Girls Is Missing Brother Is After Two Young Men

ELECTRA, Texas, Sept. 21.—The two young men who are alleged to have either abducted, or persuaded to leave with them, about 10 o'clock last Wednesday night, pretty 14-year old Vivian, daughter of N. O. Zerbel, a patent medicine salesman now in Electra, were last heard of at Matellie Thursday night.

The mother of the girl solicited the aid of local and county officials immediately on learning of her daughter's disappearance Thursday morning. The officials of every county in western Texas have been notified to be on the lookout for the trio. Mr. Zerbel has sent 40 telegrams to various points in the Panhandle and New Mexico. His 15-year old son is on the trail of the trio with a warrant for the arrest of the two young men. Young Zerbel wired from Childress yesterday that he had a clue to their whereabouts. The mother is in an almost hysterical condition over the absence of her daughter.

The two young men are described as being about 21 and 23 years of age, and are thought to have been involved in petty thefts here and at Wichita Falls. They are also suspected of stealing automobiles. One of them has been identified as being from San Angelo; the other is thought to hail from Ballinger.

The girl, Vivian Zerbel, is 34 years old and large for her age, has bobbed hair, blue eyes, and is quite attractive.

REVOLTS IN RUSSIA, ITALY AND SPAIN—WHAT NATION NEXT

Fast Spreading Reaction Against Democracy is Now Threatening the German Republic Says Lloyd George

By THE RIGHT HONORABLE DAVID LLOYD GEORGE, O. M., M. P. (Former British Premier.)

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LONDON, Sept. 22.—The Spanish coup d'etat is part of the general movement of reaction against democracy which has arisen since the war.

It started with the Bolshevik revolution; it swept over Italy; it has captured Bulgaria and its latest phase is the military insurrection in Spain. In fact one of the most remarkable products of the war has been the initiation and extension of movements throughout Europe bearing the Fascist character.

In essence, bolshevism and fascism are revolts against parliamentary methods of government—in other words, against the Democratic conception of government. In some quarters there is growing discontent with parliamentarism because of its dilatoriness, its confusion of aims, its pettiness, its costly inefficiency, its constant failure to attain its ideals. A great reformer is always, in the end, disappointed with the percentage of achievement which democracy has secured. The language of oratory. Most of them get discouraged altogether and then abandon the vain pursuit or relapse into languid support of conventional programs.

Now and again a man arises who gets angry and rudely brushing aside representative government, he resorts to direct action. That accounts for Russia. In other quarters there is deepening distrust of democracy because of its menace to existing interests and comforts, its supposed readiness to make unwise concessions to popular clamor, its reluctance to govern firmly when firm government gives temporary offense—because, in fact, it is too anxious to please. That was the complaint in Italy.

Signor Mussolini would probably claim Caesar as his prototype, but Cromwell was the first great modern fascist. Carlyle's description of Cromwell's "Purge" gives the whole substance of the Fascist doctrine.

"Come, come," exclaimed my lord, general in very high key, "we have had enough of this—and in fact my lord general is blowing all up into clear conflagration exclaims, 'I will put an end to your prating' and steps forth on to the floor of the house and clearing his throat, he occasionally stamping the floor with his feet, begins a discourse which no man can repeat. 'Heavens! he is heard saying 'It is not fit that you should sit here any longer. You have sat too long here for any good you have been doing lately. You shall now give place to better men. Call them in, add he hastily to Harrison in words of command, and some twenty or thirty grim musketeers enter with bullets in their snaphauchs, grimly prompt for orders, and stand in some attitude of 'orderly arms' there. Veteran men of might and men of war, their faces are as the faces of lions and their eyes as the eyes of the rose upon the mountains—not beautiful to the honorable gentlemen at this moment."

There you have the whole attitude of the Fascist in this historical deed of the greatest modern example of the type—the Cromwellian—described sympathetically by the greatest exponent and advocate of the doctrine—Thomas Carlyle.

