### NORTH TEXAS INCREASE TWO HUNDRED BARRELS

Central Texas Field Shows a De-  
crease of Five Thousand  
Barrels.

NEW YORK, April 26.—The daily average gross crude oil production of the United States decreased 500 barrels for the week ending April 25, totalling 1,945,850 barrels compared with 1,951,650 for the preceding week, according to the weekly summary of the American Petroleum Institute. The daily average production east of the Rocky mountains was 1,330,450 barrels compared with 1,326,450, a decrease of 4,000 barrels. California production was 715,000 barrels, the same as the previous week.

Oklahoma-Kansas showed a daily average gross production of 523,500 barrels, an increase of 12,500; north Texas an increase of 200; central Texas a decrease of 5,000; north Louisiana an increase of 400; and Arkansas a decrease of 5,500 barrels. Production of the Osage nation was 21,500 barrels against 19,200; Tonkawa 24,100 against 25,000; Louisiana 1,150 against 8,650; and British pool 24,000 against 24,750 barrels. The Mexican pool was reported at 2,800 barrels against 27,000.

Haynesville, north Louisiana, 24,300 against 23,700; and Smackover, Ark., 18,800 against 25,500 barrels; heavy 61,450 against 73,300. In the Gulf coast field Hull was reported at 15,500 barrels against 14,800, and West Columbia 17,650 against 19,000. Mid-continent crude was reduced 19 cents, now being quoted at 11.40 to 12.50 a barrel, according to the gravity of the oil. There were no other changes reported for the major districts. Bradford district, Pennsylvania being quoted at \$4.00 and Gulf Coast \$1.75 a barrel.

**Prince Takes Part.**  
The archbishop of Canterbury, assisted by England's most distinguished prelates, solemnized the union. The Prince of Wales took a prominent part in the proceedings and doubtless learned much that will be turned to good account when he enters the marriage state himself.

Wales and his brother, Henry, acted as best men, but it was Wales who produced the ring at the critical moment.

The eight bridesmaids were chosen mainly from among the personal friends of the bride. They were dressed in immaculate ivory white crepe chiffon trimmed with Nottingham lace and presented a fairy-like picture.

Lady Elizabeth was attired in an exquisite gown of white ivory moiré chiffon embellished with bands of silver and pearl embroidery. A 15-foot train of ivory colored net hung from her shoulders.

of beige crepe with overdress of black lace and sash and vest of beige crepe embroidered in oriental colors. She wore gable fans and a black crinoline hat trimmed with black bows.

**Faces Are Radiant.**  
The faces of the sovereigns were radiant as the tall, erect figure of their son, with Wales on his left, walked to the altar, followed soon after by the bride upon the arm of her father, the Earl of Strathmore.

The strident strains of the hymn, "Lead Us, Heavenly Father, Lead Us," lent a note of beauty to the procession.

The revised and shortened exhortation, as approved in the new English prayer book, was pronounced by the dean of Westminster and then the archbishop asked the final question, "Wilt thou?"

The ceremony completed, the archbishop bestowed his blessing on the pair and prayer was recited. This was followed by a second blessing and an address by the archbishop of York.

Emerging into the street, the duke and his bride were greeted by a peal of abbey chimes. This was the signal for a deafening shout of acclaim from 50,000 throats as the multitude outside the abbey, craning their necks and standing on tiptoe to catch a glimpse of the couple, saw them step into their carriage of plate glass and gold for the drive to Buckingham palace.

fering from wounds inflicted in the world war, viewed the procession from a grandstand erected opposite the abbey. From the balconies and windows of Westminster hospital thousands of other war invalids saw the stirring event.

Arrived at the palace the royal couple received another deafening crescendo of cheers from their well wishers.

The king and queen held a reception in the palace and the bride and bridegroom were showered with congratulations and good wishes on every side. The reception was followed by a luncheon at which the gigantic wedding cake—in it weighed 3,000 pounds—was cut. A piece sent to each guest who made a wish before taking the first bite.

Soon after 4 o'clock the duke and duchess left for the Waterloo station, the king and queen flooding them with an avalanche of rice as they departed. At the terminal another great crowd sped the royal couple on their honeymoon journey to Surrey.

