

CAPTURE TAXICAB AFTER 2 POLICEMEN SLAIN BY OCCUPANT

OFFICERS WHO INVESTIGATE SCREAMS OF WOMAN MEET DEATH.

CHAFFEUR TOLD "GO ON OR I'LL GIVE IT TO YOU"

Machine Believed to Be Same One Is Caught After Running Chase.

NEW YORK, July 27.—In the capture early today of a taxicab after a running chase through the Bronx during which a pursuing policeman fired several shots at a chauffeur who escaped, police believed they had found the car used by a man who last night shot and killed policemen Charles Reynolds and Frank Bonnell.

The taxicab was captured by Policeman Taggart after he had seen two suspicious looking persons alight and run into an apartment house. The chauffeur, refusing to obey Taggart's command to stop, fled away.

The two patrolmen were killed last night when they had overtaken a man and a woman in a taxi after a mysterious chase over the Queensboro bridge.

Reynolds and Bonnell found the woman screaming in the taxi. Policeman Seikman who was attracted by the screams had run up to offer his aid, the officers said they were about to take the man and woman to a police station.

As Seikman turned to go he heard two shots, saw the patrolmen fall and then saw the taxi speed away after hearing the murderer shout to the chauffeur:

"Go on or I'll give it to you."

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Johnson's Threat of Break In Republican Ranks Is Viewed As Hopeful Omen By Democrats

WASHINGTON, July 27.—Senator Hiram W. Johnson's ringing call to procedural reform in his New York speech Wednesday night has made it impossible for the Republican party to go into the 1936 presidential campaign under the leadership either of a reactionary or progressive standard bearer, unless the party managers are ready in advance to accept a probable defeat.

This was the plain reaction here today among politicians of all stripes, who will see hard battle in the fall for the G. O. P., who would prefer to go down with a sinking conservative ship than grasp at a flimsy raft of doubtful safety.

Senator Johnson's attack on the reactionary tendencies and policies of the Harding administration on domestic questions attracted attention here only second to his scathing exposure of the hope to involve the United States in the League of Nations which is at the bottom of the Harding-Hughes-Moore proposal for membership in the league.

Progressives within party councils, who long ago saw the futility of hoping to survive the approach of the 1936 election by the old ticket, had their hope strengthened by the Johnson speech that President Harding may "see the light" and voluntarily estimate himself out of office. It is believed, an open fight will be made by those opposed to the leadership of the present administration in the event of a defeat without a change of resistance.

Magnus Johnson's victory in Minnesota emphasized the loss of the political wind which blew in the Republican party. Democratic senatorial victories in the east last November showed which way the political wind was blowing there. California and the coast go as Johnson goes. In addition, word has come to Washington within recent weeks from regular party leaders in many states that Harding could not win.

Senator Johnson has forced into the clear, and will keep it there until another "solemn" referendum confirms the verdict of 1932, the lid-tight movement under cover in the Republican party to ignore the public will as expressed in the seven million majority three years ago and involve the United States in European antagonisms. It is recalled with added significance that Senators Moses and Watson of Indiana and Representative Wood of Indiana, and others among the old guard as well as progressives and irreconcilables, gave public warning of what this effort would mean. Abandonment of the policy written by the voters in 1928, these leaders served notice, meant certain disaster.

Commenting on Senator Johnson's denunciation of the league court proposal, Representative Wood, chairman of the national Republican congressional committee said:

"Senator Johnson's views on this question coincide with the views generally of the American people."

Hughes and Hoover, on the inside of the administration, and with most of the outside are the outstanding leaders in the effort to put through the league court proposition. One result of Senator Johnson's speech is to be to compel President Harding to choose between this group, representing the pro-entanglement wing of the party and the official managers.

Democrats here today were inclined to view the Johnson pronouncement with mixed emotions. Naturally they were elated on the further evidence of the widening breach in the rival party ranks.

With the Democrats are insisting openly upon a pro-league plank platform to be adopted next summer. They assert that they are assured of enough votes in the convention to go through with this program. Those with more level heads, who think the party has an excellent opportunity to solve its issues in view of the situation within the Republican organization, are fighting hard to stave off an avowed league denunciation.

The Democrats get considerable satisfaction from their interpretation of the speech as distinctly anti-administration. They also regard it as bringing the Johnson boom to the point where his hat can be thrown into the ring by his supporters when Harding eliminates himself or when it otherwise appears the moment is ripe for the move to be made with assurance of success.

It was noticeable that many of the Democrats took the same view of the progressive Republicans that the Johnson movement is likely to give irresistible impetus to the growing demand that Harding step down.

In that case, Hiram Johnson becomes the logical successor to the nomination; on non-entanglement and progressive issues.

