TESTIFIES "KING" BENJAMIN MADE IMPROPER MOVES

ST. JOSEPH, MICH., May 11.—Mrs. LeVina Johnson Henger, 78, who fled from the house of David Colton two weeks ago told Judge Harry Dingeman, the one man grand jury delving into charges of immorality in the colony, "King" Benjamin Funnell, the cult leader, made improper advances to her when she was visiting at Shiloh last summer. "King" Benjamin, she testified, asserted he was testing her faith when she objected.

Marathon Walk Austin to Dallas To Kansas City

DALLAS, May 11.—Jack Earle, of Kansas City, on what he calls a "marathon walk" to Kansas City, arrived here at 8:45 o'clock this morning, having negotiated the 325 miles, as he now files, from Austin to Dallas in less than two days. He says he had been working at Houston and started by train to Kansas City to visit his mother, planning stops at San Antonio and Dallas. At San Antonio he was robbed of all his money. He beat his way to Austin on a train and then decided on the walk.

GOOD EXPORT INQUIRY FOR SUGAR LEADS TO INCREASE IN BUYING

NEW YORK, May 11.—A continued good export inquiry for refined sugar and indication of a better market here was announced today as increased buying in the local raw sugar market today. There was an advance of one-sixteenth cent on the bulk of six and one-half cents for Cuban, cost and freight, or to within one-fourth cent of the season's high record price.

BURKHARDT RESIGNS AS MANAGER RESERVE BANK

DENVER, COLO., May 11.—The resignation of Charles A. Burkhardt, as manager of the Denver Branch of the Kansas City Federal Reserve Bank was announced here today. Burkhardt, it was announced, will become secretary and manager of the Denver Clearing House Association. He is widely known in banking circles.

FIVE ARE INJURED IN AUTO ACCIDENT IN TAYLOR COUNTY

ABILENE, TEXAS, May 11.—Five persons were injured, two seriously, when an automobile turned over just south of Abilene, this county, this morning. Mrs. Parramore, Mrs. Mrs. Cecil Woods of Winters, both unconscious, are being brought to Abilene. Mrs. Frank Williams of Winters and Mrs. Woods' two children were less seriously hurt. The accident took place when the driver of the car attempted to drive around a truck.

TEXT BOOK BILL WINS VICTORY IN VOTE OF SENATE

DEFEAT POINT OF ORDER THAT MEASURE IS NOT ADMISSIBLE. BOWERS SAYS GOVERNOR WILL VETO IF PASSED

WASHINGTON, May 11.—The text book bill won a victory in the senate this morning when that body, by a vote of 16 to 10, voted down a point of order that the bill is not admissible under the governor's call for special session. Little was done with the measure this morning other than discussion on the question of whether it can be considered.

ENCOURAGING REPORT FROM U. S. MINISTER

WASHINGTON, May 11.—U. S. government officials have promised Jacob Gould Schurman, the American minister at Peking, that they will consider a general policy for the extermination of bandits in China as soon as the present situation growing out of the war with the Japanese is adjusted.

SHANGHAI, May 11.—United States Minister Schurman said that he expected to hear at any time that the Suichow train bandits had released all their captives. Mr. Schurman arrived here at midnight with his wife and niece.

PHILADELPHIA, May 11.—Brigadier General Robert, who was 84 years old, died at the Chamber of Commerce building in Philadelphia and New Bedford. He was a member of the commission that designed the sea wall for Galveston and also designed the bridge connecting that city with the mainland.

Switzerland Excited Result Assassination Of Russian Delegate

TWO SENATE BILLS ARE ENGROSSED BY HOUSE AT AUSTIN

AUSTIN, May 11.—Two Senate bills were engrossed by the house this morning. They were Doyle and Bowers, authorizing the purchase of 333 acres of additional land for A. and M. College and Murphy, appropriating \$25,000 for the erection at Houston of a monument to General Sam Houston. The house members appointed today to the conference committee on the Bell liquor bill concerning prima facie evidence of violations were Harrison, Crawford, Dunn, Patterson and Bell.

APPROPRIATION BILL DECEASED IN HOUSE

AUSTIN, TEXAS, May 11.—Consideration of the departmental appropriation bill on the floor of the house continued slowly today. Reductions totaling \$2,990, of which \$18,000 was taken from traveling expenses of the board of health and \$6,000 from the agricultural department, were made.

THREE MEMBERS OF FAMILY DEAD TWO ARE INJURED

CINCINNATI, May 11.—Three members of the family of Joseph Fischer, a contractor of Hartwell, a suburb, are dead, and the father and two others are seriously injured, as the result of a grade crossing accident in Hartwell last night when the automobile in which they were riding was struck by a passenger train.

DYNAMITE BRIDGE IN RUHR DISTRICT RESULT SENTENCE

ESSEN, May 11.—Sabotage gangs dynamited an important railway bridge last night as their appetite probably will be satisfied by the French court martial at Dusseldorf imposing the death sentence upon Albert Schloetter, convicted with six others on charges of sabotage and espionage.

MEMORANDUM SUBMITTED TO SECRETARY OF WAR

PANAMA, May 11.—In a memorandum submitted to Secretary of War Weeks, the government of Panama asserts that inasmuch as the canal has been completed, the United States should definitely declare that it now holds all land necessary for the protection of the waterway, thereby affording a safeguard for the project.

MEXIA, TEXAS, May 11.—Twenty or more major oil field supply houses operating in the general east Texas fields, with headquarters here, and all local oil refiners, were to close one hour, 4:00 to 5:00 o'clock, this afternoon as a mark of respect to the men lost in the Hughes-McKie oil well accident Wednesday. The number of dead is placed here at 14 or 15, several of the victims are to be buried between 4:00 and 5:00 o'clock today.

