HAMMER SLAYER TO BE RETURNED TO U. S.

Once Defiant, Woman Now Hopeless, Broken and Resigned to Her Fate

TEGUICUALPA, HONDURAS, May 23.—(Via radio.)—Clara Phillips has broken her silence. Seated in her jail cell Tuesday night she told me her story of her escape from the Los Angeles county jail. Her story of her dash to freedom was simplicity itself. Here it is:

"I didn't want to come, I asked him: 'What's the matter in going to that God-forsaken country where all Americans are watched carefully?' 'But I couldn't see him see reason. He was too crazy. He gave a gun and said he would kill me unless I did as he said. Rita Mae and I pleaded with him, but he said he would always will.'"

Message to Husband. Then Mrs. Phillips sent a message to her husband in Los Angeles.

"But I wasn't sure I knew," she said, "that in spite of it all I have been good and that I love him and always will."

When Mrs. Phillips made her statement here Under-Sheriff Eugene Biscuit and Deputy Sheriff Walter J. Hunter. Slanting rays of a setting sun touched Clara Phillips' face and brought out vividly the lines of weariness and despair that have grown deeper since the arrival of the Los Angeles officers.

Though she shed no tears while making her statement there was a note of hopelessness in her voice. And the sudden manner, the indifference which characterized her throughout most of her trial for the murder of Albert Meadows was gone. She seemed just what she is—a tired woman, resigned to her fate and willing to return home.

As soon as the extradition papers arrive at Puerto Cortes, a special permit will be given to Clara to visit her country.

Ella Mae Jackson, Clara's sister, will not be released until Mrs. Phillips has been safely away from Tegucigalpa.

Mrs. Jackson, however, declares she will return with Clara or die in the attempt.

The fate of Clara is doubtful. Several Honduras officials have intimated that they will hold him to investigate his stories that he has knowledge of a revolutionary plot against the government.

It is possible that he may be charged with conspiracy.

WESTERN OKLAHOMA RECOVERING FROM EFFECTS OF STORM

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 23.—Western Oklahoma was slowly recovering today from the effects of Monday's storm, but the flood waters coursing down streams from that section of the state were expected to bring further damage to central and southern Oklahoma. Millions of dollars worth of crops have been washed out in fifteen counties in western and northwestern Oklahoma.

The great of the flood in the North Canadian river was believed to have passed Oklahoma City. Damage in the city was confined to the lowlands. Points downstream reported the river over flood stage and still rising this morning with adjacent farm lands inundated.

# AMERICANS HAVE NO SOLUTION EUROPE'S TROUBLED AFFAIRS

BIG MEN RETURNING FROM EUROPE WITHOUT CONFIDENT OPINION

ALL AGREE SITUATION IS PAINFUL ONE

Germany Not Only Nation Suffering from Situation in the Ruhr District

LONDON, May 23.—There are many Americans in Europe—members of our government departments, and others who have returned with the confidence and assurance of a judge.

But a striking fact is that none of them, so far as your correspondent has talked with them, has any confident judgment as to the future of Europe. They agree, and the best judgment of Europeans bears them out, that the Ruhr situation is the most serious and serious part of the problem of Europe—perhaps a little painful to America—and may have a curious outcome assuming that some of the strong proposals from high sources have any substance. For the present, it is a tug of war with many of the psychological and economic elements of a war. It is a contest of nerves and endurance. All are suffering. Germany is one party to the contest that is suffering severely. France and Belgium are also suffering in a business way more than they like to admit publicly. Belgium especially is embarrassed in-

dustrially by the paralysis of the coal and steel industries in the Ruhr. Some of the bystanders, like Holland, are extremely hard hit. Great Britain suffers severely. But Britain is determined to endure through these rather than take any step that might embarrass France. Lloyd George is the one prominent British public man who criticizes the French publicly and bitterly. Some of the industrial districts, where unemployment prevails, share his views, also the French. But Lloyd George is not in sight of any return to power.

The only alternative proposed to France's course is the suggestion made by Secretary Hughes last December that reparations should be fixed by a tribunal of business men. Britain would like that. So would Italy, so would other neutral bystanders. Germany would accept that plan. But France refuses, and no nation is willing to force this course on France against her will. Britain is paying penance for the mistakes Lloyd George made, which France, there is a widespread opinion that France's present course as a whole, aside from the Ruhr action, is seriously unwise. But the expression of criticism of French policy as a whole is restrained by the feeling that in the one detail of that policy which is to the front—namely, the Ruhr—it would be wrong to give comfort to Germany. Everybody agrees that Germany can and ought to pay much larger reparations than she has yet shown willingness to pay. Until Germany makes a proper offer, France will be supported and even her mistakes condoned.

