## INJUNCTION AGAINST SHOPMEN ON STRIKE IS MADE PERMANENT

CHICAGO, July 12.—A final decree making permanent the temporary injunction obtained by the United States government in federal court here October 5, 1932, against the railway employees' department of the American Federation of Labor, its officers and others restraining them from interfering with any manner, direct or indirect, in the operation of railroads during the nationwide shopmen's strike was entered today by Judge James M. McLaughlin of the United States district court.

The decree making permanent the injunction which is considered the most widespread restraining order ever obtained in the history of litigation, affects approximately 490,000 railroad employees and officers of the shop crafts concerned in the strike. The injunction was applied for by United States Attorney General Harry M. Daugherty on behalf of the United States district court.

Theoretically, the strike is still in effect. The shopmen left their posts of duty on July 1, 1932, when the United States railroad labor board ordered a cut in their wages effective on that date. The strike continued for more than a year, during which time, according to evidence introduced by the government, widespread assault and intimidation of men who had taken places of striking shopmen occurred. In some instances troops were called out to patrol railroad property and at other places special guards were hired by the railroads to protect their properties.

The cost of the shopmen's strike on the 19 railroads from which evidence was adduced amounted to approximately \$96,501,376, according to government testimony. The cost does not include damage to property, loss of business incurred, increased cost of doing business or loss of time and damages resulting from the strike.

The department of justice expenses amounted to \$12,429 through the use of additional U. S. deputies and the incurring of other expenses directly traceable to the strike. The cost of the strike caused a delay in passenger, freight and mail service of approximately 50 per cent. It also resulted in a general breakdown and deterioration of the surplus motive power of the roads, and the temporary suspension of the nationwide picketing and slow down of business as testified by 53 representatives of leading business concerns.

Approximately 1,500 instances of various kinds of assaults and 19 deaths due to alleged strike activities were reported by the shopmen and about 55 cases of kidnaping and other assaults were cited in the government's evidence.

## GREAT BRITAIN IS READY TO PREPARE REPLY TO GERMANY

FRANCE AND ITALY ARE NOTIFIED BY PREMIER BALDWIN.

LONDON, July 12.—Great Britain has informed France and Italy that she is ready to assume the responsibility of preparing the draft of a reply to the German reparations note.

Announcement to this effect was made by Prime Minister Baldwin in a statement to the house of commons today on the subject of the reparations policy. The British government, he said, invites the sympathy of the allies and of all interested states for the present policy of solely at the pacification of Europe and the recovery of the exhausted world.

Neither will factional politics be discussed. "It is a get-together conference at which reports will be made by state leaders on general political conditions," he said. "Our publicity representative, Mr. George Lockwood, also will lay before the committee some ideas he has as to bringing before the people the remarkable achievements of the national administration."

man of Kansas, Joseph Keating, Indiana committeeman, and Congressman Will Woods, of Indiana, chairman of the national congressional committee, who tried to dissuade President Harding from committing the administration to the world court.

**Admits Hard Fight**  
Both Mr. Keating and Mr. Woods were confident that factional strife in Indiana would be forgotten in the campaign to reelect Mr. Harding. They admitted it would be a hard fight.

"I look for a stiff fight in Indiana, particularly if the Democrats should nominate Senator Kailston for president," said Mr. Keating. "Senator Kailston would fit most any platform the Democrats could write. He has been regular on all occasions, always supporting the party nominee from Bryan to Wilson and Cox."

"He is geographically well located. I wouldn't be surprised, if after Cox, Smith and McAdoo and some others are eliminated, they would come to Indiana for their nominee. If they do Kailston will give us a good battle, but Mr. Harding, in my judgment, will carry the state against any candidate the Democrats can nominate."

Dave Mulvane was equally confident that Kansas would go for Harding in a landslide vote. The economies of the Harding administration stand out above all other issues," he said. "This record is unassailable and stands as a great achievement in this after war period. I don't think you need to worry about Kansas next year."

NEW YORK, July 11.—Fake buying orders for Southern Pacific railroad stock were distributed among a number of brokerage houses in Wall street this morning, but the fraud was discovered before the market opened and none of the orders are believed to have been executed.

LAS VEGAS, N. M., July 12.—District Judge D. J. Leahy who is sitting here in the criminal proceedings instituted against Carl C. Hanna, former state supreme court justice, who was called to the stand, was adjudged guilty of direct contempt of court by Judge Leahy shortly after Hanna was riding in an automobile driven by Magee and a woman witness for the defense, had asked whether Judge Leahy was intoxicated when the woman testified, Judge Leahy said "I don't know."

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### READY TO PREPARE REPLY TO GERMAN

(Continued from page one.)

Many of the consequences which were anticipated were in the course of fulfilling the German demand that appears to be moving fast toward economic chaos. "Dealing with the present situation in the Ruhr the premier said indefinite occupation by one country of the territory of another in time of peace was a phenomenon rare and regrettable, to which an honorable end should be found as soon as possible."

The proposals set forth in the recent German note were inadequate, he admitted, but they should be explored and examined, not ignored. Mr. Baldwin failed to state what the British proposals will be in the event the government intends to frame, nor did he say anything in regard to an international commission to examine into Germany's capacity to pay.

Referring to the position of the allies, Mr. Baldwin said: "The exchange of friendly conversations had not appeared to lead to positive results and it was becoming evident that the attitude of the principal parties must be more clearly defined. He held that the debtor should not merely be called upon to agree to the terms of the loan, but that the terms of the loan should be placed in a position to do so."

