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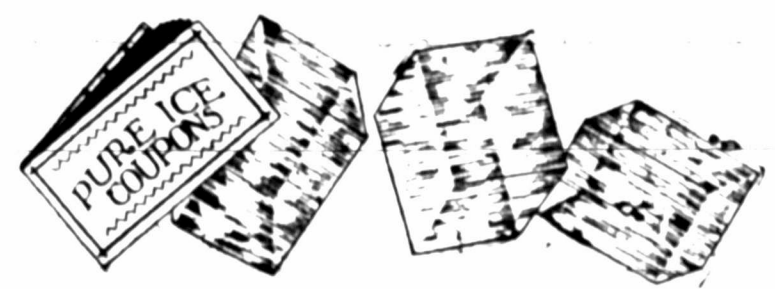

Farmer Stands in Line to Lose \$4.65 on Every Acre of Ground Sowed in Wheat in This County

The plaintive song of the wheat farmer of Kansas who figured with President Harding and showed him a gain of a measly dime to every acre placed in wheat is drowned in the wail of the Wichita county farmer. Conservative figures on the most of production of wheat in this county and on the basis of average production this season place the loss per acre here at \$4.65. The return on an acre of wheat in this county this year will be approximately \$5.50. This figure is arrived at by taking 10 bushels as the average yield per acre in the county and according to many farmers this yield is too high for an average. The average valuation of cultivated farm lands in the county for 1922 was \$85 per acre, but in order to be conservative Guy R. Jones, county agent, took the figure of \$60 as the average value of an acre of land in the county. Eight per cent interest on the investment therefore would call for an initial expenditure of \$3.30; plowing an acre of land costs \$1.50; harvesting and drilling \$1.50; cutting \$2.50; threshing \$1.50; hauling to market 30 cents; seed \$1.50; taxes \$1.15, making a total of \$12.15.

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CITY WATER SAFE FOR DRINKING SAYS HEALTH OFFICER

Judging from the number of telephone calls received recently, there appears to be some anxiety among the patrons relative to the safety of city water for drinking purposes. Dr. A. M. Douglas, city health officer, said Wednesday morning in discussing the water situation.

"The lowness of the water in the lake does not affect the condition of the water after treatment," the health officer continued.

"It is all subjected to the alum settling process, passed through three feet of sand and gravel filter, and then treated with liquid chlorine. Whatever slight contamination may occasionally pass through the sand filter is destroyed by the chlorine before the water is distributed from the plant," Dr. Douglas said.

Laboratory tests are made daily by the health office in order that a most check may be kept on the safety of the treatment. These tests are very rigid, the same as the tests established by the United States public health service.

"Since the water passes through these tests, the department feels safe in assuring the public that it is safe for drinking purposes," Dr. Douglas said.

Two Well Known Actors Killed by Bolt of Lightning

NEW YORK, June 27.—An electrical storm which swept over the metropolitan district early last night at Long Beach, Long Island, killed Bert Savoy, of the stage team of Brennan and Savoy, and Jack Grossman, also of the theatrical profession, who was with him, and caused the death of a woman in Brooklyn and an eighteen-year-old youth in Yorkville.

Upcoming these, falling telegraph poles and unrooting houses the storm wreaked havoc through Brooklyn and sections of Long Island.

TAKE NEW STEP TO BRING RUSSIA BACK TO EUROPE

LAUSANNE, June 27.—The allies today took another step toward "bringing Russia back to Europe" by a decision to invite the Soviets to sign the Turkish straits convention when the Lausanne treaty is ready for signature. Terms for opening the straits to foreign warships were arranged at the first conference since but Foreign Minister Tschitcherine of Russia objected to this agreement. The Soviets since that time, and particularly during the excitement following the announcement here of the Soviet envoy, Vorovsky, have contended that Russia never refused to sign the convention and was entitled to representation in the present conference. The allies are anxious to see how Russia will greet the present invitation.

The Russian debt problem, set for discussion today, was delayed again as the instructions expected by the French delegates from their government were not received.

WHITTINGTON NO. 1 IN PANHANDLE WILL BE DRILLED DEEPER

McLEAN, TEXAS, June 27.—With the report that more depth is to be added to the Whittington No. 1, the first two of which are producers, the general consensus of opinion is that the old producers of the Panhandle field will also have to be drilled deeper. The well has averaged a flow of 20 barrels an hour and is estimated to be between a large and five hundred barrel producer.

TEMPLE NO. 1 NEAR IOWA PARK MAKES GOOD OIL SHOWING

Pay sand was struck at 1,270 feet Tuesday morning by the Temple No. 1 well being drilled by Duncan and White 12 miles west of Wichita Falls and one-half mile west of the old Temple-White well on the Mattie Parker land.

