





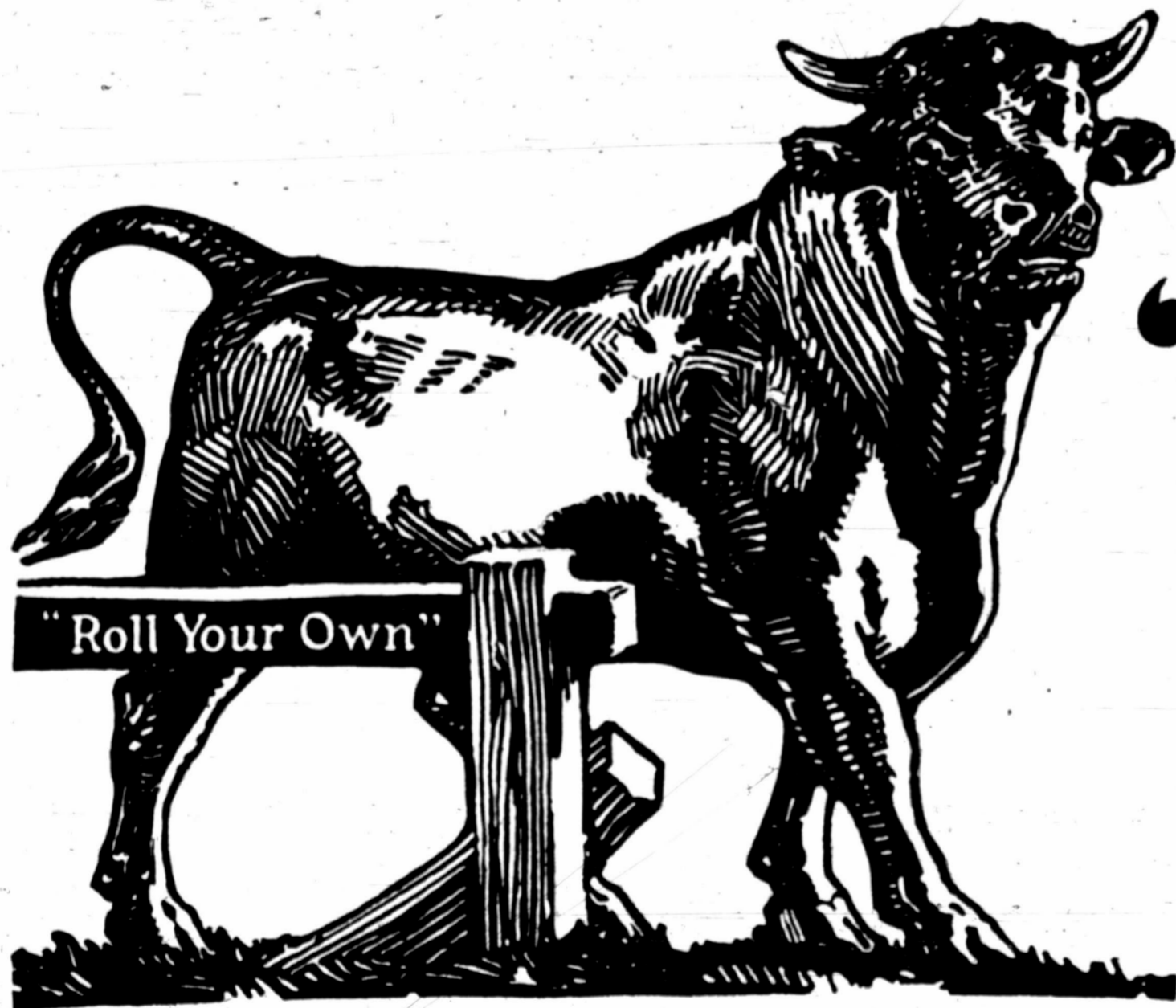

### 'Six to One' Vote Does Not Give Great Britain Advantage Claimed By Opponents League of Nations

WASHINGTON, May 8.—One of the objections brought forward against America's entry into the League of Nations, and renewed now as a reason why America should not join the court whose judges were chosen by the League of Nations, is that in the league, as it is expressed by those who use the argument, Great Britain has six votes to America's one. This is the most concrete of the arguments used against the campaign that Hiram Johnson made against it. Again, in Harding's speech about the international court, he recalled this objection, treated it as if it were serious, and said that for the purposes of the court he would be willing to waive it. This argument, because it is so simple and concrete, has had weight with many persons in America.