FOURTH OF BUSINESS SECTION OF ELDRADO TEXAS IS DESTROYED

SAN ANTONIO, TEXAS, May 11.—Fire of suspected incendiary origin destroyed one-fourth of the business section of Eldorado, causing a loss of about \$15,000. Business places destroyed included the Eldorado Hardware Company, Mrs. K. C. Hanson's confectionery, Ernest H. Sweatt shoe shop, Joe Williams' tailor shop and Herbert Finley's barber shop.

GERMANY GIVES UP ALL HOPE FOR HELP FROM THE OUTSIDE

NEW YORK, May 11.—Germany has given up all hope of obtaining outside aid in the settlement of the reparations problem and has come to the realization that she must settle her own affairs.

SEVEN FIREMEN AT DALLAS INJURED IN BLAZE FRIDAY A. M.

DALLAS, May 11.—Seven firemen were injured, none seriously and property loss estimated at more than \$2000 caused by fire here today which destroyed the two-story residence of Mrs. J. M. Boswell on Swiss avenue, and damaged three other two-story residences. A high wind was blowing and 19 engines, four trucks and five hose companies, called to the scene, battled the flames a hour before they were brought under control.

SPUDDERS GET LONG SOUGHT HURLER FROM CHICAGO ON OPTION

The services of Pitcher Stauffer of the Chicago Cubs have been obtained under an optional agreement by the Spudders for use this season. Stauffer was acquired after being purchased by President R. Q. Harve Stauffer in 1922. Stauffer is not yet waived out of the big show, but Bill Killefer, who was with Stauffer, was brought under control.

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MAINTENANCE OF WAY AND SHOPMEN GRANTED INCREASE

FOUR CARRIERS REACH AN AGREEMENT WITH MEN THURSDAY.

DEMANDS TO BE MADE ON OTHER RAILROADS

Concerted Move Among Certain Classes of Employees is Indicated.

CHICAGO, May 11.—Indications of a concerted move among certain classes of railroad employees for increases in wages today came from the cases already filed before the United States railroad labor board and reports of negotiations pending with various carriers.

Four carriers granted increases yesterday, reports stated, embracing shopmen on the Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis railway, shop crafts and men of the Pennsylvania railroad system, maintenance of way men of the Chicago and Alton railroad.

The increase to shopmen on the Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis Railway was two and three cents, affecting about 2,000 men. The Pennsylvania system increases to clerks and shop crafts were announced as three to seven and one-half per cent.

Ten thousand maintenance of way men on the Great Northern road received increases ranging from \$2.54 to \$10.00 a month. Increases for maintenance of way men on the Chicago and Alton railroad ranged from \$3.40 to \$10.00 a month.

From New York reports stated the union shopmen plan to present wage demands totalling about \$12,000,000 to the management of the Pittsburgh and Lake Erie, Baltimore and Ohio and New York Central railroads.

CHARGES FRENCH IMPERIALISM IS WORLD MENACE

PHILADELPHIA, May 11.—Urging an equitable settlement of the question of German reparations, Dr. F. E. Hoffman of Babson Institute said today at the annual meeting of the American Academy of Political and Social Science that "French imperialism is as much a menace to mankind as German imperialism."

"The world's sympathies are with France," he said, "but the world's judgment is clearly against the course she has taken in seeking by force of arms which would have been yielded to her by proper political and economic pressure."

"France has not gained, but lost, by the Ruhr occupation. Each day only increases the sinister complications. If the objective of the occupation is reparations in full that objective is being destroyed. If the purpose has a larger political significance the implied dangers are of the very first order to the whole civilized world. French imperialism is as much a menace to mankind as German imperialism."

"There is more urgent need for higher an international economic conference, in which the United States should participate, or an economic survey made by American experts, in the full confidence of the American people."

MOLER REPUDIATES STATEMENTS IN HIS RECENT CONFESSION

LIPSCOMB, TEXAS, May 11.—William Moler, charged with killing of Noah Samples, aged rancher in Hemphill county last March, almost completely repudiated his former confession when he took the stand in his own defense in district court here.

The defendant was on the stand from 10 o'clock until 6 o'clock this afternoon.

Moler declared his former confession was given under duress and that it was not all true. He claimed that he made the confession as a result of threats and promises and as a result of his own fear of mob violence.

He testified that Samples was under the influence of liquor at the time of the homicide and that the latter attacked him, when the fatal blows were struck to save his own life.

Moler stated that Samples became angry because the former could not find any more whiskey. DePal was made that the killing resulted because Samples would not lend him money.

The defendant in his testimony admitted burning the body of Samples and also acknowledged that he took Samples' car to Oklahoma, as he admitted in his former confession, given about a week after the slaying.

Thousands of people have been in attendance at the trial, which was started Monday.

Two Washington Couples Dance to Altar to Marry

WASHINGTON, May 11.—Two couples survivors of a marathon dance contest which got under way Monday night on a Potomac river houseboat, were married last night as they shuffled by Judge Mattingly of police court. Fred Newman and Evelyn King, both 21, and Herbert J. Skelly, 22, and Thelma Reed, 21, all of Baltimore, the participants in the double wedding, had danced their way on a truck to the court house during the day to obtain marriage licenses.

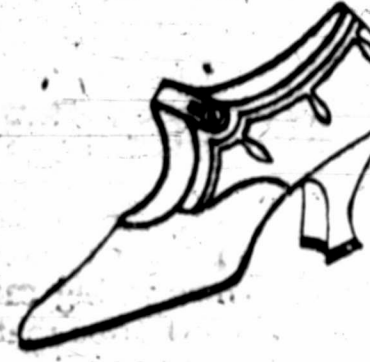

GET WATER FROM IRRIGATION LAKES IF CITY NEEDS IT

NO DANGER OF WATER FAMINE, DISTRICT OFFICIALS DECLARE.

SUPPLY AVAILABLE IN EMERGENCY HERE

Could Be Pumped From Diversion Lake Into Canal On Short Notice.

Wichita Falls is in no danger of a water famine this summer, it was stated Friday, in connection with reports that the water supply was getting uncomfortably low.