### REPRESENTATIVES FROM SEYMOUR AT MEETING OF ENGINEERS AT AUSTIN

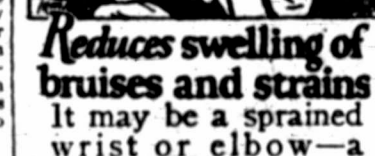
SEYMOUR, April 25.—R. E. Baak and Judge Jo A. P. Dickson, representing the Seymour Chamber of Commerce, left here Tuesday morning to attend a meeting of the engineers' committee appointed by Governor Neff, federal and state engineers and business men of Texas to be held in Austin to present an outline of the work to be done in making a hydrographic and topographic survey of Texas water sheds under the reclamation act passed during the last regular session of the legislature which provided a fund of \$500,000 for that purpose.

Importance attends this meeting for the reason that an effort is being made in an endeavor to rescind the action of the legislature in making the appropriation of \$500,000, and authorizing the survey of the various water sheds of the state with the two-fold purpose of prevention of flood waters inundating millions of acres of fine farming lands of Texas and for irrigation.

SEYMOUR is particularly interested for the reason that the state board of water engineers has already approved such a survey to be made on the Brazos river just above Seymour at Cooper's Island with a view of determining the feasibility and cost of an irrigation dam at this location, which, if carried to completion, would easily irrigate 150,000 acres of the fertile Brazos valley lands in the vicinity of Seymour and constitute perhaps one of the most important irrigation systems in the United States.

### Are To Request Submarines For Coast of Texas

DALLAS, April 26.—Federal prohibition officers in Texas will join officials of other Gulf states in requesting the government to assign submarines along the coast of the Gulf of Mexico to combat the rum fleet operating in those waters, Frank Cole, state prohibition director for Texas, said here today. Most of the liquor reaching this state is brought in by means of a "rum fleet" operating from Mexico and Cuba, he said. He conferred with other federal officials here today concerning the situation.

### ENGLAND PRODUCES LESS THAN 40,000 CARS YEARLY

LONDON, April 26.—Every tenth person in the United States owns an automobile, according to British statistics. American manufacturers produce in a single month more than the total number of cars now in use in the whole of Great Britain, which is 314,650. In 1922 American output was nearly 3,000,000 cars. Britain's output was less than 40,000.

American automobile owners in 1922 used 22,000,000 tires and 22,000,000 inner tubes. The total number of employees in the British car industry is less than 100,000, which is insignificant when compared with any one of the prominent American factories. In Great Britain there is only one automobile to every 152 of population.

British manufacturers are discarding the heavier motors for lighter and more flexible designs. They have found that the modern 16 or 12 horse-power light car performs better than the heavy 30 or 38 horse-power car of a few years ago. The lighter cars have remarkable power of acceleration, flexibility, and smoothness of running, due to their high-speed engine. As the cost of licenses in Britain is based upon the horsepower of the motor, it is important to confine the size of the motor to reasonable limits, especially for the man of moderate means.

### GHOSTS ALONE DISTURB MAIL RUNNERS IN INDIA

LONDON, April 26.—"Not a year passes that does not take its heavy toll of Indian mail runners who lose their lives in the execution of their duty. It might be a tiger, a swollen river, an avalanche in the Himalayas or a gang of robbers. The work goes on just the same; the mail goes through whatever happens."

So said Geoffrey Rothe Clarke, director-general of Posts and Telegraphs in India, speaking before the Indian section of the Royal Society of Arts. With the runners, Mr. Clarke stated, the mail was a fetish they would protect at all costs. For wild beasts, floods and dangers of various kinds they would not turn aside. But, fearless though they were when threatened by such perils, even when carrying the precious mails, they would go miles out of their way to avoid an evil spirit whom they suspected of lodging in a tree. Of ghosts they were far more afraid than of the fiercest wild beasts.

### JUDGE RELEASES PRISONER UNDER OWN RECOGNIZANCE

Judge P. A. Martin released J. P. Duan from the county jail Thursday morning when the state attorney advised that it was not ready to try the case against him in which he stood charged with manufacturing chocklaw beer. The defendant has been a prisoner in the county jail for 59 days and was unable to make bond but when the announcement of not ready was received from the state the court placed him under recognizance and released him.