Started in Russia
The present movement started not in Italy but in Russia. The first great fascist of today is not Mussolini but Lenin. He was the first to substitute force of popular election in a democratic state. Bolshevism was not a revolt against custom and Russian grand dukes. It was a revolution aimed at the overthrow of another revolution, which had already overthrown the ancient regime. Russia was a republic, the czar was a prisoner, the last surviving grand duke was in exile, the land of Russia had been confiscated and distributed amongst the peasants before Lenin took a hand in the government. He rebelled against the parliamentary regime of which Kerensky the Socialist, was chief. He grew contemptuous of the Volgas of rhetoric which flowed from the first Russian revolution. Endless talk which never frayed but which was nevertheless not navigable. It carried nothing, it turned nothing, it was all talk. It could not fight and it would not make peace. It undoubtedly had behind it an overwhelming majority of duty chosen representatives of the Russian people.

But Lenin had just as great a contempt for the will of the people as Mussolini. He therefore enrolled his followers into an army which swept away the newly-created parliamentary system and substituted for it a Cromwellian regime, based on organized force. It was the rule of the armed saints of communism.

Electoral system in France
The soviet system of election is a farce. No man who is opposed to bolshevism has a chance of appearing at the central assembly. Lenin does not attempt to conceal his opinion that the people are not fit to govern. It does not believe in democracy as a stranded democratic expedient—it has left its cradle.

Bolshevism is not a gigantic plundering of property classes for the benefit of the impecunious proletariat. That is not an exhaustive view of it. It is an accurate definition of its doctrine. It is all that but it is much more. It teaches the proletariat to sacrifice everything for the bolshevik state and its adherents readily sacrifice life, comfort, liberty, at the behest of the soviet leaders. All the misdeeds which have come from the failure to recognize this dominant factor in its composition. It is the spirit that animates fascism in Italy, and as long as it continues, bolshevism will rule Russia and fascism will govern Italy.

But they are both fatal to democratic government. Lenin and Mussolini alike despise parliamentarism. The bolshevik attitude towards

minister. I do not intend to sell my birthright for a mess of pottage—the collaboration of the dogs of Italian political life. If collaboration was to be offered, it must be wholehearted and unconditional. I do not deny the people's right to conclude. Their just murmurs, and, but this must not be exaggerated."

No Mistaking Meaning
There can be no mistaking the meaning of these words. The people may exercise their right to murmur in and through parliament, but that limited right must not be exaggerated. Fascism was "strong enough in itself," whatever parliament chose to do or not to do. This is the real Cromwellian attitude.

Spain now follows the example of Russia, Italy and Bulgaria. The existing Spanish parliament was only recently elected on a basis of universal suffrage. There was a liberal government in power which, judged according to all constitutional standards, enjoyed the confidence of that parliament. "It did not, however, enjoy the confidence of all classes in the country. What party government does? But in this case, opposition was powerfully entrenched in the army command. That is also the case in other lands and that fact, once upon a time, proved to be a serious menace to the life of the third republic in France. It was saved by Clemenceau. Waldeck, Roumieu, Belin, Zola and many another strong man, who believed in liberty.

In Spain the army has successfully arrogated to itself the functions of a parliamentary majority. It has now formed a government. The principle of popular sovereignty expressed by parliamentary institutions is set aside in favor of the Cromwellian principle that if major opposition is dismantled with the working of these institutions, they can at any moment step in to regulate them.

Which will be the next country?

These coups have been attempted in Germany by communists and reactionaries in their turn, but so far with no success. The assembly of democracy are still on the watch—perhaps on the point. It things go badly for Germany, they will all probably ending their conspires. Will they prevail? If so, which of them? Much depends on the answer the coming months will give to these questions.

The spreading of reaction against democracy is a serious movement which needs careful watching in all countries. It has the sympathy of extremists on the left as well as on the right. Only a few years ago the British trade unions were temporarily captivated by the idea and called it "direct action." The extreme conservative wing today do not conceal their enthusiasm for Mussolini and his methods. The dis-hardism which sought the present government into the world is zealously fascist in sympathy, outlook and more and more in expression. "Conservatism and constitutionalism were formerly interchangeable terms. But that was in the days when the majority of adults had no voice in the working of the constitution. It is no longer so. An increasing number of conservatives are looking towards unconstitutional methods for security against changes which democracy may soon demand. It is a dangerous hope to cherish. For this weapon is at hand for the communist as well as the conservative to handle. If General Primo saved it in Spain, Lenin snatched it in Russia and his followers are still wielding it with merciless power.

