### ICE PLANT OUTPUT WILL BE DOUBLED AWARD CONTRACT

Contracts have been let for the installation of an additional ice tank and machinery which will increase the manufacturing capacity of plant B of the Peoples Ice Company from 50 to 100 tons per day according to announcement made Thursday by Morris Marcus.

Plant A has a manufacturing capacity of 115 tons daily and a storage of 5,000 while plant B has a space of 2,500. This insures the people of Wichita Falls and surrounding territory against any ice shortage, according to Mr. Marcus.

"We are proud of the fact that we are second to no other city in the state from a standpoint of high class delivery service," declared Mr. Marcus in speaking of new and contemplated improvements along this line.

New Packard trucks and trailers are being purchased for the handling of ice between the stations at Iowa Park, Electra and Burk Burnett and four new Ree trucks and 16 new wagons have also been added to the delivery department, according to Mr. Marcus.

A quick delivery truck service is maintained to take care of calls for ice that come in case the wagon should pass the customer of the lady of the house should be away when the wagon passes.

### Prohibition Question Debated At New York With Radio Listeners Providing Audience of Thousands

NEW YORK, April 18.—Prohibition was debated before half a million people tonight. The audience was the largest ever assembled for such an event.

When General Ransome H. Gillett, general counsel of the Association Against the Prohibition Amendment, and Warren E. Wheeler, general counsel for the Anti-Saloon League of America, stood for two hours before a little electrical instrument in the offices of the American Telephone Company, another page in the fast growing history of the radio was written. It was the first time a subject of nation-wide interest had been debated via the radio. And for its audience, within a hundred mile radius of New York alone, was figured at 500,000.

In addition, tens of thousands of other listeners in every section of the country, in Canada and in Europe may have "horned in." The powerful station is capable of serving much more than the western hemisphere, it is said.

In a half a hour's pause after the presentation of the two sides, 15 telephone lines were kept busy receiving local and long distance calls asking the debaters questions which it would have taken them five hours to answer.

"We are literally swamped with questions from our audience," Mrs. George E. Owens, president of the Government Club, who presided, announced.

### FORD MOTOR COMPANY REPORTS CASH BALANCE EXCEEDS \$200,000,000

NEW YORK, April 18.—In a dispatch to the Wall Street Journal Henry Ford states that the cash balance of the Ford Motor Company still exceeds \$200,000,000, in spite of huge expenditures recently for coal properties, timber lands, water power and branch plants.

All these big deals were cash transactions, wherever such arrangements could be made, Ford said, and all had been paid out of current earnings.

"As yet," he said, "we have not thought of borrowing any money."

The biggest project now engaging Ford's attention is the doubling of the cooking oven capacity at his River Rouge plant at Detroit. Ford said that contracts already had been let for the structural steel for these ovens.

"When these are finished," Ford added, "we will be ready to double the cooking ovens again."

The Ford Motor Company has been selling coke this winter to its employees at about half the price charged by other coke firms, Ford said, he hoped to sell coke soon to the general public, and that in this way every piece of coal taken from his mines would be "burned twice."

WASHINGTON, April 18.—Up to the close of last year aviators of the air mail service had flown a total of 2,351,523 miles since the inauguration of the service in May, 1918, according to a report made public today by the postoffice department. It was estimated that the service is now operating on a schedule of 2,000,000 miles a year. The total cost of the service since its inauguration was figured at \$1,292,567.65, much of the expenditure having been made for permanent improvements, such as repair shops and development of landing fields.

A total of 160,437,500 letters had been delivered by air, the total for last year increasing to 60,000,000.

The reports showed that on more than one-third of the 14,704 trips made the pilots had to wing their way through rain, snow, hail or fog.

### 215 GALLONS OF LIQUOR FED INTO MOUTH OF SEWER

BERLIN, April 18.—The Lokal Anzeiger learns in parliamentary circles that 900,000 pounds in marks was thrown on the London exchange market yesterday. The newspaper says it is not definitely known from what sources the money came but it assumed that the action was a French maneuver designed to interfere with German efforts toward strengthening the mark as well as to break Germany's resistance.