About this argument certain facts can be set down which have at least the merit of an historical narrative of how the relative numbers "six to one" arose, and also point to some surmises which the reader may or may not accept as to how the discrepancy would work out in actual practice.

This argument is commonly put forward as if it were a kind of trick on the part of Great Britain, by which she would be enabled to have six times as much power in the league as America. Historically this is inaccurate. When the Paris peace conference was in session it was taken for granted that Great Britain, like every other nation, would have one vote in the league. But there were in Paris at the conference certain representatives of the British dominions, men like Hughes of Australia, who were exceptionally jealous of the prerogatives of their dominions, and insisted upon assertion of their rights. Men like Hughes said, in effect: "If Australia was good enough to help with the war, she is good enough to have a voice in the league." The government, sounding sensible, it is repeated, with equal force for Canada, for India, and for South Africa.

Now the fact is that Great Britain herself did not want to defer on this point. But she was obliged to. Australia had fought valiantly in the war and therefore Australia was entitled to a seat at the Paris peace conference. Therefore, also, Australia was entitled to a seat of its own in the League of Nations. And so as to the rest of the British dominions. The parts of the British empire should have each an individual vote in the League of Nations was determined. In effect at the moment when the dominions helped in the war, and at the moment when the cause they helped in the war, they were granted seats at the Paris peace conference.

To Great Britain it was repugnant rather than an advantage to have six times as much power in the league as America. Instead of concentrated into one vote, Great Britain would have much preferred to have one if the league would wield the entire power of the whole world-wide British empire. The fact that the separate dominions were able to claim, and successfully insist upon, each for a vote for itself, is actually a sign, not of the solidarity of the British empire, but of its rapidly increasing diffusion, a process which has been very rapid since the war began.

A further aspect of the "six to one" argument will be made vivid if the reader will imagine it in terms of America. Imagine that America, instead of having one vote in the league, had six, and that these six were distributed geographically over the country. Imagine that one man like, let us say, Mr. Taft, was casting one vote for that part of the country which centers at Washington. Imagine that another man like, let us say, Senator Underwood, was casting a separate vote for the south—imagine that another man, like Senator Borah, was casting a third vote for the northwest. Imagine that a fourth man, like Senator Capper, was casting a vote for the agricultural country of the middlewest. And so on. Is it not clear that these six men would be actuated by different and often conflicting interests? Is it not clear that on many questions they would separate? Is it not clear that the United States would be weaker with six

#### ADDED TO TERRITORY SERVED BY BARGE LINE

NEW ORLEANS, May 8.—The entire Texas gulf coast from Orange to Brownsville along the line of the New Orleans, Texas and Mexico Railroad was added to the territory served by the Mississippi river barge line through a tariff announced here today by W. M. Hough, traffic manager of the barge line.

The new rates, Mr. Hough said, covered the movement of commodities from all points in Illinois along the lines of the Illinois central railroad and west into Iowa, as far as Dubuque to the Texas points along the Gulf Coast lines, by way of East St. Louis or Cairo and thence to New Orleans by barge line.

