Board Discusses Kindergarten Plan

Census work in Parmer County is "over the hump," according to Mrs. Charles Corn of Bovina, the chairman for Parmer County.

She indicated that an area around Black still has not been worked, and some parts in Friona have not as yet been contacted. Mrs. Corn said it might be the last of the month before the nose-counting is completed.

The county census chief said that residents of Parmer County had been most cooperative in helping with the every 10 years chore, even though some people think the government was a bit nosy on the census forms.

"One thing about it, in most cases, the people know the enumerators, and this makes it easier," Mrs. Corn pointed out.

Those working as enumerators in Friona included Mrs. Joe Mann, Mrs. Glenn Reeve, Jr., Mrs. Prentice Pruitt of Hub and Phyllis Herrington of Farwell.

One thing that Mrs. Corn said the 1970 census was indicating was that there would be fewer residents in the rural areas than before. "We find vacant houses in the country; but there are very few vacant houses in the towns," she said.

This would support the "farm to city" trend which has been evident not only in the Panhandle but all over the nation, for a number of years now.

Parmer County will be one of an elite group of counties in the Panhandle which will show good population growth during the past 10 years. The county may have grown as much as 25 per cent during the past decade. But we'll have to wait a while longer to find out exactly what we have done.

With the reviving of the baseball program for 14 and 15 year old boys, a need is being renewed for a baseball field for these boys.

Since Reeve Field was dismantled early last year, there has been no field for the older boys. (Of course, it wasn't particularly needed the last year, since we had no teams in this age bracket.)

The older boys will play in a league with Farwell and Bovina, and apparently most of the games will be played on fields in those towns. Bovina has a lighted park, but Farwell does not.

Baseball officials were to contact representatives of St. Theresa's Catholic Church about the possible use of their field for some games locally.

In the meantime, however, some interest is being expressed for a "community" baseball team, and should we field such a team, such as we have in the past in the Irrigation League, then another park will be a necessity.

The lights and equipment from Reeve Field were dismantled and stored by the Noon Lions Club. However, the problem now seems to be land which could be made available for a park.

There are also those interested in making men and equipment available should such a location be found, and a park constructed.

It may be too late to get anything like this done for the present season; but then again, maybe not.

A town the size of Friona needs a good baseball field. It also needs a community team, made up perhaps of the older high school and ex-college players. This would give the community an activity to follow during the summer (provided the park also had adequate bleachers.)

We're throwing this out as a challenge to residents of Friona. Anyone interested in donating land for a park give us a call. We could have it ready for the latter part of the season.

The Friona School Board of Trustees approved teachers' contracts, and re-elected board officers as part of their regular meeting Monday night.

The two new board members, Steve Messenger and Floyd Schueler, were installed as members. Dr. Paul Spring was re-elected as board president, Louis Welch as vice president and John Blackburn as secretary.

The board accepted resignations from Mrs. Sam Mears, high school math teacher, and Mrs. Arthur Turnbough, high school homemaking teacher, both of whom do not plan to teach during the 1970-71 term.

At the same time, the board voted to offer teaching contracts to Mrs. Leonard Coffey for the math position, and Mrs. Dale Guber for the homemaking job.

Also accepted was the resignation of John Morrow, seventh and eighth grade girls basketball coach and physical education instructor. The board discussed the possibility of hiring a woman instructor for the position. It was left at the discretion of the superintendent, as to how it would best suit the school system.

In other business, the board voted to follow the state's minimum requirements on mandatory kindergarten program

for the 1970-71 term. Children who are five years, six months old as of Feb. 1, whose family makes less than \$3,000 per year, or are otherwise educationally deprived, will be eligible for the kindergarten program, which will run concurrently with the school term.

The school is currently making a survey to determine the number of children who will be eligible for the kindergarten program. It is thought that two teachers will be required to implement it the first year.

The board also agreed to continue in the Titles 1, 2 and 3, federal money allotments for such things as the library, visual aid and projectors.

It also voted to re-affiliate with the PESO (Panhandle Educational Service Organization) and the film rental program, which costs the district \$1301. Superintendent Alton Farr stated that the film rental plan had been used extensively by the schools, and found very helpful and worthwhile.

Superintendent Farr was authorized to secure bids for remodeling the old shop at Friona Junior High School, with the thought of adding two classrooms. Need for repairing the roof in that area was also discussed and included in his bid

requests. Tax assessor-collector Porter Roberts' contract was approved for the 1970-71 term.

Farr presented his reports on the activity, cafeteria, snack bar and transportation funds, and on the school budget.

LAKEVIEW PROJECT

Developer Anxious To Begin Construction

Jack M. Huddleston of Amarillo, spokesman for High Plains Development Corp., which plans to eventually build 102 homes in the new Lakeside Addition in Friona, said this week that the company is anxious to get started with their project.

"We are simply waiting for FHA to approve our first increment, and the minute we get that approval, we plan to begin work on the first five homes in the addition," Huddleston said.

He indicated that the first homes would range from \$13,000 to \$17,000, all with garages, and would be located on Etta Avenue. Huddleston said that in the initial phase of the project, the company planned to build some 35 homes on Etta Avenue, as that street would be developed toward the center of the property.

The property which has been brought into the city limits contains 102 lots. It will be split by two semi-circular streets, Etta and Springfield, and these streets will be bisected by another street, Northwest Drive.