Democracy bears strains.
Democracy has its faults. No doubt they were at their worst in Italy when Mussolini rose. But the great lesson of war is that democratic institutions bear a prolonged national strain where authority breaks down. The nations that snapped the axle were Russia first

then Bulgaria (a dictatorship born of a coup d'etat), then Turkey, then Austria, then Germany—all of them autocratic governments. They fell according to the degree of their democracy.

The nations that stood the strain without a break were the democratically governed countries of Britain, France and Italy. The United States of America only came in late and therefore it would be hardly fair to quote them as an example. Democratic institutions are good or bad, according to the quality of the people from whom they draw their power. No stream can ascend above its source. If the people receive sound education, they can be trusted with the destinies of their country.

PRESIDENTIAL POSSIBILITIES FROM VIEWPOINT OF FARMER

Sympathetic Feeling for Coolidge But Ford Has Stronger Following; Mark Sullivan Reviews Campaign

This means that the successful candidate in the election must have something more than half of the 531 electoral votes. Ordinarily, only one of the candidates of the two old parties running for president is automatically elected, but if the other has the necessary majority. But if Henry Ford should complete the situation by running on a third ticket he might, while falling far short of meeting the requirements for election, carry enough states to bring it about that neither the Republican nor the Democratic candidate should have a majority in the electoral college.

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In such an outcome the law requires that the election be thrown into the lower house of congress. This has happened in two cases in our history, once in the case of Jefferson and Burr, in 1801, and once in the case of John Quincy Adams and Andrew Jackson, in 1825.

If the coming election for the presidency should, by such a sequence of events as is here outlined, be thrown into the present house of representatives, some curious and disturbing results might readily follow. The congress elects a president by a vote, not an individual member by states. That is to say, the

STATE URGENT IN REQUEST FOR TAX ON SLOT MACHINES

Several urgent requests have been received by Guy C. Raley, county tax collector, from the state, prompting him to make quick collection of taxes on all slot machines in Florida county. Character of Saint Luke Described By Judge Kay in Sunday Morning Lecture to Class at Strand Theater

One of the largest crowds that has attended the Kay Bible Class of the First Methodist Church, south, in several weeks, was present at the Strand Theater Sunday morning, September 16, when Judge John C. Kay delivered the following lecture on the subject of "Luke," as reported by Mrs. Lilyan A. Ward:

St. Luke, in the New Testament, became one of the great writers of authority, historic authority for the life of the Savior. Why does he become so? Because, he was a cool, level-headed, sober, quiet man. Luke doesn't get excited about anything. He can tell his story in fewest words that any man in this house. When he comes to where that boy died, in one place, he didn't make a great, long, rambling, pathetic story out of it, but he said: "He was her only son and she was a widow. How much more than mine? did he express in one line. The Bible does that. It just guesses out all the chaff and straws, and leaves you with the very wine of Lough."

"Luke was a physician. The Master was often called a physician. Now, a physician in that day was something different from what he is today. Just how different, we do not know. I want to pay my compliment here this morning, as best I am able, to a righteous, fair, industrious doctor. I think a doctor, whose chief ambition and whose chief reason is to go out and serve his life in serving humanity, ranks among the greatest of all men. But, I speak not for that doctor who would make haste to be rich. Some of these country doctors, living in small communities, that have devoted their lives to the treatment of the sufferings of that community, rank among the world's heroes, and no doubt, many of you will recall men that type."

"Now, Luke laid that down. He even laid that great profession down to take up a greater one—to go about with St. Paul, teaching the gospel. 'You know whether he was a big man when Paul says that he was his companion.' 'Who is going to write that about you—that you were his companion and friend? When you get up yonder, they may ask you 'What kind of people did you associate with down here on earth?' Now, we can't all be friends to the great. There are not many St. Pauls running around for me to meet and associate with, but let me beg of you to have good friends, true friends, decent friends, or that you have none."