Wednesday morning there were 219 feet of oil in the hole, according to Mr. Temple, who stated present indications were that the well would be flowing within the next 48 hours.

This well is located three-quarters of a mile southeast of the old Calhoun field, six miles south of Iowa Park.

Find Thornless Dewberry Vine At Gainesville

CHICAGO, June 27.—(AP)—The chance discovery of thornless sprigs of a dewberry vine in a Gainesville, Texas, garden has given to the horticultural world a thornless dewberry vine, which is on exhibition at the convention of the American Association of Nursery Men which convened in annual session today.

The sprig was discovered in the garden of Mrs. Tina Austin of Gainesville, nearly 10 years ago. Through patient and careful cultivation by Jim Parker, venerable horticulturist of Tecumseh, Okla., the sprig developed into a vine which is capable of producing large berries.

The association will be in session here three days. It adopted the report on the revised constitution and by-laws today. The major change in the constitution was the revision of a section making the linking of state and sectional horticultural associations with the national association possible.

TEST TO BE MADE TWO MILES SOUTH OF LAKE WICHITA

Morrison & Coleman are moving in a rig today on their location in the southwest corner of block 14, Henry Ford land, about two miles due south of Lake Wichita, and will put down a 2,000 foot rotary test in this part of the country.

1,200 FOOT TEST TO BE STARTED NEAR CHARLIE IN CLAY COUNTY

An interesting test will be put down on the F. C. Carpenter land by E. C. D'Armett, the well which will be a 2,000 foot test, is located about one and one-quarter miles southwest of Charlie in Clay county. The derrick is up and the machinery is being installed, after which drilling will start at once.

GRAND JURY MAKES FINAL REPORT AND RETURN 30 BILLS

REPORT RECEIVED BY JUDGE H. K. WILSON LATE TUESDAY AFTERNOON

JURY FINDS JAIL IN GOOD CONDITION

Mention Made in Report of Matter Referred to By Commissioners

Submitting its final report and returning 30 bills of indictment, the grand jury of the June term of the 10th district court adjourned at 5 o'clock Tuesday evening. The true bills included 28 bills in the felonies and are charged and two misdemeanors.

Two men who had been summoned as witnesses before this judicial body were indicted on charges of perjury. Both men are in jail, but officials have asked that their names be withheld. It is charged that the offense of perjury was committed while they were witnesses before the grand jury.

In the written report, the jury stated that it found the county jail and the juvenile and women's wards on the third floor of the court house in good condition and commended the sheriff's department for the manner in which the jail was being kept.

The written report made no mention of the matter referred to it by the county commissioners, following the hearing had last Monday on the proposition of payment of the matron. The county commissioners in a motion placed on the minutes of the court, invited the grand jury and other officials to take such action as they saw fit in regard to the allowance of \$150 a day to Sheriff Murphy for the payment of Mrs. Harley Snyder, the matron, who told the commissioners that since the first of the year she had received but \$14 a month.

One capital case was included in the 30 bills of indictment returned. Mrs. Beall, negro, was indicted on a charge of murder and in a second bill he stands charged with assault with intent to murder. Beall was the negro who it is charged shot and killed Willie Bush in the flats three weeks ago and then wounded his wife by shooting her twice in the leg.

The grand jury also urged cooperation between the various county officials in the administration of the affairs of the county.

The district and county attorney and their respective assistants and Judge H. K. Wilson were thanked for the aid and assistance given the jury during its sessions.

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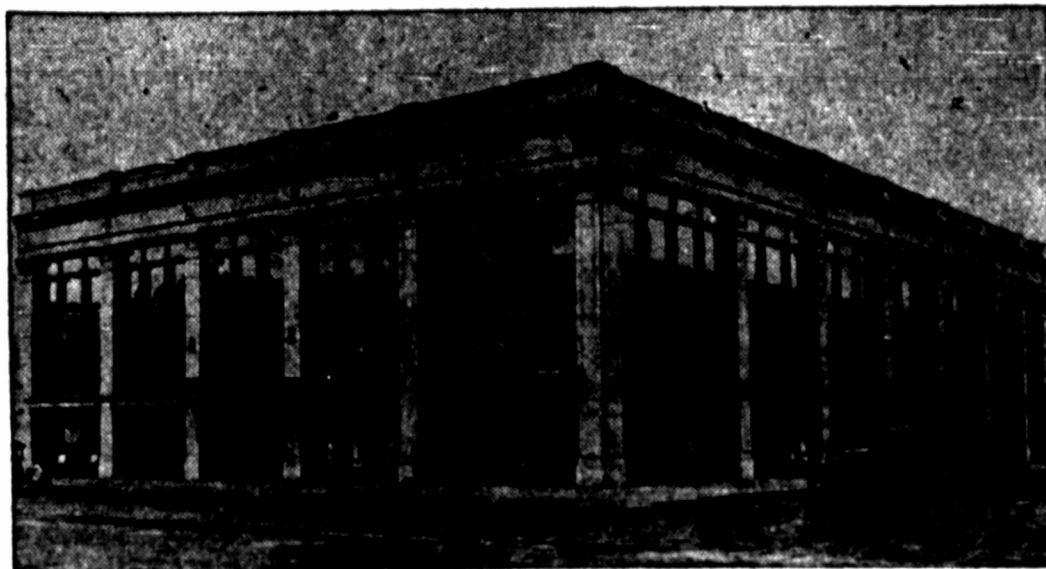