Business people will be served coffee and doughnuts and given a tour of the newly redecorated library facilities.

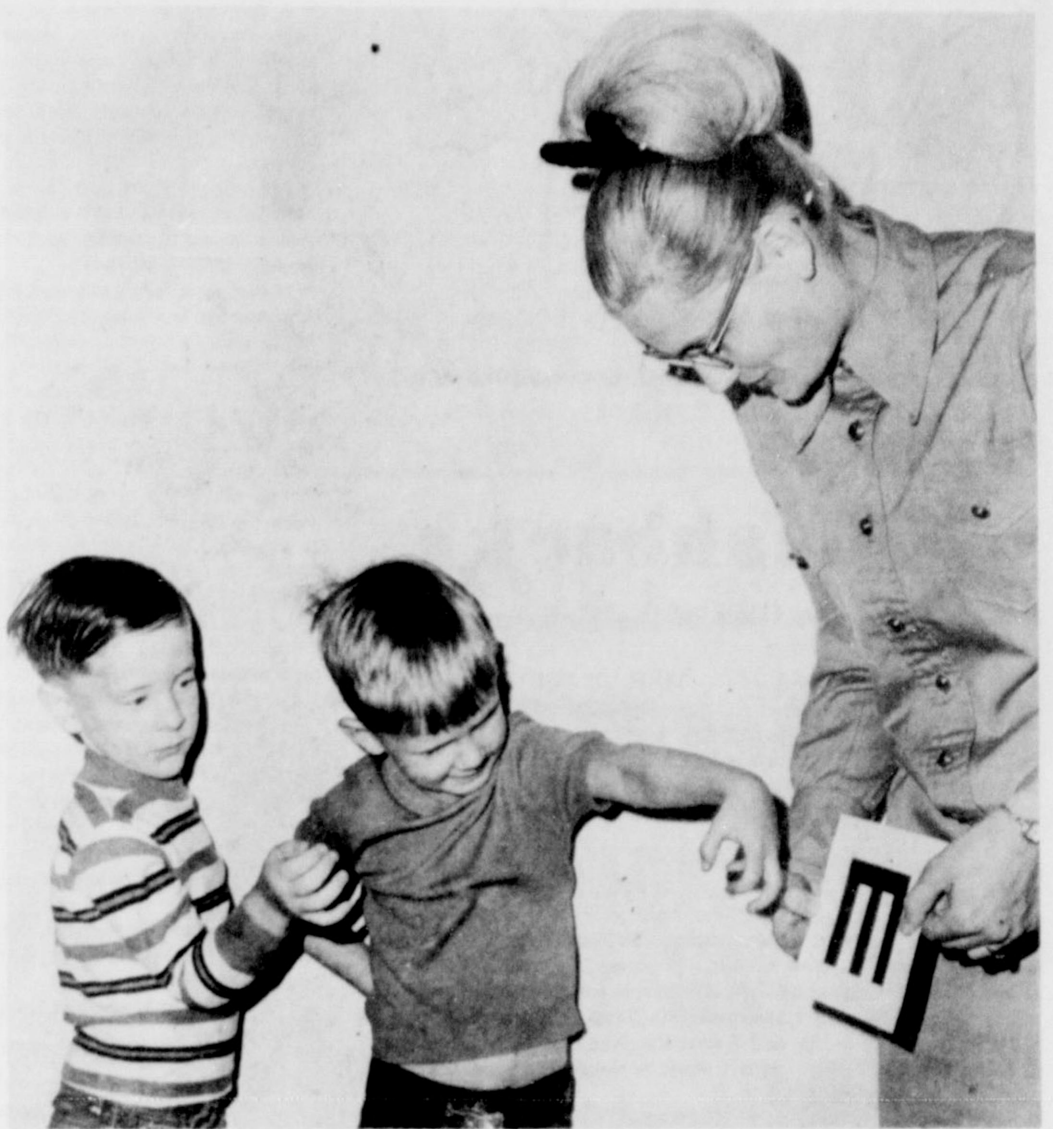
The morning coffee is sponsored by the library personnel and by the Friends of the Library organization.

Volunteers from the New Horizons Junior Study Club, trained by the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness, will check youngsters for signs of visual problems from 9:00 a.m.-11:00 a.m.

The "E" game an integral part of the screening procedure, is used to discover indications of visual faults in children who have not yet learned to read. The topsy-turvy table is actually the letter "E" that tops the usual eye chart. The "E" appears on the wall chart in diminishing sizes and rotating positions, with the "table legs" pointing in a different direction each time.

The child being screened indicates which direction the "legs" are pointing, thus permitting him to be checked even though he cannot read.

For the actual screening test, the child performs alone; however, to enable the youngsters

Pre-School Eye Test Slated On Saturday

Think an eye test can be fun? Not for older folks, perhaps, but preschool tots who learn the "E" game, complete with "Magic Shoes" and a topsy-turvy "Table," an eye test can be a happy adventure in growing up healthy.

Such fun will begin in Friona at a free vision screening program to be held on April 18, at the Friona Grade School Library.

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For the actual screening test, the child performs alone; however, to enable the youngsters

to learn the game and overcome any possible shyness, the preschoolers play it in a group first. The children sit in a semi-circle before a volunteer who displays the "E" symbol, and they move their arms up, down, right or left to correspond with the rotation of the "E" by the volunteer screener.