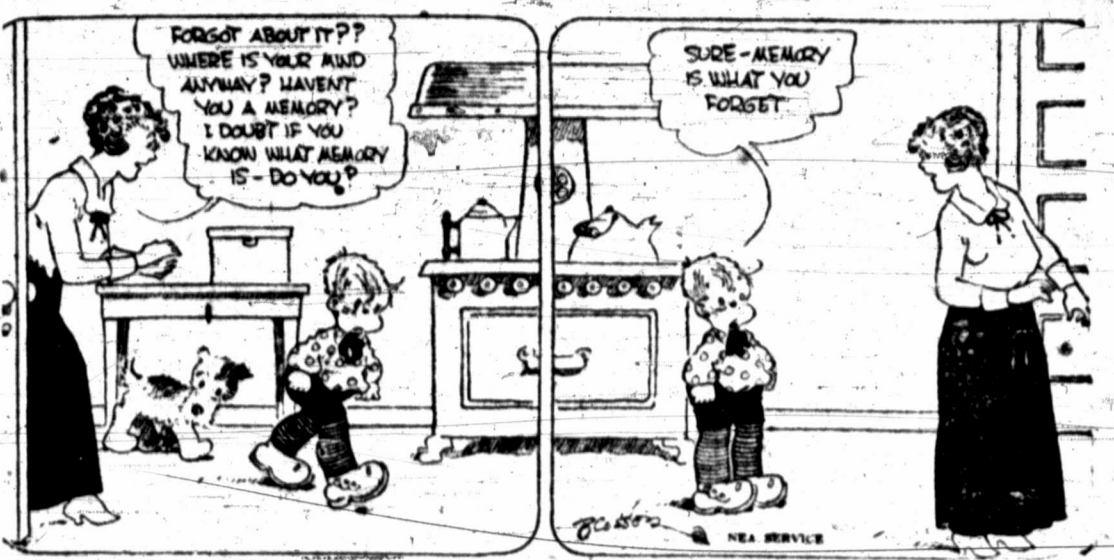

