

MINERS AND OPERATORS HAVE SIGNED NEW WAGE CONTRACT BOTH ITALY AND GREECE ACCEPT PEACE TERMS PROPOSED OK AHOMA GOVERNOR FORBIDS ASSEMBLIES OF MASKED MEN

ANTHRACITE COAL STRIKE WILL END; REACH AGREEMENT

PROPOSED NEW CONTRACT TO COVER A PERIOD OF TWO YEARS MUST BE APPROVED BY SCALE COMMITTEE

Expected Men Will Be Back at Work in Mine September 19 or 20.

HARRISBURG, Pa., Sept. 8.—Representatives of anthracite operators and miners tonight agreed upon the terms of a proposed new two-year wage contract. The union scale committee immediately approved the agreement and fixed September 19 as the date for a tri-district convention at Scranton, at which it will be submitted for ratification by the miners.

The proposed new contract will cover a period of two years. The scale committee was called to meet immediately to approve it.

Union leaders said the tri-district convention probably would be called for September 17 in Scranton. The new contract, if the agreement is ratified by the convention, will be signed in Harrisburg, Governor Pinchot said the principals would return here for that purpose.

These four points included: a 10 per cent increase for all mine workers; establishment of the eight hour day; recognition of the union and of the principles of collective bargaining.

PEACE PROPOSAL OF COUNCIL IS APPROVED BY ITALY AND GREECE

ROME, Sept. 8.—Italy accepts the terms of the council of ambassadors and agrees to evacuate Corfu and adjacent islands when Greece has evacuated all of Italy's demands for reparations.

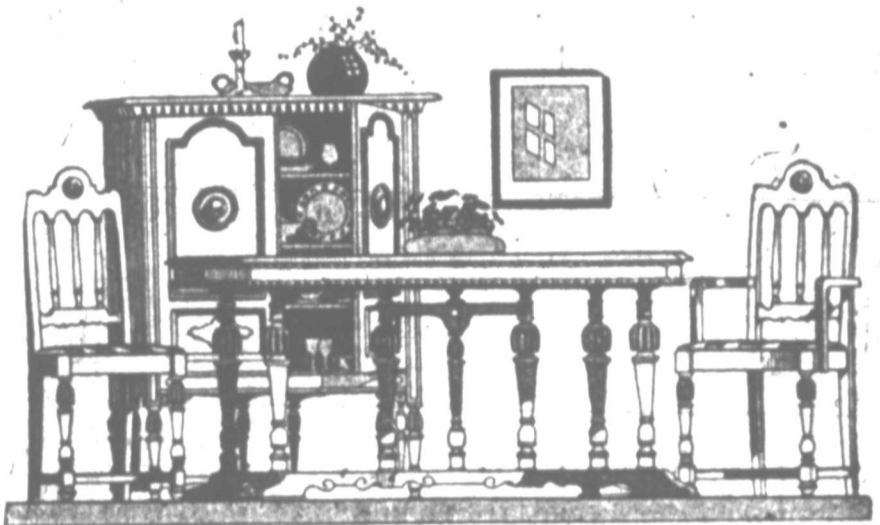

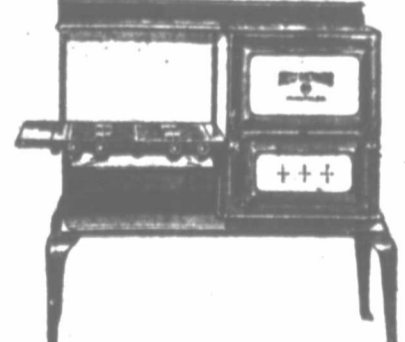

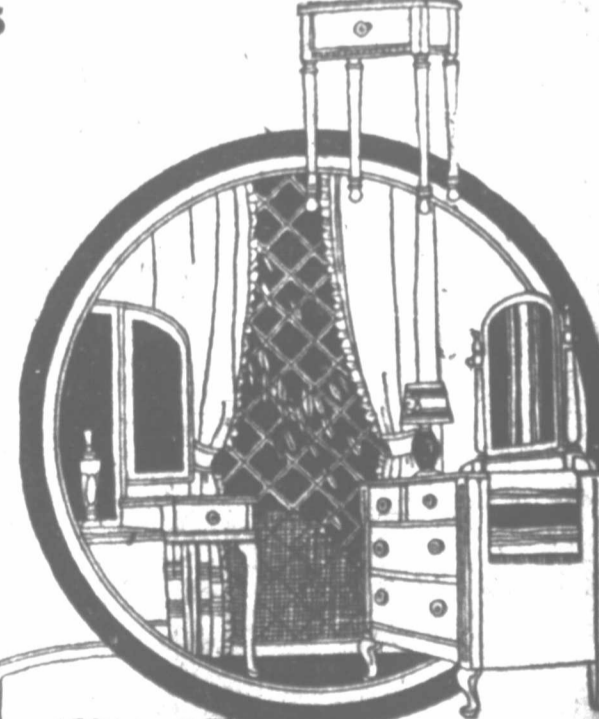

# FIFTY THOUSAND NEW FARMS FOR THE PEOPLE OF ESTHONIA

## Carpenter Tells How New Republic Gives Peasants Estates Formerly Owned by Nobility of That Country

Visits the Confiscated Mansions and Talks With the Pioneer Farmers—Millions of Acres Going Into the Hands of the People—A Chat With the Premier—Will Esthonia Last? The Baltic Republics as Poisoned Oysters—Can They Combine?—The Russian Humpty Dumpty.