"Luke went out—for what? To make the world better. To make it better! 'I haven't much time, as I have so often said here, and not for ineluctable inoff' herad' emfryp elimination if I had all the time, to exalt any church, or to lift up the hands of any religious movement, naked christianism's wrypted on that merely wanted to teach a naked belief.' 'These apostles went out, as the Savior went out, to relieve human suffering, and to meet human need, and to teach men a better way of life. Yet, some of these fellows will debate. They do not have these debates like they used to have them so much, but they would meet out here on Mud Creek and debate about what the Bible meant. Let me tell you, folks, that's ignorant, doing. "Preaching Signs Unheeded. 'How many signs are we going to pass by unheeded? Are we going to turn these things off and try to put around later, and trust? We do not like to mention it, but once in a while I die.' Well, lots of you are dying now, with your heads turning white, with a tooth coming out, with a little capillary broken somewhere in your body, with a little tube stopped up. We are already dying, and this gospel is to bring men. A great doctor taught that when a man was forty years old, the seeds were already planted in his body that were going to carry him away from here. Will you listen to this great gospel? Will you believe in it? What is it with all of its imagery, with all its wealth, with all its beauty, with all of its power? Is it to be wasted and lost on us because we will not heed, and will not listen, and will not look out? 'Paul thought, and Luke thought, and the Savior thought that these things were so important to men that they never lost an instant of time in rushing through their life in the world, hither and yonder, in order that they might reach, in the short time allotted to them, as many men as possible. But, they couldn't reach them all. They did not reach them all. They do not now. The effort of the church is to reach as many as possible. But, that book says that it is for all."

PRESIDENT GIVES FARM SITUATION MUCH ATTENTION

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23.—The agricultural situation continued to command a majority of President Coolidge's attention today, several sessions of congress calling at the white house to give the president their views on what should be done for the wheat farmers in particular.

Senator Borah, of Idaho, who has been the most vocal of the wheat farmers, at the conclusion of his visit, said that he had expressed to the president the same views on the need for an extra session of congress as outlined in the executive by Senator Borah of Idaho, who has been the most vocal of the wheat farmers.

The Dakota senator was pessimistic on the suggestion that crop diversification could solve the wheat farmers' problem. He declared it was easy to suggest, but hard to put into effect. He added it would be just as easy to ask a cotton manufacturer to go into the mining business, if conditions were had in the cotton goods trade, and just as likely of accomplishment.

Senator Cameron of Arizona took issue with Senator Borah, declaring he could see no occasion for an extra session and that diversification is a practical solution. Representative Anderson of Minnesota laid before the president a plan of immediate relief that need not wait on legislation, he said. Anderson proposed that the flexible provision of the tariff law be invoked to protect American wheat against Canadian competition and thereby increase the price and stabilize the market.

The counterfeiters operated in Vienna, Budapest and Warsaw, their plant being in the Polish capital. One hundred small bills that had been raised to \$100 bills by the skill working crooks were taken when the gang was caught.

Inside Stuff On the Total Eclipse

By WILL ROGERS

Well, I have just this minute returned from Tia Juana, Mexico, where I along with some thousands of other Scientists, went to see the Total Eclipse. That is what we were going for. You know I don't take much excuse to get a man, or woman either, to go to Mexico nowadays. So when the Scientists said that Los Angeles was only to get a 40 percent Eclipse (that is about the only thing I ever knew Los Angeles to fall down on). They are generally the percent, I kinder hurt their pride. It was the first time that Nature had ever handed them a mere 99.

I don't really think they would have ever gotten over it but San Francisco only received some 50 or 60 percent so that kinder saved things over.

But the Chamber of Commerce has held a meeting and voted Resolution to send for the next Eclipse in its vicinity. They claim that it was due to the Club not giving the matter more thought that they lost the One Percent on this one.

Well, the Scientist Road Map showed that Catalina Island and San Diego and Tia Juana, were right in the path of total blackness. Everybody that could get out of a California line in time to make the trip started for one of these places. Catalina Island offered wonderful possibilities. You could get two rounds of Seaside, see the Eclipse and get your Chewing Gum at cost—all in one-day's pleasure.

San Diego is a Town built in the most South Western part of the United States where Americans who are coming out of Mexico sober up, before being able to go to their various homes, and it is really remarkable what a thriving Town it is. You would be surprised at the business they do.

There are nice Hotels there with ice Water in every room, and even Banks where you can draw Drafts on your Home Bank after a Day in Mexico at the Tables, (as they say in Monte Carlo books). San Diego makes very few going down into Mexico, (only the Punahoes) is made by people who are in a great hurry to get there, once you begin to reach the Oasis.

