Educational Bill Passes in House; Moves to Conference

APPROPRIATIONS TOTAL \$10,000,000, MAKING REDUCTION OF \$1,400,000.

EDUCATIONAL BILL SENDS MESSAGE BACK TO GOVERNOR

Wichita, June 8.—On its own motion the house of representatives today passed the bill for educational appropriations by a vote of 55 to 48. The bill provides for a total of \$10,000,000, a reduction of \$1,400,000 from the original bill. The bill is now being sent to the conference committee.

In the event a decision is reached that a reply be made, the French government is reported to favor a curt dismissal of Germany's latest proposal.

China Demands Apology from Japan in Note

BEIJING, June 8.—The Chinese foreign office today sent a note to Tokyo demanding an apology, indemnities and the punishment of the Japanese commander and his marines who shot down Chinese during the Japanese boycott in Changsha, province of Hunan, June 3.

The note demands the withdrawal of the Japanese subsidiary, Sanyo, from Changsha, which is a treaty port on the Yangtze river; punishment of the Japanese commander and marines from the gunboat Fushing; indemnities for the families of Chinese who were shot down during the disorders; an official apology from the Japanese government; and guaranteed from Tokyo that similar incidents will not recur.

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CHICAGO POLICE EXTEND SEARCH FOR GIRL SLAYER

CHICAGO, June 8.—The police and operators of the state's attorney's office today extended outward the state their search for the blue-eyed smiling girl bandit who slew Richard C. Teamer, wealthy insurance man, at his home here Tuesday night.

Mrs. Gertrude Getson, foremost among the dozen or more suspects whom the police characterized as a notorious bad woman, is being sought in Milwaukee where she recently is known to have stopped at a hotel. Her father's home in Chicago, Peoria and Joliet also are being watched.

Dismissing the theory that Teamer was killed by mistake and hearing of automobile thieves, which the insurance man has vigorously prosecuted, the police say they are convinced that robbery was the motive for the holdup of Teamer and his wife, which ended in the former's death. Mrs. Teamer, who watched the photograph of the body after they had been robbed of about \$25 by the girl and a male accomplice, said Mrs. Getson more nearly resembled her father's slayer than any called to her attention. The authorities are also searching for Mrs. Margaret Deane, widow of a prominent Chicago physician, and her companion, William Gardner, in the belief that they may be able to furnish the identity of the couple who would have aided Schlegel in the holdup. The latter denies all knowledge of it.

GIRL SMILED AS SHE FIRED SHOT

CHICAGO, June 8.—A smile, as distinct and exotic as that of Mona Lisa, holds the secret of the identity of the girl assassin of Richard Teamer, wealthy insurance adjuster.

A demure, soft-spoken girl shot Teamer as he returned home with his wife, she smiled as she ordered her victims to hold up their hands, she laughed, as her companion stripped Mrs. Teamer's wedding ring from her finger, and giggled as though she had played a prank when she leveled her revolver at Teamer's head and fired.

"I shall never forget her smile," Mrs. Teamer said today, in seeking to aid the authorities in tracking the girl.

"She wasn't loud, tough or swaggering in her manner, and she smiled so strangely even at the moment when she pulled the trigger."

The smile which smiled so deeply on Mrs. Teamer's mind even in the moment when her husband was killed, the authorities believe, is the fixed grin of a raving psychotic.

A roundup of suspects which was begun immediately after the shooting failed to yield a positive identification by Mrs. Teamer until she was shown a picture of Gertrude Getson, a paroled offender, according to the police records.

Mrs. Teamer stated at the picture of the smiling girl.

"If her eyes are blue she is the one who killed my husband," came Mrs. Teamer's reply.

"Mrs. Getson's eyes are a hazel blue," Detective Sergeant Wm. Cox declared.

Search for Mrs. Getson was intensified as it was recalled that she carried a revolver and was "quick on the trigger." She is alleged to have held a squad of officers at bay with a revolver when they sought to arrest her and her sweetheart, Louis Morrey, after a holdup in Peoria.

Maye, a patrolman, has been suspended today pending an investigation by the police board into charges that he severely beat several local newspaper reporters, including two women writers, when they attempted to attend the examination by police of Mrs. Richard C. Teamer last Wednesday in connection with the slaying of her husband.

MOTORMAN HELD AFTER FATAL CRASH WHEN POWER FAILS

NEW YORK, June 8.—Patricio Mollia, a motorman, was held for homicide today charged with having deserted his car last night when the power failed and it plunged eight blocks down one of the steepest hills in the city, killed a young girl, seriously injured four other persons and made homeless 16 families who lived in a brick tenement partly demolished by the crash.

