









### MARRS WILL NOT OBEY ORDER STATE BOARD EDUCATION

PLANS TO CONTINUE EFFORT TO TEST VALIDITY OF CONTRACT

### GEOGRAPHY ONLY BOOK OF IMPORTANCE INVOLVED

Hearing Will Be Had Before Federal Court at San Antonio August 10

Special to The Times. LUBBOCK, TEXAS, Aug. 1.—Superintendent E. M. Marrs does not think that the present decision on the textbook question is any great menace to public education and will not for the present obey the order of the state board of education to recognize the contracts of the American Book Company. Marrs intended to continue to work to secure a test of the validity of the contracts by the court. This was the effect of a statement given out by him here Tuesday. He is touring western Texas as a member of the governing board of the Texas Technological College. "Of course I shall be governed by the order of the court," he said. "This is not so serious as it seems for no basic books are involved except geography. There is a serious doubt in my mind as to whether the law authorizes the purchase of more than one series of supplementary readers and the schools are already full stocked with readers for each grade. If I should recognize the contracts as ordered by the board of education such action would give the American Book Company better grounds to enforce the contract even though its validity would be questionable, inasmuch as the books would be distributed throughout the state and the doctrine of quantum meruit would be involved."

### YOUNG MAN CUT IN TWO LIVES TWENTY MINUTES

WATSONVILLE, CAL., Aug. 1.—Carl Lee, 19, was run over and cut in two at the waist by a train on which he was a stowaway, near here early today, yet he not only lived for 20 minutes, but was conscious enough to talk in detail to hospital attendants. He said he was "beating" his way about the country. He said his mother was Mrs. Nettie Lee, Indianapolis.

### More Than 2500 Acres Are Burned By Forest Fires

COURT DALENE, IDAHO, August 1.—More than 2500 acres were reported today to have been scorched by fire near the Magee range station, which was supposed to have been caused by lightning and has been fanned by high winds. The station was said to be serious although the wind had subsided and the weather was cooler last night. Forest telephone lines have been destroyed by the fire and communication with the region has been cut off. Fifty men are fighting the blazes and more are being rushed to the scene. Estimates of the losses cannot be estimated.

### McLEAN TERRITORY IS BENEFITED BY RAINS

McLEAN, TEXAS, Aug. 1.—The extreme drought which has prevailed over this section of the panhandle for some time was broken by the heavy general rain which practically covered this entire territory. Crops that before presented complete failure have revived to such an extent that farmers declare them to be in better condition than for a number of years at this season. The excellent crop condition and prospect for further production are attributable to this rain. Corn, feed stuffs and cotton promise exceptional production.

### MILITARY FUNERAL FOR MARVIN HOLDER HELD WEDNESDAY

Funeral services for Marvin Holder, 21, who was instantly killed about 10:30 o'clock Tuesday morning when he fell from a truck on the Seymour road between the crossing of the wheels of the truck passed over his head, were held from the residence, 2015 Taylor street at 5:30 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. Burial was in Rosemont burial park. A military funeral was held in charge of Battery D, 11st P. A. Texas National Guard, of which the young man was a member. The accident in which young Holder was killed took place about 10 miles out on the Seymour road Tuesday morning. It is said that Holder was riding on the side of the truck, and in replacing pipe that had worked loose his hand slipped and he fell under the rear wheel of the truck. He made his home with his mother, Mrs. Vina Holder, 2015 Taylor street. Besides his mother, Mr. Holder is survived by five brothers: D. L. Holder, C. Holder and E. L. Holder of Wichita Falls; W. M. Holder of Clovis, New Mexico; and George W. Holder of New Mexico, and two sisters, Mrs. John Hart of Dalhart, and Miss Wilma Holder of this city.

### Man Held For 'Divers' Reasons Neglects Rope

DETROIT, August 1.—Russell Hurt of Sandwich, Ontario, today is under arrest for divers reasons. "Captain" John Spear, a diver, was forty feet under water at the Offitway, Ontario, docks yesterday and Hurt, his helper, was on the dock. One end of a rope was around Spear's waist, the other was in the hands of Hurt, whose job it was to bear vigorously away the "captain" signalled that he wanted to come out of the water. The "captain" signalled and Hurt heaved, Spear caught a ladder with the assistance of the strong pull at his waist. Half way to the surface the rope slackened. "Captain" Spear, who is well along in years, all but fell back to the bottom. Fighting the pressure of the water and hampered by his heavy diving suit, he fought his way to the surface and reached the dock exhausted.

