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GERMANY PREPARED TO ENLIST INDUSTRY IF RUHR RESTORED

CONDITIONED ALSO ON RECOVERY OF CERTAIN RIGHTS IN RHINELAND
WILL SOLVE ISSUE OF PASSIVE RESISTANCE
Willing to Pledge Private Property, Industry, Commerce, Finance and Agriculture.

BERLIN, Sept. 12. (AP)—Germany is prepared to enlist private property, industry, commerce, finance and agriculture as a pledge for the payment of her reparations obligations, if she is assured that the Ruhr and Rhineland will be restored, said Chancellor Stresemann in his address to the German editors yesterday.

"These guarantees," he said, "are capable of solving the question of passive resistance, provided assistance is given us that on the basis of such an understanding the Ruhr will be evacuated and the Rhine restored to its former rights."

Proposing an international trusteeship for the administration of the proposed evacuation, the chancellor said the proceeds accruing from the mortgages would be paid to the trustee who would in turn be responsible for France to resolve large sums of money immediately.

"Such guarantees," he pointed out, "will give France such and will meet the conditions under which France was willing to evacuate the Ruhr," and added that "before these guarantees could be obtained, many must be permitted the right to administer the Ruhr and recover their property."

Stresemann called to assist directly that Germany was prepared to stop passive resistance immediately, if the evacuation of the Ruhr and the restoration of the Rhine and Rhineland was decided and that for those ends she was ready to give fresh guarantees, which would be a step toward the restoration of the Ruhr and the restoration of the Rhine and Rhineland.

Indefinite Occupation of Tulsa By Military Authorities Indicated By Failure of Officers to Resign

TULSA, Okla., Sept. 12. (AP)—An impasse was reached today in the negotiations between local business men and Governor J. C. Walton for the lifting of martial law and indications pointed to the indefinite occupation of Tulsa county by state troops.

That the governor's terms would not be met appeared a certainty, and on the other hand, the executive displayed an disposition to modify his demands.

The question of the retirement of Sheriff Roy Sanford, Police Commissioner Harry Kinkadon and the county jury commission composed of J. W. Owens, C. L. Holland, Dr. G. M. Robinson, all of whom Governor Walton charges are under the domination of the Ku Klux Klan, was the rock upon which the peace exchanges grounded.

The governor demands the resignation of these officials, holding that only upon their withdrawal from office can the local government be reorganized. Kinkadon, who he alleges has been protecting floggers.

The business committee composed of M. G. McClure, president of the chamber of commerce; L. M. Poe, attorney; and Clarence Douglas, announced this morning, however, that no one had been delegated to wait upon the officials named by Walton.

STATE OF SIEGE IS PROCLAIMED IN BARCELONA, SPAIN

CIVIL OFFICIALS ARE DEPRIVED OF POWERS OF GOVERNMENT.
APPEAL TO PATRIOTISM OF RESIDENTS OF CITY
Imminence of Important Events Widely Discussed During Wednesday Night.

BARCELONA, Sept. 12. (AP)—A state of siege was proclaimed here at 11:15 o'clock this morning and the Catalan military authorities took possession of power in the city.

It is stated here that several gatherings, notably those in Madrid, Saragosa and Seville, have adhered to the military movement which now must be recognized as a general uprising of the two million people of the peninsula.

The main telephone exchange here was occupied early today by a band of men understood to be headed by Captain General Primo, who will signal an outbreak in other chief towns in Spain. Grave rumors were circulated in Madrid last night and the government held a hastily called meeting.

It also is declared the leaders of the movement will seek to maintain the normal life of the country. The proclamation demands in an appeal to the patriotism of the population, entreating the military forces to give their lives to the country if necessary.

It is reported that Santiago Alba, minister of foreign affairs, is under arrest in San Sebastian. A communique issued by the military authorities today, which was brought against the minister of foreign affairs, stated that the council (the premier) and that a government will be established under the military authorities.