So you see it didn't take much decision on my part to decide that if I, along with the other Scientists who were to write on this Traffic accident in the Skies, want to pick out an Observatory there was no particular reason why we should select a Dry one.

Well, my friend Mr. Henry Ford may or may not ever be President, but I want to publicly say this to him that the people he sells his Cars to are of a very high type of intelligence. I never saw so many owners of one make of car so interested in Astronomy in my life. These were not only Autos of every make but people of every make, (some two rows deep for 150 miles) struggling to reach Tia Juana, Mexico, FOR THE ECLIPSE.

You would see people going to Mexico to see this eclipse, who, if you looked at them, you wouldn't think they knew when Sunday passed between Monday and Saturday, much less when the Moon passed between the Sun and Earth.

Now, as I say, we passed through some 70 miles of United States Territory that was to be blotted out totally, but there wasn't an observatory in the entire region. Being my first year as a Journalist and this being my first assignment to cover a total Eclipse for the various papers who crave my Scientific knowledge, I am really ashamed to admit it but, outside of not even knowing what an Eclipse was or when one was to happen, I had never even entered one of their Observatories where they watch these Eclipses; so it was with the greatest anxiety and enthusiasm that I dashed up to the Mexico line.

The Country to the south of us we have lately recognized. (The reason for my other Nation that wants us to recognize them, is to strike Oil, or some other commodity that our Capitalists want.) But this editorial is not on our Foreign Relations. That I will take up in due time as we have some Foreign Relations. This is to be on the Plains, their various Routes, mode and speed of travel.

A great many Scientists, I had read in the papers, were bringing Cameras to Photograph this remarkable phenomenon. But most of the Scientists that I saw had Jugs and Flasks. Well, not being on Science, I didn't know what to bring. You know these Scientists are such a queer lot I wouldn't be surprised at anything they do.

Well, I asked the Custom Inspector where the Observatory was. He said, "Which one?" I said, "Lick." (That was the only one I had ever heard of.) He said, "Right over there is one, if it ain't all Licked up."

You never saw such an accommodating Country in the World. Just think of the preparations they had gone through for the visiting Scientists' Pleasure. They had built these Observatories all over the place right up to the line where you would lose no time. You could start observing the minute you got into the Country.

Now, there is set to be among my readers some who are as ignorant as I am about the inside of an Observatory, so far their benefit I will explain just what it is like. On the left, as you enter, is a long Table affair, that runs the length of the room. It's really higher than a Table, and back of it is a long Mirror where you get the reflections of any local Eclipses that might happen. Then on the bottom, outside this high counter, is a little low railing that Signers' Mirrors could look over if they wanted to see an Eclipse.

Now, up here in Los Angeles, they talked about smoked Glasses, but down there they just filled them and looked through them, and the more Glasses you used, and the more different kinds of glasses, why, the more Eclipse, you could see. Some men would have to get the man to let them try a dozen different Glasses before they could get the right focus.

Then, on the other side of the room, if you didn't want to look through glasses upside down, why they had various other instruments of knowledge. One was a Table with little Cubes set square for apparently square) with Dots on them and the Scientist would shake them in his hand and lay down some Money, and then let them empty out his hand. Then another Scientist, even more of a Scientist, would pick up the money in one hand and the little squares in the other and hand the squares to another Scientist and put the money in his Pocket. Then the same operation would be gone through, till each Scientist except the good one, would be gone through.

I asked a visiting Agronomy Professor what the idea was. He

said, "You can see if you are right." I says, "What has that got to do with the eclipse?" He says, "Why you bet on the passing." So I bet them I would pass but I didn't, so now I want the Scientist to figure out in what year I am going to pass.

By that time it was 12:30 P. M. so I came out of the Observatory as that was the time it was supposed to be Total, but there wasn't a Soul on the Streets or outside any place. Everybody was on the inside looking at the Eclipse. It was pretty dark on the Street and a Mexican who lived in the edge of the Town started milking his Cow, and raising the mischief with his wife because she didn't have his supper ready.