### COMMANDER OWSELY EXTENDS THANKS TO LIBRARY ASSOCIATION

HOT SPRINGS, ARK., April 26.—Alvin Owsley, commander of the American Legion, today thanked the members of the American Library, now in conference here, for the service they rendered American soldiers during the war in the distribution of books, and at the same time heartily endorsed the purposes of the association.

"You and your association should command universal support," Commander Owsley said, "for yours is the fine task of aiding in the training of the mind. The legion, like you, believes that the making of an American. True, it is that we want our people to be strong physically, fit for the severest hardships. We cannot afford to be a nation of weaklings. We would be the last, however, to sacrifice mental training to physical prowess. The Greek ideal of a sound mind in a sound body meets our standard."

"Since 1917 I have been conscious in a general way of the comprehensive distribution of books which was effected by you but it is only since I have read in detail the reports of your officials that I have an adequate notion of the great task you performed. I have learned that 2,000,000 books were started on their way to France."

"Finally victory came. The average soldier knowing little of transport difficulties, but conscious that the war was over, prepared hopefully and expectantly for an immediate return. There followed a number of disappointments and delays. Men who were suddenly removed from the intense anxiety and the feverish activity of war became restless and unruly. In that situation the American Library Association played a truly great part. Men were given books to read and thus lived apart from the deadening routine of waiting for ships that seemed never to come."

LONDON, April 26.—Those who have been happy in the belief that the duke of York is marrying a Scotch girl received something of a shock today when they read in the Daily Express a statement by Arthur C. Fox-Davies, the distinguished genealogist, that Lady Elizabeth Bowers-Lyon is not Scotch but English. Mr. Fox-Davies traces the new duchess' ancestry back to the first duke of York who was born in 1241 and from whom the present duke of York is also descended.

Boycan was the first witness to take the stand. He testified that along with other employees at the Katy round house he had given the defendant his pay check on the morning of March 1.

This was the story told by Williams, according to officers the day after he and Clark were placed under arrest. He stated at that time that Clark had gotten into the automobile with him and ordered him to drive out on the Friberg road where the money was hidden and where he received orders from Clark to tell the story that they had been held up and robbed of all the money.

He told the officers at that time that he had obeyed Clark's orders under fear of death.

By HORTENSE SAUNDERS. NEA Service Staff Writer. NEW YORK, April 25.—Daniel R. Edwards has succeeded in collecting the finest pair of medals in the whole country—the Congressional Medal of Honor and the Distinguished Service Cross.

Of all our war heroes, he alone of all living men holds the exclusive right to trim up his coat with both these coveted decorations. Officially, at least, he's the bravest man in the country. "But he doesn't admit it. 'Take Sergeant York—there's a real hero for you,' he exclaimed admiringly. 'He did a smashing thing.'"

But I knew how Edwards got his Congressional Medal—how he lost his right arm and his right leg the same day at Soissons. After his arm had been torn away by a German shell he took his automatic in his left hand, jumped into the enemy's trench, and killed four men and took four prisoners. While conducting them to the rear, his leg was shattered by a shell.

"Believe me or not, but that shot in the leg was a relief," he said. "I hadn't had any sleep for four days. A few minutes had by all at the Paris Bastille Day celebration. Losing my leg brought me what I wanted more than anything else in the world—sleep."

This had not been so long after the incident which won him the

break the record of the day before. Finally, I worked it out by mathematics. Today I can tie one as quickly as you could.

"I've had lots of fun with my claw arm," he said. "I used to tell my aunt it operated from buttons on my vest and she actually believed me.

"Being blind for a year or so wasn't so bad either. You miss a lot of unhappy sights—and atrocious styles."

"Are you afraid of anything at all," I asked. He admitted two suppressed fears.

"One is that I may become the world's greatest living prevaricator," he explained. "Telling war stories—you know, every war story gets better every time you tell it."

"Just then Mrs. Edwards came in. It seemed she wanted to buy a hat. Without a protest he dug down for the price.

"And the other fear?" I pursued. "Mrs. Edwards," he replied, laughing.

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### FORMER JUSTICE FAVORS HARDING COURT PROPOSAL

ENDORSED BY JUDGE CLARKE  
IN ADDRESS BEFORE CHI-  
CAGO CLUB.