REVAL.—I have just returned from a motor car ride through northern Esthonia. My car was a Minerva, a Belgian limousine, furnished by the minister of agriculture, and some of the leading officials of that department went along to show me the big estates which the government has taken from the Baltic Barons and divided out among the peasants. This little republic half as big as the state of New York, with a population equal to that of Kansas, has for more than six hundred years been controlled by big land-owners. It has been owned by the descendants of the German knights who conquered the country during the middle ages, enslaving the peasants and taking those farms. As time went on the people got some land and more and more freedom, but when the Russian revolution occurred, more than sixty per cent of the territory still belonged to the descendants of the German Crusaders and eleven hundred of them owned about 1,000,000 acres. Each had a large holding, the average being about five thousand acres. The rest of the land was held by small farmers, who had on the average about eighty acres each, and in addition there were hundreds of thousands who had no land at all. They worked on the big estates and on others owned by the churches and the towns, and by the Bank of Agriculture and the Crown.

Why the Division was Made  
The division of the estates was demanded by the people. For hundreds of years they have been oppressed by the German Balts who were their masters under the Russians. When the revolution occurred, in order to get the people to fight for their independence, the Esthonian revolutionists promised that the land should be taken away from the nobles and divided among the peasants. They were forced to do this not only by the popular outcry but from the fact that the Bolshevik army which was fighting the revolutionaries had sent out proclamations that every Esthonian who came to its support should have a farm of his own. The cry of the rebels was that they were fighting for their own lands, and the government has carried out its promise in taking over the estates and apportioning them among the people.

Esthonian Farmers  
As a result, Esthonia is practically a new country, held by new owners, and with tens of thousands of small farmers scattered over the great estates of the past. I might call it a pioneer country, for the farms are now in small holdings of 125 acres or so, some smaller, some larger, and every man has to care in his allotment and build a log cabin, or shack, or some other home in which to live.  
50,000 New Farms Created  
The old buildings on the estates have been taken over and some of the large brick barns are now occupied by the land holders awaiting the time when they can build individual barns of their own. In most cases a small tract of land has been left to the former rich owner and this often contains the mansion where he lived like a prince, entertaining his friends.  
In thinking of Esthonia as a pioneer country, however, one must dismiss all ideas of our pioneer days. America was virgin and covered with forests. It was an unbroken wilderness, without any of the so-called improvements. Esthonia, under the Balts, was better farmed than any other part of the Russian Empire. The Barons was rich and they had the German thrift for which their country over the way are so noted. They drained their lands and rotated the crops, using fertilizers of every description. They farmed with the best of agricultural machinery, and not a few had factories

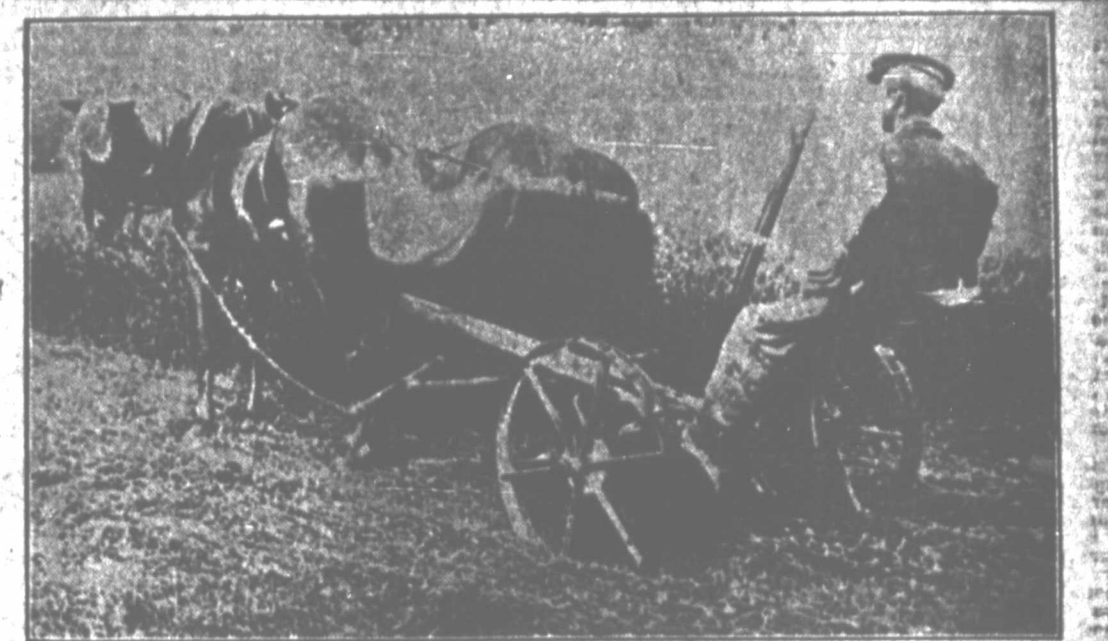
and distilleries. Some were stock farmers, and others had dairies. Some raised grain, and in the northern part of the country potatoes were so much grown that even now Esthonia is called the "potato republic." The tubers grow here as easily as in Ireland and Maine, and are produced in vast quantities for the making of alcohol. Every farm has its distillery, and in normal times the country yields so much alcohol that it could give a quart and a half to every man, woman and child and have some to spare.  
Over the Land by Motor Car  
But let me describe my trip through the country. We left Reval on a macadamized roadway and for much of the time our speed was thirty or more miles per hour. This does not seem fast at home, but in this land of few automobiles, it means a great deal. We were on one of the chief highways, and scores of peasant women were coming into Reval to market, driving single and double teams harnessed to the boat-like wagons which are the typical farm vehicles of the country. The horses all had great yokes above them, and they were harnessed by tugs to the front axles and the hubs of the wheels. The vehicles were so stiff that they could not move quickly out of gear, and every horse was frightened by the gasoline fumes rushing towards him. In many places they drove out into the fields to allow

