### CHANGE OF VENUE WILL BE ASKED IN MOREHOUSE CASES

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 21. LAST WEEK IN AUGUST DULL, HARBORAGE FOR WOOD. BOSTON, Aug. 21.—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow: "From so dull the last week, in August has revealed a very dull market for wool and prices consequently have been steady with a slight upward in favor of the buyers. Some prices are erratic. Some manufacturers looking for small quantities of wool to cover any orders or buyers are willing to pay a fair price, while the necessity of selling sometimes has forced conditions which make the range of values on early considerably less of most unusually wide. "Wool interest is being shown in the Texas fall wool and mohair clips which are just commencing to be shown. ### CLEANUP DRIVE IS LAUNCHED BY CITY AND CIVIC LEAGUE

An active cleanup campaign which will have for its purpose the thorough cleaning of all streets, alleys, residence property and vacant lots in the city and the highways leading into the city, was launched Friday morning at a joint meeting of the women of the civic league, members of the chamber of commerce and representatives of the city health department.

Monday night a committee from the civic league will go before the city council and petition the city fathers to set aside a clean-up week during which the people will be asked to clean up and beautify their property for the fair. During the week designated a general appeal will be made to the civic pride of the property owners to clean up their property.

At the end of the week a careful check will be taken of the lawns and vacant lots and property that are not cleaned of weeds and rubbish will be hauled to the dump. In accordance with the city ordinance notices will be mailed out to owners of the property advising them to clean up and remove their property. After this notice has been given, if the property is in the same condition the city will clean up the property and assess the expense against the property.

Mrs. J. M. Isbell, chairman of the sanitary department of the civic league, will have charge of inspections of yards, both front and back, and of alleyways in the residence section. Mrs. Bert Dean, chairman of the city beautification committee, will work in connection with the other committee and urge property owners to beautify their property and make it attractive to visitors during the Texas-Oklahoma fair.

City will assist

Dr. A. H. Douglas, city health officer, will assist in the campaign by looking after the downtown alleys and clearing the highways leading into the city of all rubbish and garbage. Dr. Douglas said that permits had been issued to 27 men who were licensed to haul garbage and that the wagons would be available to the residence section. A minimum charge of 25 cents a barrel is made for hauling and the committee will urge that housewives insist that the garbage be carried to the city incinerator.

Aside from the regular clean-up activities, the civic league will make an effort to stimulate interest in beautifying the city streets and making the city generally attractive to visitors during the Texas-Oklahoma fair. They will urge all merchants to decorate their places of business with the Texas-Oklahoma fair flag. All streets leading from the business district to the fair grounds will be decorated with flags and a slogan, "Follow the flag to the fair," will be adopted by the civic league.