### Thermometer At 96 Degrees For Maximum Tuesday

As a maximum temperature for Tuesday afternoon, the mercury played around 96 degrees between 4 and 6 o'clock, according to the thermometer at the home of George Simmons, 1404 Broad street. Hurt dropped to 81 degrees as a minimum during the night. Following the hard rain of two days ago when the temperature dropped several points, the mercury has been on a steady rise. A cool breeze made the day comfortable Wednesday. A wind blew from the southwest all during the forenoon, and in spite of Old Sol who shined down upon the city all day, there were not as many complaints about the heat. The day was unusual for August 1. Conditions remained the same over this section of the state. There have been no rains or disturbances of any kind for the past two days, and according to weather reports from the various railroad offices the temperature has been rising slightly. Very little wind movement has been recorded recently.

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### IMPROVEMENTS ARE PLANNED AT VERNON FREE TOURIST PARK

KELL MILLING COMPANY TO SUPPLY ADDITIONAL EATING TABLES  
CHAMBER OF COMMERCE INSTALLING TELEPHONE

To Double Number of Lights and Provide Other Conveniences for Public

VERNON, TEXAS, Aug. 1.—Vernon's free tourist park—already pronounced by many travelers to be the best along the Colorado-to-Gulf Highway, will have additional improvements made on it immediately, according to action taken at a meeting of the directors of the chamber of commerce Monday night.

C. D. Ashenburt of the Kell Milling Company announced that this company would place additional eating tables in the tourist park at once. The chamber of commerce is installing a telephone there, and through the courtesy of the Vernon Electric and Ice Company, the number of lights in the park is being doubled. A light is also being placed a block away on the Colorado-to-Gulf Highway over a large sign announcing that the park is free to tourists.

Members of the local post of the American Legion white-washed all the trees in the park yesterday afternoon. The park already has eight booths in which tourists may spread their lunches, and five concrete ovens for cooking, in addition to a bath house with showers, and a camp house. A keeper of the grounds is being employed.

Lon Byars, chairman of the chamber of commerce, reports that an average of over 100 tourists use the park every night, according to the register which is kept there.

Technical Board Coming. R. H. Coffey and E. C. Christian have been appointed as a committee from the chamber of commerce to secure from 50 to 75 automobiles to go to Quanah next Monday afternoon and escort to Vernon, the technological locating board, which will spend Monday night and Tuesday morning here.

R. W. Halley, J. V. Townsend and L. E. Piper will have charge of the entertainment of the board while its members are here.

At their meeting Monday night the directors of the chamber of commerce voted to instruct their agricultural committee, composed of County Agent F. D. Chaney, Marvin Sharp, and Miss Kula Goodfellow, home demonstration agent, to prepare an agricultural exhibit to send to the Texas-Oklahoma fair at Wichita Falls this fall and to the state fair at Dallas.

The directors also pledged 125 memberships to the Colorado-to-Gulf Highway Association. M. Haney, chairman of the highway committee, will have charge of obtaining the memberships.

C. D. Ashenburt, chairman of the

the trade extension committee, will carry a crowd of Vernon boosters Saturday to the big rodeo and picnic at Bayland, 14 miles southwest of here. The Vernon band will probably make the trip.

Women's Club Entertainment. Miss Etta Goodfellow, Wilmberg's home demonstration agent, announces that there will be a joint entertainment of the women's home demonstration clubs of Wichita, Baylor, Knox and Wilmberg counties, on Coffee Creek between Vernon and Seymour, August 22 and 24.

There will be instructive courses in millinery, cheese making, and other topics, and various camp sports will be enjoyed. There will be several speakers and workers for the encouragement, including Mrs. Phoebe K. Warner of Claude and Miss Mamie Lee Hayden of College Station.

Wilmberg county has 13 home demonstration clubs, with a total membership of 497.

Consolidated Plans. Architect Guy A. Carlinder of Amarillo was here Monday conference with the school board on proposed plans for the new school, a site for which was purchased in southwest Vernon last week. At a meeting of the city commission held Monday night an ordinance was passed providing that no costs be taxed against defendants in the corporation court except jury fees and witness fees, in accordance with provisions of the charter. The ordinance sets out the fact that all officials of the city are on a salary basis and that no fees are necessary in assessing penalties for law violations.

A motion was made and duly seconded that the city make a tentative offer of \$17,500 for the sewer system. The offer includes the purchase of materials on hand and a permanent easement on lands crossed by the sewer system and that used as a disposal tank. C. O. Walling and others who own property have not indicated as to whether they will accept the city's offer. This matter has been under consideration by city officials and the owners for more than one year and will probably be settled one way or the other in the next few days.

The city hall was moved to new quarters in the Anderson building Tuesday afternoon. This makes the location more convenient to the public, being situated on the ground floor of the building.

Funeral services for John M. Evans were conducted at the family residence at 4:30 Monday afternoon by Dr. L. J. Mims, pastor of the First Baptist Church here. Interment followed in East View cemetery. Mr. Evans has been in ill health for years, and death came at 1:30 Sunday morning.