In an emergency, water from the irrigation lakes could be put into Lake Wichita, T. B. Noble, vice chairman of the irrigation board, said Saturday. From two to three weeks would be required to make the necessary arrangements, but this is considered ample time. By installing pumps at the diversion dam, the water in that reservoir could be put into the south side canal in time to relieve any condition that might develop.

The south side canal is now almost ready for water, but a few culverts remaining to be installed. These could be completed within 30 days of normal work, but water could be run through the culverts by means of temporary work at the culverts, should it become necessary. At the diversion dam, water could be lifted from the lake into the canal by means of pumps. With 25 pumps, water in the storage lake ready to be retained into the lower body, enough water could be provided to carry the city well past any dry spell.

F. N. Lawton, manager of the city water department, said Friday that Lake Wichita's supply of water would last, without additional rainfall, probably 90 days, or until late in August.

Urges School Aid.
HUNTSVILLE—Resolutions urging passage of measures by the state legislature which will supply sufficient funds for proper maintenance of rural schools of Texas were adopted at the annual rural life conference which just closed here.

The resolutions favored passage of measures placing a tax on companies reaping great profits from natural resources of the state. Relief for farmers of the taxes now being paid by them also was advocated.

'Bavu' Showing At Olympic Is Unusual Film

A special production which opened at the Olympic theater Thursday is entitled "Bavu." Judging from reviews the Olympic patrons have a genuine and unusual treat in store for them.

The following was clipped from a May issue of the Motion Picture News: "Undoubtedly this play was written with the screen in mind since it carries all the essentials which provide an exciting hour. Presumably burdened with dialogue, it showed itself as lacking punch, and it may be that it appeared unconvincing in the film translation, and what transpires has all the earmarks of a good old-fashioned blood and thunder melodrama."

The background of this picture is the Russia at the height of the revolution, and doubtless the author was inspired through the vital figure of Lenin. For dramatic purposes he exposes his central figure from which the play takes its name, as an ignorant, uneducated, uncouth brute, who, drunk with power after the overthrow of the czar, plots to wreak vengeance upon everyone who comes across his path. He uses the call of patriotism to cloak his mad impulses, and through the power of his eloquence and his vital personality he has the peasantry completely under his domination.

Stuart Patton, the director, has brought forth the atmosphere and considerable touches—such as the mass meeting of everyone who comes across his path. In fact, it keeps going with plenty of movement, color and thrills to the end. The finish shows the ignorant Bavu being outwitted by his educated rival. There is a pursuit over the snow, which results in the death of the vicious peasant.

"Bavu" gives Wallace Berry another opportunity to show his mastery skill at characterization. His make-up, his eloquent pantomime, fascinating mannerisms are deftly suggested. In fact, he makes the picture. Since he is in nearly every scene the picture compels attention. His support is competent. An exciting melodrama, this "Bavu," which holds the interest because of its characterization and incident. Watching Berry you forget its obviousness and the fact that it carries few dramatic twists.

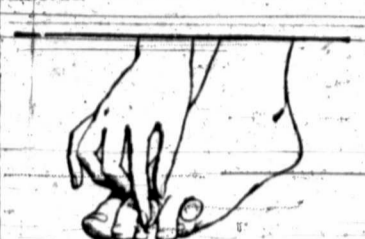

LEASES CHANGE HANDS AROUND SWEATT TEST

The proposed contract between
the city and county whereby the
Kemp library becomes the center of

or two members at large be named.

The contract provides that title
and control of the library property
in this city remain in the city.

ries. The contract, if approved, will
become effective September 1 of this
year.

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IMMIGRATION LAW ONLY KEEPING OUT UNDESIRABLE ONES

BRITISH QUOTA IS 35,000 SHORT FOR PAST FISCAL YEAR.

PROBLEM IS TO INDUCE DESIRABLES TO COME

Great Britain Alone Has Total of 1,400,000 Unemployed in Government Report.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 10.—A thoughtful and fairly well informed person being asked what is Great Britain's greatest problem today, replied: "It is how to take care of its 1,400,000 unemployed." A few days before, Judge Gary, the head of the United States Steel Corporation, when asked what was America's greatest industrial problem, replied, "More labor."

In the light of Great Britain's problem of how to find labor, consider the following facts: During the last fiscal year of the United States kingdom immigration percentage law of sending in 77,343 immigrants. Actually during that year Great Britain sent in only 42,710 immigrants. That is to say, only 55 per cent as many immigrants went to America from Great Britain as had the right to.

In other words, under our present quota law, America could have got from Great Britain nearly 35,000 more immigrants than actually came. Under this state of facts, it would seem that the answer to America's dilemma as propounded by Judge Gary and others of our industrial leaders, would be not in trying to change the law so as to increase the percentage of immigrants permitted to come in, nor in otherwise changing the law in the direction of greater elasticity, but rather in the practical business of bringing in those British workers who could come but don't come.

Practically nobody in America objects to bringing in immigrants from Great Britain. Nearly all of the anti-alien prejudice which is responsible for our present sentiment against immigration is directed not against Great Britain nor against the other countries of western Europe, but against certain countries in southern and eastern Europe.

The practical business of getting these English, Irish, Scotch and Welsh unemployed started toward America ought not to be too difficult for our industrial leaders. It would relieve Great Britain and it would benefit America. If the United States does not find some way to do something about it, Great Britain being hard pressed by the problem, is likely to organize means of sending its surplus population to

Canada, Australia and other British dominions. What is said about Great Britain is true also of Germany. During the last fiscal year, 45,053 immigrants could have come in from Germany. Actually 19,953 came in. This is to say, 44,000 Germans could have come in under our present law who did not come in. It would seem that in the devising of ways and means appropriate to this set of facts would be the basis for an acceptable compromise between, on the one hand, these anti-alien forces in America who are utterly unwilling to make the present law more elastic but would not object to the bringing in of British labor and German labor, which could come in under our present law but fails to come.