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Harrisburg Officer Is Near Death Result Shooting in Which Deputies And Prohibition Agent Take Part

HOUSTON, Texas, Sept. 12. (AP)—Deputy Constable Emery Hicks of Harrisburg is near death, and two others are suffering from wounds received early this morning when a prohibition agent and members of the Harrisburg constable's office staged a pitched rifle and pistol battle on the Galveston-Houston road near here.

Hicks was shot through the chest and just above the ankle. Frank G. Hines, brother of Kelly Hines, the prohibition agent, who was operating a ditched rifle and pistol battle on the Galveston-Houston road near here.

According to an eye witness, Hines had stopped a car en route to Houston and was holding the driver and a large quantity of liquor when another car approached, coming from Houston. As the second car drew abreast of the two machines two men jumped out and began firing.

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THREE VICTIMS OF GEORGIA FLOGGINGS IDENTIFY DENTIST

Hartley, all of whom have been whipped by the dentist, testified during that period, pointed out the dentist as having been a member of the crowds that "took their own."

Barnett testified that he was accused of neglecting his children after the floggers had lured him out of his place of business and that he had been warned either to marry or discharge a woman who was waiting for him. Arnold testified that he was whipped because the floggers said he was not paying enough money to afford to eat his lunches at restaurants and that he was warned against drinking of selling whiskey.

Dr. W. A. Little, a physician with office in the same building in which Dr. Yarbrugh has his office, was called as a character witness for the defendant. On cross examination he was asked if he had ever heard of Dr. Yarbrugh being the "whipping boss of Macon."

He said that on January 14, 1922, he was called to the home of the defendant and that he had seen him being whipped. He said Mills at first did not want to give names, but finally told him John G. Colbert and John M. Howard were in the crowd and that the men were khaki and legging.

John Howard of Barksdaleville, who was named by Mills as having been in the crowd, testified that Mills' reputation was bad.

John Howard of Barksdaleville testified that he had never heard anything derogatory to the defendant's character.

NEW YORK, Sept. 12.—The daily average production of the United States increased 18,000 barrels for the week ending September 8, totaling 2,217,000 barrels, according to the weekly summary of the American Petroleum Institute.

Oklahoma showed a daily average production of 430,000 barrels, decrease 1,000; Kansas 41,000, decrease 400; central Texas 278,000, increase 11,900; north Louisiana 35,000, decrease 1,000; Arkansas 127,000, increase 700; Gulf coast 107,000, decrease 900; eastern 105,000, decrease 2,000; and Wyoming and Montana 161,000, increase 2,000 barrels.

Daily average imports of petroleum at principal ports were 350,000 barrels, compared with 374,000 of the previous week. Daily average receipts of California oil at Atlantic and Gulf coast ports were 107,423, compared with 102,537 for the previous week.

LAST CALL FOR FORMER OFFICERS TO AFFILIATE WITHOUT EXAMINATION

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Sept. 12.—The last call for former officers of the United States army to affiliate with the officers reserve corps without examination has been made for the eighth corps area, United States army.

According to government regulations as at present, all former commissioned army officers with commissions in the officers reserve corps must place their applications before November 11th, 1933. After that date the applicant must take a regular army examination, providing there is a vacancy which he wishes to fill.

All reserve officers are eligible for promotion after three years' service. To be a member of the officers reserve corps carries no obligation of any kind, the reserve being called out only in cases of national emergency. Attendance on summer training camps also is optional. Any man who served as an enlisted man in the world's war is eligible to take the examination for a commission in the reserve. OCCUPATION TAX LAWS OF STATE NOW IN EFFECT

Several new occupation tax laws of the state, passed by the last session, are now in effect and steps will be taken to make collections.

Every theatrical or dramatic representation and every musical comedy show and all similar amusements for which an admission is charged, that travel from place to place, are subject to an occupation tax, depending on amount on the population of the town or city in which they are showing.

