If those of us who are older would seriously consider some of the mistakes we have made during the past ten years and start right now trying to refrain from repeating them, some improvements would be evident by the end of the decade.

If anyone is thinking "It's too late to correct what has already been done," I'd be the first to agree. However, I feel sure if we are honest enough to acknowledge some of the errors we've made, we can refrain from making the same ones over again in many instances.

One authority has charged us with being too lenient and indulgent with our children. I'm of the opinion we have, in far too many instances, followed the path of least resistance and failed to be good examples.

F.B.I. Director J. Edgar Hoover recently reported a nationwide crime increase of ten per cent. This indicates that crime is increasing five times faster than our population. He also reported that crime among juveniles under eighteen years of age jumped eleven per cent last year.

Dr. M. Norvel Young, president of Pepperdine College, Los Angeles, recently asked the question, "What can we do about it? Then made the following suggestions:

1. You can teach your children to obey the laws of the land, and you can be an example in this respect.

2. You can encourage the officials of government by commending those who do an outstanding job in law enforcement or in upholding the basic law of the land, the Constitution.

3. You can encourage judges and attorneys who show courage in combatting crime and dispensing justice.

4. You can write to editors and commentators and encourage those who take a stand for law, order and justice.

5. Through Bible classes, you can stress the teaching of the Scriptures that Christians should respect duly constituted authority. "Let every soul be subject unto the higher powers. For there is no power but of God: the powers that be are ordained by God. Whosoever therefore resisteth the power, resisteth the ordinance of God: and they that resist that receive to themselves condemnation" (Rom. 13: 1-2).

6. You can follow the scriptural injunction to visit those in prison. There are more people in prison today than ever before—more young people in prison than in college. Many of these people need friendship, teaching, and encouragement in doing right. Some of our students at Pepperdine College are working with prisoners at every level of our correctional institutions. There is a great need for Christians to prepare themselves for a life of service in the field of corrections.

7. Above all, you can pray for those in authority and for those who are being tempted into a life of crime. Render honor to whom honor is due, custom to whom custom, and pray for rulers. Our nation is facing a great threat from lawlessness and crime. Surely all of us do more by prayer than this world dreams of.

8. You can help young people obtain a Christian education. There is no doubt that many teenagers turn to a life of crime because they drop out of school and have no job.

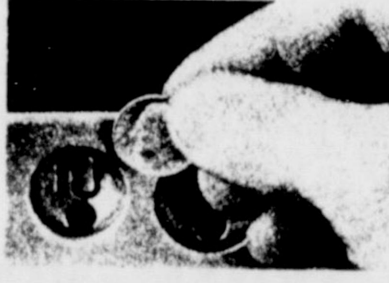



Notice is given that the E. W. FLYNT ESTATE P.O. Box 191 Tulla, Texas 79088, applicant, seeks a permit from the Texas Water Rights Commission to divert and use one-hundred and eighty (180) acre-feet of water per annum from a proposed sixty (60) acre-foot capacity reservoir located on Running Water Draw, tributary of Salt Fork Brazos River, tributary of Brazos River, Brazos River Basin, said water acres of land in the Abner Taylor Survey No. 534, Abstract No. 87, Parmer County Texas, and approximately twenty-five and one-half (25-1/2) miles east of Farwell, Texas.

Friona has never yet had an All-State Band member, and all Friona band students and directors are very proud of those who are representing them this year.

GSPA Asks Nixon Aid On Payments MBP Names New Head Of Personnel

The Grain Sorghum Producers Association asked President Nixon and the Budget Bureau this week to reconsider their stand on not making advance payments to farmers, who comply with the 1970 Feed Grain Program. It has been the practice in the past for farmers to receive one-half

Depletion Allowance Maps Available From District

Frank Rayner, manager of the High Plains Underwater Conservation District No. 1, announced that the 1969 cost-in-water - depletion, income-tax allowance maps have been released by the District.

These maps are constructed annually by the District and are used by the property owners throughout the High Plains area to claim an income tax allowance on the amount of the depletion of the underground water supply beneath their property.

Although the District charges \$1.00 plus postage for each map,

covering an entire county, the income from such map sales goes only to defray the cost of printing and mailing the maps and to pay for the land appraisers fee for developing cost in water tables for each county. These tables can be secured without cost from the District.

This is a non profit service that is provided for the District's property owners.

Hearty Homemade Soup
Use the last small bit of leftover turkey carcass in homemade Cream of Turkey Soup. To make broth, cook the carcass and any skins and bits of dressing several hours in well seasoned water, then strain.

Cream of Turkey Soup
1/2 cup margarine
2 1/2 tablespoons corn starch

1/4 teaspoon pepper
3 cups turkey broth
2 cups milk
1 cup chopped, cooked turkey
Salt
Parsley, optional

Melt margarine in a large saucepan. Add corn starch and pepper; blend well. Remove from heat, gradually add turkey broth and milk, mixing until smooth. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens and comes to a boil. Add turkey, cook 2 minutes stirring constantly. Salt to taste. Garnish with parsley, if desired. Serve immediately or keep hot over steam. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

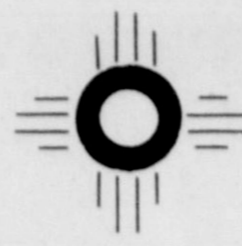

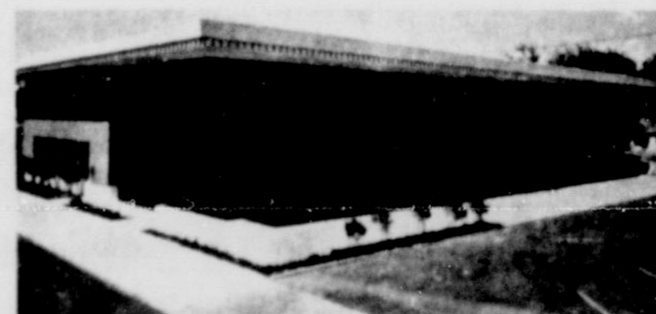