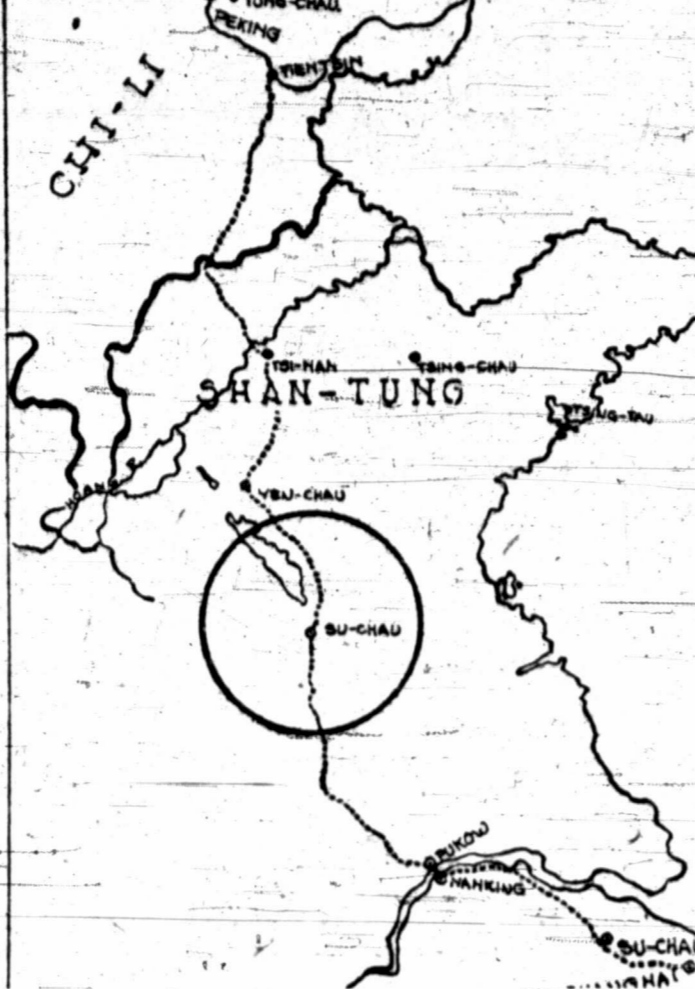

Federal and state departments have been at work for several weeks to prevent entrance of the malarial into this country, he said.

ADDING LIVESTOCK AND IMPROVED MACHINERY

Situation May Disprove Theory That American Farmer Will Profit From Exports.

WASHINGTON, May 11.—The theory held by the leaders of the American Farm Bureau Federation and widely disseminated among the American farmer is that when Europe becomes stabilized the market here for farm goods will increase to the point of bringing the American farmer back to pre-war prosperity. This theory has been made the basis for a movement among American farmers looking to pressure on our government toward helping to hurry Europe back to normal. On paper and from a point of view 4,000 miles west of Europe, in the Mississippi valley, the theory looks sound. In Europe, however, one begins faintly, at least to question it. It may be that with the wheat-raising of Russia, Rumania and elsewhere in Europe, back to normal production, they will be able to supply Europe its own wheat and other foodstuffs to a



greater degree than before the war. Throughout all Europe the farmer is the one man who is "coming back" and coming back fast. Everywhere he has paid off his mortgage in depreciated currency. A continental European farmer who, before the war, was burdened with a heavy mortgage, is now able to pay the interest in depreciated currency with a dozen eggs, and to pay the principal with a cow. The farmer is conspicuously the rising class in Europe.

Without a Percolator. Using a coffee pot to serve six persons, mix half a cup of finely ground coffee to a thick paste with a little cold water. Now They Can Warn Us of Impending Earthquakes



United States Hydrographic Forces, With the Aid of New Submarine Devices, Can Tell Us of Volcanic Disturbances Deep Down in the Sea, Presaging Land Disasters—By Rene Bache

THE hydrographic office of the navy has started out to map the floor of the Pacific Ocean, with the help of the newly invented depth-finding machine. Up to the present, knowledge of the contours of the sea-bottom has been limited to what could be ascertained by soundings with a plummet on the end of a line of piano wire run off a reel. Necessarily the information thus obtained has been very incomplete, and, as one might say, fragmentary. But the "sonic depth-finder," which ascertains depths by the time required for the return of echoes from the ocean floor, renders a complete charting practicable, like a survey on land.

By this means hills and valleys are accurately mapped, even though miles under water. Already a satisfactory chart of the floor of the Pacific has been completed from San Francisco southward to the Mexican boundary and far enough westward to reach depths of over two miles.

ONE important object of the mapping, soon to be much further extended, is to locate "fault lines," that is, submarine cracks in the earth's crust, which are liable to give rise to earthquakes. Careful study of such fault lines, where they are observable on land, has been made along the Pacific Coast; but, in order to complete the data, it is necessary that supplementary information should be obtained in regard to breaks of the kind under the sea.

Thus, for instance, the earthquake which damaged San Francisco in 1906 was due to the slipping of a block of rocks thousands of feet thick and 185 miles in length along one side of an old break known as the San Andreas Rift. This fault-line appears to start from San Bernardino, extending in a north-westerly direction across the gap called the Golden Gate, and thence to Cape Mendocino, where it leaves the land and passes out under the sea. Whether does it run? Nobody knows; but the submarine geographers propose to find out.

Already, in their mapping work, they have charted a number of steep submarine slopes and cliffs which may possibly be fault-lines. If these lines of structural weakness in the earth's crust can be accurately determined, under the sea as well as on land, it ought to be practicable to forecast earthquakes—not the times when they would occur, but the localities in which they might be expected to happen.

A most interesting feature of the contemplated work will be an accurate

mapping of the great holes in the ocean floor. All that is known at present about these remarkable submarine abysses is what has been ascertained by a few soundings. Sounding-lines have found a depth only sixty-six feet less than six miles in the chasm called Nero Deep, which was discovered, southeast of Guam, in 1899. That hole held the depth record until, only a short time ago, a more profound gulf east of Mindanao, in the Philippines, was found, yielding one sounding 404 feet more than six miles. If Mount Everest, the tallest mountain in the world, were set on the bottom of that chasm, its loftiest peak would be 3087 feet under water.