SAYS SENATORS SHOULD  
ADOPT WITHOUT DEBATE

Appears as Representative of the  
League of Nations Non Par-  
tisan Association.

CHICAGO, April 25.—President Harding's proposal for the United States to become a member of the world court of justice was endorsed today by John H. Clarke, former justice of the supreme court, in an address before the City Club. He declared the proposal should be adopted by the senate by viva voce without debate.

Former Justice Clarke, who appeared as a representative of the league of nations non-partisan association, said that only a small group of senators opposed the world court, some saying it had too much power, and at least one because he held it to be the offspring of the league of nations.

"Only two objections," he said, are being made to participation in the court, one that somehow, such participation would carry the nation into the league of nations. As an experienced lawyer, he said he was sure the proposed reservations would prevent any relations with the league.

"I wish our government could see its way clear to join wholeheartedly and without reservation in the support of this great court," he said, "but since the administration refused to act without reservations, I hope they will be accepted by the senate and that to this extent our country may be proved to have been sincere in its 50 years of professed desire for such a court and to keep itself right with the civilized nations of the world."

Second Objection  
The second objection, he continued, was the claim that Great Britain would have six votes in the election of judges of the court to one vote for the United States.

"This objection rests wholly upon the base, unworthy supposition, that the representatives of these great friendly commonwealths would corruptly combine with the under countries to elect corrupt judges, for this is what the insinuation really means.

Even if that were true, he asserted, it would result either in the immediate destruction of the court or the plot would fail. But, he continued, the judges of the court are nominated by the representatives of the nations in The Hague arbitration tribunal of which the United States has long been a member, and then are elected by the league of nations. He pointed out that the judges must have a clear majority in both the assembly of the league, in which Great Britain would have six votes and the United States, if a member, would have but one, and also in the league council, in which Great Britain would have but one vote and the United States, if a member, but one.

"It is a shame, a disgrace, to us all," he continued, "that such can be found in our public life capable, even by indifference, of impeding such motives to six great friendly nations. Believing, as we do, that the people of our country favor, by

### RUSSIAN REFUGEES TO NUMBER OF 300 WILL BE ADMITTED

WASHINGTON, April 25.—President Harding decided today to permit transportation to the United States of the 300 Russian refugees who recently landed in the Philippines.

Plans for bringing the refugees to the United States on an army transport were mapped out at the conference of the president, Secretary Weeks and John Barton Payne, chairman of the American Red Cross. Admission will be possible under the immigration law, inasmuch as the Russian quota has not been exhausted for the year ending next June 30.

Secretary Weeks said the refugees would make desirable citizens, most of them being skilled workers or professional or technical men.

A. N. P. A. VOTES NOT TO

### DIRECTOR LORD PRAISES WORK OF NATIONAL BUDGET

SAYS IT OPERATES ON EFFICIENT AND METHODOLOGICAL BASIS.

COMMON SENSE WAY OF  
CONDUCTING BUSINESS

Reviews Record Made in Handling  
Expenditures and Appropriations.

BLOOMINGTON, IND., April 25.—The national budget has transformed the United States, the biggest business agency in the world, from a disorganized, haphazard, unmethodical business organization into a "concern" operating on an efficient and methodical basis, H. E. Lord, director of the budget, asserted here today in an address at the dedication of the new school of commerce and finance at the Indiana University.

"The national budget is simply the ordinary, every day, common sense way of successful big business applied to the routine of the United States, which is the biggest business in the world," Director Lord said.

"For many expensive, extravagant years the United States government operated without consideration of the need of a balanced budget, no attempt being made to keep expenditures within probable receipts."

As a lack of control, the speaker said, from 1890 to 1922 the estimates submitted to congress called for \$22,000,000,000 more than were actually appropriated.

That condition no longer obtains, Dr. Lord asserted, and pointed to the change in procedure as illustrated by the appropriations for the next succeeding year 1923, the amount submitted to congress by the president, as prepared in the bureau of budget, being approximately \$200,000,000 less than the amounts asked for by the various executive bureaus of the government. For this fiscal year, the speaker said, the bureau of budget's estimate of appropriations was \$230,000,000 less than the amounts asked by the departments of the government.