us to pass, and some of the women drivers got down and wrapped their shawls over the heads of the horses to keep them quiet, as we went by. Now and then a shaft snapped as a horse whirled at sight of our car, and milk-women driving colts left the road and went with their carts into the plowed land adjoining.

The Farm of a Vint  
About ten miles from the city we stopped at the farm of a vint or small landholder, one of the fifty thousand mentioned above. This man had eighty acres of land, and was well cultivated. His house was a cottage of six or eight rooms, built of stone and roofed with straw thatch. Above the straw rose the chimneys, made also of stone but painted snow white. This is so of all the chimneys in city and country. It is said that the white plaster saves the chimneys and makes them last longer. There were also a small barn of stone and sheds all roofed the same way.

Introduced by the officials of the agricultural department, I entered the house. Three of its six rooms were floored with stone and the other three with rough boards. The stoves were of stone, each running from the floor to the ceiling, and the furniture meagre. One room was given up to the children for a nursery, and I noticed an old-fashioned cradle with a baby therein. The farmer's wife brought the baby outside and we photographed it.  
The soil of this farm was comparatively poor. Near Reval the country consists of chalk-like rock built up in this strata as regularly as if laid by a mason. Much of the rock is good building material. Farther back from the sea the soil improves. There is good pasture and the land grows large crops of potatoes and grain. This farmer seemed to be content and he was sanguine as to his future.

On a Divided Estate  
About twenty miles farther on we left the main road and entered one of the great estates which are now being divided. It contained about six thousand acres, much of it in very large fields surrounding a mansion where the owner lived in about the same style as our rich Southern planters of slavery days. The man, as a Baltic baron who had cast in his lot with the Germans during the war and for that reason was considered a traitor and the estate was confiscated. The house was magnificent. Enclosing it were beautiful grounds laid out with a view to landscape effect. It had gardens and orchards and extensive lawns. It is now used as a hotel office for the country about, and the postmaster took me over it, upstairs and down. There were perhaps a dozen large rooms well fitted for entertaining, and a wide entrance hall from which a carved staircase led by easy flights to the floor overhead. Most of the heating was by porcelain stoves. The floors were of hard wood and I could

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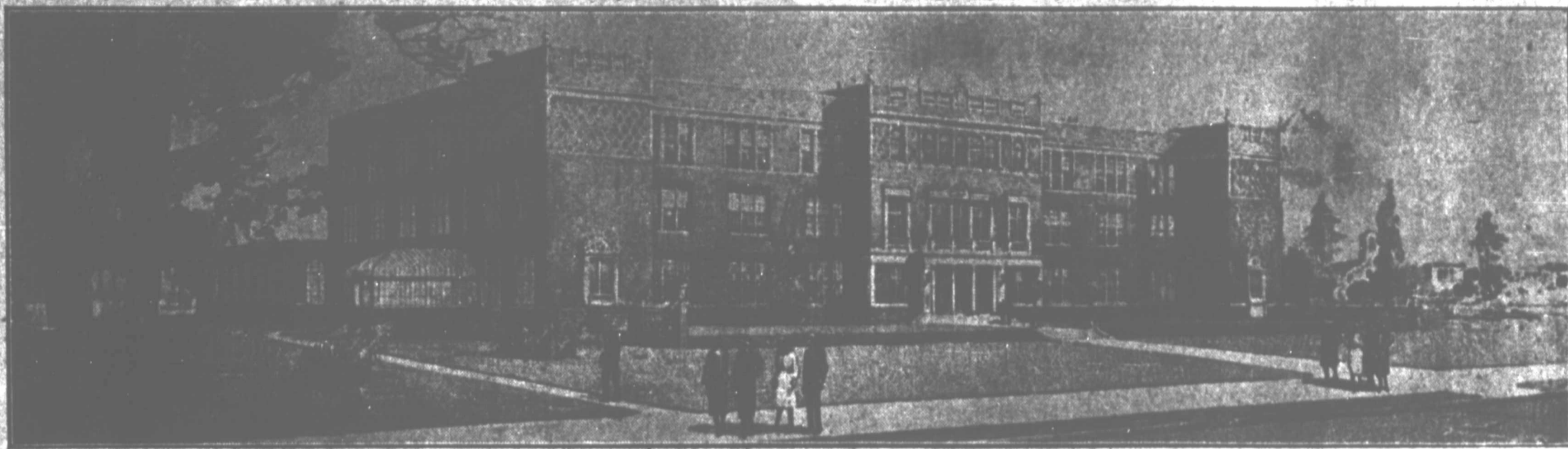