Another hot night was felt in Wichita Falls Thursday when a heavy wave regular over the section of the state after dark. As a maximum for the day, the mercury went to 79 degrees at 8 o'clock last night. Early Friday morning, however, the temperature dropped, and as a minimum registered 57 degrees, according to the thermometer at George Simmons' house.

Friday dawned cloudy and hot, with a slight breeze from the west, slightly breaking the sultry condition of the weather. Although there was no rain reported, over this territory, the clouds were heavy, and the mercury was steadily rising over the entire district Friday morning.

The division, which was made Friday, is as follows: Wichita Falls precinct, \$89,571; Burk Burnett, \$32,885; Mescalra, \$27,338, and Iowa Park, \$114,971, making a total collection for the three weeks of \$1,317,981.

RESTRAINS COMPANY FROM SELLING ANY MORE STOCK

NEW YORK, July 27.—An order restraining the Simons Development Company, Inc., from selling any more capital stock was signed by Supreme Court Justice Bijur today. The company was sued by James R. Kelly, who charged that Philip Francis, president of the company, had sold him \$100 in stock on the promise that the money would be used in developing placer mining in new gold fields in Guaymas, Mexico.

Today the company, which had been charged false pretenses, declaring Francis had told him of profits from the new mines would run from \$1,000,000 to \$5,000,000 a year.

Francis had been in custody of American authorities.

AMERICAN SAILORS CAPTURE SOVIET'S GUARDS, GET AWAY

ROME, ALASKA, July 27.—Officers and crew of the American trading schooner Iskum of Tacoma, Wash., were being congratulated here today on having freed themselves from the custody of the soviet government of Russia, which ordered them held on charges of violating Russian trading laws.

Owners of the craft had been informed that drugs with Russian countries was carried on at the risk of the trader and that therefore the American state department could do nothing to help. In this dilemma the men of the Iskum seized soviet guards placed aboard their vessel to keep the craft in Siberian waters, put the custodians in irons, made an escape from Adanyr, and crossed the Bering sea to Nome.

Today the schooner, which belongs to the Phoenix Northern Trading Company of Tacoma, was lying here and the soviet guards are in custody of American authorities.

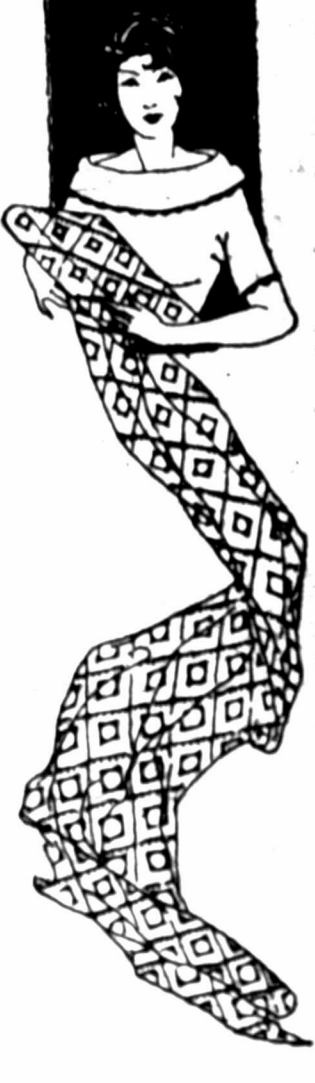

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Texas Viewpoints

Triumph of the Law. (Houston Chronicle.) The people of Harris county on Tuesday, July 24, witnessed a signal triumph of law in the criminal district court.

The defendant did not belong to what is ordinarily known as the criminal class. Neither by heredity or environment had he become associated with criminal instincts.

They rejoiced to see the influence of lawless examples. They sought the contagion of a spirit which while spreading virtue was in fact sowing the seeds of crime.

That conception was obviously erroneous. The law is not a mere tool to be used by the people—has delegated to certain agencies and certain agencies the right and power to enforce when the law is broken.

This being true, when the defendant assumed to exercise functions which are not his, he is guilty of a crime, and that crime is not a mere technical violation of law.

That they so offended they confessed. They realized that they had violated the law and they were not ashamed of it.

The law triumphed, and the defendant is pleased to record that triumph, but it would not add a feather to the scale of the state unless the law is obeyed and the consciences of wrong doers of the erring citizens.

Their actions need no interpreter to make plain their meaning. Their confession had been made and they were prompted by a false conception of right and duty.

The result should send its influence deep down into the minds and consciences of all other men, organized or unorganized, to be alert and ready to do their duty.

The law triumphed, because a judge bravely, because a honest man served on the last two grand juries, and refused to be swayed from their duty.

Behind the law and the court and the representatives of the state and the united sentiment and wholesome social convictions of the mass of the people, by the power of which the law is enforced.