At the beginning of this fiscal year, Director Lord stated, the government was faced with an extraordinary problem as the program of expenditures as prepared by the various departments called for \$223,000,000 more than the expected receipts.

"When the budget was submitted to congress in December last," he continued, "it gave a statement of the expected receipts and proposed expenditures for this current fiscal year. At that time the discrepancy had been reduced from \$223,000,000 to \$23,000,000. At the present time the possible excess of expenditures over receipts is \$10,000,000. No effort is being spared by the bureau of budget, acting as the agency of the president, to eliminate this threatening deficit."

### URGE PRESIDENT TO INVESTIGATE COTTON FORECAST

ST. MATHEWS, S. C., April 25.—President Harding was asked to order an investigation to "ascertain under what authority of law" the bureau of economics of the department of agriculture acted in issuing its recent cotton acreage forecast, in a telegram addressed to him last night by J. S. Wannamaker, president of the American Cotton Association. The president also was asked to "issue a statement to the country indicating the policy of the government relative to market value of American farm products."

At the same time Mr. Wannamaker sent a telegram to Attorney General Daugherty urging that he "institute a sweeping investigation as to combinations formed to depress values of staple agricultural products and prosecute those responsible for combining or entering into any kind of cooperative effort to destroy the natural laws of supply and demand under the cloak of governmental authority or otherwise and those who make heavy sales of agricultural products like cotton, which they do not own, which do not exist and cannot be secured."

### MINING ENGINEER HELD IN MEXICO IS RELEASED

MEXICO CITY, April 25.—The American school at Torreon has advised the American embassy here that Oliver W. Krull, the mining engineer, who was kidnaped by the

bandit leader Juan Galindo from the Trinidad mine, Durango, on April 4, arrived in Torreon last Monday. The consul gave no details. Newspaper dispatches about 10 days ago reported that Mr. Krull had been released on the payment of \$5,000 ransom.

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### OIL PRODUCTION TAX IS REDUCED TO TWO PER CENT

BILL IS CHANGED AND REPORTED FAVORABLY IN THE SENATE.

### LIMITED PROVISION OF EDUCATIONAL BILL

Out Section Which Would Have Prevented Employing Non-Residents.

AUSTIN, April 25.—The Coffee excise tax on oil production was cut from three to two per cent and reported out favorably by the state affairs committee this afternoon.

The same action was taken at the regular session and resulted in the measure to pass. The committee unanimously reported favorably the Smith inheritance tax bill and Thomas delinquent tax bill.

Provision of the educational appropriation bill which would have prevented employment of teachers who are not citizens of this state except those who have resided in this state 10 years, was stricken from the bill today when the senate adopted an amendment by Rogers eliminating the provision.

In a brief address to the senate, former Lieutenant Governor Lynch Davidson commended the legislature on adoption of the resolution opposing the interstate commerce commission's plan for consolidating railroads. Davidson said the plan messages government ownership and that he is opposed to any such plan.

Favorable reports were made to the senate today by the criminal jurisprudence committee on two liquor bills. Of primary importance of the favorable report given the bill liquor bill which would make possession of liquor or materials for making liquor prima facie evidence of guilt of violation of the prohibition laws. The lobby bill seeking to authorize the closing of hotels and restaurants that permit the sale of liquor or gambling also was reported favorably.

The attempt to repeal the \$600,000 food control and reclamation bill was defeated in the senate today when the mining and irrigation committee reported unfavorably the bill which sought to repeal the appropriation.

### MAIL CONTAINING MONEY FOR STOCK BEING RETURNED

FORT WORTH, April 25.—Previously withheld names of 22 oil promoters, indicted last week by the federal grand jury on charges of using the mails to defraud, were made public today by United States District Attorney Zweifel.

At the same time Zweifel admitted that mail containing stock subscriptions and addressed to certain promoters or their brokers, was being returned to prospective oil investors pending investigation of certain cases. He would not make public the names of promoters or companies who are returning stock subscriptions, nor would he divulge the number following the plan.

CHIEF JUSTICE TAFT TO ASSIGN SPECIAL JUDGE

WASHINGTON, April 25.—Extra federal judges to try oil fraud cases recently brought in Texas by the federal government will be assigned in the near future by Chief Justice Taft at the request of the department of justice. Most of the cases will be heard at Fort Worth.