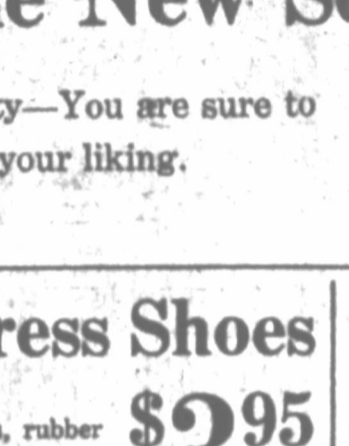

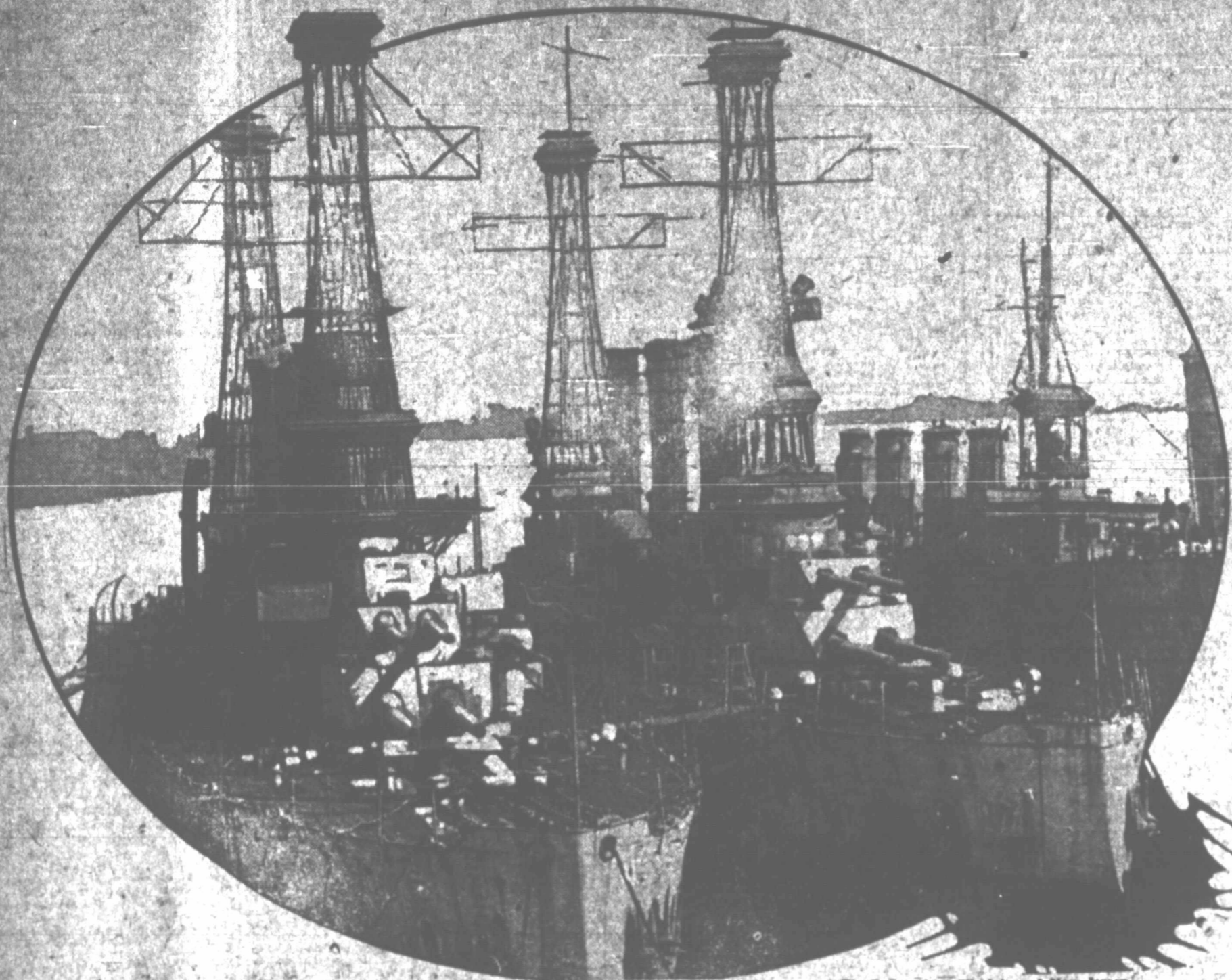

## Relishes and Sauces Prepared For Winter in Sister Mary's Kitchen

Delicious and delectable relishes will clarify the roughest out of meat and lift it out of the realm of everyday.

With their smooth and lusciousness, they are a little bit of everything that grows in the garden in their deliciousness, and in combining the vegetables and gauging proportions.

Many of these relishes can be made months ahead of time, and they are especially handy at the end of the season when the danger of frost hastens harvesting. Or you may just happen to have one that you know what to do with when the family has suddenly gone out for dinner and the refrigerator is empty and the stove ought to be used up some way.

Tomatoes, green or ripe, form the basis for several of these.

**Mixed Relish.**  
½ green tomatoes, ½ large sour apple, 2 small onions, green pepper, 1 cup seeded raisins, 4 cups vinegar, 1 cup water, 1 cup brown sugar, 1 tablespoon salt, 1 cup whole mixed spices.

Wash tomatoes and chop fine. Peel and core apples and chop fine. Put onions and chop fine into pan in hot water, rub off this outer skin and remove seeds and white fiber and chop fine. Chop raisins. Put chopped vegetables and raisins in preserving kettle. Add remaining ingredients with the spices tied in a small muslin bag. Boil one hour. Pour into sterilized cans and seal.

**Unseasoned Pickles.**  
One-half peck ripe tomatoes, 2 ripe peppers, 4 green peppers, 2 large heads celery, 1 Bermuda onion, 2 small white mustard seeds, 1 tablespoon black pepper, 1 cup salt, 4 cup vinegar, 3 cups sugar.

Wash vegetables, boil tomatoes and salt whole. Boil peppers and rub off outer skin, remove seeds and white fiber and chop fine. Peel onion and slice. Slice sugar, salt, pepper and mustard tied in a muslin bag and let stand until sugar and salt are dissolved. Chop and mix vegetables, pour over vinegar mixture. Store in an earthen jar in a dry cool place. Keep tightly covered with a heavy glass.

