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WHOLESALE PRICES SHOW SLIGHT GAIN MONTH OF MARCH

WASHINGTON, April 17.—An increase of one and one-quarter per cent in wholesale prices in March as compared with February was shown in figures on 404 commodities announced today by the bureau of labor statistics of the department of labor.

Building materials and metals showed the greatest advance in price, averaging three and seven per cent, respectively.

Food and lighting with an average decline of 2.7 per cent showed the only decrease of all the commodities due to further declines of bituminous coal prices.

Compared with March a year ago, the general level of prices showed an increase of 13 per cent.

Metals and metal products were 32.7 per cent higher; building materials 25.7 per cent; clothes and clothing 16.7 per cent; farm products 10 per cent; and miscellaneous commodities 5.3 per cent.

IS INCLUDED IN LIST OF 14 URGED FOR EARLY SURVEYS.

ONE OF SEVEN DAMS PROPOSED FOR BRAZOS

Would Be Part of Comprehensive Flood Prevention Scheme For That River.

Seymour dam is greatly pleased to learn late Monday that the Brazos dam project had been included among the first to receive attention from federal and state authorities and had been recommended for early survey.

Reports from Austin that repeat of the \$60,000 appropriation for flood and reclamation surveys would be sought at the special session expected to result in efforts to block any such legislation.

The state board of water engineers recommended a list of 14 projects to the United States geological survey, which will do the first engineering work of the recommended seven, are on the Brazos and its tributaries, forming part of a general program to reduce flood damage in the Brazos Valley. The project in which Seymour is interested is part of the flood prevention system, in addition to its irrigation potentialities.

Working Women in Twelve States Thoroughly Aroused Over Decision Affecting the Minimum Wage Law

WASHINGTON, April 17.—Working women in no less than 12 states are thoroughly aroused over the decision rendered this week by the United States supreme court declaring unconstitutional the minimum wage law of the District of Columbia. The fear is expressed that as a result of this decision similar laws in the 12 states will fall and that the earnings of the million and a half women workers in these states will suffer reduction.

With a view of trying to work out some plan to maintain the standard of wages for women the National Women's Trade Union League has initiated a movement for a conference of the various national women's organizations which is proposed to assemble in Washington probably early in May. Those which will be invited to participate are: The National Consumers League, National League of Women Voters, Y. W. C. A., C. T. U., Girls' Friendly Societies, National Council of Jewish Women, National Council of Catholic Women, General Federation of Women's Clubs, American Association of University Women, National Congress of Mothers and Parent-Teacher Association, National Council of Women, National Federation of Business and Professional Women, as well as others.

NEW INTEREST IN HERRON CITY AND WILD BEND FIELD

GRAHAM, TEXAS, April 17.—Interest seems to be swinging back to the Herron City-Wild Bend district. Penn Cities McGarr brought in what appears to be a mighty good well at 2250 feet on the Abernathy survey. When the sand was scratched the well began gushing profusely. They have shut down set storage and connect up pipeline. The well is about one-fourth mile from the big Phillips Petroleum Casinghead Gas Plant, and since the gasoline is reported to be very rich in gasoline content, it is likely to be very valuable to the company, even as a gas-er.

The Seaboard Oil & Gas Company brought in a well Saturday on the Hughes land—Simmons lease—at 2340 feet, good for 100 barrels. This is a part of the property included in the big deal last month when the Seaboard Oil & Gas Company took over the Penn Cities-Simmons holding in this part of Young County.

The Gulf-Hookaday well, four miles from Graham, is beginning to talk on the appearance of a real oil field. Four new derricks now surround the big discovery well, while as many more are prouing to move in. C. W. Whitehead, who has had an extended fishing job on his No. 1 Johnson, one mile east of Graham, is again drilling at around 2,900 feet. This well lacks only about 200 feet being down to the Gulf-Hookaday sand, and is being watched with keen interest by operators.

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PETITIONS FOR FIVE BLOCKS OF PAVING PRESENTED MONDAY

HUFF, 13TH AND POLK STREET INVOLVED; ACTION IS DELAYED.

POSSIBLE REDUCTION IN TAX RATE SEEN

Equalization Board to Be Appointed Soon; Delay Naming of City Precursor.

Petitions calling for the construction of five more blocks of pavement in the residence section were submitted to the city council at the Monday night meeting. Figures on the available city funds for excavation were given and action on the petitions was withheld until some definite information concerning the financing of other paving projects could be secured.

The petitions called for two blocks on Huff Avenue from Marshall to Clark and on Thirteenth from Clark to Grace; and three blocks on Polk Avenue D to Avenue G. The two petitions were signed by practically all of the property owners on the streets, according to the paving men who presented them.

It was also learned that the M. & T. Ry. was considering the paving of the alley way to the rear of the union station, between Eighth and Tenth streets. J. T. Gant of the Wichita Ice Company appeared before the council with the request that the work be postponed until fall on account of the interference with the delivery department of his company. The council did not take any official action on the request.

At Commissioner Young's suggestion, the appointment of a special prosecutor for the city court was held over until next meeting night. F. C. Johnson, desk sergeant for the police department was appointed deputy city clerk with the customary bond of \$1,000.

H. J. Anderson, city tax collector, met with the council and announced that the tax roll would be finished by May 1 and requested the council to consider the appointment of the board of equalization. Mr. Anderson said Monday night that if the present valuation were retained that a five cent reduction in the tax rate would be possible. It is probable that the valuation of \$34,000,000 for 1922 will be retained for the next year and the present rate reduced from \$1.55 to \$1.50. The equalization board will be appointed at the next regular meeting of the council.

ROXANA PETROLEUM CORPORATION WANTS INDIAN OIL LANDS

APPEAL FROM RECENT DECISION OF INTERIOR DEPARTMENT.

DOMESTIC CORPORATION BUT FOREIGN CONTROLLED

Secretary Work Expected to Withhold Decision Pending Study of Briefs.

WASHINGTON, April 17.—An attempt to lift the restrictions placed upon foreign participation in the natural wealth of the United States was made today in an appeal by the Roxana Petroleum Corporation from a decision of the interior department barring it from holding leases on Indian oil lands. While itself a domestic organization, the Roxana Company is controlled by the Shell Union Oil Company, owned largely by Dutch and British interests.

The bill provides that they shall not be released from occupation taxes. The bill would also authorize the secretary of state to collect delinquent taxes and to allow them to the officers by whom they are collected.

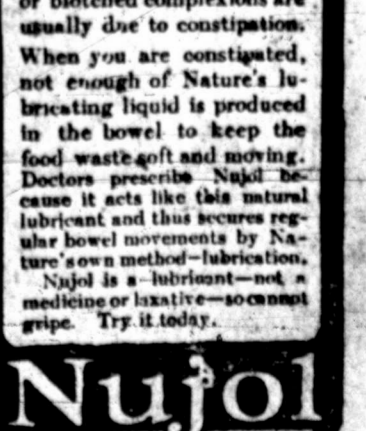