Electric Wires Cause Prostration Scientist Claims

By C. F. BERTLETT
Universal Service Staff Correspondent.

PARIS, June 27.—The multiplication of electric waves from telegraph, telephone and wireless, and from light and power wires is responsible for many cases of prostration and sickness, often resulting in mental affliction, says Charles Nordmann, famous French scientist, in this morning's *Matin*.

"To the question as to whether electricity reacts on human organisms, especially in cities, science can today reply squarely in the affirmative," says Nordmann.

"Each time the electric current varies, in other words, each time it is cut off or switched on the inductive currents are prolonged, affecting all objects, except non-conductors, in the immediate neighborhood.

"The human body, which is a concentration of cells, largely of heated salt liquid, is an excellent conductor. Each time we turn on electric switches our sensitive organism is thrilled with electricity which reacts on all the nerves something like a mild drug.

"Taken in excessive quantities, such as people living in cities, are obliged to take, this electric drug can be extremely dangerous. It reacts not only on the nerves but reaches the brain. Women are particularly affected, and tests that I have carried out show that the pine and nerve centers are usually affected."

BRITISH LABOR PARTY BARS COMMUNISTS BY VOTE OF MEMBERSHIP

LONDON, June 27.—The British labor party, opening its conference here today, widely cheered the announcement that the party had grown from a membership of 62,689 in 1909 to 4,336,800 in 1922.

After an attack by John Z. (Jack) Jones, M. P., on the tyranny of bolshevism in Russia, a resolution was passed to take a card vote, which resulted in a vote of 1,566,000 to 200,000 not to affiliate with and not to admit communists to membership in the party.

Henry Webb, chairman, predicted that if labor's strength continues to grow at the present rate, the party will assume control of the government in 1936.

Proclaiming that labor has the only clearly defined program which would be a substitute for socialism and the present capitalist system, Webb declared that the change would be made progressively, without violence and in accordance with the wishes of the people, to insure a permanent, sane and peaceful overturn of the conditions which have left thousands homeless and caused the great army of unemployed. The chairman then attacked the "savage policy of France in the Ruhr."

The question of the withdrawing British troops from Germany, leaving the German workers to the mercy of the French armed forces, will be the subject debate tomorrow.

ENGLAND AND FRANCE LOCK HORNS IN WHAT MAY BE A NEW WORLD STRUGGLE

This is the second of a series of articles by William Philip Simms, noted war correspondent and student of world affairs who recently completed a study of post-war conditions in Europe for NEA Service and The Times. These articles summarize his findings.

England and France have locked horns in what may prove to be a life and death struggle for supremacy in Europe.

Cooler heads in the two countries may yet combine to save the situation, but the indications are that unless powerful neutral influences can be brought to bear, it is difficult to see how the existing rivalry, envenomed and bitter, can fail to develop a serious peril to the peace of the world.

This rivalry—political as well as economic—is the real secret behind the failure of France and Germany to come to terms over the reparations question. Germany would never have dared face united France and Britain. She would have come to terms long ago.

The two elements composing the rivalry—politics and economics—are hopelessly scrambled, like white and yellow of eggs in an omelette. You cannot make war successfully without plenty of coal and iron and steel. Nor can a trading nation like the United Kingdom go very far economically if hopelessly outstripped by a neighbor in the production of these vital commodities.

