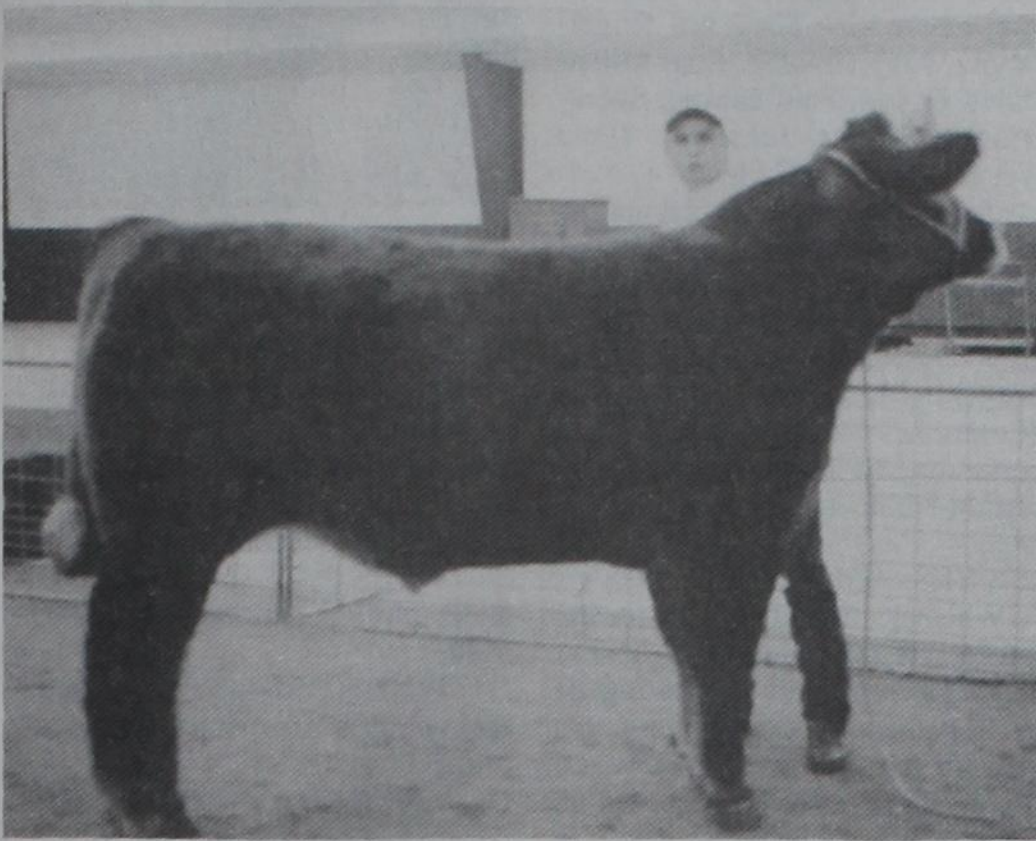

Another Big Snow Received By Area

The fifth major snowfall of the winter season was received in the area on Tuesday, measuring a strong four inches for most of the immediate area.

The snow was preceded in the early morning hours by rain, which changed to freezing rain, sleet, and later snow. It all accounted for considerable moisture, with an official .72 inches registered at the Friona NWS station.

About .3 of that amount came from the rain and freezing rain, with the other .42 inches coming from the snow, which was extremely wet in nature.

The snow began falling just prior to 8 a.m., and fell until about 9:20, and stacked up that much in such a short time. Residents

marveled at the extremely large flakes.

One Amarillo weatherman said the flakes falling there measured four inches across. A local resident said it looked as if "it were snowing snowballs" for awhile.

Added to the .28 inches of rain from two earlier ice storms during the month of January makes the month's moisture an even inch, and keeps the "Winter of '92-'93" going as one of the wettest on record. November rang in with 1.61 inches of moisture and 10 inches of snow, and December added nine inches of white stuff and .98 of moisture.

That's 3.59 inches of moisture for November-December-January, when sometimes an inch overall is more like the average.

Following the storm, temperatures warmed up nicely, to 65 degrees on Thursday.