When the time for the individual test arrives, the "Magic Shoes" help to sustain the child's interest as well as aiding the accuracy of the Test. To obtain a precise check of the youngster's visual acuity, the chart must be read from a distance of 20-feet.

"We hope every preschool child in the Friona area will be brought in by his parents," Mrs. Jerry Hinkle, Chairman of the screening project said today. "A vision problem can be a tragic and needless handicap for the youngster going through school."

If a youngster's test performance gives evidence to the volunteer screener of a possible visual difficulty, the child is "referred." This means his parents are notified in writing of the need for the child to have a complete medical eye examination. Each referral is subsequently followed up to see if the youngster has had the necessary examination.

Patrol Investigates 11 Rural Wrecks In March

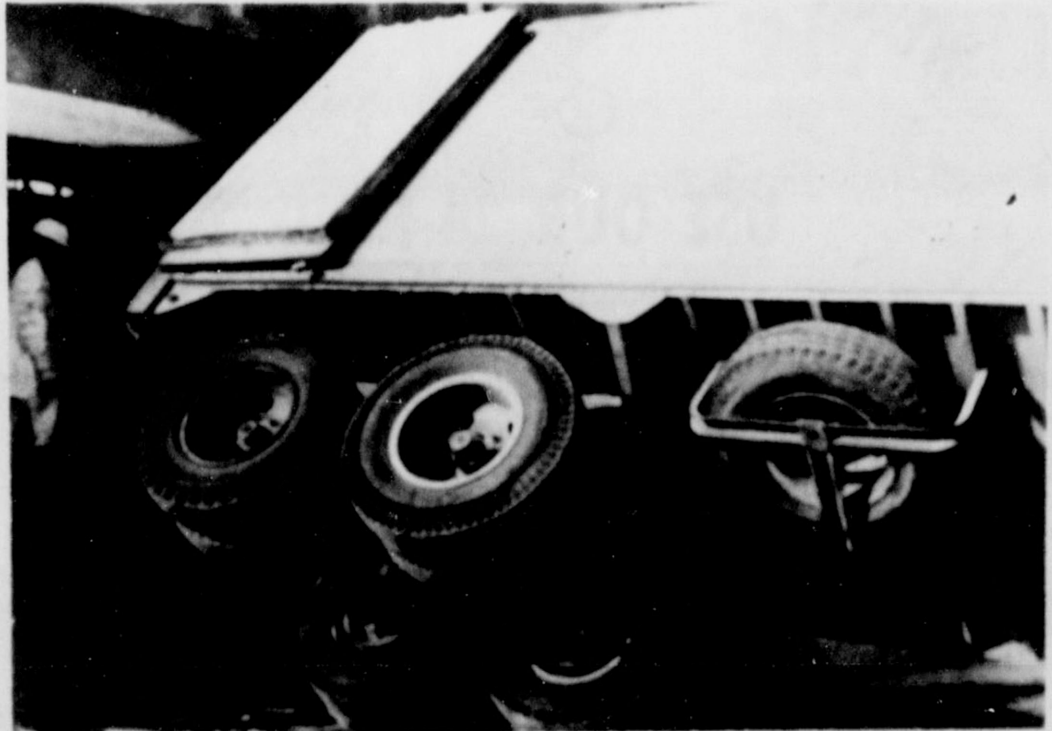
The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 11 accidents on rural highways in Parmer County during the month of March, according to Sergeant W.E. Wells, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in nine persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$5,835.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first three months of 1970 shows a total of 28 accidents resulting in no persons killed, 14 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$25,370.00.

The final entry in the 1969 Texas traffic records has been entered and closed. An all-time record of 3,551 persons killed, an estimated 223,000 suffered injuries.

Since the death count of 2,254 in 1960, Texas has gained steadily each year. The Sergeant stated, "If the number of deaths continue to increase as they have since 1960 by 1975 they will have increased 100 per cent."

40 YEARS AGO--APRIL 11, 1930

A deal was completed last week whereby E.V. Rushing transferred his grocery and dry goods store on Main Street to R.F. Fleet, until recently of Ada, Okla. This is the store originally established by J.G. Weir, now of Hereford. Mr. Weir selling to a Mr. Warren, who in turn sold to Mr. Rushing.

35 YEARS AGO--APRIL 12, 1935

Winners in the County Meet held in Friona last week for high school literary events were: Friona, first with 84 points; Oklahoma Lane, second, 49 points, followed by Bovina, Farwell and Lazbuddie. In the track events, Friona won in Class A, Oklahoma Lane won the Class B division, followed by Lazbuddie, Bovina and Farwell. Rhea was the winner in rural school division with Lakeview second in Literary, and Jesko second in track.

30 YEARS AGO--APRIL 12, 1940

There is considerable agitation in Friona asking the city commission to make laws prohibiting chickens from running at large in Friona; also to make regulations governing the cleanliness of houses and lots in which chickens and livestock are kept.

Hand bills are out announcing the formal opening of the Hatle Hardware for Saturday, April 13.

25 YEARS AGO--APRIL 13, 1945

President Roosevelt died shortly after 1 o'clock Thursday afternoon, according to radio broadcasts. He died at Warm Springs, Georgia. Early details were brief and no immediate comments were made by military authorities. Elected in 1932, Mr. Roosevelt has since served this country continuously as president. He will be succeeded by Vice President Truman.

