



EQUAL TAXATION.

Statistics are being collected by a special senate committee regarding the assessment of property in the counties of the state with a view of recommending legislation for the equalization of assessed values throughout the state.

The committee, no doubt, will find much interesting information but the outstanding fact that some countles assess property on a very low basis of valnation while some other counties have a high basis is already generally known, and it is also generally known that the reason some countles have a high rate of assessment is because of the local need of greater revenue. Our method of assessing values and of collecting taxes has laid a penalty upon the more progressive nities and has had the effect of giving a bonus to some of the older, more settled and less progressive communities which actually receive more from the state treasury than they pay into it. If it were for the need of local revenues, under our pres ent system of assessment it would become a contect which each county would vie with all the others in attempting to get its basis of assessment the low est and pay the least into the state treasury.

We do need some method in Texas by which the talked ten whole days without stopping? assessed values in the countles into which the state is divided can be equalised so that each county will pay its proper proportion of taxes to the state. A state board of equalization appears the only solution of the problem.