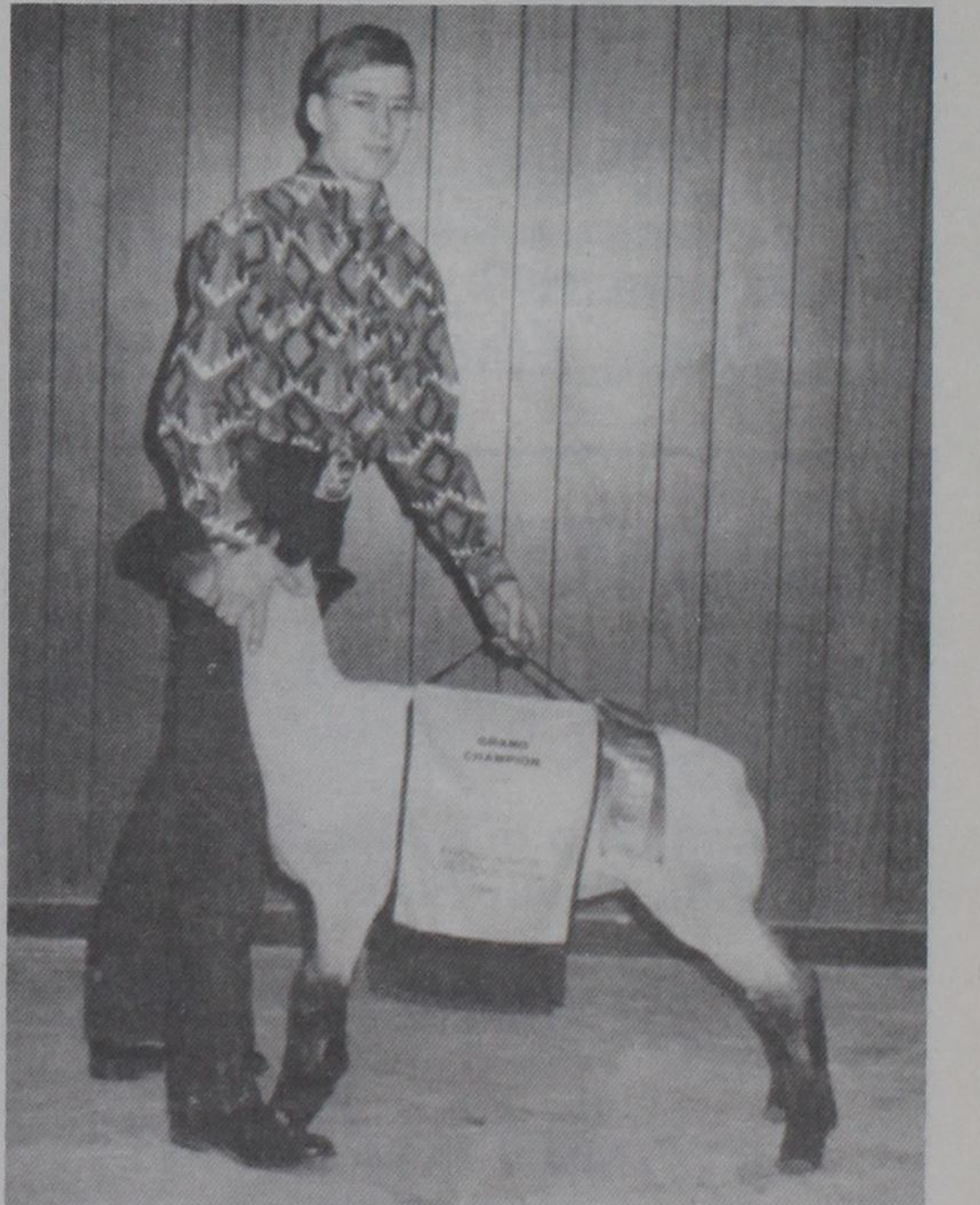

65 YRS. AGO--JAN. 27, 1928

As we understand it, the plan will provide an eight-room addition adjoining the west of the auditorium wing of the present building forming a "T".

55 YRS. AGO--JAN. 28, 1938
G.B. (Pete) Buske, proprietor of Buske Chevrolet and The Friona Feed & Produce, had a narrow escape from probable serious injury Wednesday when he was charged by a "gentle" Jersey bull. 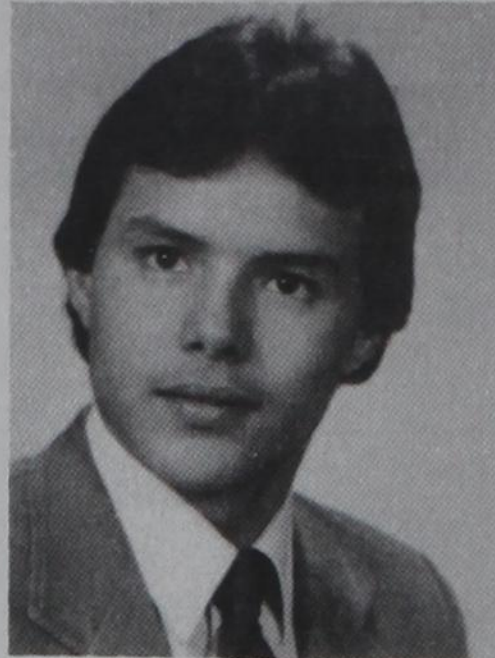
15 YRS. AGO--FEB. 5, 1978

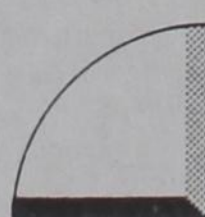

Squaws Top Tulia; Go 2-0 In District

The Friona High School Squaws survived a shaky start, plus an inspired effort by a former playoff team, to down the visiting Tulia Lady Hornets, 52-40 last Friday night.

Any resemblance between the Tulia team and one that had a 3-14 season record was purely coincidental, as the visitors came out with a purpose, and played with the intensity of the Tulia team that "won all the marbles" in the state meet for class AAA teams in 1991.

Adding to the "edginess" for the Squaws was the fact that the game was delayed for an hour and one-half due to the game officials getting their signals mixed up.

By the time substitute officials could be summoned, players from both teams had been suited out and "warmed up" way beyond what was necessary.

Tulia took a 5-2 lead after a cold-shooting opening quarter, and after Gena Willard brought Friona to within one point with a basket at the 1:50 mark, Tulia got a three-point basket to take an 8-4 lead with 1:04 left in the opening quarter.

However, Angela Belcher took the spotlight for Friona. She connected on a jump shot with 46 seconds left in the quarter for a 6-8 deficit, and her nice turning jump shot with 19 seconds left in the quarter enabled the Squaws to be tied at 8-all at the end of the period.

The two teams traded leads for the first half of the second quarter, until Renee Martin's follow shot at the 4:02 mark gave Friona the lead for keeps at 13-12.

Gena Willard scored on a jump shot, her twin sister Tena did likewise at the 1:15 mark, and Renee Downey zapped a three-pointer from the side after stealing the ball, to run Friona's lead to 20-12, and that was the halftime score.

The Squaws had scored nine unanswered points to finish the second quarter, as they held the Lady Hornets scoreless the last three minutes of the period. This

trend continued as the third quarter opened.

Miss Downey stole the ball, and drove coast-to-coast for a layup and a 23-12 Friona lead, was fouled on the shot and turned that into a three-point play just 38 seconds into the quarter.

A minute later, Tena Willard sank a long jump shot, was fouled, and likewise made her free throw.

That gave Friona a 26-12 lead, and the Squaws had made a 15-0 run in five minutes of clock time that ended the first half and started the second.