The car was of the one-man type and had reached the top of a long hill when the power failed. The motorman, according to his report to the police, applied the brakes, but the car started backward down the hill, rapidly gathering momentum. The motorman jumped and a male passenger followed him, leaving three women in the car.

The car, going 50 miles an hour, struck an open window at the foot of the hill, tore along the street and at a curve gouged away the front of the tenement and was finally crushed beneath the falling debris.

Mary McLaughlin, 11, was crushed by falling brick and thrown beneath the wheels.

HOME OF TAXICAB COMPANY HEAD IN CHICAGO IS BOMBED

CHICAGO, June 8.—The home of Morris Martin, president of a local taxicab company, was bombed early today, marking a climax to frequent clashes this week between opposition factions in the company which has resulted in one death and a score or more drivers being sued and beaten. No one was injured and slight damage was caused.

MONROE STREET WATER BASIN IS BASIS FOR SUIT

The Monroe street basin which at various times has been termed the Monroe street lagoon and frog pond is the basis of damage suits filed late Thursday afternoon in the 14th district court by Harwood Stacy and Harry Naylor.

The city of Wichita, Falls together with J. Caruthers and J. E. McDowell are cited as defendants in the two suits in which an aggregate damage of \$4,000 is asked.

The petitions of the plaintiffs recite that their property has been damaged by reason of the acts of the defendants in that the natural outlets to the low spot in the 1400 block on Monroe street were blocked when the defendant Caruthers erected a house, cutting off the natural flow of the waters which accumulate there during rains.

It is further contended that the city was advised of the possible consequence of the act of the defendant Caruthers, but that they did nothing to prevent the existing conditions. The defendant J. E. McDowell purchased the house and property of Caruthers and for this reason he is also cited as a defendant.

It is charged that by reason of the stoppage of the flow of the waters the property of the plaintiffs has been damaged in the amount prayed for. It was indicated at the weekly session of the city council Monday that legal action would be instituted in an effort to get relief.

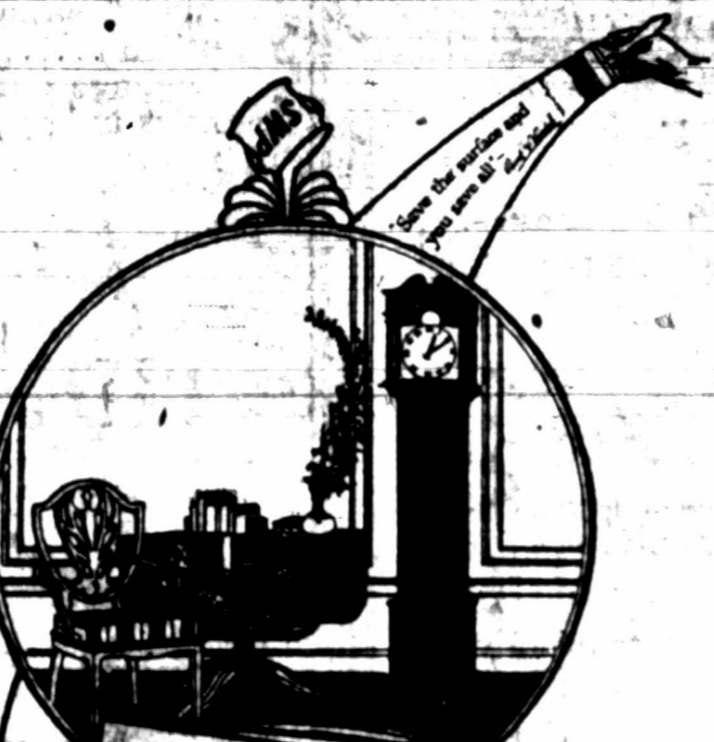

MONROE STREET WATER BASIN IS BASIS FOR SUIT

The Monroe street basin which at various times has been termed the Monroe street lagoon and from pond is the basis of damage suits filed last Thursday afternoon in the 26th district court by Harry Naylor and Harry Naylor.

The city of Wichita Falls together with J. Caruthers and J. B. McDowell are cited as defendants in the two suits in which an aggregate damage of \$4,000 is asked.

The petition of the plaintiffs recites that their property has been damaged by reason of the acts of the defendants in that the natural outlet to the low spot in the 1400 block on Monroe street were blocked when the defendant Caruthers erected a house, cutting off the natural flow of the waters which accumulated there during rains.