The great holes in the sea floors usually have the shape of elongated troughs. One of them, known as the Tonga Trough, east of the Tonga Islands, has a measured depth of nearly five and three-quarters miles. South of it is the Kermadec Trough, 788 feet deeper. Another big trench skirts the southern edge of the Aleutian chain, and along the coast of Japan runs a submarine chasm of such magnitude that geologists think the entire Empire of Nippon may have been thrown up out of it by volcanic action.

In the same way Guam may have been spewed up out of Nero Deep, leaving that great hole to show where the island came from. In past ages there has been volcanic action on a tremendous scale beneath the sea. A usual feature of the "troughs" is a volcanic cone rising from the middle of the abyss to within a few thousand feet of the surface.

ALL over the floor of the Pacific are scattered volcanic cones, some of whose tops are only a few hundred feet under water. Many others are tall enough to rise above the surface, their summits forming islands. Five hundred and seventy miles due west from Monterey Bay is a "drowned mountain," doubtless an ancient volcano, two and a half miles high. Not long ago a trans-Pacific cable had to be carried around it.

There are deep holes in the bottoms of all seas. The one of greatest profundity in the Atlantic Ocean is Nares Deep—otherwise known as Virgin Deep—north of Porto Rico and the Virgin Islands. It has a measured depth of more than five and a quarter miles.

Oceanic islands commonly owe their origin to volcanic disturbances. Every now and then violent earthquakes in the region of the Azores give advance notice of the birth of a new island.

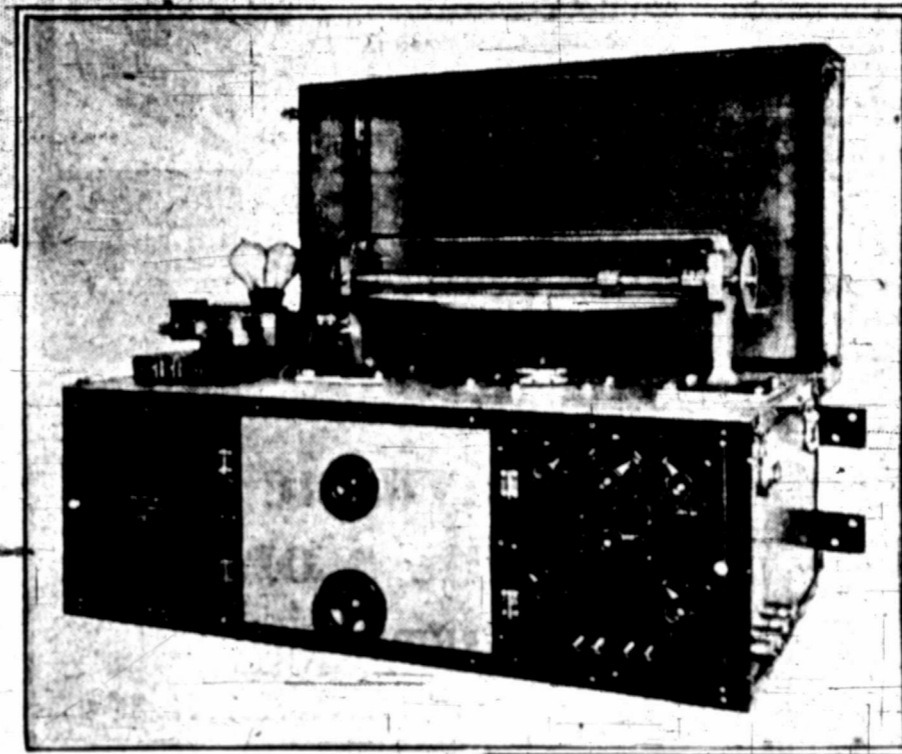
Fire presently breaks out from the sea, and vast quantities of lava are vomited up in a cloud of steam, smoke and ashes. When the fuss is over, it is seen that a group of rocks has been uplifted, which grows until perhaps it covers a space several miles in circumference. Later on, perhaps, the new-born island sinks and disappears.

Submarine earthquakes are not uncommon phenomena. Now and then a slip of rocky strata occurs along a fault line in the sea-bottom, and, if not far from shore, it may give rise to a "tidal wave," causing a wall of water fifty or sixty feet high to rush over the land. Only a few months ago such a wave wreaked enormous havoc in Japan, wiping out scores of villages and thousands of human lives. A big slip along the San Andreas crack, out at sea, might conceivably precipitate a similar catastrophe in California.

VOLCANOES are land-makers. The island of Martinique, on which Mont Pelee is located, is nothing more or less than a surface ash-pile around a chimney that extends downward into the interior furnace of the terrestrial globe. It marks the place where vents leading upward from the core of the earth opened ages ago in the sea-bottom, two miles below. The present crater of Mont Pelee is the mouth of a chimney, a recent eruption from which wiped out two towns and thousands of lives.

The floor of the ocean is a desert far more desolate than any waste of dry land. There is no plant life of any kind, but everywhere an interminable expanse of "ooze"—slimy stuff, composed partly of very fine sand or mud, and partly of shelly material and the decaying substance of what were once the bodies of minute animals. A continual rain of these tiny animals from the surface of the sea, always falling, spreads over the bottom a layer of easily digested food, suitable for the smaller creatures that inhabit the depths.

At times the surface level of the sea is literally almost packed with these tiny "foraminifera," whose shells exhibit many curious and beautiful forms, resembling dinner-plates with perforated designs, fireman's hats, young mushrooms, pretzels, pineapples, soap-dishes, etc. How largely they contribute to the paving of the ocean floor may be judged from the fact that all the great chalk beds of the world, and all the deposits of limestone and marble, are composed of their shells. They furnished

the material for the Washington Monument and the Pyramids of Egypt.