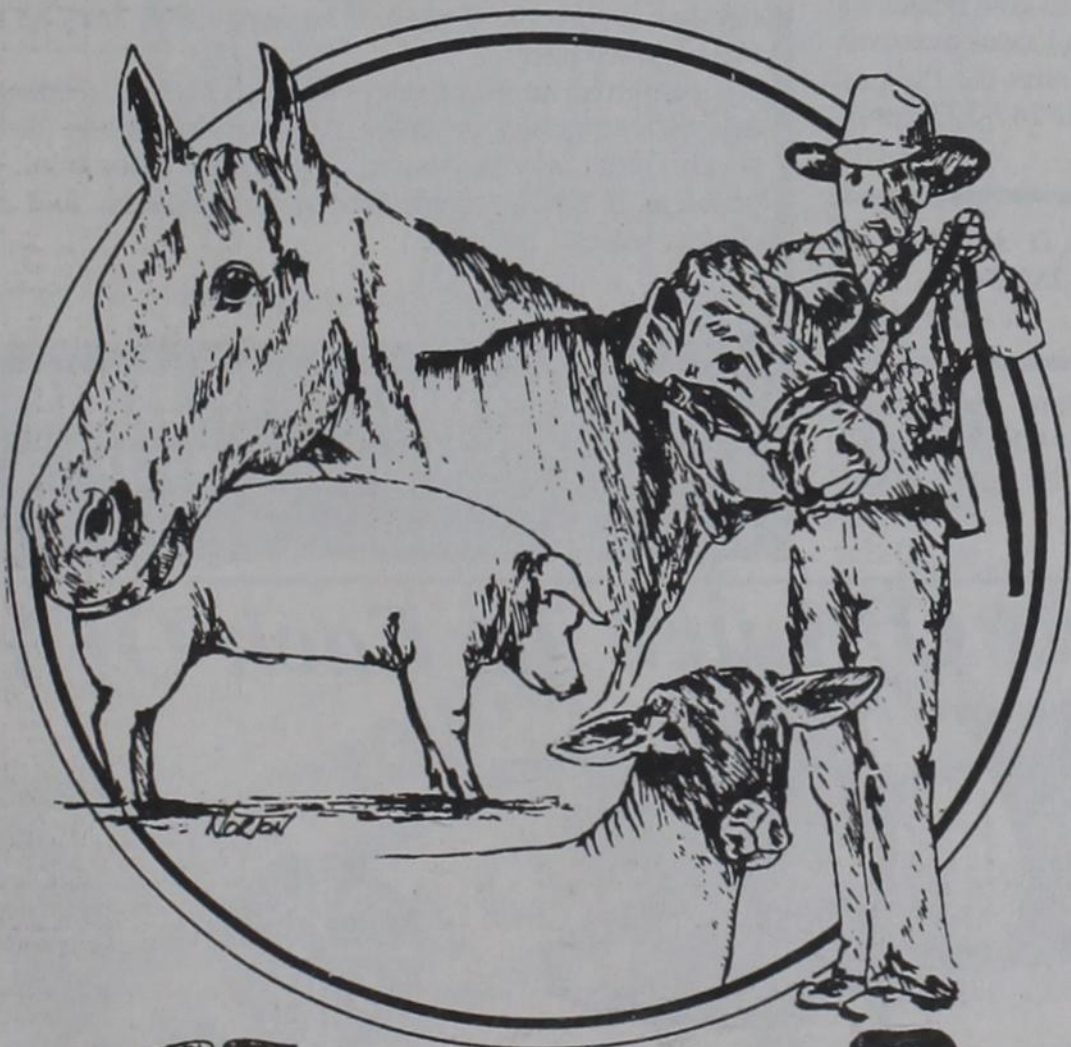

Astigmatism

Nature made most of us almost perfect--but not quite. And in many people, there's a slight irregularity in the shape of the cornea--the front surface of the eye, or even of the lens itself. The "flaw" prevents light rays from an object we look at from meeting in a single

focal point in the back of the retina. Instead of a clear image, the picture sent to the brain is distorted.

A person with this condition--called astigmatism--may be nearsighted, farsighted or even test out at a perfect 20/20. Indeed, everyone has it to some degree. The irregularity may be there at birth or may develop later.

Astigmatism may cause eye strain, fatigue, reddened eyes or headache after reading or doing close work. Where the astigmatism is severe, there may be blurred or distorted vision, too. Fortunately, the problem is easily correctable with eyeglasses and certain types of contact lenses.

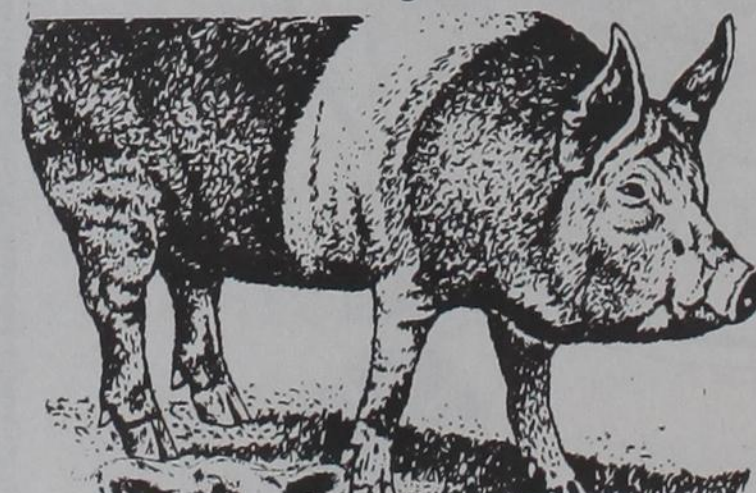

46th Annual Junior Livestock Show Set

The 46th annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show will be held January 29-30 and February 1 at the Community Center-Showbarn in Friona.

Judging will be held on Saturday, as in recent years, with the premium auction sale on Monday.

Weigh-in and classification for pigs will be held from 1-5 p.m. on Friday, January 29. Sheep will be weighed and classified from 7-9 a.m. Saturday, January 30.

The steer show will kick off the judging on Saturday at 9 a.m., followed by heifers. The lamb show begins at 11 a.m., and barrows will be judged beginning at 2 p.m.

Judges for the county show will be Bert Williams, steers and heifers; Jamie Osborn, barrows; John Kearney, lambs, and Jess Holloway, showmanship.

Exhibitors of grand champion animals in the 1992 show were Shane Roberts of Farwell, barrow; Monty Schueler of Friona, lambs; Lori Bradshaw of Lazbuddie, steers, and Jarah Redwine of Lazbuddie, heifers.

Roberts gave his school its first barrow title in ten years, since Danna Ralston won it in 1982. It was just the sixth barrow title for a Farwell showman in the 45-year history of the show.