20 YEARS AGO--APRIL 7, 1950

Is it a bird? Is it a flying saucer? No, it is Ray Landrum's answer to the gasoline tax. Establishing a first for the Panhandle and probably the nation, Landrum sailed (yes, sailed) his gasless motorless "Windmobile" ahead of Thursday's not-so-gentle breezes down Highway 60, right through Canyon, up the Amarillo hill and finally lighting and hitching just south of Amarillo--a motorless trip of some 72 miles at a speed drawing gasps and odd looks from the morning's travelers along route 60.

15 YEARS AGO--APRIL 8, 1955

Modern farming methods in Farmer County, with the self-guiding tractor, scientific fertilization of the soil, crop dusting via plane and helicopter, etc., were joined this week by another modern practice--the extensive use of ladybugs in dealing with the greenbug problem on young wheat. G.H. Whittaker, Woodrow Whittaker and Frank Zinzer are the pioneers in the project, distributing some 21 gallons of ladybugs over some 500 acres.

10 YEARS AGO--APRIL 7, 1960

Incumbents won their seats back in both the city and school elections last Saturday and Tuesday. D.C. Herring, up for re-election, was returned to the board of trustees of the Friona Independent School District, and W.M. Massie was also elected. In the city race, Mayor R.L. Fleming unopposed, was re-elected, and aldermen Glenn Reeve Sr. and Eddie McIl were elected for another term.

5 YEARS AGO--APRIL 8, 1965

The Friona City Council officially annexed 24.03 acres of school property at the new high school building site, and agreed to enter into contract with the school for paving adjacent to the property at its regular monthly meeting.

Pause And Reflect

On a recent evening I was one of eleven men who met to hear a tape recording of speeches made at a convention of subversives.

We heard only two hours out of a total of twenty that had been recorded.

It was an occasion to be appreciated, but not enjoyed in the usual sense of the word.

A few words of explanation concerning the convention will help clarify the alarm generated in the mind of this writer.

About 18 months ago 4000 people met in a California city to plan how best to coordinate their efforts toward the violent--yes, violent--overthrow of your government.

There were 300 different subversive organizations represented.

Did you realize that there exists that many clubs, etc. all bent on achieving your downfall?

How many thousands of members must they have if they can muster 4000 delegates?

The eleven men sat quietly as the narrator gave a brief run-down on the background of the various speakers to be presented.

Then the speeches began and as we listened a feeling of incredibility permeated our group.

This tone was not supposed to exist.

It had been made secretly and smuggled out for rerecording and distribution; therefore the speakers, having barred all news media from the meeting, did not hesitate to express themselves with reckless abandon where motives and methods were concerned, they also resorted to language that may not be repeated in a family newspaper.

For the most part the speeches were mercifully brief. After the first two or three outbursts one began to wonder if he was really hearing such rantings, or if perhaps he had drifted off to sleep and was in the throes of an unpleasant nightmare.

Surely these were not American citizens mouthing the words of that arch-Communist, Mao Tse Tung!

Is this young white woman, screaming vindictive oaths, really a student at one of our major universities?

A well known criminal lawyer, who later defended the Chicago Seven, advised the rag-tag mob of their constitutional right to collect arms to be used in open revolt!

A male student, whose diction and delivery evidenced training, took up the verbal cudgel.

As he rehearsed the old, worn, out, communist cliches one could not help but regret that his talents had not been put to better use.

The names of Marx and Lenin were used frequently, followed by applause.

Mao was praised and quoted freely.

The Black Panthers were well represented and their speakers were successful in upholding the horrid image they have worked to establish. This organization that J. Edgar Hoover, director of the F.B.I., claims as the greatest internal menace in the U.S.A.

The tape wound on and on, and a definite pattern began to emerge.

Speeches, repetitious phrases, obscenities, all fitted neatly into the tired old line that the ignorant have swallowed for years.

Whenever a speaker found himself bogged down in monotonous mediocrity he had only to shout--"Power to the People!"

Thunderous applause always followed.

Other popular phrases were "J. Edgar Hoover is the biggest 'Pig' in the world."

"Down with American Imperialism!"

"Down with American Fascism!"

In other words, "Down with America."

Don't fool yourself that these people are less than deadly serious.

They are demanding your life and the lives and liberties of all future generations of Americans.

They mean business and they have the guns, bombs, dope, money (our taxes to some extent) and brains to bring about the successful completion of their goals unless we the voting public demand immediate action on the part of Congress.

I don't mean setting up more and more communities, I mean tell the whole Congress that we are darned sick and tired of a bunch of rebels bluffing the entire country into submission.

We have the laws, the means, and jails enough to hold the whole mob, but we can't play politics and survive.

The time is NOW to forget whether you are a Democrat or a Republican and stand up and Fight for America--and I mean especially that small, but powerful, handful of Congressmen and Senators who by the powers of their egos have come to think of themselves as Gods!

"Power to the People?"

Right!

The people who work, pay taxes, and love our Nation enough to register and vote.

Alton Morris, Vice-Chairman of the Parmer County SWCD Board of Directors, presented awards to winners at the conclusion of the contest.