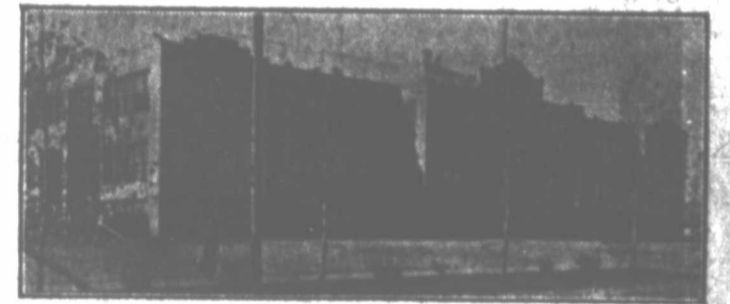

Within the past eighteen months, Wichita Falls has voted approximately a million and a half dollars worth of bonds to provide adequate, suitable and modern school buildings for its future citizens and voters.

Within the past 18 months, the various independent school districts of the county and the rural school

districts have expended nearly two millions of dollars in the enlargement and betterment of their school systems.

Electra, Burk Burnett, Iowa Park and Fairview, the other four independent school districts, can now boast of some of the most beautiful and modern school buildings in the state.

The Fairview school district until last spring was a rural school district, but it became classified as an independent district at that time and besides being the youngest independent district in the county stands out prominently as one of the biggest strides of advancement in the school history of Wichita County.

### New District Rich

This district is located in one of the richest oil fields of Texas and has a taxable value of approximately \$12,000,000. With the balance which was left in the treasury a year ago, new brick buildings were erected, including a high school which has now been classified as a first class high school and will be recognized by the colleges of the state as such.

Dr. W. E. Sutton, dean of the department of education, after an inspection of the school last year and shortly before it became recognized as a first class high school, stated that it was one of the best equipped schools that he had ever seen.

The high school is located near the district center of population. A truck is used to transport pupils who live in the far end of the district. All the pupils above the sixth grade go to the Central high school. The rural schools of the county have also shown a progressive step in that they have erected teachers' homes. There are now eleven teachers' homes in the rural schools of the county, five of which have been built during the past two years.

During the past 18 months the rural schools of the county have expended over \$65,000 in improvements on buildings, while several districts have erected new buildings entirely.



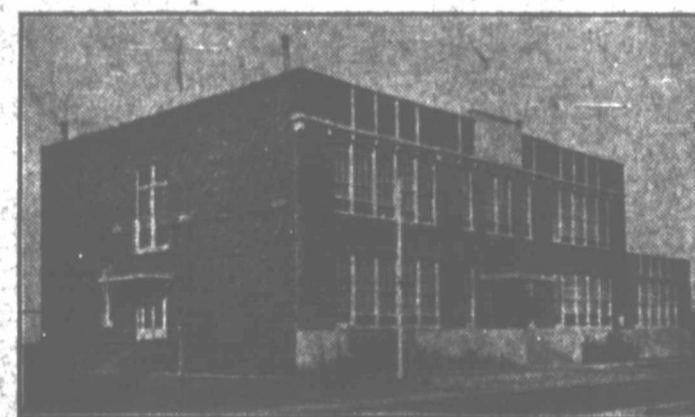

### CHEVROLET CO. GIVES ADVICE FOR CARE OF CAR

**From The Chevrolet Review.**

**Regularly Every 200 Miles with Oil.**

Once every 200 miles the bearings of the generator should be lubricated with a few drops of good machine oil through the oiler provided. Be very careful not to use too much oil, as it will get on the brushes in the bearings, and cause them to wear.

Do not use any strainers, get oil or grease on the brushes, or get a wad of cotton in the oiler.

A drop of oil occasionally on the door latches and door hinges will prevent "sticking" the door.

**Careful of the Storage Battery.**

The storage battery is the heart of the electric system and its life depends on the care it receives and the kind of service demanded from it.

The owner of a new car should go to the nearest authorized battery service station and have the battery recharged and tested. A full charge of the 40-day insurance policy. Be sure to keep all cells filled with distilled water to a level one-half inch above the top of the plates.

Unless you are doing an unusual amount of daytime driving and but little nighttime driving, you need not fear that your battery will overcharge. Many owners allow their lights to burn when driving during the day with the idea of preventing an overcharged battery. This is not practical or necessary, except where long continued, high-speed driving is necessary.

**General Suggestions.**

Do not attempt to adjust your carburetor or ignition system, unless you are thoroughly familiar with the mechanism—take your car to a service station.

Be sure that your brakes are adjusted properly and that they are equalized. Be sure that they are equalized by stopping suddenly on the pavement. If they are not equalized, you will see a black line on the pavement behind one wheel or the other, indicating that it is being allowed to slide, whereas the other wheel stopped at once because the brake was working properly.