Although Lazbuddie showmen have dominated the barrow and sheep divisions down through the years, it was only the seventh steer title for an LHS exhibitor in county show history.

Showmanship winners in 1992 were: barrows--Holly Engelking, Lazbuddie, senior, and Greg Salyer, Friona, junior; lambs--Shana Foster, Lazbuddie, junior, and Cody Simmons, Friona, senior; beef division--Mandy Magby, Lazbuddie, junior, and Clint Hurst, Lazbuddie, senior.

Roberts' barrow was a cross-breed, which made the eighth time for a crossbred animal to win the county title. Hampshire breeds hold a wide lead in the overall history of the show with 16 titles. Durocs and crosses have won eight times

apiece; Polands have been tapped six times, Chester Whites four and Yorkshire once.

Miss Bradshaw's winning steer in 1992 was an exotic cross. It was the 14th time for an exotic cross to win the county steer title.

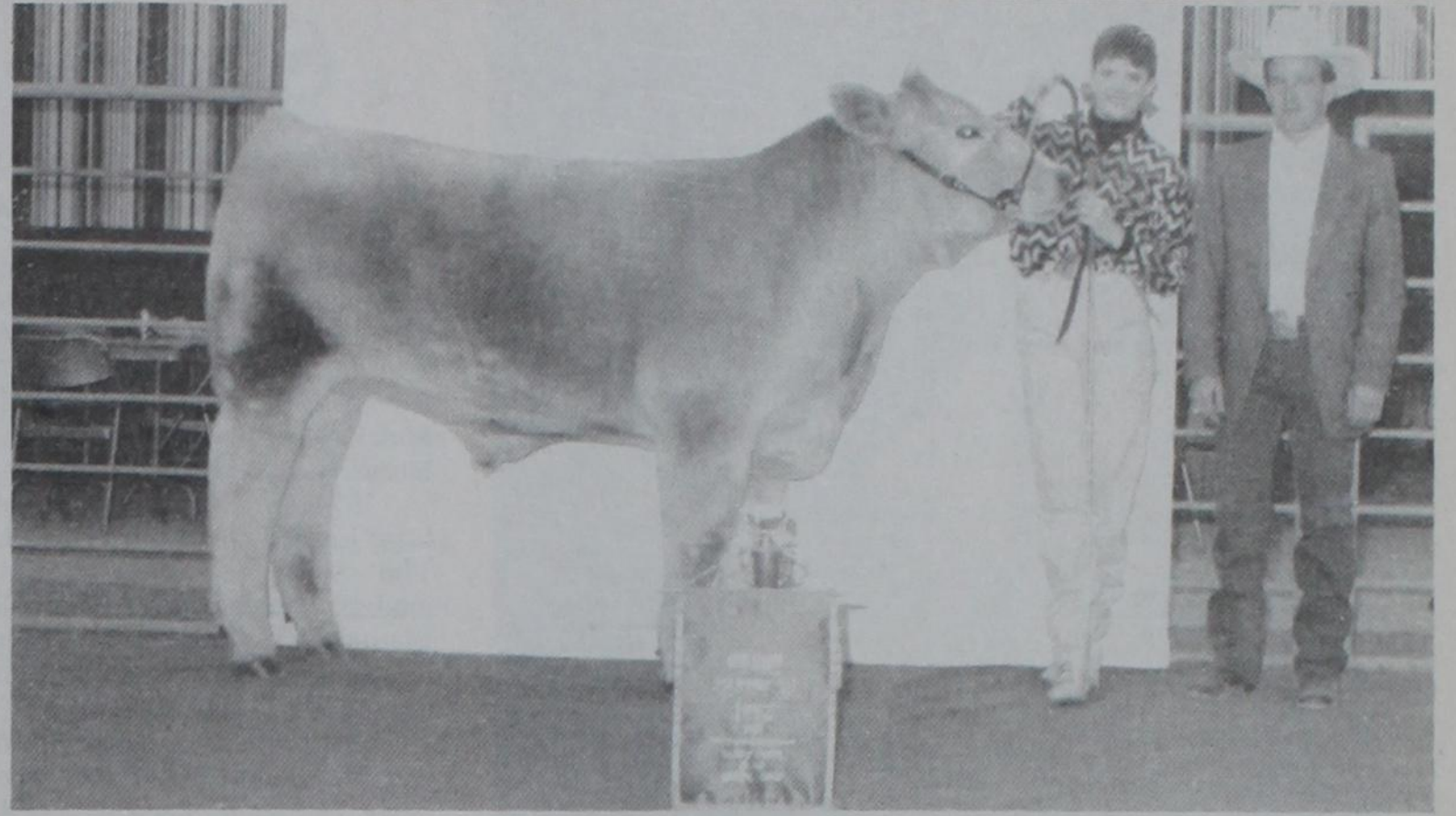



Pot Pie Recipes

BY CARLA McKEOWN
It seems we're always running short on time these days. So many things to do; so many more things we would do if we had more time.

One thing that seems to take up so much of my time is dish washing. My husband, Tony, says I use too many dishes when I cook, but I really try not to. I can cook

the meat and spaghetti sauce together in the same pan, but I just cannot cook the spaghetti in that same pan.

One solution to too many dirty dishes is one-pot dishes, such as the following pot pies.

The recipes for the pot pies look long and complicated, but making the dishes isn't hard at all. The recipes are just a little longer than

some because everything--meat, vegetables and bread--are all in one.

Pot pies are cooked until the crust is browned and the filling is hot and bubbly, making them the perfect fare for cold winter nights. To make the process easier, cook the meat, and chop the vegetables and meat ahead of time; store in the refrigerator until ready to assemble the pie.

You can use any double pastry dough recipe for the Ham and Vegetable Pot Pie. The others come with directions for making their crust.

