
### New District Rich


Dr. W. S. Sutton, dean of the department of education, after an inspection of the school last year and shortly before it became recognized as a first class high school, stated that it was one of the best equipped schools that he had ever seen.

The high school is located near the district center of population. A truck is used to transport pupils who live in the far end of the district. All the pupils above the sixth grade go to the Central high school. The rural schools of the county have also shown a progressive step in that they have erected teachers' homes. There are now eleven teachers' homes in the rural schools of the county, five of which have been. built during the past two years.