Your radiator should always be full of trouble is sure to follow. It is a good plan to form the habit of inspecting and filling the radiator before the car is taken from the garage. On long hours, especially when you have been traveling over hilly roads or those with a loose top surface, examine the water supply quite frequently. Consider, almost as important as your supply of gasoline and oil.

Always use clean water and never put cold water into an empty radiator while the motor is hot. By hot we mean any temperature which is uncomfortable to the hand when held against the cylinder head.

After reading these admonitions, the average motor owner will say, "It takes all the joy out of life." Not so—we are trying to put joy into it, for if these few suggestions are followed, your motor, battery, etc., maximum service and enjoyment will be secured from the car.

**CADILLAC MOTORS NEW ENGINEERING PRINCIPLE SOON**

### Department of Commerce Reports On Automotive Conditions Various Foreign Countries Both Continents

**American Cars Exports to Heavy Tax.**

The market for foreign motor cars, especially in Europe, is far from good, according to Consul General J. M. Brington. American cars which must compete with the great quantities of "American" motor vehicles under their own labels, and heavier tax than the high speed cars, with automobile makers. The import duty is also prohibitive. Mr. Brington states in a report to the department of commerce.

Accessories will find a fair market at Mr. Brington continued, provided they are intelligently presented. Italian cars are of excellent workmanship but their accessories line leaves much to be desired both as to quality and selection.

There have been wide queries throughout the country, any intelligently presented. In the course of his address he stated: "Motor car development is just at the beginning. The members of the industry most prominent during the next five years will be those making the most fundamental advances. Many designs have been made under the pressure of great commercial demands, and with the complete, which has been placed upon production, some decisions of automotive engineers which, under these conditions, have stood as accepted facts for eight or nine years have been proved erroneous by laboratory research; and during the next five years, engineers will profit by the latest scientific discoveries to a degree that would be unbelievable to the average layman."

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The Dewar trophy, awarded each year by the Royal Automobile Club of England for the most significant motor car development of the year, was won in 1922 by Cadillac cars, as the first to develop a high degree of standardization. That is, they were cars in which, because of accurate machining, all parts are exact duplicates of the other parts of the same kind, and can be used interchangeably without fitting. In 1923 the Cadillac car again won the Dewar trophy for best general performance.

The Cadillac car is the only American car which has ever won the Dewar trophy, and the only car in the world to win it twice.

The Cadillac organization was the first to introduce V-type eight-cylinder automobile engines in United States. Others of its pioneering achievements have been that it was first to discard magnets and adopt Delco, a most dependable system of ignition; first to introduce a complete electrical system of starting, lighting and ignition; first to develop and incorporate thermostatic control of circulating cooling medium; and first to incorporate thermostatic control of carburetion.

The Cadillac Company will first market a quality car manufactured upon a quantity basis, and more than 100,000 of its V-type, eight-cylinder cars are now in operation, many of them having entered their tenth year of service.