There was no parade, no soundings of trumpets, no appeal to popular passion, nor setting of the judicial scale to weigh the matter, but with dignity and fairness and justice all was done.

Beets Satisfactorily Canned by Cold Pack Method; Make Good Pickles

Can beets early in the season while they are small and tender. Winter beets require long cooking and to the housekeeper who must buy her fuel by foot or units every hour spent in the cooking of a vegetable is quite an item.

Beets for canning should be a dark rich red. Care must be taken when washing not to break the skins, for this will make them lose color. The only satisfactory way of canning beets is by the cold pack method. Very few vegetables are canned by the open kettle method and beets especially are susceptible to can that way.

To Can Beets

Wash beets carefully. Cut off leaves, leaving two inches of stem. Do not cut deep into or break the skin in any way. Boil for an hour. The beets should be about three-quarters done so that the skins will slip easily. Remove from boiling water and dip in cold water.

Strip skins and pack in sterilized jars. The beets should be sliced or diced of left whole just as they are to be served. More beets can be put into each jar if they are cut.

Fill sterilized jars to within one-half inch of the top with beets. Add 1 teaspoon salt and 1 teaspoon sugar for pinks. Fill with one-fourth inch from the top with boiling water.

Half seal and put in hot water bath for two hours. Remove from boiler and seal. Turn upside down to cool. When cold store in a dark cool place.

Pickled Beets
Beets, vinegar, sugar, salt.
Wash beets carefully as in preceding recipe. Boil until tender. They should cook in an hour and thirty minutes at the most. When done plunge into cold water and slip the skins. Cut in slices about one-half inch thick and pack in sterilized jars. Be careful not to break the slices when packing.

Use one cup granulated sugar, one cup vinegar, one quart water and one teaspoon salt in each quart jar in preserving kettle and bring to the boiling point. Boil three minutes, remove from fire. Do not boil more than three minutes, because long cooking of vinegar will make itropy.

Four boiling vinegars over beets in jars and seal. The vinegar must cover the beets completely and the jars must be full to overflowing. Run a spatula down the side of jars to be sure that the vinegar fills the jar.

The secret of any canning done by the open kettle method lies in making cans full to overflow, thus excluding all air, and having the contents of the cans boiling when sealed.

Silverware Polish.
Clear or good cigarette ash makes an excellent polish for silverware.

SALADS AND FROZEN DISHES ACCEPTABLE IN SUMMER TIME

With the thermometer registering a hundred and above every housewife welcomes cool and easily prepared dishes for her meals. Cold meats, salads, food preparations of various natures all make a strong appeal to the sluggish appetite, which is prevalent at this period of the year.

Household Suggestions

Stuffed Tomatoes Served.
Eight medium-sized tomatoes, 2 packages neutrochal cheese, 4 tablespoons finely chopped English wall nuts or hickory nuts, 4 tablespoons minced celery, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon paprika.

Peel tomatoes and cut slices from stems and scoop out center. Put centers in a strainer to drain off juice. Mash cheese with a fork, add remaining ingredients and mix well. Use tomato juice to make moist. Fill tomatoes with mixture. Arrange on lettuce and mask with mayonnaise or cooked salad dressing.

Cooked Dressing.
Four tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1 tablespoon flour, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon mustard, 1 teaspoon pepper, 1 cup vinegar, 1 cup water, 2 egg yolks, 1 cup whipping cream.

Melt butter, stir in sugar, flour, salt, pepper and mustard. Add vinegar and water and stir until smooth. Cook, stirring constantly until thick. Remove from fire and beat in yolks. Let cool and add whipped cream. This dressing will keep a week on ice.

Maple Parsnips.
One and one-half cups maple syrup, 4 egg whites, 2 cups whipping cream.

Beat whites of eggs till stiff and dry with a wire whisk. Put syrup over the fire and bring to the boiling point. Add slowly to whites, beating thoroughly and cooking the syrup while beating. Do not cook the syrup enough for boiled frosting, but it should be boiling when added to the eggs. Whip cream and add egg mixture. Turn into mold, pack in ice and salt and let stand three or four hours or longer.

This dessert should be made the last thing in the morning. Use three cups ice to one cup salt in packing.

Apple Letting.
An unusual icing may be made by grating one apple into the whites of an egg, while beating it thoroughly. Then add half a cup of sugar.

For Flaky Crust.
When removing pies from the oven rest the pie tin on a shallow dish until the pie is cool, instead of setting it directly on the table. Doing this insures having dry and flaky undercrust.

Do not leave a metal fork or spoon in your salad ingredients or in your salad dressing, as a poisonous compound might be formed.

To Clean Wood.
If the wood of the kitchen table is discolored, cut a lemon in half and rub it over the discolored surface. Rinse well with clear water. Pastry boards and rolling pins may be treated in the same manner.

