



The French government has alseed the money by sedling bonds of their own people and have gone long on the expectation of reimpursing their people so soon as they hould collect their reparation coney from Germany. 





"Specialized wheat farmers," says the Breeders ette, "may be bent, broken or 'busted,' but the worwhelming majority of American land owners are either apecialists nor wheat farmers. All classes of farmers have been affected by the agricultural

rould have brought acute distress. There are many sections in the south where a failure of the cotton crop or a low price for the staple brings distress even more acute than is being experienced by the wheat growers of the Dakotas or Minnesota today.

But the practice of diversified farming is apreading steadily. Of course there are sections that are best fitted for wheat growing and there are other sections that are best fitted for cotton raising and other sections for other crops. These special crops will always be the main crops in the sections which are best adapted to their growing but more and more the farmers will insure themselves against the failure of the main crop or a distressingly low price for it by diversification.