### WOMAN REFUSES TO ADMIT SHE IS CLARA PHILLIPS

TEGUCIGALPA, HONDURAS, April 25.—Clara Phillips, the escaped California hammer murderer, with a woman companion, arrested here Saturday, are still held in the local jail, awaiting full identification at extradition papers, while the man who accompanied her under the name of Carson, is separately held in the penitentiary.

When seen at the jail the woman known as Clara Phillips refused to admit her identity, but discussed the crime attributed to her and the escape in such a way as to leave no doubt of her identity. She shows no evidence of being downhearted.

### FIND MAN SENTENCED WITH BULLET IN HEAD

MARIANNA, ARK., April 25.—I. R. Hilton, 35, recently convicted of murder in the second degree and sentenced to seven years imprisonment, was found today with a bullet wound in his head, said to have been self-inflicted. Hilton was found guilty last week of the killing of C. A. Bonner, Hilton charged that Bonner interfered in his family affairs.

### CHAUTAQUA STATE BANK AT TOPEKA, KANSAS, CLOSED

TOPEKA, KAN., April 25.—The Chautauqua state bank of Chautauqua, Kan., was ordered closed today by Carl Peterson, state bank commissioner. This followed closing of the Elgin state bank of Elgin, Kan., yesterday by order of the commissioner. J. R. Burns, cashier of the Elgin bank, also is president of the Chautauqua bank. Closing of the Elgin bank was brought on by an alleged defalcation of \$10,000 by Burns, according to Peterson. Burns is in custody of a deputy state bank examiner.

The results of these efforts, it is said, will also determine in what manner the allies will bring up the question and what stand they will make on it.

### SHALLOW POOL IS BEING OPENED UP NEAR ARCHER CITY

ARCHER CITY, TEXAS, April 24. Within the past few weeks there has been quietly going on at the Dalmar pool, just north and east of this city, a lot of hard work by experts on the works of this company, and Wednesday No. 2 pumped 16 barrels in three hours and No. 4 is predicted to be a 40 or 50 barrel.

This may be news to every resident of Archer City, but it has been known that oil, in paying quantities and of a high grade, has been produced for some time on this lease, but due to accident and unavoidable mishaps, the Dalmar people have been compelled to be patient and stick with these wells, with the result that they now have two good producers at the 1050 foot depth, with a storage of around 750 barrels of fine oil, and a splendid piece of property on which to drill more, when proper arrangements can be made to do so.

Leasing is Active. Leasing in Wilbarger county has taken on new life. On account of the several wells drilling for oil in the county it has made the activity in oil leases. The price, however is still very low.

FRIENDS OF F. K. EMERT EXPRESS THEMSELVES ON RECENT INDICTMENTS

Fred K. Emmert, St. Louis Bond Company official, who was among those indicted by the grand jury at Corpus Christi this week, is well known in Wichita Falls, his company having negotiated the sale of \$2,750,000 worth of the irrigation district bonds. Mr. Emmert has a number of friends here who expressed confidence Thursday in the outcome of the case.

These friends called attention to the fact that the district attorney had protested against the returning of the indictments.

"If any law was violated in selling the bonds the way they did, then 500 city and county officials in Texas have violated the law," said one friend of Mr. Emert. "The law says that bonds cannot be sold for less than par. Frequently, the market for bonds is below par, and it has been a general rule to pay the discount in the form of a commission so as to get the money and start the improvement. That was done in the Corpus Christi case."

### Increasing Activity In Evidence In Various Parts of Archer With Many Interesting Tests Drilling

ARCHER CITY, TEXAS, April 24. There is increasing activity here in the oil business, merchants reporting better trade generally, transient parties passing through stopping here to obtain necessary articles, including made and supplies such as can be procured promptly.

Probably the most business is transacted at present in the Archer County abstract office where a large force is employed, and there is hustle all day and some evenings as well.

Interest is being centered more and more on the tests going down to the north, northwest and northeast of the city, such as the Whitney-Bolding test on T. Glass survey; the United Royalties to the north of here near the Burns-Stoneking, the two Burton and Ruff tests and to the south of the Peterson well and in the Geraldine townsite.

