## ONE SOLDIER KILLED AND CAPTURE TWO IN FIGHT WITH BANDITS

### FOREIGN NATIONS OUTLINE ATTITUDE ON "DRY" DECISION

WASHINGTON, May 25.—Five foreign governments already have made known to the state department their position in regard to the proposed supreme court ruling against the presence of liquor on foreign ships inside the three-mile limit. Besides the communication received yesterday from the British government also in writing, and the attitude of the French, Italian and Dutch governments have been presented orally to Secretary Hughes.

### HOLD PORT AUTHORITIES HAVE NO JURISDICTION

## CHICAGO LABOR LEADER FINED AND SENTENCED TO SIXTY DAYS IN JAIL

WAUKEGAN, ILL., May 25.—(AP)—Michael ("Umbrella Mike") Boyle, Chicago labor leader, today was sentenced by Judge Robert K. Welch of Rockford, sitting in the Lake County circuit court to serve 60 days in jail and to pay a fine of \$1,000 for contempt for failure to answer questions in the grand jury investigation of charges of tampering with the jury which acquitted Governor Len Small for conspiracy last year.

## GREAT BRITAIN HAS DETERMINED NOT TO BREAK WITH RUSSIA

WASHINGTON, May 25.—The interstate commerce commission, in an opinion announced Friday, held that the rate charged John A. Hunt & Co. by the Fort Worth & El Paso Grande Railway shipments of wrought iron pipe in railroads from Ranger and Jukehamon to New Orleans was unreasonable. Reparations in the sum of \$2,679.17 were awarded.