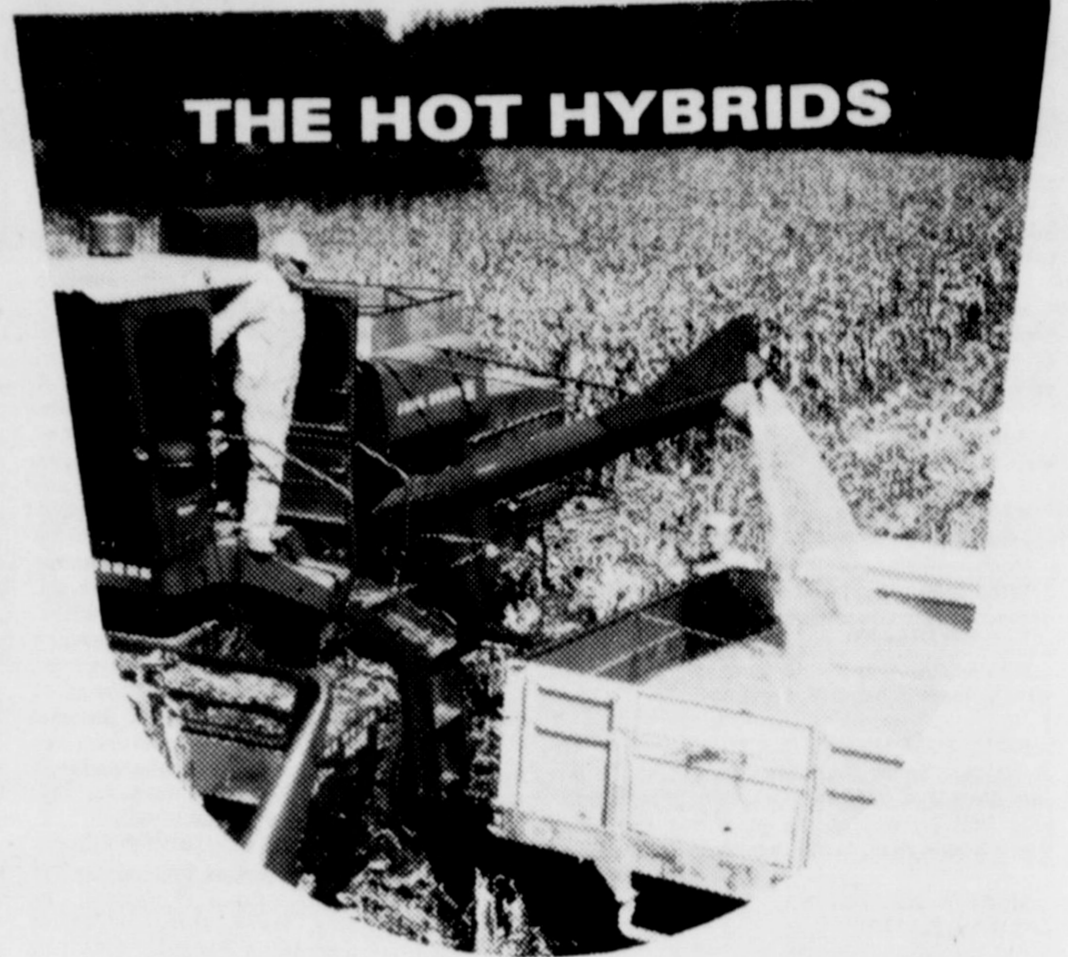

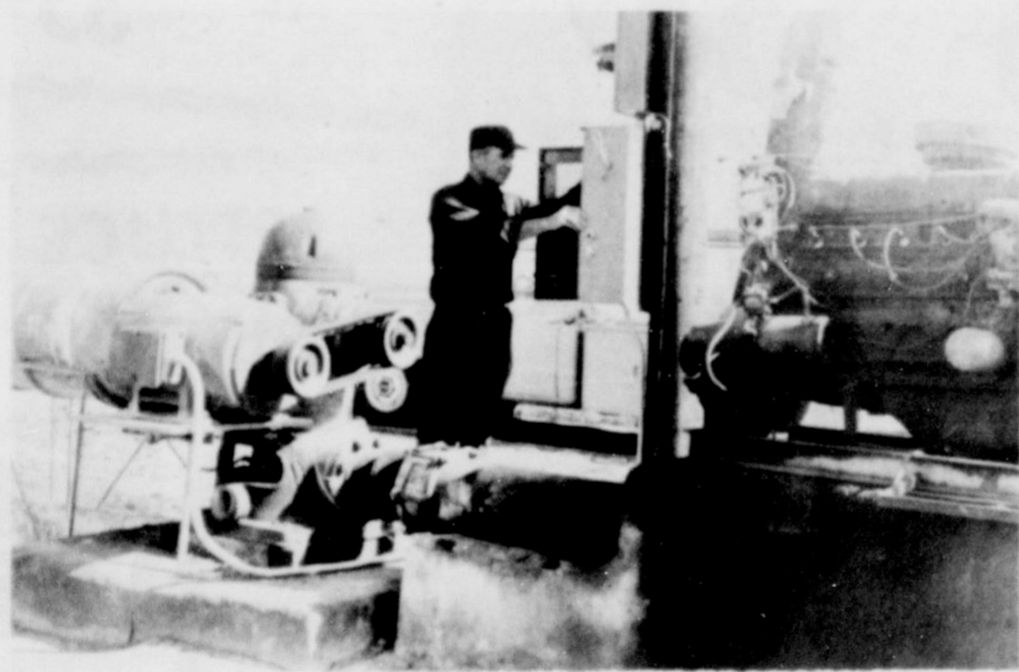

Friona Team Posts Two Wins In Tourney

Friona's Little Dribblers came back from the first annual National Little Dribblers tournament with two wins and no losses.