### JUDGE AND COURT BAILIFF CATCH TOTAL OF 27 FISH

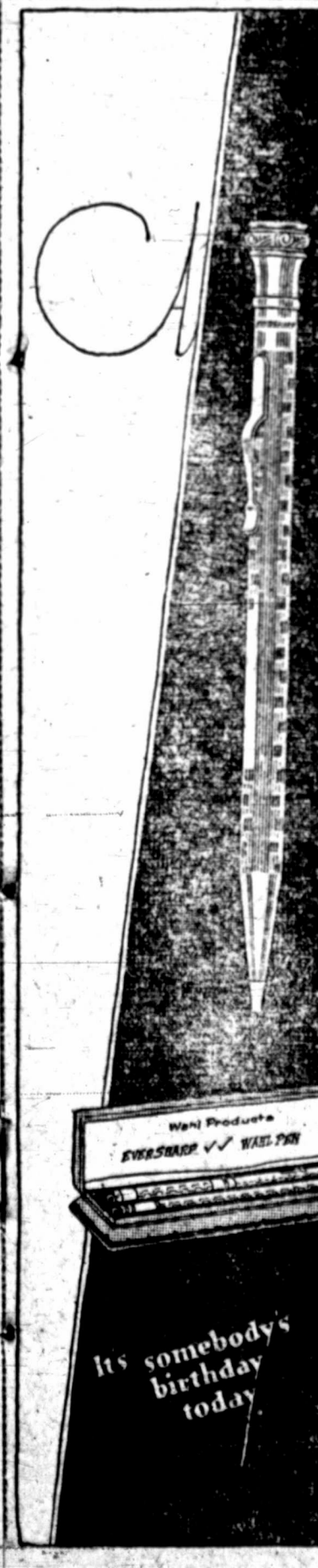

Every Person Works Day a Week To Support Government of U. S. Banker Tells Louisiana Meeting

SHREVEPORT, La., April 15.—The tax burden per capita in the United States is only exceeded by that of Great Britain and it is probably hopeless to expect any decrease, Dr. W. F. Gephart, vice-president of the First National Bank of St. Louis, said today in an address before the Louisiana State Bankers' Association.

It has been estimated that each person in the United States works one day a week to support the government which now is operated at a cost of about \$4,000,000,000 a year, he said, speaking of the subject of "Tax Exempt Securities."

Secretary Mellon of the treasury, he said, had stated that there are eleven billions of United States securities totally exempt from taxation and about twenty billions of

other government securities partially exempt, and that the government loses between \$30 and \$50 millions of dollars annually because of the tax exemptions feature.

Dr. Gephart said "there is not much doubt that a very considerable portion of the exempt securities are held by those who are in the higher income tax brackets because the advantage in keeping the principal and especially the surplus, is very great."

Statistics seem to show without much doubt that this practice of using the tax exempt securities as a means of reducing the income tax payment is very generally practiced.

CENTRAL TEXAS SHOWS  
DECREASE FOR THE WEEK

Oil Stocks East of the Rocky Moun-  
tains Gain 3,300,000 in  
March.

NEW YORK, April 12.—Pipe line and tank farm gross domestic crude oil stocks east of the Rocky mountains increased 3,300,000 barrels in the month of March, according to returns compiled by the American Petroleum Institute.

The daily average gross crude oil production of the United States increased 9,500 barrels, the week ended April 14, totaling 1,551,650 compared with 1,542,150 for the preceding week, according to the weekly summary of the institute. The daily average production east of the Rocky mountains was 1,236,600 barrels, compared with 1,223,150 barrels, an increase of 13,450. California production was 715,000 barrels compared with 720,000, a decrease of 5,000 barrels.

Oklahoma-Kansas showed a daily average gross production of 518,250 barrels, an increase of 2,150; north Texas an increase of 2,000; central Texas a decrease of 950; north Louisiana an increase of 750; and Arkansas an increase of 5,100. Louisiana production of the week ended April 14 totaled 1,549,000 barrels, a daily average of 257,714, compared with 1,542,000, a daily average of 257,000 for the week ended April 7.

### THREE PER CENT TAX ON OIL PRODUCTION IS PASSED IN HOUSE

AUSTIN, April 12.—Final action on the first tax measure of the called session was taken by the house Wednesday afternoon when it adopted the three per cent oil tax bill.

As adopted the bill, which places an occupation tax upon the gross oil production, carried an amendment by Matternwhite making the tax three per cent, thus reducing it from five per cent as proposed by the author of the original bill. The vote of final passage was 97 to 18.