It is further contended that the city was advised of the possible consequence of the act of the defendant Caruthers, but that they did nothing to prevent the existing conditions. The defendant J. B. McDowell purchased the house and property of Caruthers, and for this reason he is also cited as a defendant.

It is urged that by reason of the stoppage of the flow of the waters the property of the plaintiffs has been damaged in the amount prayed for. It was indicated at the weekly session of the city council Monday that legal action would be instituted in an effort to get relief.

Bill Discusses Building Homes And Feels All Puffed Up Result Part Dollar Family Is Playing

"I feel all puffed up today," said "Bill" Dollar, "because I have heard so much talk about the building that is going on in Wichita Falls and the important part that the Dollar family plays in this work of making Wichita Falls a better city in which to live.

The man who builds a house is the man who spends his money in his own city with his own merchants and helps Wichita Falls while Wichita Falls helps him."

"The dollars earned in Wichita Falls and kept circulating in Wichita Falls are the ones that have made Wichita Falls a city of fine homes. The dollars that are spent in other cities by Wichita Falls people are the ones that help those cities to grow," continued "Bill" Dollar.

"To build a house is a dollar and cent proposition. It takes lots of Bill Dollars and to build means to spend money that has been saved or the dollars earned that would have been spent.

"If some men who are busy paying rent year in and year out would analyze the matter they would find that the reason they haven't the courage to build their own house is because they haven't the courage to save.

"Many a man who is now paying rent can save enough to make the first payment on a home, and then if Wichita Falls money is kept circulating in Wichita Falls plenty of opportunities will be found to

SAND STORM CAUSES DESTRUCTION TO GROWING COTTON

HASKELL, June 6.—A severe sand storm which struck this county early yesterday morning left in its wake untold damage to the cotton crop of Haskell county.

It lasted only thirty minutes but it was the most disastrous sand storm which has struck this county in years. Hundreds of acres of cotton will be to plant over because of the severity of the wind and sand.

The light sand suffered loss in many localities, but it was more destructive in the sandy sections. Cotton seed is getting very scarce and the farmers will have considerable trouble getting seed to replant the crops.

HEAVY DAMAGE REPORTED FROM KNOX COUNTY

KNOX CITY, June 6.—Many acres of cotton are damaged and others are a total loss as a result of the sand storm which raged here for a period of two hours, from one to three o'clock Thursday afternoon.

Many farmers are of the opinion that the wind was necessary to replant their crops.

Most of the grain in this section has been cut and very little damage resulted to the grain crops.

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FUGITIVE NEGRO IS CAPTURED BY CITY OFFICERS FRIDAY

FOUND HIDING IN WOODS NEAR IOWA PARK; TRAVELED ON FOOT.

CAPTURED EARLIER AT IOWA PARK, GOT AWAY

Wanted in Connection With Double Shooting Here Early Thursday Morning.

Ira "Drug Store" Beale, the negro who shot and killed Willie Bush, and painfully wounded his own wife, Josephine Beale, Wednesday night, was captured by City Officers Will Lay and Harry Hendrix, Friday morning about 10:30, three miles north of Iowa Park.

At the time of his arrest Beale was lying under a tree in hiding. He told officers that he spent all day Thursday in hiding on Holliday creek and that he had been through this city at 5 o'clock Thursday night when he walked to Iowa Park. He had not eaten since the time of the murder, he told the officers at the time of his arrest. He told officers that he was waiting for darkness to continue his journey. At the time of his arrest he had only \$1.50, before leaving town, he told the officers with which the murder was committed, to the proprietor of a negro tailor shop. The gun brought him only \$2.00 and he had been unable to get railroad fare; the entire trip had been made on foot, he said.

Friday morning about one o'clock City Marshal Hamp Love of Iowa Park, arrested Beale and started to Iowa with him but the negro escaped. Love was furnished with a full description of the negro by city detectives here who have been on the trail since the murder was committed.

The capture of the negro ends a 24-hour search which was carried on by the city, Kansans and sheriff's department. Beale is being held in the city jail awaiting transfer to the county. He confessed to officers that he was the person responsible for the shooting.

Rev. B. E. Wildcat, brother of Josephine Beale, the negro who was shot, says that the shooting occurred at his home at 710 Flood street at 1:10 o'clock Thursday morning. He and his sister had just returned from the Pleasure Garden, a negro resort which they keep near "Drug Store" came to the door and requested admission.