Enjoy the following pot pie recipes:

OLD-FASHIONED CHICKEN POT PIE

- 4 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1/2 cup chopped celery
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1/4 cup all-purpose flour
- 2 cups chicken stock or canned broth
- Salt and pepper, to taste
- 2 cups chopped cooked chicken
- 1/4 cup chopped parsley
- 1/2 teaspoon crumbled sage or 1-1/2 tsp. chopped fresh sage
- 1 cup whole wheat pastry flour
- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 6 tablespoons shortening, chilled
- 3 to 5 tablespoons ice water

In a medium-sized saucepan, melt the butter over medium heat. Cook the celery and onion in the butter until tender. Add the flour and cook, stirring, for 1 minute without browning. Add stock and cook, stirring constantly, until sauce thickens. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Add chicken, parsley and sage. Stir and set aside. In a large bowl, stir together the whole wheat and the all-purpose flour. Add the salt. With a pastry blender or two knives, cut in the chilled shortening until the mixture resembles meal. Sprinkle with ice water and stir until the dough stays together. Roll the dough into a ball and divide into two parts. On a floured board, roll out one part of the dough to 1/4-inch thickness. Line a 2-quart round baking dish with the pastry, allowing the edges to extend over the sides. Add chicken filling. Roll out the second half of the dough and place over the top of the dish. Trim excess crust around the edge of the dish. Press the edges together to seal and crimp together. Make several slashes in pastry top. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour. Makes 6 servings.

HAM AND VEGETABLE POT PIE

- Double pastry crust for 9-inch pie
- 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon instant chopped onion
- 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1/4 teaspoon dried oregano leaves or 1 tsp. chopped fresh oregano leaves
- 1/8 teaspoon garlic powder or one fresh garlic clove, minced
- 4 medium new raw red potatoes (about 1 pound)
- 1-10 ounce package frozen chopped broccoli, thawed and drained on paper towels
- 1-2 ounce jar sliced pimentos, drained
- 8 slices (3/4-ounce each) Swiss cheese, divided
- 1/3 pound cooked ham, trimmed and cut into 1/2-inch cubes
- 1 tablespoon skim milk
- 2 teaspoons grated Parmesan cheese

Roll the pastry dough into two crusts. Line a 9-inch pie plate with one of the pastry crusts; trim to fit. Set other crust aside. In a small bowl, combine flour, onion, mustard, oregano and garlic powder. Set aside. Peel and thinly slice 2 potatoes; place on the bottom of the unbaked pastry shell. Sprinkle with 1 tablespoon of the flour mixture. Spoon broccoli over the potatoes. Sprinkle pimentos over the broccoli and the remaining flour over the pimentos. Place 3 slices of cheese on top of the vegetables. Break a fourth slice into quarters and use to fill in the spaces between the other cheese slices. Sprinkle the ham over the cheese. Peel and thinly slice the remaining potatoes and place over the ham. Top with the remaining cheese slices. Lift the top crust onto the filled pie. Fold the top edge under the bottom crust and flute the edge. Cut slits in the top crust. Bake at 400 degrees for 35 minutes. Remove from oven. Brush the top crust with milk and sprinkle with Parmesan cheese. Cover the edge of the crust with foil to prevent over-browning. Return the pie to the oven for 10 minutes. Let stand 10 to 15 minutes before serving. Makes 8 servings.

ITALIAN PHYLLO PIE

- 1 cup sliced fresh mushrooms
- 5 tablespoons olive oil or butter,

- melted
- 1-26 ounce jar tomato and basil pasta sauce
- 1-9 ounce package frozen artichoke hearts, thawed, well drained and chopped
- 1-1/2 cups chopped cooked chicken
- 1/2 cup sliced pitted ripe olives
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- 10 frozen phyllo dough leaves, thawed
- 6 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese

In a large skillet, cook mushrooms in 2 tablespoons olive oil until tender. Add pasta sauce, artichokes, chicken, olives and sugar. Bring to a boil; reduce heat and simmer, uncovered, for 20 minutes, stirring occasionally. Meanwhile, lightly grease an 11-inch tart pan with oil. Arrange 2 phyllo dough leaves in the center of the tart pan (edges will extend over the side of the pan); brush with olive oil and sprinkle with 1 tablespoon Parmesan cheese. Continue the layering process 4 more times, overlapping the edges of each layer. Spoon the meat mixture into the prepared pan; fold edges of phyllo dough leaves over the mixture. Brush the top with remaining oil and sprinkle with remaining cheese. Bake at 400 degrees for 15 to 20 minutes or until golden brown. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