In towns of less than 1,000, a tax of \$5 is charged; 1,000 to 2,500, \$10; 2,500 to 4,999, \$15; 5,000 to 9,999, \$20; 10,000 to 24,999, \$25; 25,000 to 49,999, \$30; and more than 50,000, \$35 for each day the show is staged. The above table prevails when the admission is not more than fifty cents, but where the admission is greater than this amount the tax shall be double the amount above stated. This law, however, does not apply in cases where the theatre in which the company is showing has already paid an occupation tax, as provided under another section of the law.

Moving picture houses and the like also pay a state occupation tax on the following amounts: In cities with a population of less than 1,000, \$5; 1,000 to 2,500, \$10; 2,500 to 4,999, \$15; 5,000 to 9,999, \$20; 10,000 to 24,999, \$25; 25,000 to 49,999, \$30; and above 50,000, \$35.

This new occupation tax law was passed as an emergency measure and went into effect September 12. The population as of the last United States census prevails.

INSTRUCTS JURY TO CONDUCT SWEEPING KLAN INVESTIGATION

ADA, Okla., Sept. 12.—J. W. Bolen, judge of the district court of Pottawatomie county, Wednesday morning delivered a charge to the new grand jury, instructing them to make a sweeping investigation of disturbances of religious worship in rural communities by members of the Ku Klux Klan or invisible empire, "who dress themselves out in dance caps and winding sheets and parade down the aisles while religious worship is going on as a method of advertisement."

He said that until recently the activities of the Klan along this line had been confined to the city churches, but lately they have invaded the rural precincts where the larger portion of the citizens are opposed to the Klan and disturb their worship by parading down the church aisles. He said that the best citizen of the county had no more right to disturb religious worship than the meanest criminal and that it was the duty of the grand jury to indict anyone so offending.

He called the attention of the jury to reported activities of the Klan in giving orders and instructions to a citizen of Roff and said that such act was a violation of law and the guilty ones should be indicted, as such an act was intimidation and threats and a disturbance of the peace.

He called attention to reports that the Klan at Roff had attempted to take a prisoner from an officer.

He said further that he had been informed that the headquarters of the National Guard at Roff was headquarters for the Klan at that place; that the Klan kept their par-

sphericals there and that they had free access to the guns and ammunition of the army; that citizens armed with guns belonging to the state went out upon the streets and violated the weapon law of the state. He demanded an investigation of these reports also.

Morgan Leads One.
Dick Morgan, the youngster from Lubbock, started the opening and also finished it in nice style. The Buffs found him for only eight hits, but they were bunched in three innings for four of them. Wheeler, pitching with Mike Kircher toiling in rare form. The Buffs got a lead in the first inning and Morgan worked a great game and none of the three runs off him was earned. He let a two with a wild throw and the other was the result of two bobbles by his mate. This prospect, solemnly painted by the boxing experts, cannot fail to have its effect on the spirits of Luis Angel Firpo, highly impressionable Latin-American.