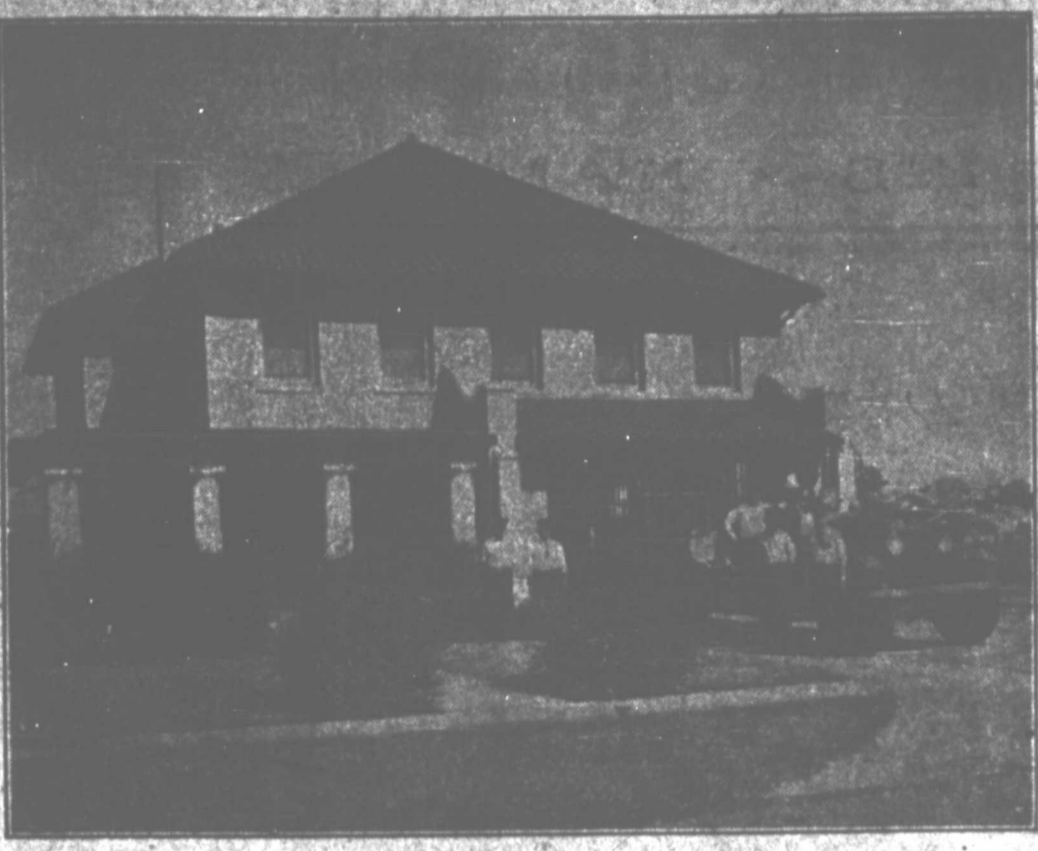

**FIRE FIGHTING EQUIPMENT OF WICHITA FALLS IS JUST CAUSE OF PRIDE TO ALL CITIZENS**

The station is the new and best equipped in the city, having been completed in the spring of 1931 at an approximate cost of \$6,000.

The splendidly equipped station on Buchanan street represents only a small part of an investment of over \$115,524.56, which is used daily in the protection of the city's homes and property. It is one of the best stations which house the firemen who guard the city night and day against the ravages of fire. Buchanan street station is closely allied in amount of investment of equipment by Central station of the city hall, the original and best station in the city. No. 1 station on Seventh street, and No. 3 at Holliday, not including an estimate on Central station, totals \$1,155,524.56. The entire fire department is valued at approximately \$2,900,000.

**Pumping Equipment.**  
Aside from the Stutz pumper shown in the picture, the station is equipped with one Seagraves pump, one White pumper, two twin combination engines, one American La France truck, one White commercial truck, a chief's car and a special model Ford for an assistant chief. About 1,000 feet of hose is in use at the different stations.

Included in the list of equipment made from the fire fighting apparatus is the Gemwell alarm system, valued at \$22,764.56. The system is made up of 115 fire alarm boxes at convenient street intersections in the city, which when pulled turn on the location of the fire at Central station where it is relayed to the other three stations, the electric company and newspaper offices.

While not listed as fire equipment, the water department maintains at convenient points over the city approximately 150 fire plugs, which may be reached by hose from practically any point in the city, all except a few of the outlying sections of the city and the newer additions are now accessible to the plugs. Additional plugs are being installed as fast as the funds of the water department will permit. The plugs are being installed at an expenditure of \$125 each.

**Fire Losses Low.**  
With the present force and equipment fire losses in the city have been kept to a comparatively low figure; the record for the first six months of 1933 has been exceptionally gratifying to members of the department and city officials. It is believed that a new reputation for low fire records will be established this year if losses for the remainder of the year are kept to the figure of the previous months.

The record has been maintained with a crew of men much smaller than that specified by the state department and that of other cities of similar size in the state.

With a purpose of gradually improving the protection and lowering the amount of fire losses in the city, the department is making improvements and additions as fast as funds will allow. A close check on public buildings, fire basements, and the constant care of equipment is largely responsible for the success of the department and for the small amount of fire losses.

At present there is some agitation for the building of a new fire station in the city. While no definite steps have been taken, the matter has been called to the attention of the city council and it is expected that the next year's budget will make provision for the erection of a modern and well equipped station in Floral Heights addition. An exact location has not been selected and no definite plans made but interest is being stimulated and some outlining is being done for a site which would furnish the best protection.

**Five-Million Dollar Drive is Discussed by Lutheran Conference**

The Lutheran conference assembled at St. Paul's Lutheran church here Monday morning discussed ways and means by which they might secure a million dollar drive. This sum is appropriated by the general board last summer at the national convention in Fort Worth, Ind.

Over \$1,000,000 of this appropriation is to go toward building a new theological seminary in St. Louis.