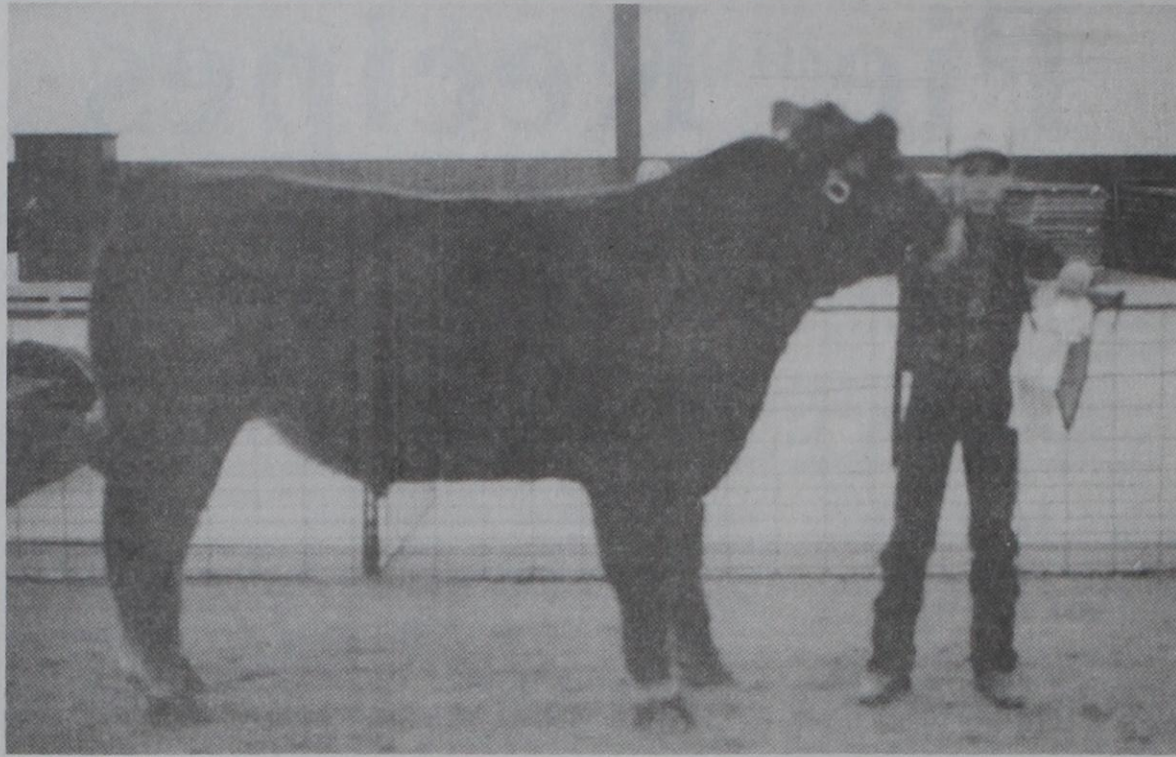

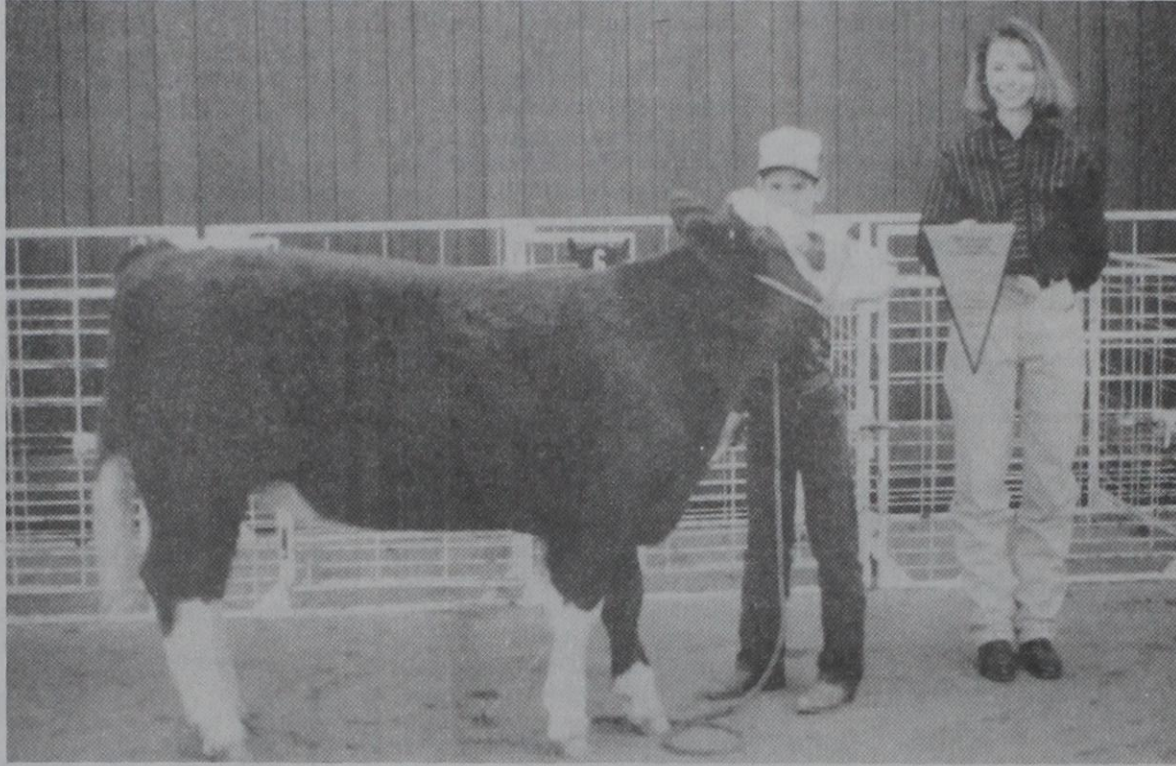

Laney Elected As Speaker Of House

AUSTIN--State Rep. James E. "Pete" Laney, D-Hale Center, was elected unanimously Tuesday, January 12, as the 68th Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives.

Laney, 49, pledged to pass a school finance plan in the House within the next 30 days--"a plan with bipartisan support that will meet the requirements of the courts and the needs of our educational system."

He said taxes should not be raised and lawmakers must agree on a budget that stays within current revenues.

The new speaker pledged to earn the trust, respect and support of Texans for the work done by the Texas House of Representatives.

"It is a sad fact that many people have lost faith in government at all levels and for many reasons," Laney said. "We ourselves are the only ones who can change that--by the way we conduct ourselves and by the quality of legislation we pass."

Laney said he will set standards for himself and for the Speaker's Office that go beyond what is required by law.

"I am requiring my top staff members to pledge not to represent

anyone before the legislature for a period of time after their employment ends. And I make that same pledge for myself," Laney said.

He endorsed numerous changes in House rules recommended by the House Select Committee on Rules to increase efficiency and accountability in the legislative process.

Laney also recommended additional reforms: requiring the Calendars Committee to conduct its business publicly; requiring every bill referred to Calendars to be acted upon within a certain time period; and establishing a 12-hour layout requirement for bill substitutes to give members time to read major revisions to bills before voting on them.

Laney said he will give House members several days to study the changes before he schedules a debate and vote on them.

Laney also will appoint an ethics advisor to help him and the House understand and follow state ethics law and produce an ethics manual as a reference for legislators and their staff members.

"I believe if all of us work hard enough and long enough, solutions can be found," Laney said.

4-H, FFA Youth Need Community Support

Christmas is over, the tree is put up and it's time to go back to work and to school. That can mean only one thing for 4-H and FFA members--stock show time.

Not everyone in these organizations has an animal project, but many do, and this is their time to shine. For months now, they've been raising a pig, lamb, rabbit or steer. The stock show is a measure of how well they did.

But in the stock show and youth business, the name of the game is not supposed to be how good you do, but how well you play the game. In other words, how much does a youngster learn from having the project and entering a competition?

Both 4-H and FFA teach the skills in animal care. They learn about rations, grooming, health care and exercise with their projects.

But the youngsters learn much more than hands-on skills. They pick up leadership skills and gain self-esteem. They learn how to handle monetary transactions through the buying and selling of their animal.