Keep Eggs Soft.
To keep letins soft add a pinch of baking powder to the whites of the eggs before beating them.

Glassed Chirts.
Glassed chirts is a popular material for curtains as it sheds dust admirably.

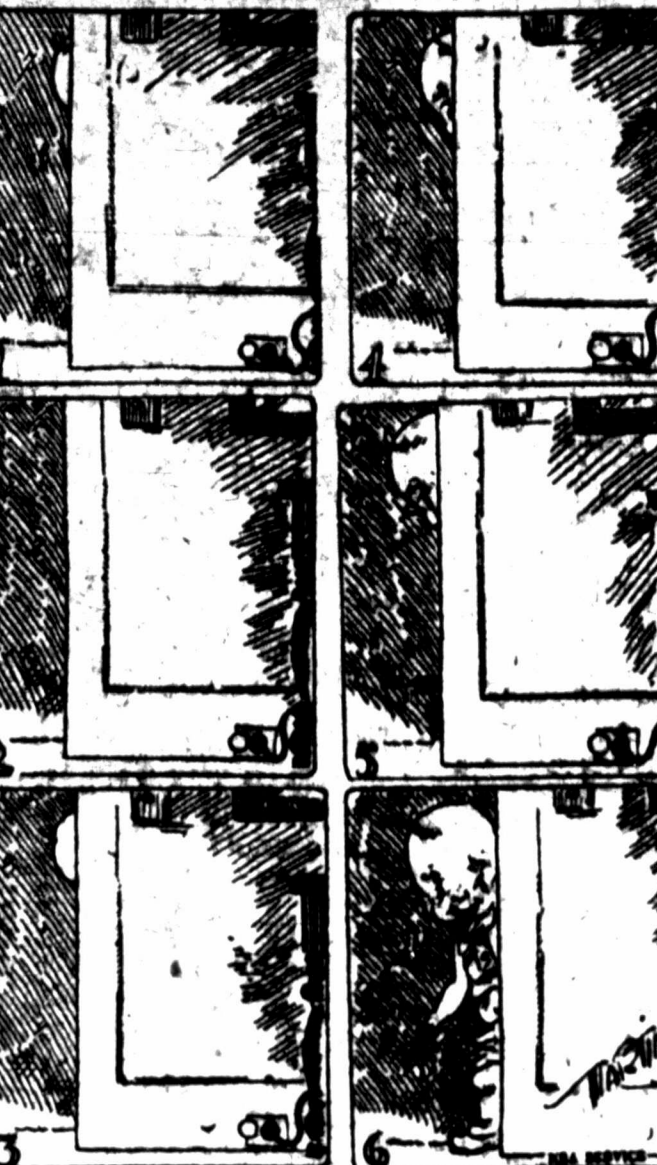
To Keep Olive Oil.

Dyer and Jonnard Feature Uphill Battle That Keeps Hopefuls Well Up in Texas League Flag Pursuit

Turkey Gross, Bear captain, opened the eleventh with a home run smack over the left field fence, and it looked like the hope-fuls were doomed again. But the Spuds, once more the scrappers of old, got to Red Lucas, the league's leading hurler, for two runs before a man was out in their half.

To Eddie Dyer and Huber Jonnard go a big part of the credit for the late victory. Dyer worked the final six innings after relieving Meine. Meine is wild. For the first time in many starts Meine was wild and he was finally struck in the sixth after he had walked four hitters and hit another. Dyer pitched fine ball for the rest of the way and helped the team along with the willow. It was Jonnard's hit that sent in the tying run in the sixth frame and it was another knock from the Spudders back started off the winning eleventh in-ning. Huber also got another blow, but it failed to help in the scoring. With the Spudders trailing by a run, Jonnard started the 11th with a hard rap to right. And here's where Dyer's bunting ability and his speed on the paths helped out. Eddie laid one down perfectly and had it beaten by a step, but that made little difference, for Simon's heavy to the left fielder had already yielded to the fence. Jonnard came all the way in and Dyer hooped it to third while Fuller chased the ball. The Bears hit a home run in the eighth before passing a batter, so they tried it again at this stage. Spudders Move Up

The win was an important one as it leads the Spudders back to third place on the trail of the Rebers and Cats. But best of all the win should put renewed life in the gang. The Spudders were truly old and that sixth round when five runs were chased in to tie the count.

Bobby Barrett's first error for the Spudders let in the tying run in the third inning. Singles by Gross and Boone put runners on first and second with one out. 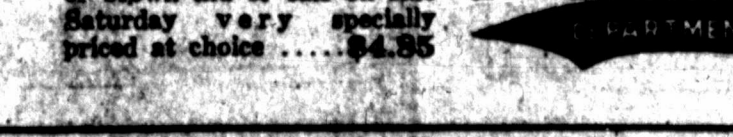