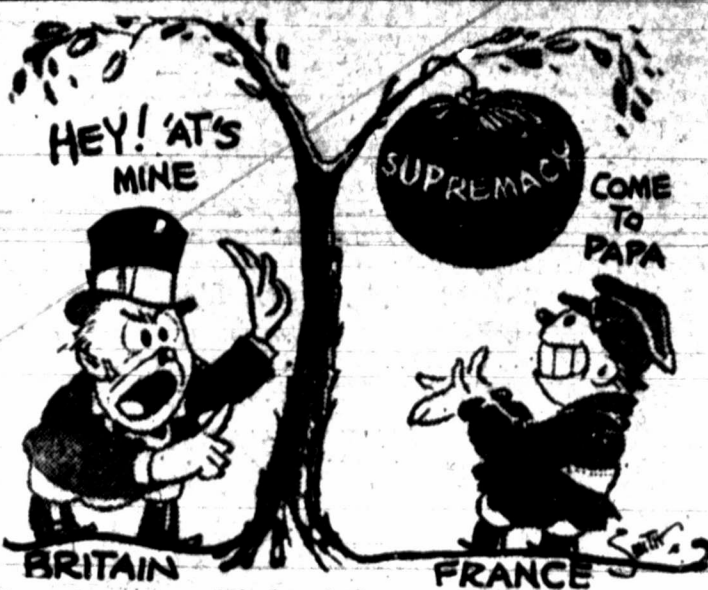

FRANCE

France is now in control of most of Germany's coal and iron and steel industries, cast your eyes over this:

France and Germany together produce in excess of 30,000,000 tons of pig iron annually as against the United Kingdom's 10,000,000 tons—more than three times as much.

France and Germany together produce about 20,000,000 tons of steel annually as against the United Kingdom's little more than 4,000,000 tons. Again the ratio of three to one.

In coal output they are about equal, with about 27,000,000 tons a year. But that does not complete the story. Since 1918 the United Kingdom has been able to increase its output only 48 per cent while Germany increased hers by 203 per cent and France by 84 per cent.

Furthermore Germany and France have a larger supply. Of the known coal deposits the United Kingdom will have dug her last ton in less than 100 years, at the present rate, while France can go on for 600 years and Germany for 1,000.

Iron Deposits. Of the iron deposits in Europe it is calculated that France and Germany together have about six times as much as the British Isles—some 7,500,000,000 tons as against 1,200,000,000.

Nations plan a long time ahead if they are to survive, and England is notoriously far-sighted. Hence it is she who sees France in control of the bulk of these economic necessities and with them completely dominating Europe politically as well as economically.

For without them in plenty no nation can successfully compete with a neighbor possessing them—neither in peace nor in war. So reasons the Britisher.

Given these, and France's present powerful military machine, the world's strongest air fleet, the best artillery and ample chemical plants for an intensive chemical warfare, England's hold on the "balance of power" in Europe has been utterly destroyed.

"Balance of Power."

What is this "balance of power?" I asked the French. They replied it is nothing more than a system

whereby no nation or group of nations in Europe is permitted to become powerful enough to challenge British supremacy.

The French claim Britain wishes Germany to "come back" so she can "play Germany against France," using the one to offset the other, while Britain makes off with the goods.

Should France follow the British plan of reparations, the French say, Germany would be strong enough successfully to defy France long before she fairly started to pay up, whereupon Britain would have the say whether France should live or die.

Hence the bitterness on both sides. And a grave peril to Europe and the world.

"I have never been a member of the 'Bill' Dollars from all over the country lately, and I am led to believe that they are coming here to see me. I want to see them all remain here, for they would not come unless Wichita Falls offered distinct advantages over other cities."

"The time is here right now," continued "Bill," when a concerted effort should be made to clean up the city to clean up if additional dollars are to be kept here."

"Clean Up House."

"Wichita Falls is not what you would call a wild west town, but it has a tremendous number of visitors here in the course of a year. You can help to boost Wichita Falls to them by putting your place into such shape that you will be proud of it, and their appreciation is sure to follow."

"Good Weather Here."

"The weather is ideal now to do that kind of work. Pretty soon it will be too hot and then the same old things that need fixing will yet be undone. Plant some rose clippings. They will grow and beautify your place. If everybody would plant six roses Wichita Falls would soon be known as the Rose City of the South."

"You must have visited other cities and towns which left a pleasant impression on you, and if you will analyze this feeling you will find that it was due to orderly cleanliness."

"On the other hand, draw up an eye picture of some other place that you were glad to get away from. Just because your eye told you that you wouldn't be satisfied to live in a city that was run down at the heel and very sloppy looking."

"Everybody Can Help."

"You may never be able to perpetuate your name in Wichita Falls by having a public building named for you, or a statute erected in some prominent place, or by any other means which will keep your name to the fore, but you certainly can do your part toward making our city a better place in which to live through helping to clean up the fix your place so that it will become an object of beauty."

"When you do that, you will notice that everything in the city will look better to you. It's up to you. Nobody else can make you do it."

"When we make Wichita Falls pleasing to the eye in every way more 'Bill' Dollars will be attracted to our city. Men with capital to invest will bring thousands of other members of the 'Dollar' family here. They will see a wonderful place where every person is bearing his or her share of the civic burden and will want to locate in a city where folks take pride in what they have."