Chester Turkish Oil Concession Causes Big Commotion In Europe France and England File Protest

By A. RUSTEM BEY
Former Turkish Ambassador to the United States.
(Written Exclusively for Universal Service)

ROME, June 6.—The tremendous commotion produced in France and England by the arrangements recently concluded between the Turkish government and the American financial syndicate headed by former Admiral Colby M. Chester, is indicative of their importance from the international point of view. But the full significance of the deal has yet to be explained.

France has lodged a protest at Ankara, claiming that the section of the Chester concession which concerns the building of a railway from the interior of Anatolia to the Black Sea and a part in this harbor, classed with the rights acquired by the French company under a convention for a loan concluded by Turkey with the French government just before the great war.

Great Britain, on her side, also has protested against the Chester concession insofar as it relates to the construction of a railway intended to traverse Kurdish territory. It was under British administration.

Both these protests are strictly indefensible, but the arguments offer plausible ground for opposing the Chester grant. In reality, Great Britain and France, with Italy in the rear, strongly object to the Turkish-American deal as such. Without plainly saying so, they are hostile to it in its entirety, in principle.

Strikes Turville blow
The fact is that this deal strikes a terrific blow at their economic ambitions in Turkey. They have become fondly accustomed to the idea that the development of Anatolia would fall practically to their exclusive use, by virtue of private arrangements comfortably arrived at between themselves and the Turkish government and the Chester group.

In their minds this vast and rich territory had become an allied preserve which no other European power or the United States would dare to trespass upon. They were so convinced of their own control of Turkey that they would not take seriously the negotiations carried on openly for months between the Turkish government and the Chester group.

When, however, these negotiations ended in a solid convention and ratification, and the latter in its initial success was on a scale to take away their breath.

The Chester concession is the most extensive and comprehensive that has ever been granted by a government to a foreign country, or for that matter to a national concern. It comprises a series of combined undertakings, each of gigantic proportions which may be classed as follows:

Proposed Undertakings.
The construction of a system of railways of an aggregate length of about 4,135 miles.

The exploitation of the mines known to exist, or still to be discovered, within a radius of 15 miles on each side of the railway lines to be built.

The erection of factories, keeping pace with the work on the railways and mines, and destined, in the first instance, to utilize the yield of the latter in the construction and operation of the former.

The construction of two ports on the Black Sea coast.

The rebuilding of the towns and villages destroyed in this region and further south, and west as a result of the occupation by Russian, French and Greek armies whose wantonly destructive action surpassed that of the German occupation in Champagne and Flanders.

The remodeling and outfitting of the city of Angora, in view of its elevation to the capital of Turkey in the place of Constantinople.

The creation of schools with a view to a gradual substitution of a more skilled labor and higher technical capacity in the carrying out of the above mentioned undertaking. It is calculated that in 12 years will be necessary to complete the Chester project.

To Serve Large Area.
The railway system under consideration is to act as a carrier to a territory as large as Germany, the agricultural, pastoral and industrial possibilities of which are practically as great, and the subsoil of this territory which is one of the richest in the world. About 115,000 square miles of this territory come under control of the Chester group.

There are about 1,000 villages and 24 towns to be reconstructed under this concession. The building of which comes within its terms, will have, therefore to deal with a traffic that is destined to reach mighty proportions.

For these details it will be gathered that the Chester concession is truly a gigantic enterprise, the full operation of which will become the basis of the economic regeneration of Turkey and the principal source of her prosperity, while the capital invested in it may look forward to profits on a proportionate scale.

No other concession Turkey may grant with a view to the restoration or development of her resources

could make it in importance. The best of the contract has gone. No wonder then that the entire powers who had calmly decided that Turkey must be carved out between them, should have entered into a furious reaction.