The deceased had been a resident of Vernon for 25 years. He is survived by his wife, who before her marriage was Miss Mary Skaggs of Decatur; by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Evans of West Vernon; by a brother, Homer Evans of Vernon, and a sister, Mrs. Maggie Hill of Lockett. Other relatives present at the funeral were Will Evans of White City, J. F. Mayfield of Bellevue, and T. C. Skaggs of Elmore, Okla.

Yeasting Child Dies. Lillie Mae Norton, the little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Norton of Odell, was buried at 10 o'clock yesterday morning at Fargo, the funeral services being conducted at the Baptist church there by Rev. Pearson. The little girl was ill for several weeks.

The Vernon company of the national guard returned Sunday from camp Mabry at Austin where they had been for two weeks of instruction. The men were in charge of Captain Clyde Watts, with Lieut. Perry McDonald as second in command and Bob Lutz as top sergeant. About 40 men made the trip.

Plan Traffic Yard. HOUSTON.—To facilitate traffic through the Port of Houston, the Houston Navigation and Canal Commission has contracted for 1,000 lots in the harbor addition. A railroad classification yard will be constructed on the pier.

Business Men Organize. GRAPPLAND, TEXAS, July 21.—A chamber of commerce has been organized here by local business men. It was perfected at a mass meeting of citizens at which W. A. Hill, merchant, was named president, and A. H. Luker, editor, secretary.

### BEN L. McDONALD BUYS NEWSPAPER AT BURKBURNETT

BURKBURNETT, TEXAS, Aug. 1.—The Burk Burnett Star, the local newspaper, has been sold by its owner, W. F. Billingsale, to Ben L. McDonald. Mr. McDonald has been employed on the paper for several months and came here from Corpus Christi where he owned and operated the Gulf Coast Printing Company of that city. Mr. Billingsale, the retiring owner, has no definite location in view at the present time, but will probably locate in Corpus Christi.

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### Establishment of Identification Bureau in Police Department Is Advocated by Chief George Hodgins

That there is a possibility of a bureau of identification being established in connection with the Wichita Falls police department was made public Wednesday by Chief of Police George Hodgins. Chief Hodgins has been active in his efforts to secure such a system for his department since he was appointed chief of the department several months ago and has given it even more attention since the recent thefts and safe robberies which have occurred during the past two weeks.

Chief Hodgins returned Wednesday morning from Fort Worth, where he spent the day Tuesday in conference with the officials in charge of the identification department of the Fort Worth force. The Fort Worth bureau is one of the best in the state and Chief Hodgins said he obtained much valuable information as to the cost and operation of such a system in this city. He brought back with him a set of index and record cards and charts that are used where this system is in force.

While the installation of the system has been discussed with the council several times, the department has previously only asked for opinions of the commissioners. It is expected that the system will be thoroughly explained and the council asked to authorize the installation at an early date.

Outline of System. A bureau of identification, as explained by Chief Hodgins, is merely an improvement over the Bertillon system whereby prisoners are mugged and finger prints taken and systematic records kept for future reference. The system also provides for photographing finger prints left by criminals to be compared with the originals in the records and used in apprehending

the perpetrators of any offense or crime. "The installation of such a system in this department would be the greatest addition that could be made at the present time," Chief Hodgins said. "It is being used in practically every other large city in Texas with remarkable success and in my opinion would fill a

long felt need here and materially aid in the reduction of crime," he added. Other information on the expense of installation and operation of the system and as to its advantages will be secured from other cities where it is being used, before the council is asked to indorse the necessary expenditures. The commissioners with whom the matter has been discussed are heartily in favor of the system, Chief Hodgins said.

