## TELLS OF SLAYING SON-IN-LAW WHILE RELATIVES LOOK ON

### GEORGIAN DESCRIBES HOW HE AVENGED MISTREATMENT OF DAUGHTER.

## ABDUCTS HER HUSBAND SHOTS HIM TO DEATH

### Body Thrown in Shallow Stream; Death Sought to Block Possible Reconciliation.

NEWSPAPER, Ga., Aug. 21. (AP)—How six members of a family were called upon to witness the execution of their son-in-law was revealed today by John W. Minter, who confessed, police said, to having shot to death Millard Trouton near here a fortnight ago and then threw his body into a shallow creek.

Minter, head of a large family of boys and girls, and having four sons-in-law, one of whom was Trouton, the police said today, related to them last night how to avenge alleged mistreatment of his daughter, the wife of Trouton, and to prevent Trouton from making further overtures to her to come back to him, he decided to "get rid of him."

"It preyed on my mind; I could not forget it," Minter is quoted as having told the police, referring, officers said, to a whipping which Trouton was alleged to have given his wife, causing her to separate from him and make her home with her parents. Mrs. Trouton told her father, brothers and brother-in-law of other alleged brutalities.

Then came a note to her from Trouton. Minter said, seeking a reconciliation. The father is said to have called his sons and son-in-laws into conference and it was decided that to prevent any further overtures from Trouton, Minter should leave the Minter home again to live with her husband by kidnapping Trouton and get him out of the way.

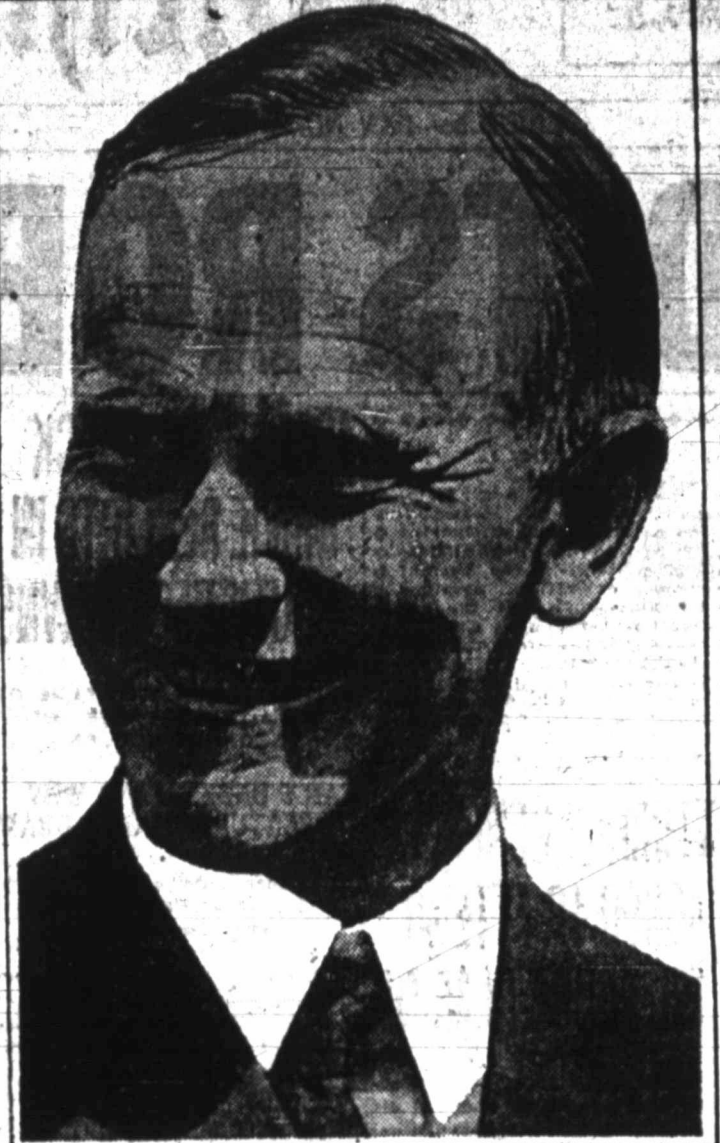

# 2 Firemen Killed, 47 Hurt, When Brooklyn Building Falls Burying Them Beneath Ruins

NEW YORK, Aug. 21. (AP)—Two men were killed and 47 seriously injured when a three-story brick building in Brooklyn collapsed last night during a fire, burying a score of firemen and spectators. An official police report today showed the total was more than at first indicated.

