RAMS DESTROYER IN **PUGET SOUND FRIDAY** NO ONE IS INJURED

ON U. S. S. HENDERSON, WITH PRESIDENT HARDING, July 27. The navy transport Henderson, returning from Alaska with President Harding and members of his official party, collided early today in a heavy fog with the destroyer Zeilin.

The Zeilin was taken in tow by the destroyer Nicholas with the Zeilin's stern stove in and leaking badly, the report said. The collision occurred shortly after 8 o'clock just as the Henderson entered Puget Sound while on its way to Seattle from Vancouver, B. C., the last stop nade on the return voyage from Alaska to the states.







THE ICE INDUSTRY IN TEXAS.

Here's something cooling to think about—the ice making industry in Texas.

Burt C. Blanton, industrial engineer of the Texas Chamber of Commerce, has made a survey of that industry in Texas. He finds that it ranks as the eighth industry in the state. Texas ice plants manufacture 15,265 tons of ice

daily, giving an average of approximately six pounds daily per person of the population. The total ice consumption of the state is something over two million tone annually. The investment in the industry in Texas is \$22,895,000.

Texans probably use more ice than the people of any other state, not because it is hotter in Texas but because the people want the comfort and protection that ice brings, and because of the good service maintained by Texas ice manufacturers.

In grandfather's day, a family of 20 children would not have attracted much attention, for a perusal of the average family Bible will disclose that five or six children were considered a small family in Civil War times and, while offspring totaled 20 only occasionally, 12 to 17 children were not at all uncommon.

Big families are getting fewer as the years alin by. The mother of 20 children is almost as much of a curiosity in 1923 as the Ormsby quadruplets were in 1901.

There'd be plenty of 20-children families, however, if the economic pinch were not quite so tight, though Lemuel R. Barton, farmer-father of the big New England family, says he finds it as easy to take care of 20 as of 5.

There are about 20 million families in America, and if each had 20 children our population would be around 440 millions-four times as big as it is now. 

Can beets early in the season while they are small and tender. Win-ter beets require long cooking and to the housekeeper who must buy her fuel by feet or units every hour spent in the cooking of a vegetable is quite an frem.

Beets for canning should be a dark rich red. Care must be taken when washing not to break the sitia, for this will make them lose color.

The only satisfactory way of canning beets is by the cold pack method. Very few vegetables are canned by the open kettle method and beets especially are impossible to can that way.

To Can Beets.

Wash beets carefully. Out off leaves, leaving two inches of stems. Do not cut tap root or break the skin in any way. Boil for an hour. The beets should be about three-quarters done so that the skins will slip easily. Remove from boiling water and dip in cold water.

Slip skins and pack in efertilised jars. The beets thin be alloed or diced of left whole just as they are to be served. More beets can be put into can if they are cut.

Fill sterilized jars to within one-thatt inch of the top with beets. Add a teaspoon sail and a teaspoon sugar for pint jars. Fill to within one-fourth inch from the top with boiling water.

Half seal and put in hot water bath for two hours. Remove from boiling water.