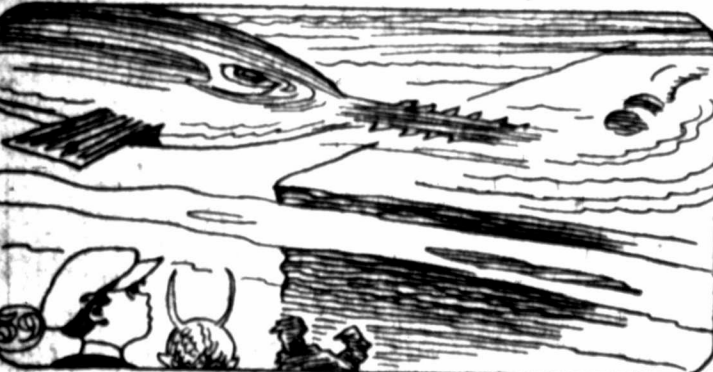

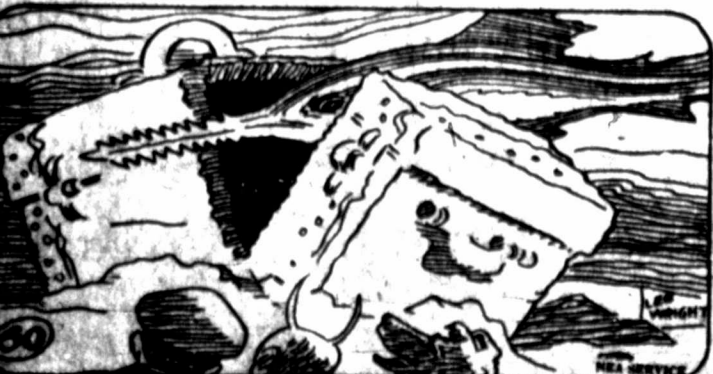

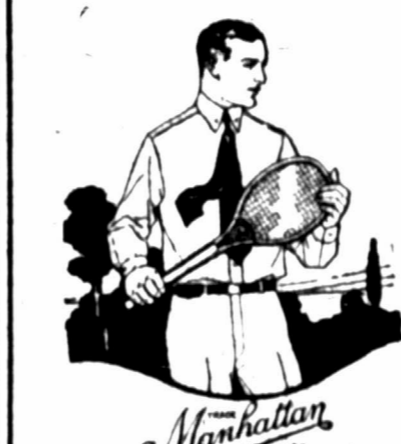

In Amarillo he said he double back and went to Dallas Saturday. He was arrested in Dallas Sunday morning. He was held in the county jail for investigation until Wednesday morning.

Only one charge has been filed against Stroud: he is charged with the burglary of Kaufman and Levin a store on Eighth street, Thursday night. Although no charges have been filed against him on the other counts, officers are confident that his arrest will lead to the activities of the gang in this city.

### Lubbock Earnest Contender For Texas Technological College Site Claims of Wilson Also Presented

Special to The Times. LUBBOCK, TEXAS, Aug. 1.—On the Llano Escarpment, or the Llano plateau, the location of the Texas Technological College came in their educational survey to determine the most suitable place for the establishment of the new institution. They arrived here yesterday afternoon from Wilson, where people called for the party at Fort early and took them to that little granite tower for study of the proposition as it has to do with the location of the college. They then presented the board to the Lubbock delegation immediately after noon. That at Wilson was given the first opportunity of the board to view a possible site for the college on the Llano plateau. Where better than here, where the rugged limestone with the almost vertical cliffs of the cooling breeze.

From Post to Wilson, a distance of 22 miles, the party rode over smooth terrain stretching in endless distance, as far as the eye could discern and nearly all developed farming land with fields of cotton, maize and kafir corn. A perfect checker board of fields and squares was this territory, and on each square a little house, windmill whirling in the steady wind, out-house, peach or apple orchard, garden spot, and in most cases a few shade trees.

Little grazing land was seen on the entire trip, only small pastures for the domestic herd have been left in virgin state. Much of the land has been put to the plow for the first time this year because of the high price of cotton. All the way this crop was in good condition, promising at this time a yield of from one-third to a half bale to the acre.

Wilson indicated a tract of 7,900 acres lying north of the settlement along the branch line of the Santa Fe which connects the town with Stanton on the main line of the Santa Fe, and told the board to select any 2,000 acres desired. Their selection could be such as to include the location of the college buildings four miles from Stanton, a city of 2,000, four miles from Wilson, two miles from the station at Stanton, and the station of Wilson. None of the land is in cultivation, the land of the greater joining with the Santa Fe the settlers just north of Wilson, but every foot of the site may be plowed up and planted the first year.

Proposed Relief Inadequate

"It was natural that one of the first schemes to be proposed should have been the government's price fixing activities of the war period. Such an expedient easily attracts the support of those who are concerned with their own immediate amelioration, but it would undoubtedly be disappointing and harmful in its ultimate results. Not only would it provide a subsidy to the wheat grower, but it would fix the price of wheat at a level which would be essential to a fixation of output. It would destroy the price mechanism by which production and demand are brought into equilibrium and, so long as it continued, the average wheat grower in this country could have no normal relation to the world's needs.

"It has been proposed also that the government should purchase, say, half the bumper of the present crop at the market price and store it in the case of a shortage. Just what the effect of such a plan on the price of wheat would be is not clear, but it is safe to say that

relative demand or of production is called for. Anything that may be done to accelerate the process of recovery, with consequent revival of demand for foreign foodstuffs, would afford a measure of relief for wheat growers in this country. It appears, also, that the farmer's difficulties have been accentuated by tariff rates which are able to raise the price of many articles consumed by him but which are powerless to raise the price of his products that are determined in world markets.

But not all the price disparities from which he suffers have their origin in the unusual effects of the tariff rates. Whether with the existing or lower tariff rates, or with no protective duties of any sort, in any event, the demand for American manufactures at the present time would be more nearly in conformity with supplies than would be the demand for wheat and other foodstuffs.