Passage of the bill was under suspension of the rules after debate on two other amendments reducing the tax to two and one half and two per cent, by Rogers and Burnmaster respectively. These were voted down 10 to 100 and 29 to 18, in order.

Representative Coffee, the author, stated the bill was prepared at a conference with the attorney general and the oil industry. He contended in support of the five per cent provision that a few "big companies" would pay more than three fourths of the tax and asked for the larger rate to give a "margin" for profitable trimming in the senate.

Mr. Satterwhite held the three per cent tax would bring approximately \$2,500,000 annually into the state treasury. He declared the oil companies probably would resist a five per cent tax in the courts, and that he did not expect a contest if it was reduced to three per cent.

### PREMIER POINCARE ENRAGED RESULT OF CHESTER PROGRAM

LONDON, April 12.—Premier Poincare, enraged by the Chester concessions granted by the Turkish government, has become the champion of the Christians in the Near East, according to a reliable source. The French premier, it is declared, has a message to London urging the need to establish a national home for the Armenians with the help of the league of nations.

The British government replied bluntly today, asking Premier Poincare how much France would contribute financially towards the establishment of the home, and the setting up of a national home for the Armenians.

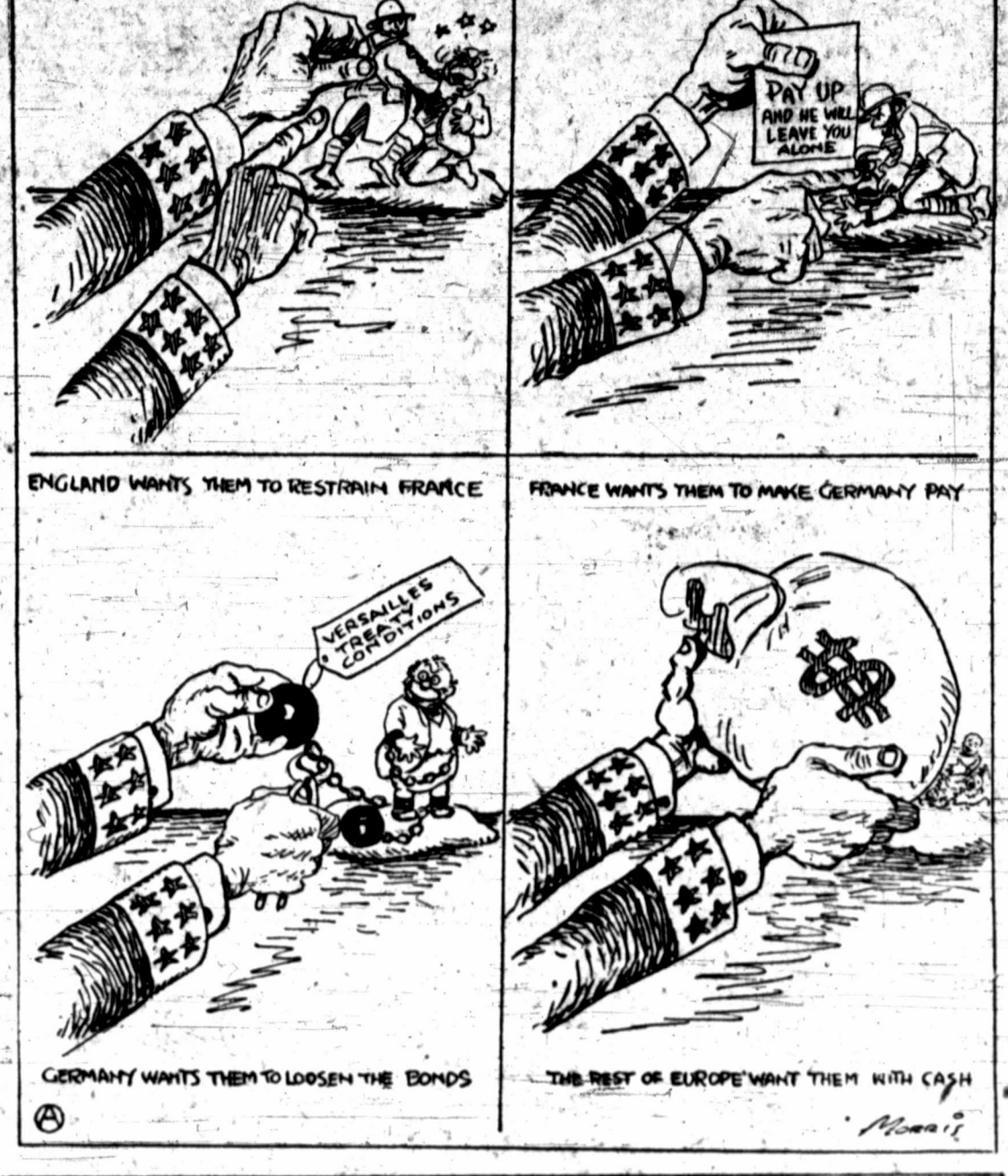

# BIG STILL SEIZED IN BAYLOR COUNTY THREE MEN HELD

The men in charge of the stills had evidently just completed a run of whiskey, as the stills were hot. The whiskey was contained in five gallon jugs which Sheriff Self looked up in one of the court house vaults for evidence.

## PIPE IS PURCHASED FOR BAYLOR WATER

ELECTRA, TEXAS, April 10.—Mayor Wm. Chivert returned today from a trip made to purchase four and three-quarter miles of pipe for the purpose of laying a water line from Red river to the municipal lake, which contains a supply of water sufficient to last only two weeks.

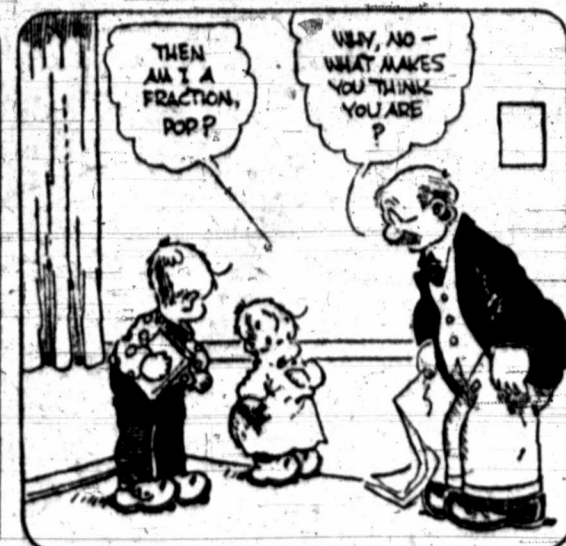

Did we get the pitching? It is invariably the prediction of the manager.

NEW YORK, April 19.—The faculty of baseball forecast, of spring time observation of the most careful figures, is reflected in the stereotyped advance statements of baseball managers, always the same.

