his whole character, is that he was not contentious. Ah, thou little narrow, cross-grained man, that's holding out, and holding out for something that is not important.

Here was old Abraham, living with his nephew Lot, and they were in the cow business, and like most of the Jews, got rich. And the cowboys got in a row over the grass and water holes, and over the wells, and this war among the cowboys got up to Abraham and Lot, and Lot went to contend with him and present his side of it, and the side of his cowboys. What does the big man say? What does the great man say? Not a little, narrow, contentious fellow like I am, or you are, he says, "Old Abraham looked him over and I can see him looking down at Lot and saying: 'Now, Lot, the whole country is before you. If you want to go east, I will go west, but if you want to go west, I will go east. Take what you want and leave me what you will.' Ah, there were 'great men living before me—remember, as Byron has well said, 'In these anybody in Wichita Falls big enough to settle a row like that? What Lot wanted was a riot, and maybe a lawsuit, and a lot of ill along a man in a settlement with these cowboys. Wouldn't we have started something out here in Texas with a thing like that? Here comes along a man in a settlement with you, and he claims a difference of about four or seven dollars. Let him have it. You could make more than that while you are worrying with it. Here's a fellow says 'I said that will. Don't you remember I was in there on a certain Sunday? Probably he didn't, but it is possible that he did. Let him go with it.

Why was Abraham great? Because men had to believe in him. You just couldn't help but believe in him and in the language of the street, you had to hand it to him.

They didn't build Abraham a tomb like they did for the Egyptian kings. Some of the pyramids that were built over them took men years and years to build. But, they put him in a limestone cave at Machpelah. Ah, you can't make a great man with a tomb. Nobody knows where Moses is buried.

What was it made Abraham great? You know, my definition of faith is a little different to that of some people. I believe in leaving the results to God. All I want to do, and all I think I have to do, is to do as best I can the things that I know how to do. I am not the paymaster. There are no rewards, and no punishments; in my heart, I am just an humble workman in that great fabric that is called civilization. I am just one of the millions of men that are trying to increase righteousness, and increase sobriety, and build up a brighter, and better, and higher civilization, for those that shall come after me. All I can do is to work, and leave the results.

So, they told this man Abraham to go down into a 'new country.' That he knew nothing about. I think it is fair to say, the way the record looks to me, that he left the next morning. How about you? If somebody was to tell you to go out for some part of Brazil, or Argentina, or Venezuela, or some place in the United States, you would look around and ask, 'Is there anybody in this neighborhood that ever did it there that could tell me anything about it? What sort of government have they got? What sort of people are they? What is the fare down there? Are there any schools, any churches, any railroads? Abraham left right then, without asking any questions. Because he could make the country, he could make civilization just like our forefathers did in coming out here, and just like we ought to do, and have got to do or perish. His character stood up because of his courage and his faith. I don't know whether there is any difference in faith—mid-courage. The more I study about that, the muddier I get, as to whether or not there is any difference. It looks to me like courage is one of the things that it took for this old man, at his time of life, to go down into this new country.

And, yet, people are saying that these old-timers are out of date that they are old fogies, that they

to you. Every man goes out into a new world. He is born into a new one, and he has got to find his own way, and he makes it by faith and by work. These two words, faith and work, are pretty often linked together in the Bible, and ought to be linked together in your life, and in mine. Perhaps, we can't be as great as Abraham, it is quite likely that we can't be, but we can understand righteousness and fair dealing, just as well as he did.

Now, I expect that you will forget most that I have said here this morning, but the next time you have a little row and contention, don't forget what Abraham said about this row over the grass and water. 'Here it is, if you want to go West, I will go East, and if you want to go East, I will go West.' Why, you can't have a row with a man like that. It can't be done. Can't be done. It is not lucky to have a row like that. Why? Because, when every opportunity was offered to Lot, when Abraham said, 'Have it your way and take what you want, he pitched his tent toward Sodom and was almost lost in the most awful calamity that humanity ever faced.

Whenever you contend with a righteous man, and whenever he leaves it up to you and gives you your choice, you are going to bet on the white when you ought to bet on the red. Now watch and see if you don't. That's what became of Lot. Abraham was alright any place, any place. A fellow says, 'I don't like it down here in Texas. You will hear them say that. Well, boom much when you say, 'I say to him: 'Brother, did you Virginia? Another fellow says, 'I

have been farming here and I can't raise a thing. Ask him how he got along in Georgia, and what he brought here with him, and so on. It is mostly the man. It is mostly the 'Abraham' in him, the faith and work and righteousness, that makes him great.