The fire of unknown origin, was in a 10-year-old building that formerly housed a Masonic Temple. Of recent years it has housed two stores on its ground floor, while the second and third stories were given over to dance halls.

Working under the glare of a half dozen hastily erected arc lights the fire fighters spent three hours in the upper part of the building. The fire was extinguished at 12 o'clock. The curious crowd had begun to disperse. A score of firemen were on the lower floor with hoses, but ladder men were taking hose forward by way of the fire escapes. Even men were on the roof, chopping at cornice.

Without warning a fifty-foot section of wall crashed in. A heavy steel girder, recently installed as an additional support, fell with the crumbling wall and carried its burden with it. The wall crushed most of the firemen on the ground floor under the light of the flames. A seventh man was carried with the wall into the burning pit.

Six of the men on the roof were catapulted into the heart of the flames. A seventh man was carried with the wall into the burning pit. The crash sent its call of blocks around and started thousands of men, women and children fleeing from the close packed tenements to the street.

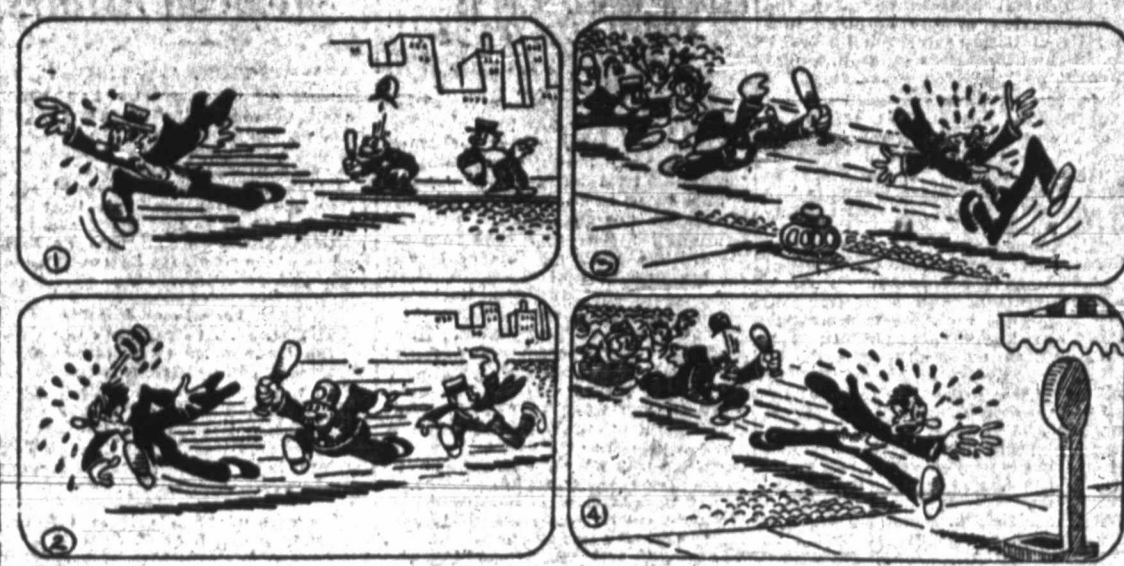

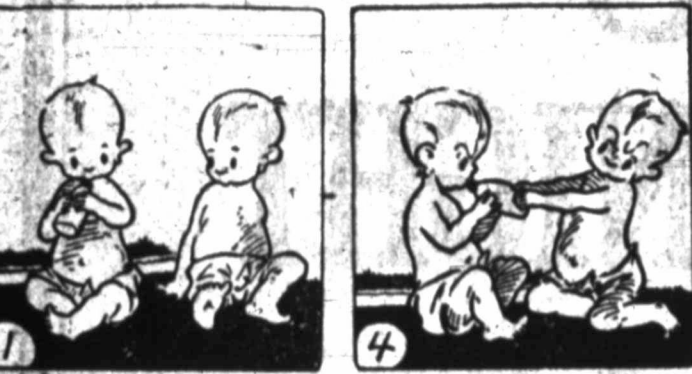