"If—mark the if—we get good pitching we will be up there." That is the sum and substance of baseball comprehension now and all the time—the pitching.

A club composed of fair players that can get three pitchers going well at the same time can win a pennant over clubs of greater talent that haven't pitchers.

This has been demonstrated time and again. No man, however expert, can say in the spring how pitchers will be going along toward mid-summer. A staff that on paper seems invulnerable may be ruined over night by accident.

The Philadelphia Athletics finished in seventh place in the American League last season. They won sixty five games.

Ed Rommel, turned away by John J. McGraw as not good enough for the New York Giants, pitched in twenty seven of these games. With two more pitchers of Rommel's 1922 efficiency, it is conceivable that the Athletics would have won the pennant. That is the difference between first and seventh place. The St. Louis Browns finished second behind the Yankees, a scant six points away.

With an Ed Rommel on the Browns, it wouldn't have been a contest. It would take a baseball club of singular unimportance and inefficiency to lose a pennant behind a pitching staff composed of Ed Rommel, Urban Faber, Pillette they did last season.

and Walter Johnson, pitching as the reader who follows baseball knows very well that the Giants are apt to walk in in the National League race this year.

He knows very well that the New York Yankees have a pitching staff too powerful to permit them to be far back in the race in the American League, even carrying the "temperament" which is a polite baseball name for "perference and indolent ball play."

But he also knows that in the American League pitching plus the normal hustle—the ambition that the Detroit Tigers, the St. Louis Browns and the Chicago White Sox will have, will give the Yankees a slight contest, perhaps beat them out.

The reader, if a baseball fan, knows that the Giants competition will come from the Cincinnati Reds and the Pittsburgh Pirates.

It is possible, but at this time it does not seem probable, that some rank outsider may come to life, get three pitchers going as stallings get Rudolph, Tyler and James going in 1914, and sweep through the field.

