Texas druggists in convention at Galveston last week discussed in a protesting menner the veratious restrictions placed by the federal government on the handling of alcoholic stimulants and narcotic drugs.

Druggists are compelled to furnish heavy bonds before they are permitted to hendle these drugs, which they must keep for sale if they are to give adequate service and there are so many detailed regniations imposed by the government that great care must be taken by the druggist that he does not violate any of them and thus make himself liable to prosecution and the forfeiture of his bond.

Honest druggists naturally chafe under these yex ations regulations but they should remember that the regulations were designed not for honest, conscientious druggists but for those who would abuse their right to handle these drugs without restrictions. There must be regulation of the traffic of these drugs and the more stringent such regulation the more vexations must be the rules.

The honest druggist is an innocent bystander in an effort of the government to suppress an illicit traffic.