After dropping their first game to eventual champion Snyder, Friona battled back with a pair of wins to gain the semifinals in the double-elimination tournament, but having to play an early Saturday morning game after a late Friday night contest hurt the team in the semifinals against Brownfield.

In the team's opening game, Snyder won, 40-28. After a good first quarter, the team went cold on both offense and defense and could not regain their form. Inability to hit their free throws kept the team from making a comeback.

On Friday at 5 p.m., Friona met Andrews, and although winning, 18-11, had what coach Kenneth Neill termed "four poorest game of the four." Only redeeming factor was that Andrews had the same problem, only worse. The Dimmitt team had beaten Andrews by only six points in the opening round.

Coming back at 10:30 p.m. on Friday, the team edged Dimmitt, 32-30, in what Neill called

by far their best game of the tournament.

The team got behind, 16-8 in the second quarter, but came back to score seven straight points to trail by just one, 16-15 at the half. The team hit four for four free throws in the rally.

Going into the final quarter, the score was tied, 21-21. The team played its best quarter, in the last one. Mark Neill made two key steals in the final minute, and scored four points, which was the team's margin of victory.

Davy Carthel, in addition to leading all scorers with 14 points, was outstanding on defense, guarding two boys from Dimmitt who were both taller and heavier. Carthel hit eight of 10 from the foul line, and the team connected on 15 of 16 shots.

The game with Dimmitt ended about 12 midnight, and the team drove to Friona and then had to get up the next morning at 7 a.m. after only about five and one-half hours of sleep for the return trip.

The team got off to a horrible start against Brownfield, scoring only two points in the first quarter. But they fought back to almost pull the game out.

Friona was the last of the "small towns" to bow out in the National Division. The team scored 107 points, third highest of any team in the tournament.

Neill pointed out that he had a lot of comment and praise from other coaches and fans for the team's courage in coming back in both of their last two

games. "We were real pleased also, with the way the boys conducted themselves at the tournament," Neill said.

This was Friona's first year for an organized program for the fifth and sixth grades. Neill said he understood that Snyder has had a program for this age group for at least the last four or five years.