It is these possibilities that make baseball.

The No. 5 lease D well of the Texhous Company, located on the Ferguson tract, was completed Wednesday in the sand at 1743 feet and will add a 60-barrel addition to the Archer County producers.

### DELIVERS LECTURE AT JUNIOR COLLEGE ON ANDREW JACKSON

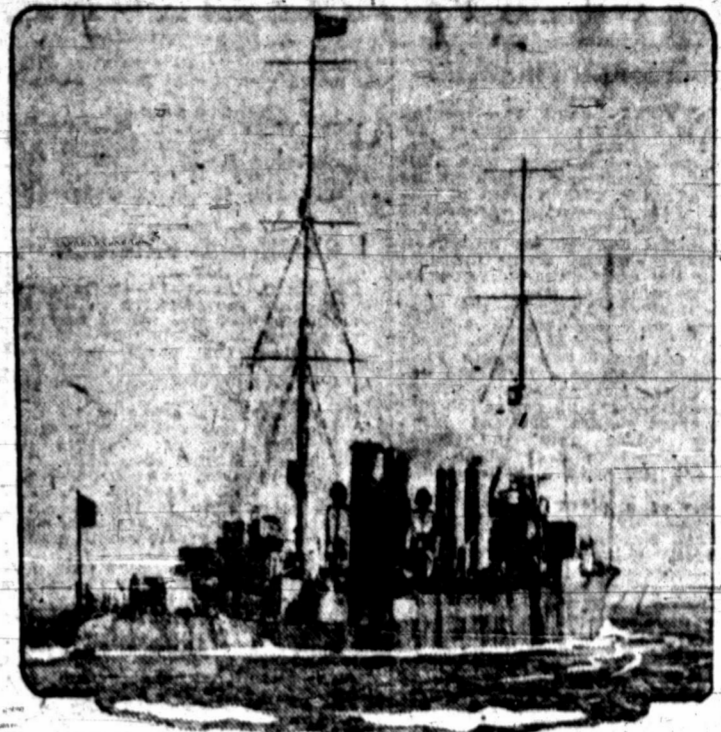

Carrigan lectured to the junior college history class Thursday morning on the life of Andrew Jackson, and gave a few notable incidents that happened during the career of the great statesman. After the talk Judge Carrigan presented the history department of the college with a lecture by Seymour D. Thompson of Missouri, the volume being personally given to Judge Carrigan by the lecturer.

In his talk, Judge Carrigan gave some facts about Andrew Jackson that are not generally known. He said that Jackson was never able to go to school, and had studied law out of one book, enough to enable him to enter the bar. One humorous incident in his life was the establishing of the expression "O. K." "Jackson was never able to go to school," said Judge Carrigan. "And so could not spell, one fault in his spelling being to put an 'o' in the word 'all.' When he was president blizz vetoed by him would be signed 'O. K. Andrew Jackson.' When asked what this was, Jackson replied that it meant 'Oll Korree.' Judge Carrigan further stated, that as a boy, Jackson, in his mind, was the greatest man in the world. "Now he said, 'I place Andrew Jackson next only to Washington.' Judge Carrigan has done much for the history department of the college since the founding of the institution this year. Some time ago he made a present of a set of books containing the records of the Red River dispute, and also gave the college access to his entire library of historical volumes.