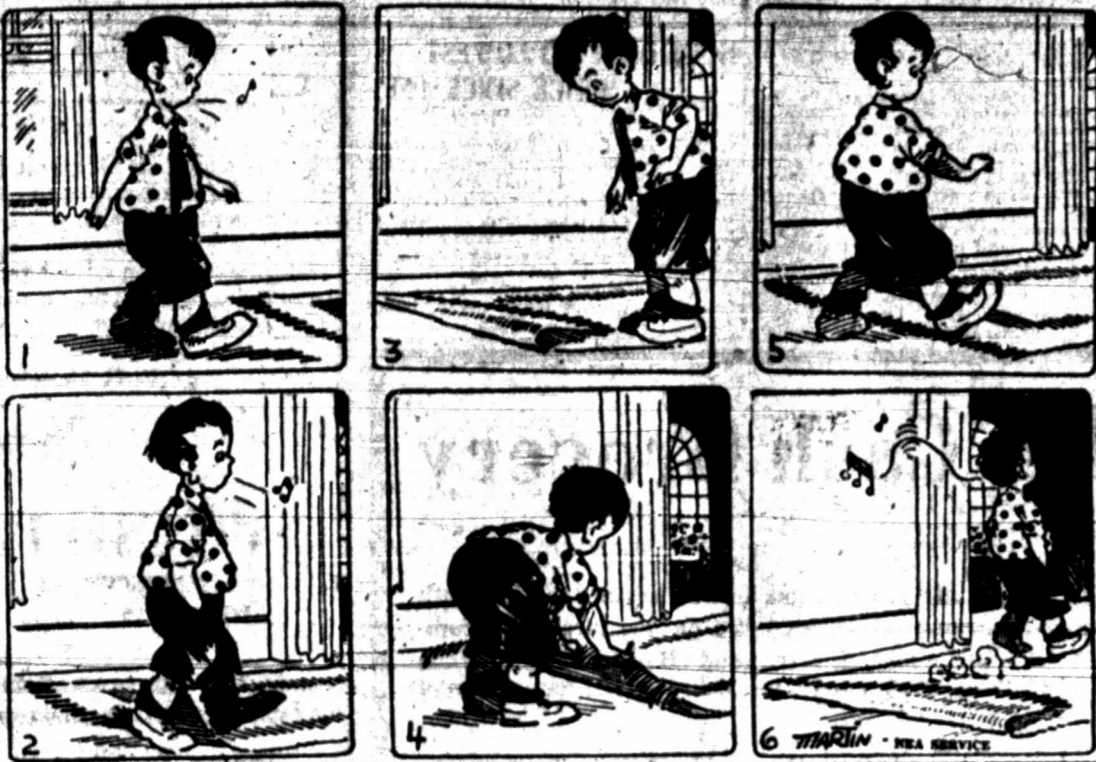

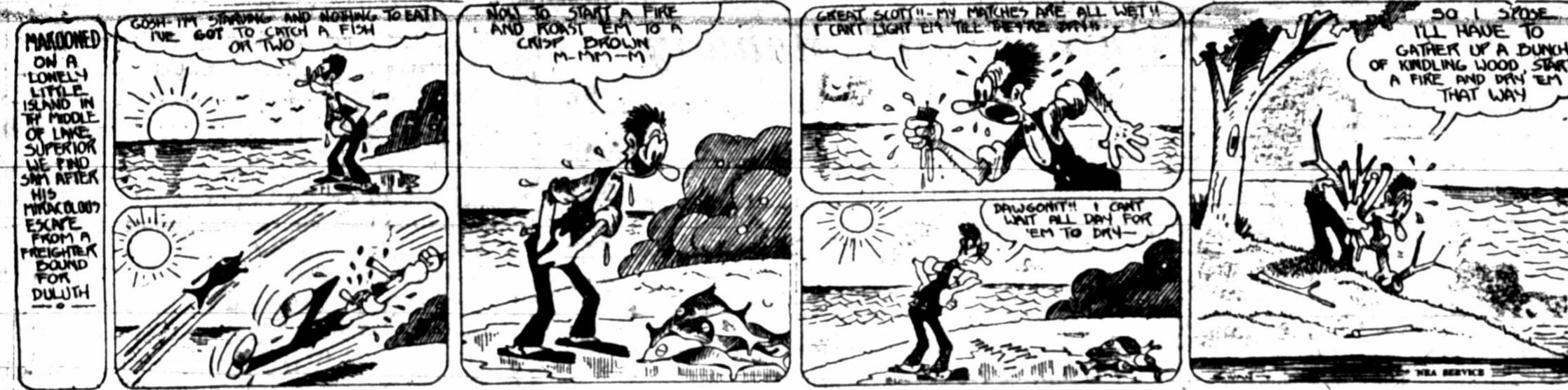

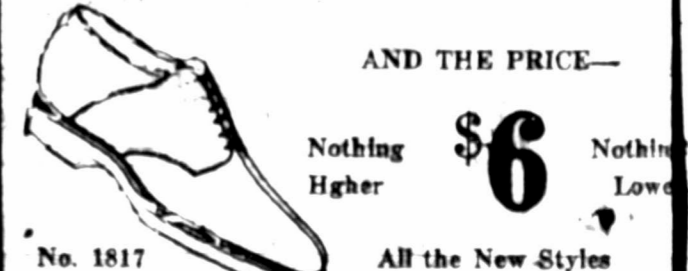