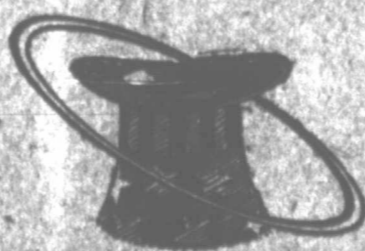

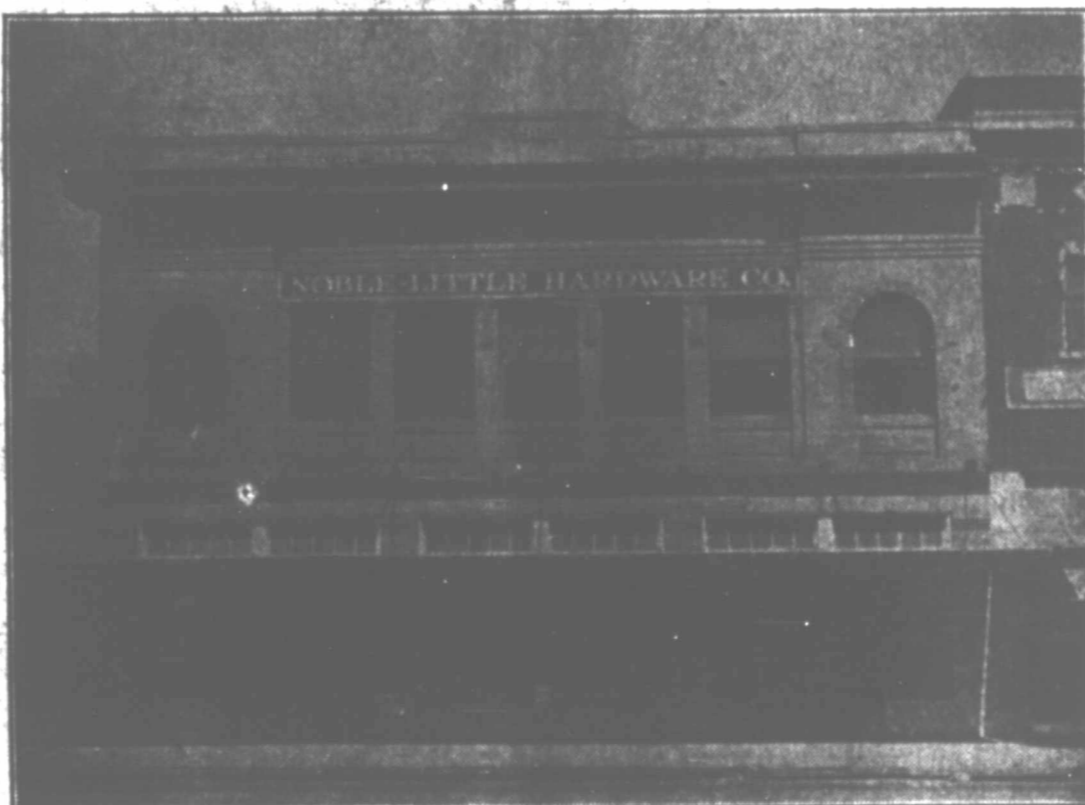

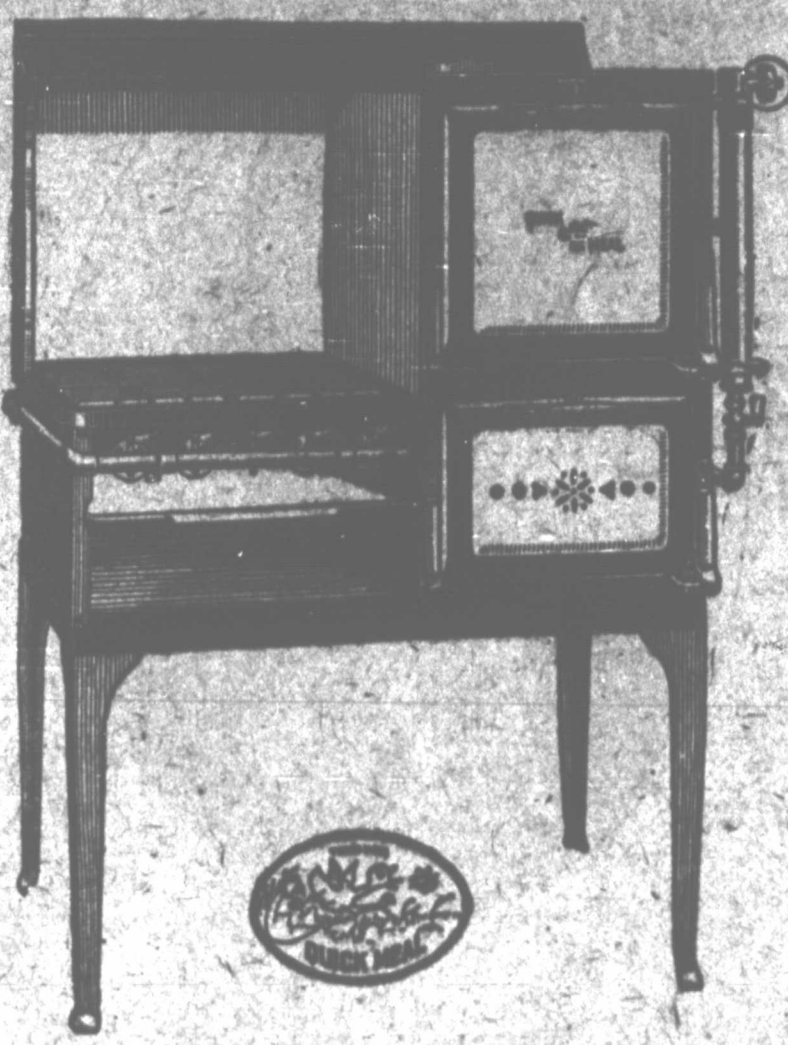

# MOST FORMIDABLE DEMOCRAT ORGANIZATION FOR McADOO

## Notwithstanding Work of Friends Not Expected to Reach Convention With More Than 400 or 450 Votes

The most formidable organization working for the Democratic presidential nomination is the one behind McAdoo. It is not the one that comes to the convention with more than a maximum of 400 to 450 out of the total of 1,000 delegates. With that large proportion, if the McAdoo candidate were within the Republican party he would be almost assured of winning. But the important difference between the Republican rule and the Democratic rule is that, whereas in a Republican convention a majority is sufficient to nominate, in the Democratic convention, on the other hand, it requires two-thirds. And two-thirds is a proportion extremely difficult to achieve even by the most diligent organization.

