





### Announce Program First Annual Baptist Encampment Near Stamford; Key Note Address By Dr. O. L. Powers

STAMFORD, TEXAS, June 9.—The first annual Central West Texas Baptist Encampment, to be held on the newly acquired property of the denomination at Lunders, 14 miles southeast of Stamford, is expected to draw not less than 5,000 people and to be one of the biggest of its kind ever staged in west Texas. ### ROAD ADVOCATES IN CLAY PLEASED BY COURT DECISION

Although the decision of the Court of Civil Appeals at Fort Worth Saturday in the Clay county road case did not dispose of the injunction sought against the county commissioners, good roads advocates in Clay county feel that it operates to bring the \$75,000 improvement materially nearer operation.

Judge Dunklin's decision was on the mandamus. Judge J. K. Dickey of Henrietta said Monday morning "the dispatches that it was on the injunction were incorrect. However, the county commissioners practically disposes of every point raised in the injunction case also. Judge Dunklin in his opinion held that the county commissioners not only had the right to refuse the petition for District No. 4, but that they could not do anything else but refuse it, as it overlapped District No. 2. I think the fact that the commissioners offered to order an election in District No. 2 after changing its boundaries so as not to overlap, kept them in the clear." Judge Dickey did not say whether, if the injunction is also denied by the higher court, the contents would carry the matter to the supreme court. No further steps will be taken, he said, until the litigation is cleared up. In the meantime, Road District No. 2 which will construct a gravel road system to connect with both Henrietta and Wichita Falls, is getting ready for action. Judge Dickey said the bonds have been approved and sold, and surveyors will start work within a short time on the necessary preliminaries.

## MANY MATTERS TO COME BEFORE CITY COUNCIL'S SESSION

Two sessions of the city council which promise to be lengthy and hard fought are carded for Monday. Monday afternoon at four o'clock, the council will hold a special session for a report and discussion on the gas question.

Burton Station and Edgar Mann will give a detailed report of the meeting of the League of Texas Municipalities held in Dallas last week. A rough plan of action for combating the increase in gas rates has been outlined by the league and the local city government will be asked to endorse or condemn the action of the league.

Several lawyers, who have kept in close touch with the question have been invited to attend the meeting Monday afternoon.

The recently proposed traffic regulations are expected to be the bone of contention at the Monday night meeting. The regulations were carefully gone over by police officials and the city attorney last week and are ready for presentation Monday night. A committee from the business community is expected to be present to protest against some of the proposed regulations.

Upon request of the traction company, the council is considering an amendment to the ordinance which granted the street car company a franchise to operate a line to the new junior college. The amendment would change the present route which leads from Avenue 4 to Bell, on Bell to Avenue 7, to Harrison; the change calls for a line

on Bell to Giddings to Avenue 7 and down Avenue 7 to Harrison. The change would prevent any interference with the proposed paving of Avenue 7. It is pointed out by the traction company in their request, property owners on Giddings street are opposed to the change in route and are expected to be on hand Monday night to enter protest.

Wooden blocks and their replacement by a more satisfactory paving material are expected to take up their usual amount of time. Commissioner Clifford has prepared figures on all kinds of paving and these will probably be presented to the council. At a previous meeting, only estimates on brick pavement were given.

A hearing of property owners on Folk street from Avenue D to Avenue G, will be held to settle on the kind of pavement to be laid on that street. Bids were received on all kinds of pavement and property owners will be called on Monday night to decide on the kind of pavement to be laid.

## FEW KATY TRAINS LATE DURING MAY; ROAD TO RECEIVE NEW EQUIPMENT

A bulletin issued by the department of public relations of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas Railroad gives interesting statistics concerning the Katy trains during the month of May.

According to the bulletin, of 2,896 passenger trains running during the month, only 117 were late. Only 46 trains out of the 3,693 passenger trains in Texas were late, and 41 trains out of the 1,411 running in other states were late during the month.

An approximate expenditure of \$7,000,000 has been used this year to purchase new engines and cars. The 55 new locomotives have now been received, and are being pressed into service as traffic calls for their use. Five hundred new box cars

have been received, while the deliveries of 1900 new box cars and 300 flat cars are now under way. Several new steel coaches have also been received, and the remaining 27, with the 200 new refrigerator cars will be delivered within the next few weeks.

Since January 1, 1922, the railroads purchased over 252,227 freight cars and 4,623 locomotives and of the freight cars purchased 126,567 have been delivered, and of the 250 locomotives purchased, 2,607 have been delivered.

### STEWARDSHIP IS PASTOR'S THEME AT METHODIST CHURCH

"At the Methodist Episcopal Church at Seventh and Lamar the pastor, Rev. L. L. Cruse, spoke of stewardship as the business manager of God," using as his text Matt. 13:12. "For the Kingdom of Heaven is as a man who sows good seed into the field, and who calls his own servants, and delivered unto them his goods."

"With the fact of God's ownership established, there remains the problem of administration. To administer is to place a responsibility on everybody in the whole world, who has a right to do with the goods of this world. The statement of the church today is that the stewardship of the world is in the hands of God."

"The game heaven and earth that God made contains in it the potential, every force of life and of the material world now known, and any other that may yet be revealed. God saw that it was good. These forces are to be discovered and administered. God has equipped man as His agent to handle His goods and operate His forces in the world. Genesis 1:28 clearly records this great commission."

"It is interesting to study God's distribution of this responsibility among his servants, and of course this can not be done without noting that which has been committed to us as things for which we will be held to account."

"To one has been committed the duty of keeping watch. Sometimes we call them a guard, a sentry, a shepherd, etc. Some seem to be especially fitted for this work, and to some it seems to appeal more than it does to others. Man has for ages looked upon this as a serious trust and a solemn obligation. Almost regardless of the monetary value of the thing entrusted to man he has guarded it even at the risk of his own life and kept it safely as though when his master comes he might give a good account of his stewardship. Like that man in God's hand, God has set him over the very work and creation of His hand to keep it from violence, or destruction. So solemn an obligation."