LAS VEGAS, N. M., July 12.—Fred Wilson, an attorney for the defense in the contempt case of Carl C. Magee, on trial here, appeared in court this morning with black eyes the result of a street corner meeting last night with O. O. Askren, chief counsel for the state in the Magee case. ### COAST PRO LEADS THIRD DAY QUALIFIERS WITH 150 CARD; GREAT PUTTING SAVES HAGEN

**INWOOD COUNTRY CLUB, NEW YORK, July 11.**—A lanky, sandy-haired Scot, MacDonald Smith, American by adoption, led the field Wednesday on this tough course in the third day of the qualifying test for the national open championship with 150 for the thirty-six holes. "Mac" is making a "come back" after ten years absence from competitive golf, and certainly seems to be on his way.

More youth in 1910, "Mac" tied for the national open at Philadelphia, with his brother Alec and Jack McDermott. He lost in the play off but the title went to Alec. Three years later "Mac" won the Metropolitan, among in sensational fashion, with 87. They hailed him then as a "find," a great "find" and predicted he would surely be the most illustrious of the famous Canastota, Scotland, golfing family.

But "Mac" had not been seen in competitive golf for ten years until last winter in Dallas, where he was runner up to Joe Kirkwood in the state open. There he began his "come back" and he continued it at Troon, where he was only two strokes behind Arthur Havers, the victor, and one behind the great Walter Hagen.

Behind Kirkwood.

On hot, heavily trapped and bunkered Inwood Wednesday, old-timers wagged their heads knowingly and saw in his inspiringly consistent performance much of the brand of game of ten long years ago. Consistent in the way to describe it. Not spectacular, yet brilliant at many times. He outdrew the struggling Hagen, with whom he was paired, and putted steadily. He was "there."

"Mac" ended 150 in six strokes behind Kirkwood's striking 144 on Wednesday, and two behind that of the present title holder, Hagen. They took chances; "Mac" played in canny style, safely, rarely being in any kind of trouble. He was unobscuredly steady.

Two birdsie graced his work, one in the morning, a four on the 53rd hole, the longest of the eighteenth, and another four on the 18th hole in the afternoon. They were real performances, and went sweetly with his numerous pars. He is going out in the first round, was one under par.

Marginal putting was all that saved Hagen from not qualifying. He was out in the morning, but astounding work on the greens coming in changed what might be called "97" golf otherwise into a much desired 97. The fighter in Hagen was at all times apparent, though, and he battled

through the afternoon for two 87s, and got in three strokes to spare.

"Sir Walter" certainly did putt. Coming in in the morning, he sank a 25 footer on the 12th, a 25 footer on the 16th, and a 18 and an eight footer on the 17th and 18th respectively. He had another 25 footer on the ninth, in the afternoon, and several other long ones. His iron shots and quite a few drives were often bad, indeed.

To add to Hagen's troubles, he was penalized two strokes on the fifteenth in the morning for taking a practice shot and knocking up the sand in a trap, when the ball was hit too lightly and rolled back off the bunker in the trap. That, however, only made the determined star fight all the harder.

Willie Ogg of Worcester, Mass., accompanied by 121, played the course with confidence and in a manner that was at times brilliant. He has a scintillating game, plus considerable consistency, and a round in the morning in 71 and in the afternoon in 75. Tuning up for the test, he shot 68 at Lido on Monday, a stunt that hasn't been done before, and a record if it had been in competition. He won the Shawnee cup two years ago.

Al Watrous, present Canadian open champion, got a par 37 going out in the morning and a par 18 coming in. His two 11's in the afternoon for an 81 put him in a tie with George Sargent of Columbus, Ohio, who did the first 18 in 71 and the last in the same number. Watrous 71 for the first round is next best to Kirkwood's record shattering 70 of Wednesday.

### Once You Overcome Fear of the Water You Can Swim With But Little Practice—Try These Stunts

**SECOND ARTICLE**  
**How to Swim the Crawl.**  
**SAN FRANCISCO, July 11.**—When you can breathe correctly and keep your balance in the water, you are ready to learn how to swim.

In all the exercises I outlined yesterday, you kept hold of some support. Now you are ready to "push off" from such support.

Stand with your back to the side of the tank, arms extended in front of you, palms on the water's surface.

Place the sole of your left foot against the side of the tank behind you, bending your left knee to a right angle.

Next lower the body, bending slightly forward, until the shoulders are under water.

Now take a deep breath, hold it, quickly submerge your face, and forcibly push yourself forward through the water with the left leg, arm and head until forced to come up for air. Then regain standing position in the manner described yesterday.

**The Pushoff.**  
This is technically known as the "face submerged pushoff," and it is well to practice it until it comes as naturally to you as walking.

When the face-submerged pushoff is correctly combined with leg and arm motion, you will be swimming. The stroke which comes most naturally to the majority of beginners is the elementary crawl, also known as the "dog paddle."

To achieve the correct leg motion, face the side of the tank and grasp some support slightly above the surface of the water.

Keeping hold of the support, take the face-down floating position described yesterday, but keep the nostrils above water by turning the head so that the right side only is in the water.

With the legs extended, kick your feet up and down alternately, never having a greater distance than eight to ten inches between the ankles. The up stroke of each foot is easy, the power being on the down stroke.

After practicing this for about two minutes, combine it with the face-submerged pushoff.

No one should try to learn to swim unless he can float. Here's how you can learn:

Stand with your right side toward the side of the pool, grasping the railing with the right hand, right arm fully extended.

Extend left arm until it floats.

Bend backward until your shoulders are submerged, and until your head floats, ears submerged.

Raise your left leg to the surface, then the right, keeping the legs straight and the ankles touching. Now you are floating and can let go the railing.

To regain standing position, bring the knees up toward the chest and at the same time bend your head and shoulders forward, finishing with the chin touching the knees. Quickly "scoop" with both hands, palms forward and hands moving forward and up in a circular motion deep under water.
