



The total loans and investments of these banks, which have about three-fourths of the soumercial banking researced of the country, have increased \$2,200,000,000,000 since March, 1922, and now exceed \$26,300,000,000, or \$500,000,000 more than in the spring of 1920. more than in the spring of 1920.

Ethking resources, however, are not strained. Interest rates are relatively low, and there has been no pyramiding of gredit through excessive borrowing at the federal reserve banks, as was the case three