Of much interest to local people is the test on the Glass survey, known as the "Copper Mine" well, and many are of the opinion that this location may surprise the knowing ones and prove to be a second Peterson-McCarte and Johnson well as the nearness of a "dry hole." A couple of miles away does not prove so much.

Another locality where careful tests are being made is to the north and one-half miles, on the Cowan ranch by Flowers and Flowers, and to the southeast by the Paragon Oil Company, on the H. Harrison land by the Bradley Supply Company. It is too early to predict but these will both be watched soon.

Some surprises are in store for the oil fraternity around this city in the near future. So many tests

are being made, some one is going to "hit it rich," it can't be helped. Many operators have remarked recently that Archer county had more oil in it than Wichita county, and it begins to look as if the truth had been spoken. One has only to look at a late map of the county, Freeman-Hampton-Ease City, Texhoma-Fanther, Mankins, the new Swastika territory and the Dalmar all producing and more to follow.

The Wirt Franklin well in the Geraldine townsite now reported on the sand with casing set, shows a trend southeastward toward this city and should the "Copper Mine" prove a producer a big area will be opened to play which will prove very interesting.

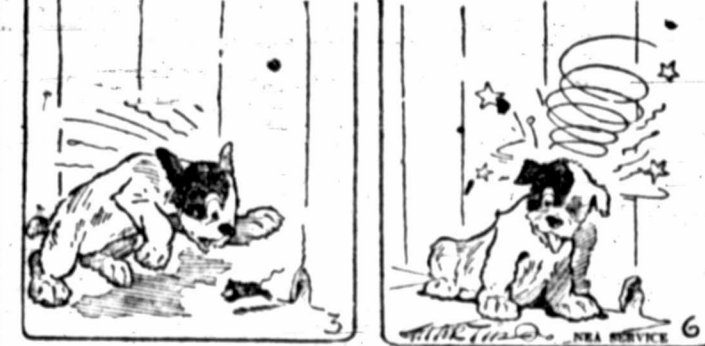
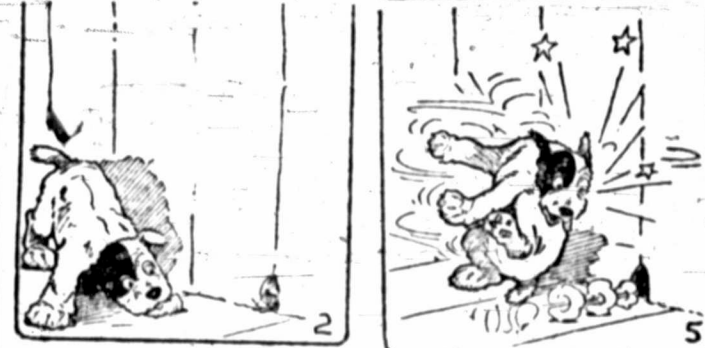

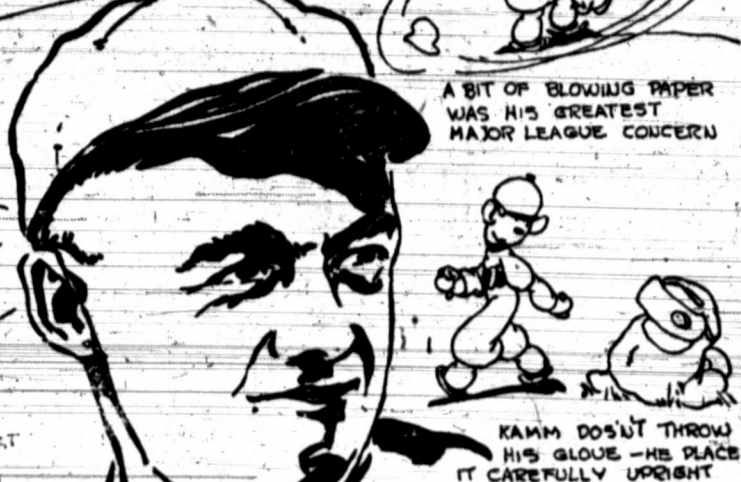

Willie Kamm AND HIS MODEST \$100,000 SWEET

By NEA Service. CLEVELAND, April 26.—What a difference \$100,000 makes. Four years ago, Willie Kamm, a slight youngster, made the jump from the sandlots of Class AA ball out in the Pacific Coast League. It was an occasion to make the youngster embarrassed and almost a victim of "back fever," but Willie Kamm, highest priced rookie in the history of baseball, had to face when he played his first American League game as third baseman for Kid Gleason's White Sox.

