CHINESE STAGE RIOT ON AMERICAN VESSEL DEMAND FREE PASSAGE

PEKING, Aug. 1.—In a fracas aboard the American steamer Albatross, caused when a crowd of Chinese soldiers boarded her at Ichang and demanded free transportation to the coast, the vessel was set on fire and the crew and passengers were in jeopardy.

A party of American bluejackets from a gunboat, responding to a call for help, overpowered the rioters and arrested 18 of them. Shots were fired before the trouble was ended. The Chinese soldiers had become infuriated at the demand for a free ride to the coast.

DETROIT, Aug. 2.—The whiskers of Benjamin H. Johnston, long his principal asset, have become his chief liability. Johnston's beard has taken him twice around the world and has made his living for him for the past 25 years, during which he has posed before artists for the numerous cheap caricatures requiring a hair-cut appointment.

The recent publicity attending the inquiry into the activities of "King" Johnston has not been a day but some one has said I am the fugitive from Benton Harbor. A few weeks ago I was arrested in Silver Springs, Ohio, on suspicion of being Funnell. Johnston said that as soon as he finishes his posing here he is going to Honolulu where "I" he said, they have never heard of Benjamin.

Protest Governor Carrying Convicts On Canadian Trip

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 2.—An inquiry into the bringing into Canada by Governor Donohue of Ohio, Karl Jennings and C. Zipliani, convicted murderers, as servants of his fishing party, will be made by W. H. Little, dominion commissioner of immigration.

Mr. Little in making the announcement yesterday, said the two men, who are trustees in the Ohio penitentiary, should have been held up at the border. Legally, he said, the prisoners were no longer amenable to the discipline of the American penitentiary and had the status of undesirable criminal aliens at large.

Governor Donohue at his fishing camp in Colchuck, northern Ontario, according to a dispatch from Toronto, characterized the prominence given the news that two of his servants were convicted as "political bunk." He said he had in his desk in Columbus a signed pardon for Jennings.

"These boys," he added, "are not real murderers. They were convicted of second degree murder, not first. They started to fight in a pool hall and in both cases their opponents were accidentally killed. I am personally responsible for these men and I know them."

ALLIES TAKE CONCERTED ACTION TO PROTEST THE PLAN OF CHANG TSO-LIN

HARBIN, China, Aug. 1.—Concerted action has been taken by the American, British, French and Japanese consuls here to protest the seizure of the Chinese eastern railway land department by Chang Tso-Lin, the war lord of Manchuria, who ordered all the railway lands ceded to Russia under the old treaties taken over by his provincial government.

The foreign consuls, viewing the seizure of the land department as a direct violation of the Washington convention, placed their official seals on a protest containing demands to railway lands. After meeting to discuss the defense of foreign interests, the consuls telegraphed their diplomatic representatives at Peking.

The situation has been further complicated by Chang Tso-Lin, ordering Chang Huan-Rin, head of the land department, to open publicly the chest containing the land deed.

PRICE OF GASOLINE REDUCED TWO CENTS ON PACIFIC COAST

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 1.—The price of gasoline was reduced two cents a gallon to the consumer in the entire Pacific coast territory by the leading oil companies.

No statement was issued in explanation by the companies, but the Standard Oil Company and others announced recently that they were facing a problem of over-production. The reduction here was from 19 to 17 cents.

J. H. SIMPSON FUNERAL BURKBURNETT TUESDAY DEATH RESULT ACCIDENT

BURKBURNETT, Texas, Aug. 1.—The body of J. H. Simpson, who met death on Saturday, July 21, was buried Tuesday afternoon. The deceased was employed in dismantling a large tank near the city when a portion of the tank collapsed inflicting injuries which resulted fatally. Special efforts were made by the coroner to identify the body, but the body was placed in an effort to locate relatives of the dead man and through many answers were received none led to the identity of those sought and the body was interred in the Burk Burnett cemetery.

RULE RAILROAD RATES FOR SUGAR REASONABLE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—Railroad rates for sugar transportation were held in line generally reasonable today in an Interstate Commerce Commission decision rendered upon complaint of sugar refiners along the Atlantic coast from New Orleans and on the Pacific.

Carriers were denied permission to reduce charges from the Pacific coast to Chicago to a point which would make them lower than existing rates from the Pacific coast to intermediate points. At the same time the present comparative basis of rates from the New Orleans refining centers to the middle west and from the Atlantic coast to the same destinations were held to be reasonable as they stand.

Proceedings brought by carriers and refiners were dismissed.

SENATOR COPELAND SAYS REPUBLICANS MISERABLE FAILURE

CRITICIZES RECORD MADE BY ADMINISTRATION OF PRESIDENT HARDING

SPEAKS BEFORE MEMBERS OF GEORGIA LEGISLATURE

Charges That Party With Being "Strangely Blind to Rights and Privileges of Labor"

ATLANTA, Ga., Aug. 2 (AP)—Charging that the Republican party has "unwisely and ignominiously failed" and expressing confidence that the Democratic party will again come into power, Senator Royal B. Copeland of New York, in an address before the Georgia general assembly today discussed some of the chief factors entering into the problems that he brought out.

"We are living in a remarkable period in the world's history," the senator declared. "No matter how complex, how compelling, how disturbing, how heart-breaking any other time may have been, I doubt if the souls of men have ever been tried more than they are at this time."

The farmer, Senator Copeland said, has suffered more than all the rest of society. He named agriculture as the fundamental industry of America as well as of many other countries, and asserted that "unless the farmer prospers there cannot be prosperity for any nation."

Senator Copeland charged that the Republican tariff framers forgot the farmers when they wrote the "Cordell Hull-Cumber" bill, which he characterized as an "iniquitous law."

Senator Copeland declared that 21 states which were carried by the Republicans in 1920 have swung over to the Democratic standard and he believed "because our country has not stood for the thoughtless neglect of the multitude for the sake of enriching a few."

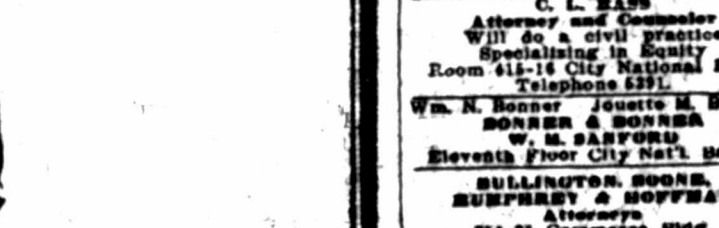