And when it's all said and done, it's only natural for them to want to have a blue ribbon to say they are winners. But the blue ribbon isn't necessary to make them a winner. They're all richer for the experience. It's an experience worth repeating. Those who don't carry home the big trophy and aren't declared the big winner might have a hard time doing so.

At the end of most stock shows is a premium sale. Of course, the grand champion animals sell for large amounts and sometimes people question if this is teaching the youngsters anything.

No one is trying to say the animal is worth those large premiums paid. That money is like a reward. It's for a job well done. And the person or persons paying the high premium use the opportunity to do a little advertising as well as say, "I believe in our youth."

The ones who aren't awarded the grand prizes, however, need community support, also. The many people who come back year after year know why they give money to be used in the auctions. But for those who haven't been, your support is needed for those individuals who did not carry away a trophy.

It's not to reward them for raising a poor animal, but to give them a second chance. A chance to try again, to work harder and learn more. There are few who would argue against investing in the education of our youth. After all, they will be the leaders of tomorrow.

Maybe they'll take home a brown or green ribbon this year, or none at all. Maybe they'll barely

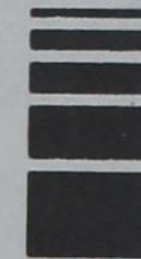
pay their feed bill or even have to borrow a little from Mom and Dad to take care of all the bills this year.

But, with a little help from friends--not necessarily friends of the family, but friends of 4-H and FFA--they'll get a chance to try again and do better the next time.

If you've never been to a stock show, never participated in a premium auction, take a few hours this year to attend one. Every county has one and there's no admission fee.

You don't have to buy an animal or even contribute money for the auction. Just go out and see what it's all about, talk to the youngsters and judge for yourself. It's a worthwhile investment. (Courtesy of the Amarillo Globe-News).

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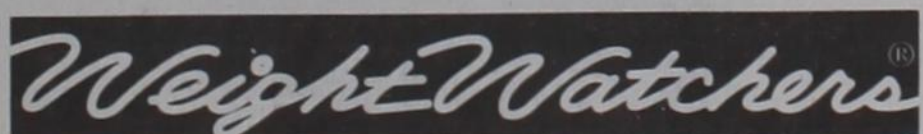

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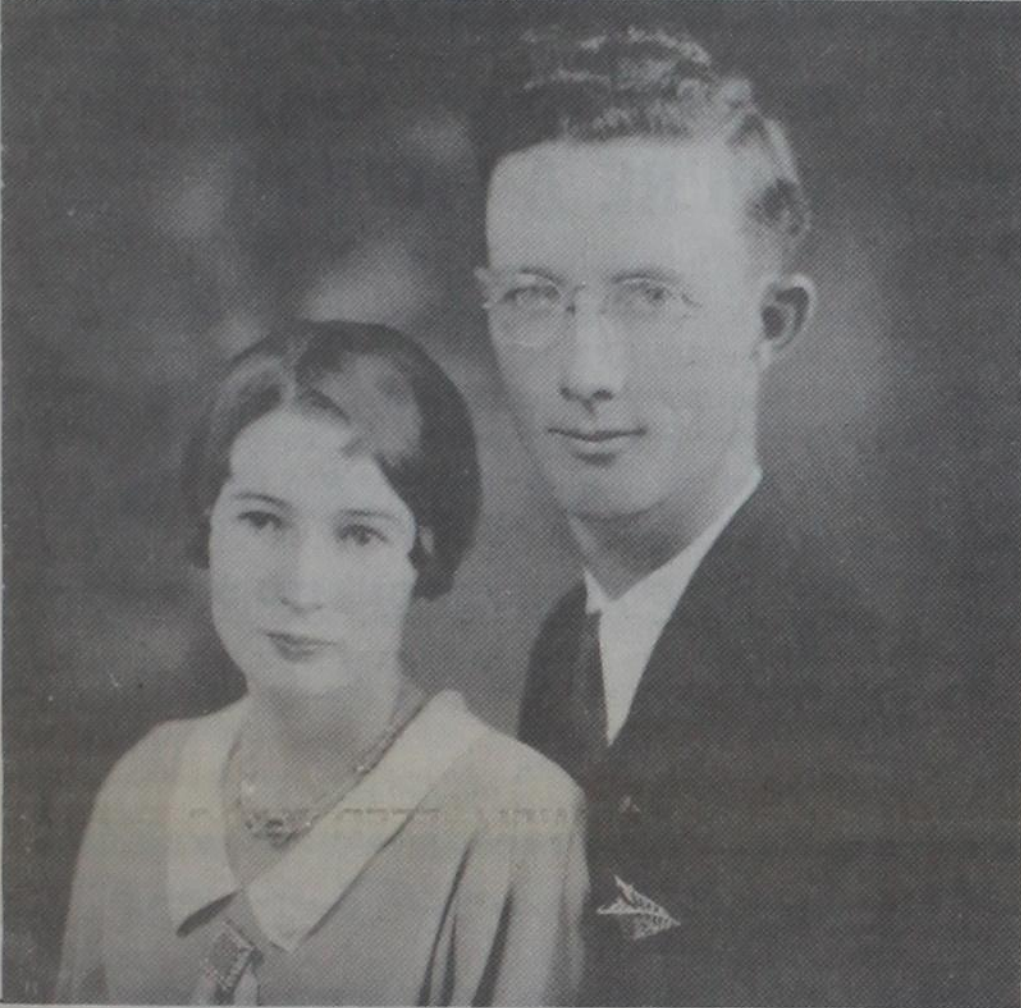

Heartbreaking Loss For Chiefs, 63-62

The visiting Tulia Hornets probably were taking the Chieftains lightly when they visited Chieftain Fieldhouse last Friday.

But the Hornets escaped with a 63-62 win, after the Chiefs wasted a hard-fought second-half comeback by not converting free throws in the final minutes.

Tulia led for most of the game, although the outside shooting by the Chieftains kept them within striking distance most of the time.

Kyle Potts' three-point basket with 3:16 left in the opening period trimmed a 12-6 Tulia lead to 12-9.

After a pair of lay-ins by Chris Hanna in the last two minutes of the quarter, Potts scored on a nice turning jump shot to pull Friona within a point at 18-17.