It was formerly supposed that there was no animal life in the depths of the ocean, but it is now known that there is plenty of it, even in the deepest abysses, which are haunted by weird monsters specially modified for adaptation to the conditions of their environment. Now and then it happens that one of these strange creatures swims high enough to get beyond its proper aqueous zone, and then, forced by the great pressure, it falls upward, arriving at the surface in a dying condition. Such accidents are accountable for the discovery of many animals of the depths which otherwise might have remained forever unknown. Others have been fetched up by the dredge nets of exploring vessels.

ONE of the most remarkable creatures of the depths is the "black swallower," a big fish that lies buried in the mud, with only its huge mouth protruding, ready to envelop any prey that comes along. Another, the "pelican fish," is nearly all head. There is a deep-sea "electric hake" which carries a formidable storage battery, and which can give a severe shock. Cuttlefishes of a size to fill an ordinary pail seem to be among the commonest of animals far down below, and are a favorite prey of the depth sharks, in whose stomachs are found great numbers of their parrot-like beaks, undigested.

In the depths there is absolute darkness—a liquid darkness that can't be felt. There is no perceptible movement of the water. No sound is ever heard. The pressure of the water is tremendous—two tons or more to the square inch—and, to enable them to withstand it, the fishes have pulpy bodies and soft cartilaginous bones.

Always there has been volcanic action on a tremendous scale beneath the sea, where there are mountains rising miles high from the floor of the ocean. A usual feature of the submarine trough is a volcanic cone rising from the middle of the abyss to within a few thousand feet of the surface. The earthquake which destroyed part of San Francisco was due to the slipping of a block of rock thousands of feet thick and 185 in length along one side of an old break known as the San Andreas Rift.

With the latest devices it is possible to know when such an undersea shift threatens earth-dwellers.

WEATHER DELAYS HOME-GROWN TRUCK ONIONS COMING IN

The cool days continue to hold back the home-grown truck, and onions and strawberries are the only local stuff on the market. Tomatoes have advanced in price and are now offering corn at 10 cents a ear or three for a quarter. Radishes, carrots, beets, mustard and turnips are 10 cents a bunch with onions down to five-cents a bunch.

Tomatoes are 25 cents a pound, spring beans two pounds for a quarter, cabbage seven and a half cents a pound, and lettuce 15 cents a head. Okra is 25 cents a pound, cucumbers the same, and egg plant is offered at 30 cents a pound.

Squash is 10 cents a pound or three for a quarter, and peppers are up to 40 cents a pound in some markets and 30 in others.

Strawberries are two boxes for a quarter, rhubarb 20 cents a pound, and English peas 20 cents a pound.

Some of Ways in Which Housewife Can Cut Expenses

There comes a time, perhaps in May, when the housewife in buying supplies, is sorely tempted to buy what seems to her, unwisely and possibly extravagantly.

There are vegetables and fruits which are a little out of season and she longs to purchase a delicacy for the family. There is a justification for such expenditures at times, and the wise woman will buy "pleasure" giving foods and balance her budget by having a cheaper cut of meat or a less expensive vegetable another day.

If, during the week a meal or two contain a surprise—a favorite dessert, or a cake or a pie, an unusual salad, or a choice cut of meat, the housewife can keep her family satisfied and happy. It is the deadly monotony of food, no matter how good it may be, that we cannot stand without fussing.

Sometimes the color of strawberries are as appealing as the flavor. Who cannot be moved by the combination of strawberries, sugar, butter, hot biscuits and cream? In combination it is the "old-fashioned" strawberry shortcake which some consider the only "real" one. Others are equally pleased with a cake filled with berries, and white on top, with beaten cream.

For breakfast or lunch on a warm spring day is there any dish more inviting than broiled shad roe on a bed of watercress? Or some days there will be mushrooms in the market, cheap and good. One can make a meal of creamed mushrooms and a salad.

Strawberry Shortcake. Sift one pint of flour, four teaspoons of baking powder, one-half

teaspoon of salt and two teaspoons of sugar together. Cut into the flour four tablespoons of butter or three tablespoons of lard and moisten to a soft dough with about two-thirds of a cup of milk. Take onto a floured board and roll to one-half inch in thickness. Cut with a biscuit cutter, place in a buttered pan and bake 15 minutes in a hot oven. Split, butter and fill with strawberries sweetened and slightly mashed. Place on top a spoonful of beaten cream.

The dough may also be divided and baked in a round pan. Have both pieces baked in the same pan, one being placed on the other, the lower piece well buttered.

Shortcake is very good covered with crushed, sweetened strawberries, slightly warmed and served with plain cream.

WOOL MARKETS OF WORLD ARE STEADY

BOSTON, May 11.—(AP)—The commercial bulletin tomorrow will say: "The wool markets of the world are generally steady, although here and there, especially in the lower grades or inferior wools, there is some unsteadiness. Limits have been lowered in certain sections of the west, we hear, from the extreme end of the eastern dealers, considerable food for thought. Boston continues to be the cheapest market in the world."

President Piggly Wiggly Stores Issues Statement Following One Lively Meeting With Fist Fight

By Universal Service.
MEMPHIS, TENN., May 11.—Clarence Saunders, president of the Piggly Wiggly Stores, Inc., was assaulted and badly injured by a member of the campaign committee, appointed by the chamber of commerce several days ago, during a meeting at the Piggly Wiggly store here today. Saunders was hit on the head with a brick and his face was badly lacerated. He was taken to the hospital and is now recovering from his injuries.

Shortly after 3 o'clock Thursday afternoon Saunders emerged from the committee room with a bruised and bleeding cheek and his collar partly torn off. His clothing was badly disarranged. The name of Mr. Saunders' assailant was not disclosed, all the committeemen remaining silent when asked for information.

The cause of altercation is supposed to have been the result of Mr. Saunders' statement, earlier in the day, in which he said he had failed to buy his stock and that the Piggly Wiggly store headquarters would be moved from Memphis to another city. This statement was issued without consultation with members of the committee who had been bending every energy for three days to sell the 50,000 shares. Only about 25,000 shares have been sold up to date. The police were called, but left almost immediately without making any arrests. The meeting was later resumed.

