BALANCE SHOULD TURN ONE WAY OR THE OTHER

Reply of British to French Communication Takes Form of Questionnaire

LONDON, June 22.—It is quite true, as is constantly said in the most authoritative circles, that the most critical days of the future of Europe will be those which will determine the conditions of the balance between the two great powers.

To put it in other words, it is between the British and the French, and the balance between them is a blowup or a definitely admitted deadlock during the remainder of the week.

The balance should turn one way or the other very soon. At the moment the French reply to the British questionnaire is being scrutinized by the Belgian government.

On the issuance of the recent German note, the French government first took the position that it would not even talk about the contents of the German note with its own allies.

In the situation thus presented them, the British determined to disregard utterly any spirit of brusqueness that they may have seen in the French attitude.

These questions, addressed by Britain to Paris, cover the first condition laid down by France. There were other reasons for inquiries in the British questionnaire, but they concerned the subsequent stages of the negotiations.

It is apparent that the British feel, first, that they must take the most extreme pains to keep the present situation alive and avoid a deadlock, but, secondly, that they must not hand out assent to the condition insisting that Germany cease passive resistance.

The same weather conditions prevailed over the entire district, and reports from different points along the line indicated no change in the summer heat.

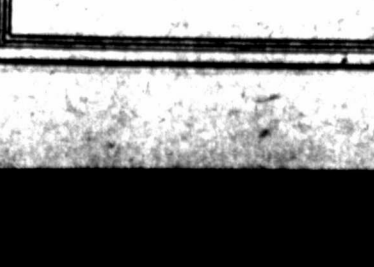

Representatives of Mr. Mellon, secretary of the treasury, broke sealed communications on battleships, yesterday, and reported liquor, confiscating it. A test case doubtless will decide that if American don't want liquor in their harbors, it can't be brought in.

There were questions about the royal coronation of King George VI. The king, broken yesterday, and upon upon a time, such breaking might have caused war. It will cause only talk now, and that is the British government on America's lack of support.