One fellow staggered out of an Observatory and I asked him if he had seen the Eclipse and he said, "Which one?" But it certainly was a success from a Scientific point of view, for way along in the evening after it had gotten light, I saw Astronomers piled up in every Observatory just overcome by what the Scientists call the Corona, or after effects of an Eclipse.

Oh yes, the Mexicans also put on for the visiting Astrologers a Bull Fight. It was held at the lower end of the Town. You had to pass every Observatory in town before you reached the Bull Ring.

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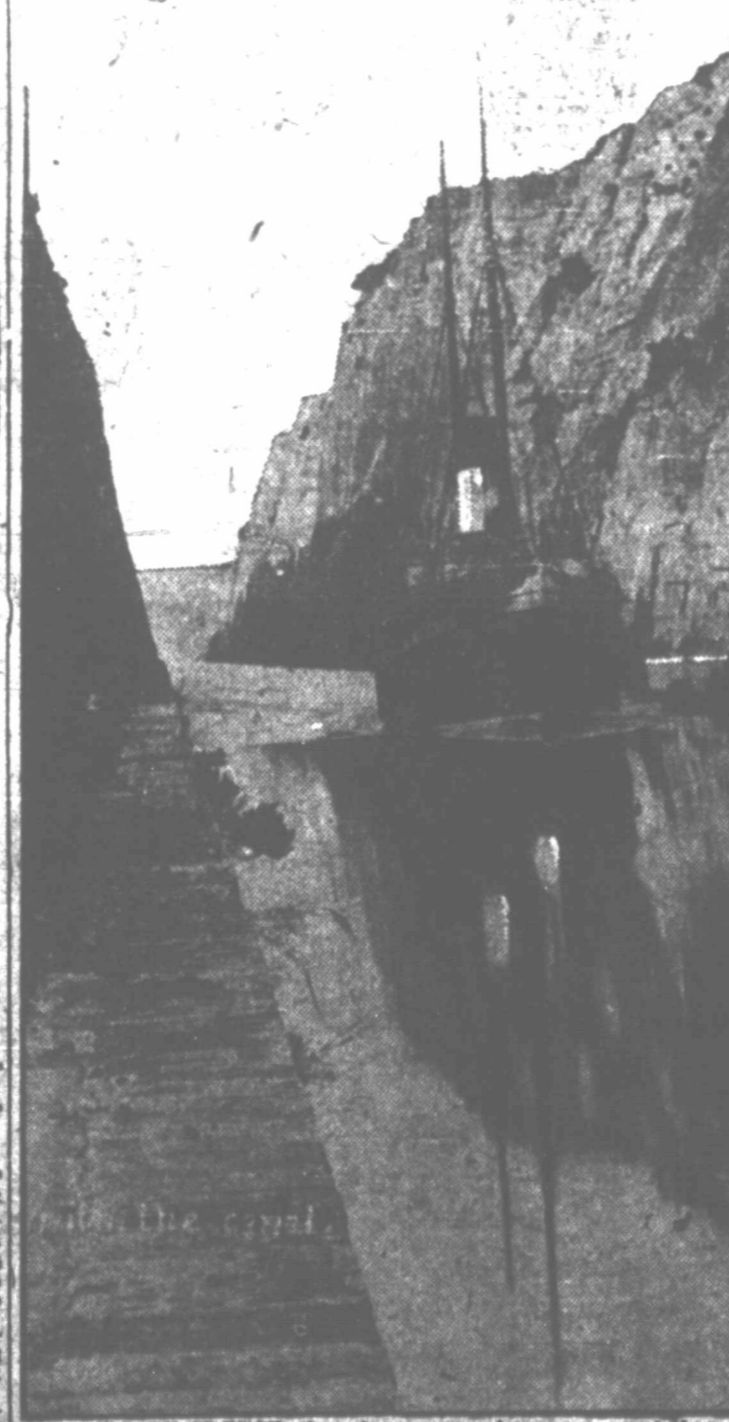

UNDERS HOLD MAJORITY OF LEAGUE RECORDS FOR ALL TIME

In Four Years Wichita Falls Clubs Complete Nearly Three Times as Many High Marks as All Others Combined

Spudder clubs in four seasons in the American League have completed nearly three times as many club records as all the other teams combined. This fact is disclosed in figures compiled by League Statisticians William B. Sargent. Of eleven standing records Wichita Falls clubs hold eight.