Mr. Saunders' statement follows: "I am today starting negotiations with several cities, meaning representative men of those cities, that a trade may be made on the proper basis for the safety of everybody's investment in Piggly Wiggly Stores, Inc., including stockholders of that company. Those interested in the various pool groups, and also myself, but I will be the last one to be considered in the matter of my own fortune being protected—I'll take what may be left after everyone else is made whole.

"This, of course, will mean the moving of headquarters from Memphis.

"I favor Nashville next to Memphis for the headquarters as I will like to see Tennessee continue as the home place of Piggly Wiggly.

"I have done all possible to keep Piggly Wiggly for Memphis, and so have certain loyal personal friends of mine, but it looks to be an impossible job to get the banking interests in the city to cooperate and that naturally prevents a large class of the moneyed interests of the town from giving their active support.

"I am sorry and ashamed that the civic pride of Memphis is so torn asunder by the different groups of business interests that Piggly Wiggly could not be supported whole-

heartedly for the good of the community and the reputation of the south, regardless of personal feelings or group cliques.

Personal Assailment.
"No one will acknowledge personal animosity, but whether acknowledgment is made or not, the truth is otherwise.

"I want it understood that I am merely proposing the proposition for the business of Piggly Wiggly Stores, Inc., to be controlled at another city—and that whatever may be done in this respect will finally be passed upon and approved by those interested with me in the several pool groups. My whole purpose is to protect everybody against any possible loss, as we have a great business and it must not be destroyed, even though I may lose.

(Signed) Clarence Saunders.

In view of Mr. Saunders' signed statement, the chamber of commerce will discontinue its efforts to sell 50,000 shares of stock of the Piggly Wiggly Stores, Inc. in Memphis. However, the organization will continue its effort in every way to find some method of procedure to retain Piggly Wiggly headquarters in this city.

The finance committee appointed by the chamber of commerce will continue to function until the final adjustment is made and it is finally decided that the headquarters of the Piggly Wiggly Stores, Inc. is to be moved from Memphis. All money paid into this committee and contracts expected will be returned to the subscribers for stock.

MEMPHIS BAND WILL COMPETE AT SAN ANGELO MEET

WILL BE SENT TO WEST TEXAS CHAMBER OF COMMERCE MEETING.

OFFICERS ARREST OPERATOR OF STILL

Watch Operations of Distiller For Half Day Before Making Raid.

MEMPHIS, Texas, May 11.—Sheriff Joe Merrick of this county can probably qualify as an expert distiller. Mr. Merrick, with Deputy Sheriff Dunk Barkley, of Childress county, spent six hours last Saturday closely observing all of the details of the whiskey making process as practiced by Hall county moonshiners. As a result of Sheriff Merrick's investigations and observations a white man and a negro assistant are now confined in the county jail as guests of the sheriff. The officers secreted themselves upon a high bluff, overlooking the scene of operations at an early hour in the morning. They witnessed the removal of the still from its hiding place to the cove, in a canyon where it was captured. They saw the operators move a barrel of mash there from a hog-pen, where it was macerating as hog-feed, to the still. Watched them set up and arrange their apparatus, build the fire and carry the water for cooling the worms, and watched them make and drink a part of the first "run" without missing a single detail. The officers approached within a few feet of Yebey before he was aware of their presence; he started to run but was stopped by shots fired at the ground in front of him. The negro was back in the cove

near the still. Had no chance to get away without running over the officers and made no attempt to get away.

This is the third time the white man has been arrested by Hall and Childress officers, on charges of violating the prohibition law. He and four others were arrested a year ago while removing a still to a place selected for a "run," where four barrels of mash was in readiness. They were released on \$5,000 bond, and proceedings before Judge Nabers, the state law at that time not classing the possession of a still as an offense. He was later arrested upon a federal charge. The scene of his operations, past and present, is in the extreme southwestern corner of this county, in the Passes river breaks on Penn creek.

The still captured is, says Sheriff Merrick, complete in every detail. He also said that everything was scrupulously clean and that the operators seemed to exercise every care to produce a good article, that they were not afraid to drink themselves.

A thorough clean-up of the town, physically, was advocated. Law enforcement, particularly in regard to the traffic law and the curfew law, but into effect by the city, was discussed by City Attorney Hamilton and others. Immediate results for better enforcement were predicted because of the meeting.

W. W. Nivens, a prominent citizen and a pioneer of Hall county who has resided many years in the Parnell neighborhood, died last Saturday at St. Joseph, Mo. The body was buried at the Hillier cemetery Wednesday afternoon. Mr. Nivens was a member of the Masonic lodge at St. Joseph and was buried under the auspices of that order, many Memphis Masons attending. Mr. Nivens was a successful stockman and farmer and a large landholder in the Parnell section.

W. M. Owen, who received his appointment as acting postmaster several days ago took charge of the Memphis office yesterday afternoon, relieving R. F. Shepherd, who has served as postmaster during the past nine years.

WILL EMPLOY DIRECTOR FOR BAND AT ELECTRA

CHARLES BONNER SHOT AND KILLED IN BAYLOR COUNTY

In the course of events which followed, Bonner was shot with fatal results.