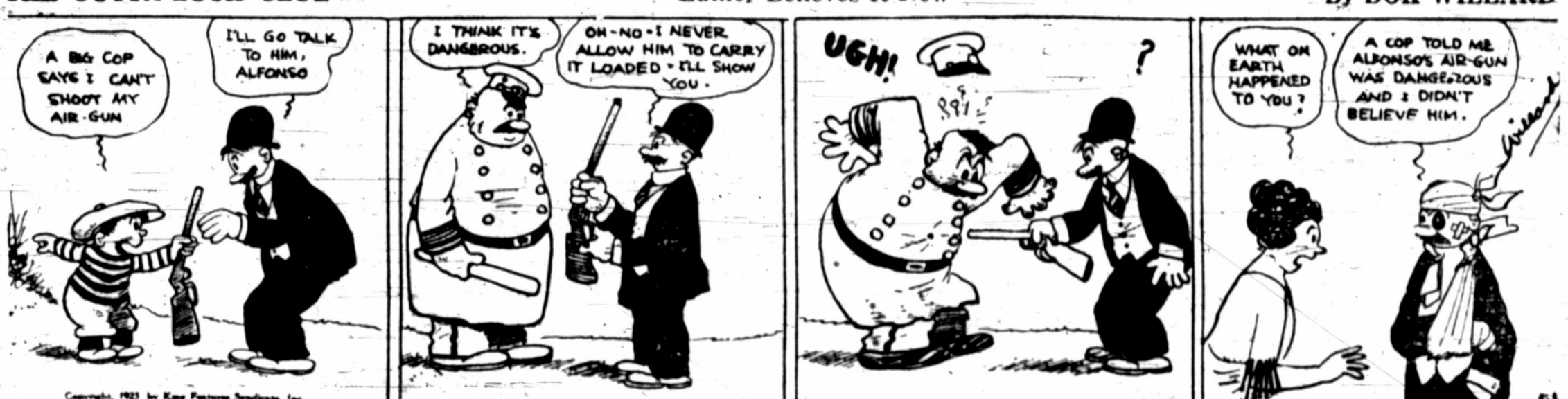

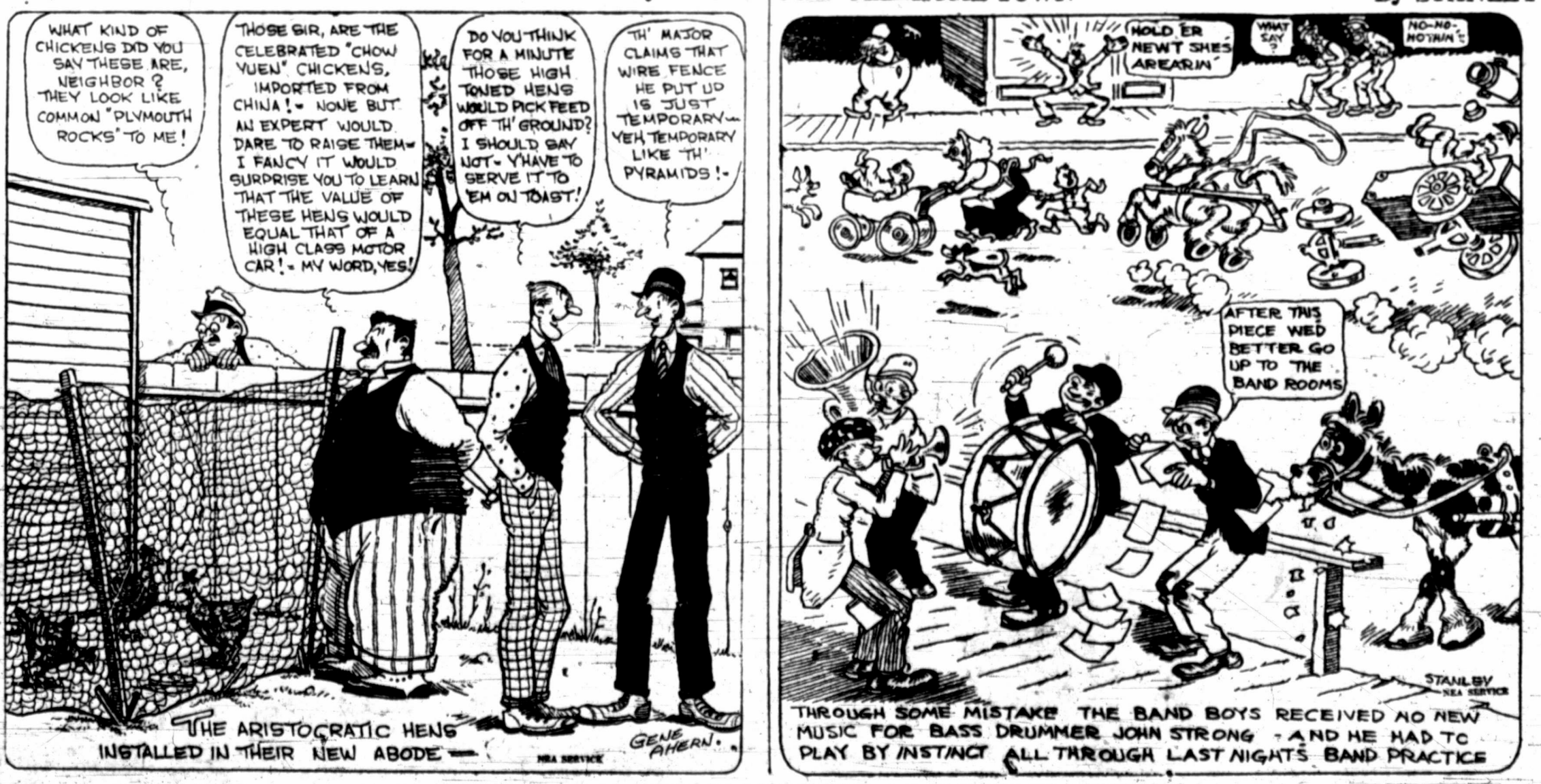