## TORNADO CAUSES DAMAGE AT GREENSBURG, KAN.

GREENSBURG, KAN., May 23.—One person was near death today, more than a score were suffering from injuries and more than 100 were homeless as the result of a tornado which struck Greensburg last night. Damage was estimated at \$150,000. The tornado, which swept from the southwest to the northwest through the outskirts of the town, destroyed 17 houses and damaged more than a score of others, tore down light and power lines and plunged the city into darkness. Only one telephone circuit was in commission after the storm. Dora Hall, 10-year-old girl, was taken to the hospital at Pratt, Kan., and is not expected to live. Mrs. Hall and two other children were painfully injured. Others injured by the storm include: Mr. and Mrs. Charles Scott, bruises. A daughter, fractured skull. A son, bruised. Mrs. Mary E. Hopkins, 65, broken leg and bruises.

## COMMENCEMENT OF MEMPHIS SCHOOLS ON FRIDAY NIGHT

MEMPHIS, TEXAS, May 23.—The commencement exercises of the Memphis high school began Sunday with the sermon to the graduates delivered by Dr. E. B. Atwood of Wayland College, Plainview. In addition to his attainment as an educator Dr. Atwood is an elegant and eloquent speaker. His sermon and advice to the Bachelors created much favorable comment, both among those connected with the school and others who were so fortunate as to hear this learned and impressive discourse. The sermon was delivered at the First Methodist Church.

Dr. J. A. Hicks, of the Southern Methodist University, Dallas, will deliver a lecture to the graduates Friday night at which time the diplomas will be delivered. The exercises will be held at the Methodist church. The senior class will present a play at the Palace Theater on Thursday night. The Junior class will hold exercises Thursday. This class numbers forty-five. The grammar school will hold exercises Friday night at the high school auditorium. Over ninety per cent of the pupils in this department made passing grades. The Memphis schools have made remarkable progress during the past two years under the management of Prof. Hibbits, who is retiring from school work to take up work at the State University. During this period five units of affiliation have been added; putting the Memphis schools ahead of any other Panhandle schools in this respect. Library, home economics and school ground equipments have been added. The limit of taxation for school purposes has been voted; also a bond issue of \$116,000 for a high school building, which is now under construction, was carried. The schools here have never had a more prosperous era and prospects for the future of school work in Memphis were never brighter than they now are. Miss Rosie Range, a teacher in the high school, and Mr. B. A. Myers of Abernathy, were married here Tuesday afternoon. S. B. Admire, the Ell farmer whose mysterious disappearance for thirty-six hours created excitement two weeks ago, has been adjudged insane by a jury in Judge Hoffman's court and is being held in the county jail awaiting admittance to the asylum at Wichita Falls. Admire is said to be in serious physical condition which requires the constant attendance of a physician. Luke Campbell, the Kellinsville farmer who was recently brought here for safe keeping, was also declared insane and will be taken to a state institution. Farmers in this section report excellent crop conditions. A large part of the cotton crop has been planted and good stands are being

generally secured. Recent rains have put a good growing season in the ground and warm, sunny weather is promoting rapid growth. A considerably larger area is being planted to feed crops than last year.

26 NEW WELLS STARTED IN CALIFORNIA LAST WEEK  
SAN FRANCISCO, May 22.—(AP)—Captain Alexander McDougall, prominent shipbuilder and inventor, died at his home here early today, having failed to recover from a major operation performed several weeks ago. He was 78 years old. He was president of the McDougall-Duluth company, and during the world war directed the construction of a large fleet of freighters and steamers. He also invented a type of ocean-going vessel, steam propelled, which proved successful and was put to use by this country and the allies.

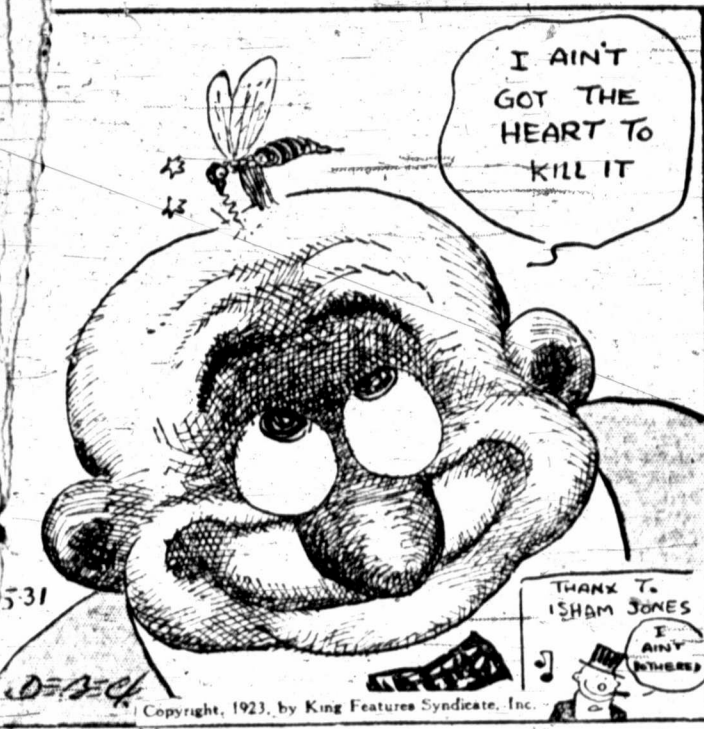