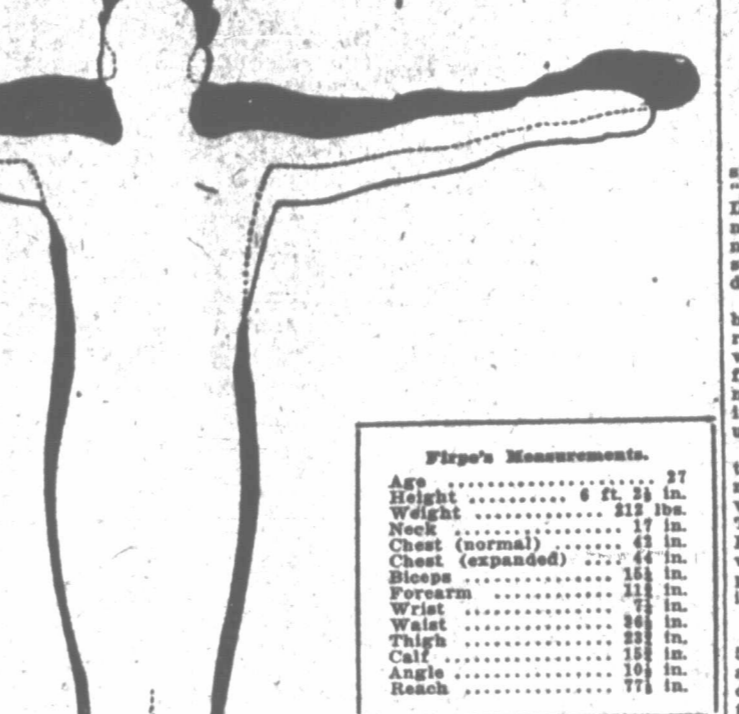

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GIGANTIC SALE OF BOGUS TICKETS IS NIPPED BY POLICE

NEW YORK, Sept. 15.—An extensive, but poorly executed plot to "film-flam" the public tickets was nipped Wednesday—but evidently not before many tickets had been sold—by a raid of detectives on a downtown printing plant.

Six thousand of the bogus pastebars, poor imitations of the real thing, were seized together with plates from which they were printed. Five men and a boy, charged with printing and selling them, were locked up at police headquarters.

The "fakes" set a number about 5,000 \$5 tickets and the remainder are for \$17.50. They are slightly darker and not as well printed as the real tickets. There is an unbroken black line between the stubs and butts of the "bogus" pastebars, instead of a dotted perforation.

The real tickets were so printed that if photographic plates are made, the word "counterfeit" not only is not visible, but is brought out. The word "counterfeit" cannot be removed wholly without engraving the entire back area.

Three plates were discovered and two are believed to have been used. The seizure and arrests, however, came only after the "fakes" were in the hands of the public.

Speculators Profit. Promoter Rickard put William Massey, a private detective, on the hunt. He and police detectives found the "fakes" were being sold in the downtown wholesale dry goods and market districts.

On information obtained from him, the detectives say, they were able to make a roundup of the other. Promoter Rickard sent out wires to police in other cities to investigate all sales of tickets possible, especially those of speculators.

There have been complaints of speculators gouging in this city, even in close proximity to the Madison Square Garden. There have been reports of requests—and of sales—of \$17.50 tickets for \$5 and \$10. Also of big jumps on other priced tickets.

Champion Worries Little Because He Departs on the Thirteenth for Ring that Has Seen 5 Crowns Fall

WHYTS TH' PUSS?

Rogue Preys Upon Rogue in Game Of Smuggling Liquor Into U. S. With No Value Placed on Lives

By JOHN T. BERKE Universal Service Staff Correspondent

LONDON, Sept. 12.—In the second of a series of sensational articles or items appearing from the Bahamas to the United States, H. Dewington Wiley, of the London Daily News, depicts vividly the perils that beset the booze runners.

How rogues prey upon rogues, and how the bootleggers conspire to violate the American dry laws are turned vicariously by later day piracies.

After describing his trip from Miami to Nassau in a schooner in which the women among the passengers were everything to sight, and engaged in "high jinks" with other passengers, including negroes, Wiley says:

Nassau plays a most important part in the American bootlegging industry, because it is British free port, and has a long history of liquor smuggling.

Liquor is brought by liners at legitimate cargo from London and Glasgow to Nassau where it is warehoused after paying duty to the Bahaman government.

In 1921 the total value of all classes imports into the Bahamas was \$5,474,000. In 1922 the total imports amounted to \$9,899,000.

Wiley reports that the life of a newspaper investigator is in constant jeopardy in Nassau where a character known as "Big Red from the Bowers" who like wild westers wears a brace of six shooters in his belt, supported by a gang of gun men from New York, rules the coast.

He is the agent of wealthy American bootleggers who once purchased big cargoes of liquor only to find later that the cargo had been filled with sea water.

After discovering how Nassau harbor is full of craft of all description, engaged in rum smuggling, with cabin like afloat on the sea, Wiley adds:

They roam the coast armed for any desperate encounter. Only a short time ago a ship left Nassau with a cargo of whiskey and was found a few days later drifting and deserted, her cargo gone, and her decks splattered by bullets.