However, Tulia scored with four seconds left in the period for a 20-17 lead.

Mark Outland made a lay-up and hit two of two from the line as Friona pulled to within three at 26-23 with 5:37 left in the second quarter.

But Tulia answered by scoring 12 of the next 16 points to open up a 37-27 lead.

Outland tatted a pair of long-rang bonus baskets in the final minute of the quarter, to pull Friona to within seven, at 40-33 at the half.

The third quarter was a good one for Friona, with big baskets by Hanna, Terron Talley, Cory Hamilton and Outland. The Chieftains trimmed a 55-45 Tulia lead to two points, 55-53, as the quarter ended.

Outland scored on a short jump shot with 6:49 left in the game to give Friona its first lead at 56-55, and Potts canned a pair of free throws a few seconds later for a 58-55 Chieftain lead.

Potts again was two of two from the line at the 4:01 mark for a 60-

59 Friona lead, and when Outland hit his jumper with 3:17 left, Friona had a 62-59 lead.

CHIEFS CONSERVATIVE

That's when Coach Kevin Cooper had the Chieftains go into a "safe shot" mode, and Tulia committed a pair of fouls attempting to regain the lead.

Harvey Martinez and Talley each missed free throws in the latter stages, and Tulia got a short jump shot with only seven seconds left on the clock to re-take the lead at 63-62.

After calling time, the Chiefs threw the ball into Potts, whose shot from about the three-point line was short of the mark. There were only three seconds left on the clock when Friona called time.

Potts paced the scoring with 24 points and Outland had 23, but the Chieftains failed to get the ball into one of these players' hands for the late fouls.

The two high-pointers didn't get enough scoring help from their mates, as the rest of the team scored only 15 points combined.

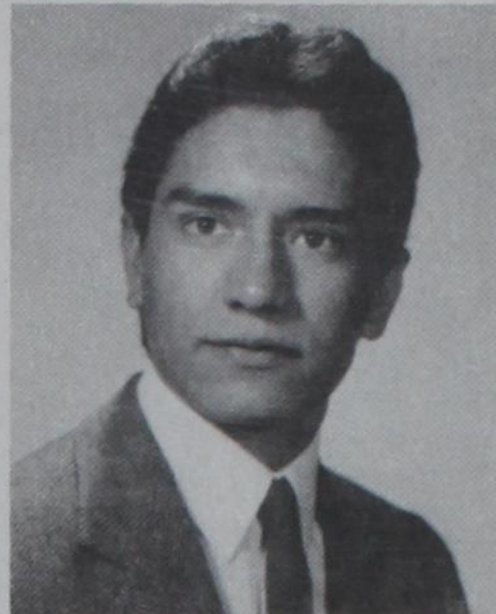
During the weekend, her three sons, Rory of Odessa, Dennis of Hereford and Toby, who lives in Lubbock, came to visit her.

Get The Total Picture With Total Return

One of the most frequently asked questions among mutual fund shareholders is, "How is my fund doing?" If you have ever wondered this, then you should know about total return.

Total return is considered by many to be one of the best indicators of a mutual fund's performance. Total return takes into account income dividends, capital gains dividends and changes in the value of the fund's shares. Your total return will vary slightly depending on whether you take your dividends in cash or reinvest them.

Here's an example of total return when all dividends and gains are reinvested:

Your account value as of 12/31/92	\$20,250
Your account value as of 12/31/91	\$18,000
Change in account value	+\$2,250

To find the total return on this account, divide the change in account value by your beginning balance and multiply by 100 (2,250/18,000 x 100=12.5% total return). This simple method tells you how much your fund earned or lost during the year and your total return percentage.

If you choose to receive dividends in cash, total return would be calculated this way:

Your account value as of 12/31/92	\$18,558
Your account value as of 12/31/91	\$18,000
Change in account value	+\$ 558

Add the total amount of dividends you received during the year to the change in account value:

Total dividends received	\$1,674
Change in account value	\$ 558
	+\$2,232

Divide this sum by the beginning balance and multiply by 100: (2,232/18,000) x 100=12.4% total return.

When dividends are not reinvested, your total return will be slightly lower. The difference becomes more dramatic over longer periods.

A mutual fund's total return will also be listed in its annual report. However, the total return figure reported by the mutual fund may not agree with your calculations. Why? The figures the fund provides are correct; however, if you did not own the fund for the entire reporting period, your total return will be different. Additional investments or redeemed shares may also affect your total return. If you invested during the year following a major increase or decrease in the fund's share value, your total return would reflect this.

These are short-term total return indications. Long-term investors typically are not overly concerned about short-term results. Over meaningful periods of five or ten years, you can generally use your fund's total return figures as a yardstick to measure how well your investment is progressing.

There are several ways to measure the performance of any mutual fund, but total return is by far the most complete. No other method simultaneously takes into account income, gains and change in the value of your fund's shares. So, when you want to know how your mutual fund is doing, look at your total return.

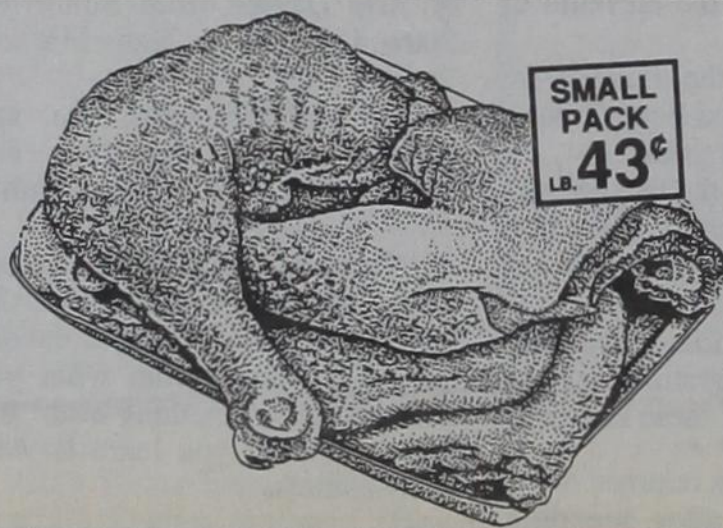