Under the rule of the Republican party, the policy would be for McAdoo's friends to avoid trying to get the nomination. If McAdoo can go through the preliminary campaign in the various states without causing friction with Ford's ends, McAdoo might then be in a position to be the beneficiary of Ford's strength in the convention after Ford has been eliminated.

There is much that makes this thing possible. The advocates of Ford and the advocates of McAdoo prefer the same kind of people. They belong in that immense area which is not conservative in the strict-patter sense, but in the same time is also distinct from the radical fringe. The people of those who would like to have the same feeling about the things which McAdoo would do if he were elected, and the hopes of those who have the same feeling about the things which Ford would do if he were elected, are largely identical. In the instances it would seem easily possible for Ford and McAdoo to get on their feet in the same way without friction. But this is the case of those political theories which look well on paper but which are difficult to carry out in practice. Inevitably in several states the primaries occur there will be a fight between Ford delegates and McAdoo delegates. Such a fight is almost impossible to carry in local districts without developing personal antagonisms. Presently the rule is for such antagonisms to go to such length that the fight between the two delegates, having had their feelings stirred up, are more opposed to do what would hinder the other than to help the other. And yet, if it were among the McAdoo delegates a man of sufficient highest intelligence to arrive at some kind of understanding between the Ford delegates and the McAdoo delegates, it would constitute the most important single element to McAdoo's success. It is the understanding of such intangible factors as this and the ability to con-

Repealing national committee that would nominate for personal ends. There are no politicians close to Ford. You can search all Washington and all the Republican national committees without finding one politician or one man in public life who has to do with the sort of relation that Daugherty had to Harding. His one intimate friend, Franklin D. Roosevelt, is not a politician. If Mr. Stearns knew any politician at all he has picked it up from Coolidge. Stearns' opinion of Coolidge is less a political relation than a benevolent, almost fatherly, one.

There are many Republican politicians who think that Coolidge's nomination is inevitable or who regard it as desirable. Assuming that he makes no mistake, but that he will be nominated because it will help them personally.

It is the fact that Coolidge has no individual political opinions or political friends, so also is he without obligations to any politician. There was only one man in public life who had the sort of relation to Coolidge that might create obligations on Coolidge's part. That man is now dead. He was former Senator Murray Crane, of Massachusetts. When Coolidge was a young man in Massachusetts politics Crane was an experienced one. Crane picked Coolidge as a winner and in many ways pushed him along. Crane's death there is no man in politics, either in Massachusetts or throughout the country, who has the feeling that Coolidge is under obligations to him or the feeling that his word ought to go for anything with Coolidge than that of any one else.

If Coolidge, or Coolidge's advocates, should survey the situation with the desire of doing everything possible to make his nomination secure they would inevitably focus their thoughts on the Western farmer. Everybody knows that at the time of Harding's death there was widespread insurgency in the Republican party. The body of that insurgency was in the farming west. The farmers had come without any justification to think that Harding was identified with what they regarded as the city classes who exploit them. It was not true at all. Harding, because of things he did during the railway strike a year ago and for other reasons, was fully as much out of favor with what is called Wall Street as he was with the farmer.

This insurgency among the Republican farming states still exists. Out of a sense of fairness it refrains from expressing open suspicion of Coolidge. But Coolidge is under close scrutiny from the farmers, nevertheless. The farmers think of themselves as having economic interests antagonistic to those of the manufacturers in the east. In this conflict they insist that whoever is not for them is against them. For the moment they tend to think Coolidge may be with them. They base this on that dramatic picture in which Coolidge took the oath of office in his father's Vermont farmhouse; on the simplicity of Coolidge's life, and on the fact that he is known to be poor. But nevertheless there is among the farmers a wish to make sure that Coolidge does not belong to what the farm-

stronger than Harding's because the former started with a clean slate. Harding was under the handicap of all the liabilities that had accrued to his party in the last year.

Of course, "making good" to the extent of winning the subsequent elections are quite different things. It is quite possible that they may put forward Harding's proposition that the Democratic party should have their only affirmative attitude in regard to Europe.

One of two things is certain. Either Congress, during the early months of its coming session, will take such drastic action for the restriction of immigration as will make the country, or, in the last of that, the platform of both political parties next year will call for this drastic action.

Not only in the bulk of the immigration coming in by ordinary channels unsatisfactory. In addition, there is a large amount of "bootlegging" immigration which the American people, if they knew about it, would keep out as rigidly as they would keep out an epidemic.

Everybody expects that foreign relations in one form or another will be an issue in next year's presidential election. But the present writer, although he has talked

with scores of political leaders in the past few days, has found no one who would be able to forecast what the foreign relations issue will be in the next year's election.

With the Democrats, as things stand today, the situation is not much better. There are many Democrats who keep their faith in the League of Nations. But there is hardly any Democrat, thinking in terms of winning the election next year, who would favor going back to the League of Nations.

All of this is of the situation today. By a year from now the whole European situation may have been changed in such a way as to present new issues. In one conceivable turn of events, if the present attempts to settle the Ruhr situation and its reparations should succeed, all Europe might leap forward in an industrial activity which would reflect itself in America.

To speak in terms of the European situation next year is to come close to the question of what American business conditions are going to be a year from now.