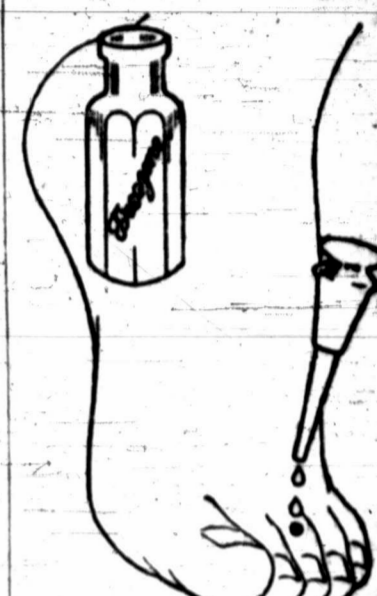

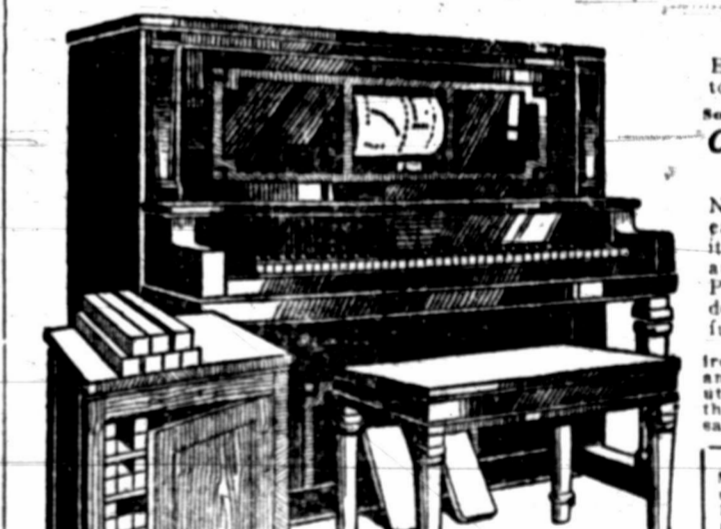

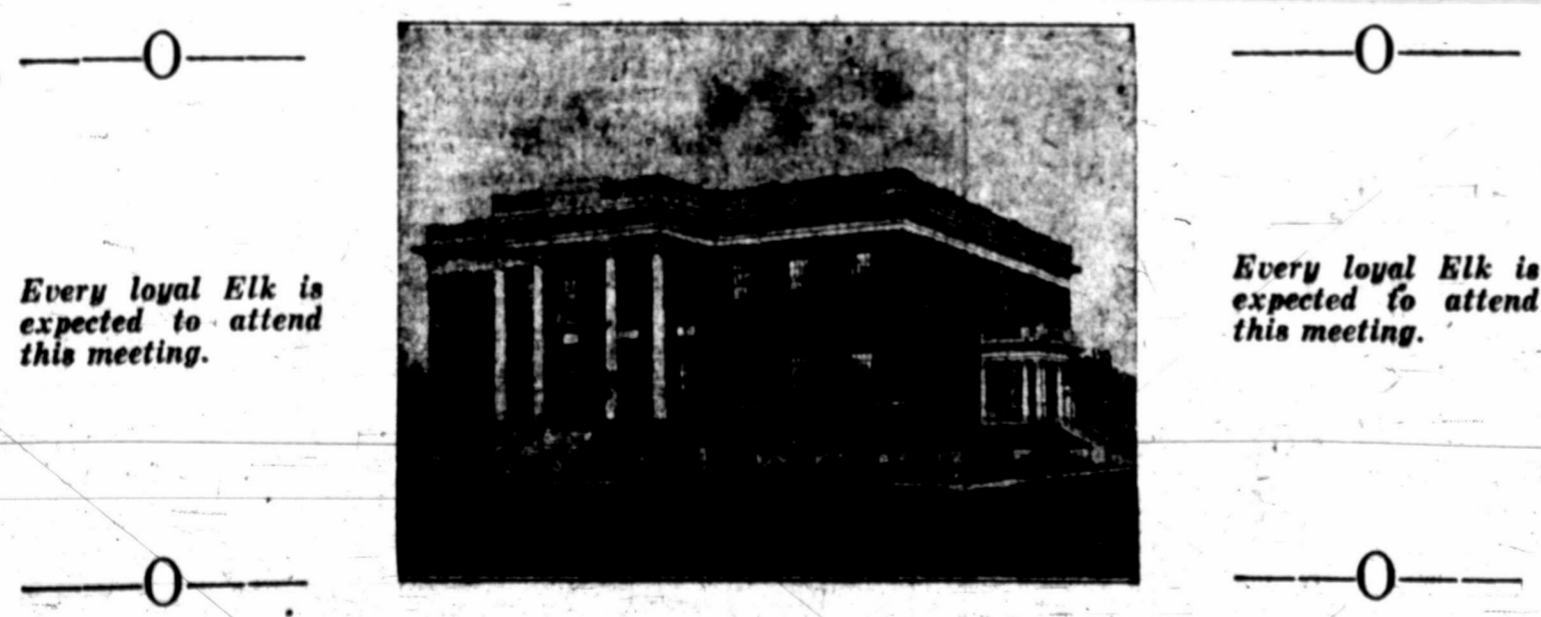