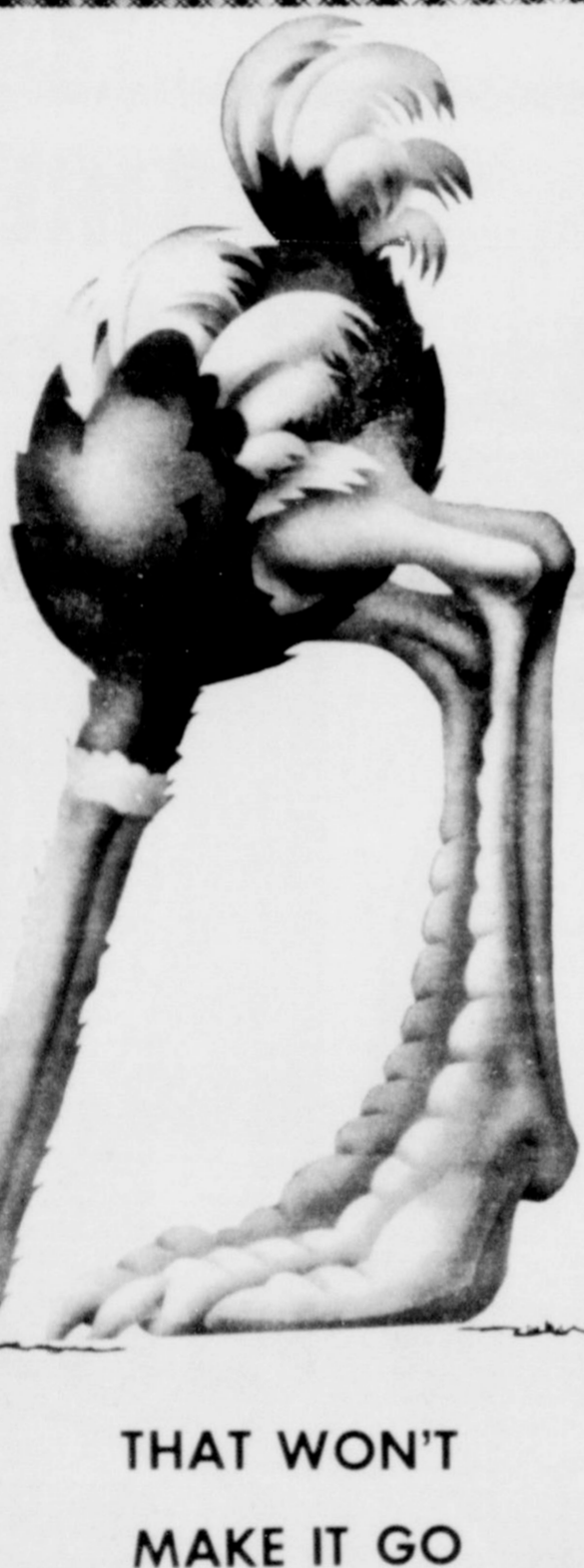

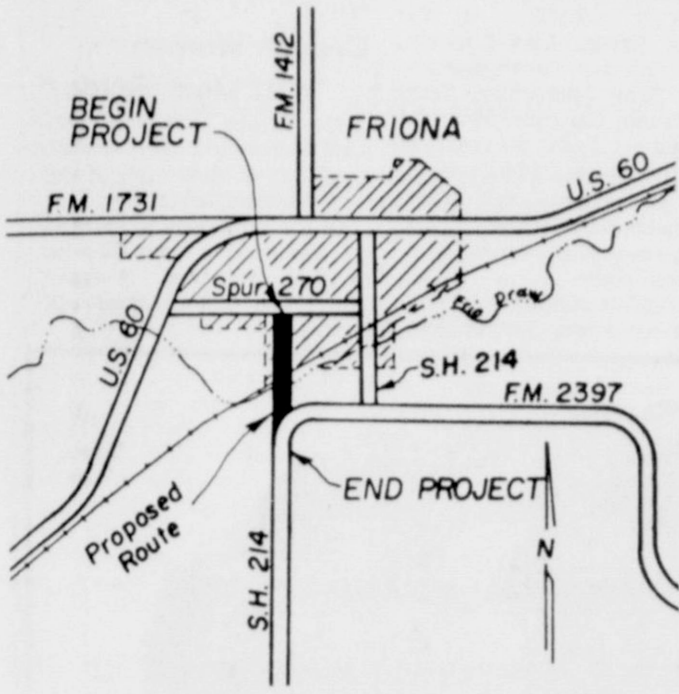

NOTICE AFFORDING OPPORTUNITY FOR PUBLIC HEARING CORRIDOR ROUTE

The Texas Highway Department is planning the construction of State Highway 214 from Spur 270 (Fifth Street) in Friona, South along Grand Avenue and across the A.T. & S.F. Railroad to present State Highway 214 curve. The proposed corridor route will pass into the City of Friona.

The proposed highway project contemplates the relocation and construction of a two-lane highway with paved shoulders and a bridge over Frio Draw and the A.T. & S.F. Railroad on sufficient right-of-way to provide connections to existing State Highway 214 and county road by the construction of an interchange.

Maps showing the proposed corridor route and any other available information about the proposed project are on file and available for inspection and copying at the Resident Engineer's Office at Littlefield, Texas. Also, maps have been placed on file with Parmer County and the City of Friona.

Information about the State's Relocation Assistance Program, the benefits and services for displacees and the relocation assistance office as well as information about the tentative schedules for acquisition of right of way and construction can be obtained at the Resident Engineer's Office.

Any interested citizen may request that a public hearing be held covering the social, economic and environmental effects of the proposed corridor route for the development of this highway project by delivering a written request to the Resident Engineer's Office, Box 868, Littlefield, Texas, 79339, before May 1, 1970.

In the event such a request is received, a public hearing will be scheduled and adequate notice will be publicized about the date and location of the hearing.