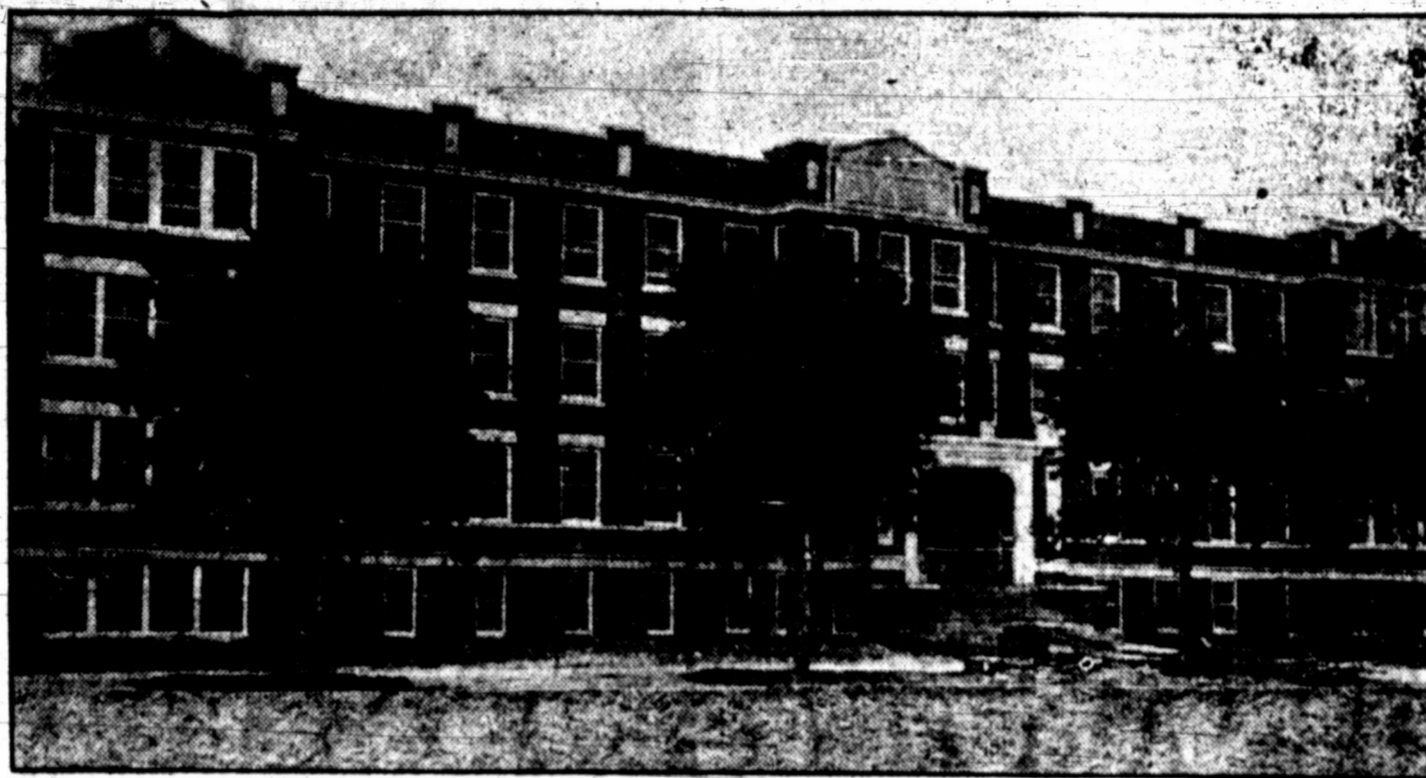

WICHITA GENERAL HOSPITAL

Wichita General Hospital Now In Tenth Year of Service to this Community and County

Saturday, May 12, Wichita General Hospital will open its doors to the public and will co-operate with some 4,500 other hospitals throughout the country in the celebration of National Hospital Day. National hospital day might well serve as an anniversary for the local hospital. Nine years and eleven days ago the first bonds were issued for the erection and operation of the Wichita General hospital. The hospital really had its origin and beginning about February 15, 1914 when the city voted \$25,000 toward building the hospital; the county voted a similar amount. Work soon began on the building and for several years the plant served the community well.

For some time the facilities were adequate for the demands made by the public but with the boom and the general growth and development of the city and county, the hospital soon became too small to serve the numerous patients who came to them for relief.

City and county officials saw the need of a larger plant and agitation toward the voting of more bonds was started. In November 1920 bonds which were to furnish the city and county with a hospital in keeping with the progress that had been made, was issued. The city voted and issued bonds amounting to \$75,000 and the county took similar action toward the improvement and increasing the capacity of the hospital.

In the meantime the patients had been scattered at Call field and private hospitals, in fact anywhere to accommodate them. As soon as bonds were issued and work was ready to begin the hospital was temporarily moved to Call field, where it remained until the completion of the building.

The bonds voted by the city and county amounting to \$150,000 allowed additions to the building which more than doubled the capacity and Wichita General is now quartered in a plant that is valued at above

\$200,000. It is declared by physicians and others who are familiar with such institutions to be one of the best equipped and most modern in the state and is sufficiently large to meet the needs of a city of 75,000.

The new plant of which the city is justly proud and which the citizens are invited to visit Saturday, will comfortably care for 120 patients. In case of emergency, an epidemic or distress, arrangements could easily be made to accommodate 140 patients. One of the special features of the institution which has been the cause of comment from visitors and has brought patients here from other cities is the modern and well equipped operating room.

By physicians who practice there regularly it is pronounced one of the best in the state. Few people think of the hospital as an educational institution. Visitors there Saturday will be shown the nurses class room where eighteen student nurses, eight graduate

nurses and two superintendent nurses besides a large staff of orderlies, cooks, maids and other help.

The nurses are comfortably housed in their own home at 206 Brook which has recently been refurnished and remodeled for this purpose. It is directly across the street from the hospital and is really a portion of the institution.

The hospital is operated under the direction of a governing board of five members who are appointed by the commissioners court and city council; they serve for a period of two years. The board is composed of four men and one woman; at least two of the members of the board must be licensed physicians.

These and many other interesting facts concerning the hospital may be learned Saturday if you accept the invitation of the board of directors and visit your hospital. The public is not only requested but urged to visit the hospital and see the work that is being done.

BROWNSVILLE.—Fifteen hundred burros were dipped at one dipping on the Yturria burro reservation between Brownsville and Boca Chica, according to Oscar Miller, in charge of tick eradication work in this section. The burros are dipped regularly, every 19 days, the same as cattle, as a precautionary measure to keep the ticks from spreading from them to cattle, Mr. Miller said.