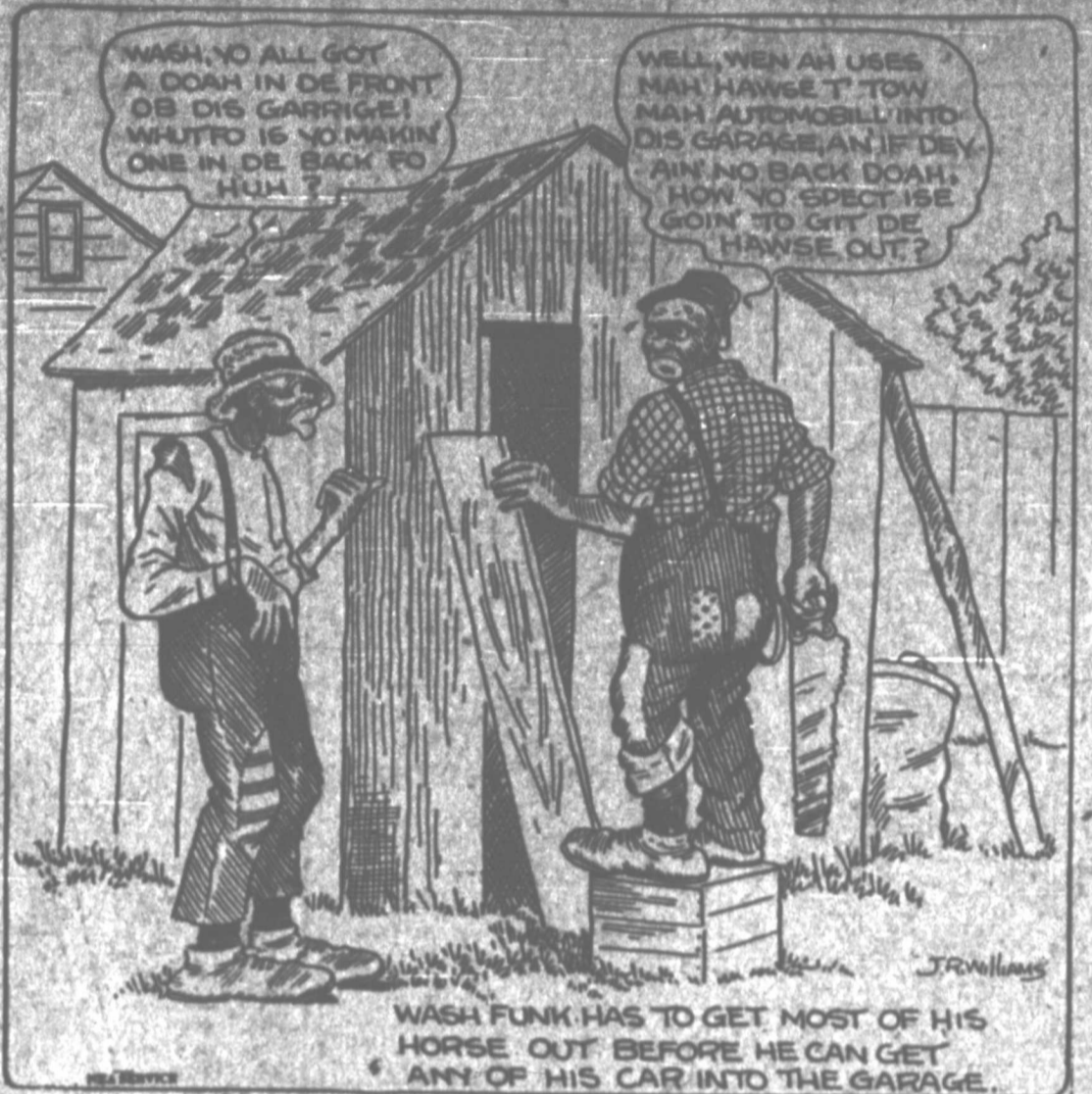

## "Golden Rule of Mechanics" May No Longer Rule World's Industry As Result of a Recent Invention

WICHITA, Aug. 30.—The "golden rule of mechanics" that what is gained in power is lost in speed and vice versa—will no longer be the rule and the world's industry will be vitally revolutionized, unless all my senses have deceived me today.

And despite the almost inconceivable nature of what I have to say, it is not an alternative, but to believe that either a new mechanical law, or a new method of applying an already known law, has been discovered.

For I have set in motion with the touch of one finger a two-ton dead-weight and stopped it the same way.

The inventor of the marvelous contrivance is F. W. Goebels, a middle-aged mechanic born in Russia of a German father and a Polish mother.

In company with Goebels and three Swiss and two German friends, I moved to the workshop where I was led into a partitioned off corner. The largest part of the shop was occupied something resembling a small flat car about 10 feet long, two feet high and three and one-half feet wide. It had three axles and rested on a narrow gauge railway track. The total weight of the contrivance was two metric tons.

The inventor asked me to grasp the cross bar at the end with a single finger and pull gently. With barely more exertion than would be required set a baby carriage in motion, I started the mass moving, and the motion, which was accelerated in a flash, was equally easy to check and push backwards.

Goebels then removed the board sliding, which covered the wheels. Superimposed on each axle, above each wheel, was an iron case. This case covered the secret mechanism which seemed to rob gravity.