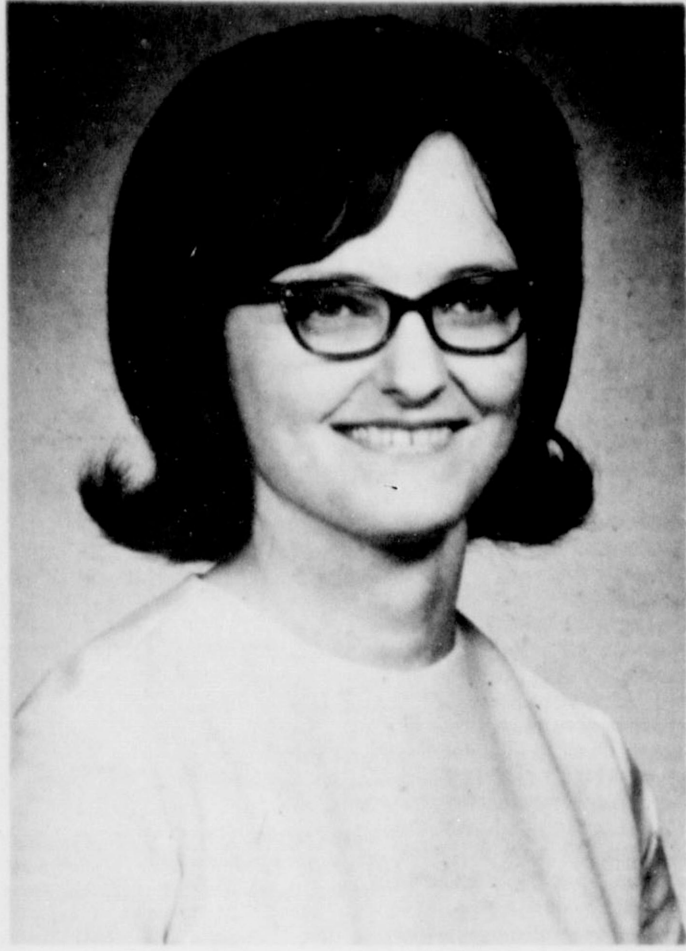

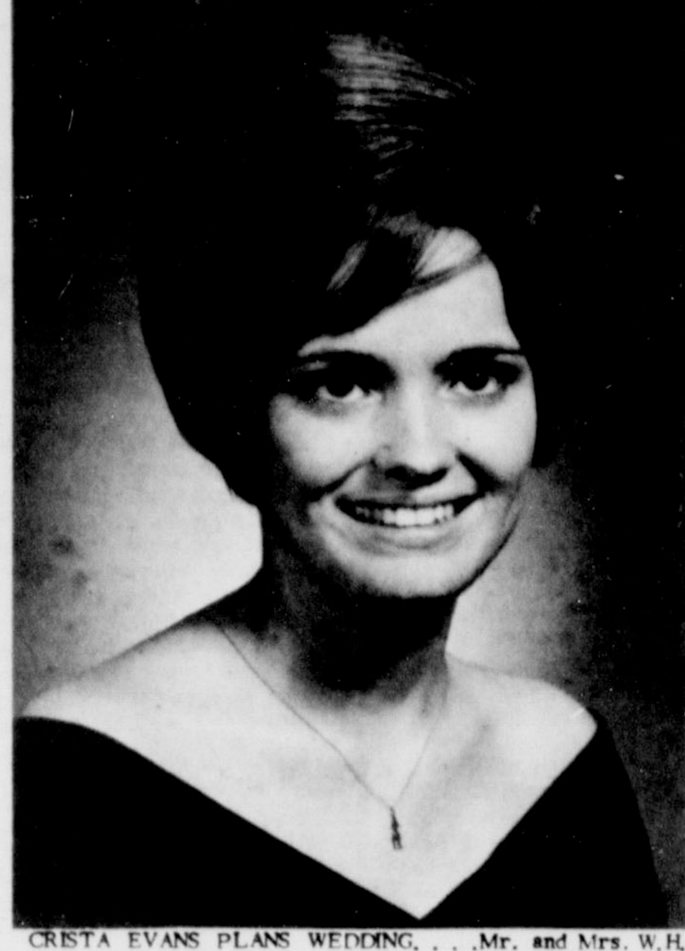

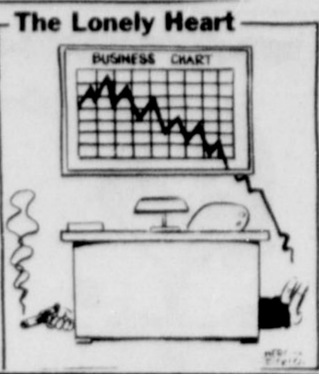

Spring flowers are beautiful all over town. Tulips have never been prettier. Personally, I prefer the bright orange red colors, but if you like some other color, all you have to do is drive around and look a little bit.

While you are driving around this time of year, remember to make a special effort to go out in the country in time to see the sun rise some morning real soon. Early Monday I was driving out in the Black Community. Near the road a large number of cattle could be seen grazing wheat and two brightly colored pheasant cocks occasionally stretched their necks high enough to see over the wheat.

The green of the wheat formed a perfect background for the red and white cattle and red, blue, green and yellow pheasant heads. Everyone ought to watch the sun rise in the wide open spaces as often as possible, even if it costs a few minutes of sleep you are accustomed to getting.

There's a lot of natural beauty to be observed in town, but then, right now there's a lot of unsightly man made detractions from the beauty of nature.

I had been thinking about some of the piles of junk, junked tires and other junky objects which should have been carted to the city dump months ago. Many of these need to be moved.

Until a news release from the Texas State Department of Health Monday I hadn't given these pieces of junk as health hazards. When you see water holding containers lying around, do you think of them as potential breeding places for mosquitoes, flies and other insects?

Even if you don't enjoy the following article, I'm hoping some of you will think about its contents then act upon your thoughts. Your effort will surely pay off several fold.

It goes like this:

"Extra bonus for prompt action on your part!
Yours absolutely free--well, almost free--a premise with no mosquitoes.

You can have this mosquito-free home and yard if you'll spend just a little of your time in a do-it-yourself vector control program, says the Texas State Department of Health.

In addition to eliminating mosquitoes, you also can free your premises of flies and rodents with a little extra precaution. The cost can be just a little effort on your part.

Spring is the time of year when mosquitoes start breeding. So take an inventory of your property. Walk around the outside of the house and take a good look. What do you see? Mosquitoes like to breed in the water that collects in sagging or stopped up gutters. Just a few minutes time on your part will eliminate this breeding site.

How many bottles, cans, tires, or other water-holding containers are partially hidden under the shrubs? These provide more breeding places for mosquitoes.

You may be surprised to know that most people grow the mosquitoes that bite them. Since most of the water-holding containers are valueless, again it is a simple matter to place them in the garbage pick up.

Should you have a container you want to keep, place it in a shed so it won't collect water.

Mosquitoes won't breed on your premise if you don't leave any water standing around. If there's a knothole in one of your trees, it can be plugged with cement mortar, roofing tar, or anything that will keep the water out.

If you have pets, develop a routine of washing the watering bowl a couple of times a week. And while you are at it, you should clean the birdbath the same number of times. This will also keep the growth of algae down and tend to do away with that ugly green, slimy look.

Since mosquitoes always develop in water, it would be well to stock your fish pond or lily pond with gambusia (top-water minnows) or goldfish. The fish will eat the wigglitails.

Anything you can do to eliminate mosquitoes will be to your advantage since the insects are a nuisance and can cause disease.