More than 22,000 fans pointing at him and continually watching him; batteries of cameramen swooping down to urge him to pose; movies clicking every time he moved; recipients of the only floral piece passed out at the game; playing third base with a half dozen cameras continually trained upon him from the base line—these are just a few of the ordeals a naturally retiring and thoroughly unpolished boy had to contend with. Besides, there was the natural consciousness of any player's major debut.

To Kamm's everlasting credit, let it be said that he met it like a thoroughbred. He played the game. This in spite of an umpire to the left of him, an overflow crowd behind him and cameras to the right so close he could feel them nearly stepping on them. The crowd was not hostile. It was intensely curious. So much so that a hush fell every time a ball was driven Kamm's way, or he went to bat. The fans wanted him to do brilliant fielding. He handled his chances gracefully. The fans wanted brilliant batting. He cracked the right field fence with a double after two attempts.

"He'll do," was Cleveland's fan-dom verdict. And Kamm has to go through the same ordeal in seven more cities. Willie's Kamm's own story of his first big league game:

"I thought I had a tough time of it when I played my first Coast League game in San Francisco, but I sure ran into more unexpected things in the majors than I ever believed possible.

"Some of the greatest ball players in the game are wearing the White Sox uniform. I am proud to have been chosen as one of them, and humbly hope I can fulfill the hopes Mr. Gleason has placed in me. But I am only one player—a 'busher' at that—and it takes at least nine men to win a game.

"A high figure was paid for my contract, but that can't alone improve my playing. All I can do is play my best and hope for the breaks.

"Imagine, then, being suddenly made the target of batteries of cameras, being pointed out as that \$100,000 player and watched as

though I was going to do something desperate any minute. "This had me nervous for a while—made me seem all hands and feet. Even my voice seemed strained. I guess I was a little over-anxious at the plate. A little piece of paper flew in front of me at third base. Ordinarily, I never would have noticed it. I finally had to pick it up. It bothered me so. Now I know how a zoo animal feels!"

"Manager Gleason's cheerful assurances to the players helped a lot.

## DEFEAT AN EFFORT TO ABOLISH GRUBBS VOCATIONAL SCHOOL

AUSTIN, April 26.—An effort to abolish Grubbs Vocational College at Arlington when consideration of the appropriation budget for that institution was considered by the senate this morning, failed. By a vote of 21 to 7 the upper house tabled an amendment by Thomas which sought to strike out all appropriations for the school. An amendment by Stuart to consolidate the school with the University of Texas and locate the two institu-

tions at Arlington was ruled out of order. Senator Thomas of Bell county in a heated speech on his amendment urged the members to "vote their convictions" and abolish the institution. The senate adopted a resolution by Wood to allow \$250 to purchase a life-size portrait of General Albert Sidney Johnson, which is owned by the regents of the Daughters of the Confederacy.

Lynch Davidson, former lieutenant governor, was invited to address the upper house.

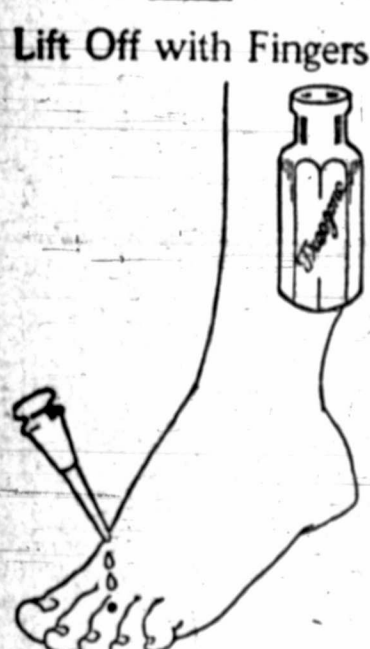
SUN HIDDEN FROM VIEW BY COVERING OF DISMAL CLOUDS