But one other league record was established last season, San Antonio's 97 triples being better than any mark compiled by any club up to the past season.

In the eleven departments of club play in 1933 the Spudders topped the circuit in six, those being in total bases, runs, two base hits, home runs, stolen bases and runs batted in. In league records for all time Wichita Falls tops the list for batting average, greatest number of hits, total bases, runs, two base hits, home runs, runs batted in and consecutive victories.

In the individual averages, but one Spudder is listed. George Blomhoff handled more chances than any catcher in the league during the last season. No Spudder holds a record for all time, although Benny Warner established the high fielding mark for shortstops in 1918 while with Waco.

Croquettes for Fall and Winter; Exactly How to Make Them Best; From Foundation Sauce to Frying

Croquettes seem to suggest themselves as soon as cool weather approaches. Their golden brown color fits in well with the fall season of the year.

Croquettes offer a most delectable way of using up left-over meats, fish, vegetables and cereals, either alone or in many excellent combinations. They are made either with cereal, such as rice, or with a white sauce as a foundation.

A few simple points for making and frying croquettes successfully should be kept in mind. Ingredients that are put in the croquette should be chopped very fine, seasoned to taste with salt, pepper, and whatever other seasonings are to be used.

Shaping may be done with the fingers or with small molds which can be bought for that purpose. It is best to allow about one rounding tablespoon mixture for each croquette, since if they are too large they may not cook thoroughly in the center.

To fry croquettes satisfactorily, one must observe the following rules: Use a heavy kettle. Fill it at least 2-3 full of fat. Test the fat before frying the food.

So the director disposes of the scenes in which this player does not appear.

All this requires careful planning in order to save expense and time, and the successful director of today must, in addition to his ability to produce cinematic entertainment, be considerable of an executive.

GRAY COUNTY PREPARES EXHIBIT FOR TRI-STATE FAIR, AMARILLO, TEXAS

MCLAN, Texas, Sept. 22.—The 14 communities of Gray county are at this time working on the county exhibit for the Tri-State Fair to be held in Amarillo September 25 to 28.
The diversity of the crops of the county can be seen in the fact that the south side of the county has already sent in as a part of their exhibit over forty varieties of farm products. This does not include the forage crops of the south side of the county and none of the products that are raised almost exclusively in the north side, such as wheat and oats.
Despite the fact that the date of the Amarillo fair is earlier than the McLan fair, which will necessitate double work on the farmers, all prospects point to the success of county exhibition at Amarillo.

With 18,879 poll taxes assessed this year and appearing on the assessor's rolls, it is estimated conservatively by those who have watched the payment of poll taxes year by year, that over 15,000 voters of Wichita county will qualify during the late spring season to vote in the many elections of 1924.

The year 1924 will see a large number of elections. There will be city elections and county, state and national. Keen interest will be manifested in all these elections and this will prompt many to qualify who do not show interest in other years.
More poll taxes appear on the rolls this year than ever before in the history of the county and for the past four or five years the number of voters who qualify, either by payment of a poll tax or by securing an exemption certificate, is in excess of the number of polls assessed.
However, it has also been noticed that regardless of how many poll taxes are paid the number who exercise their privileges of voting at elections is always two or three thousand less. At this rate it is predicted that the county, state and national elections will in all probability draw a total of 11,000, which means a far greater than at any other election ever held.
The less in the number of votes cast as compared with the number who qualified is explained by many as meaning that probably twenty per cent of the women, who are forced to pay poll taxes because of being assessed on real property do not care to vote and therefore do not exercise this privilege.
Men who have property and who are married are required by law to pay two poll taxes, as the wife is also assessed and can be charged against the property.

POLICE AND SAFETY OFFICIALS LIKE OAKLAND TRAVELER

Mr. Huff, local Oakland dealer, states that he has received notice that the "True Blue Traveler" is coming along but surely, in this direction. The program is necessarily slow, but Mr. Huff has assurance that he will receive notice of the exact time of arrival in this city in time to make ample announcement to the public.

Based on enthusiastic endorsements already received from police and public safety officials in the cities and towns which have the first models of the 1924 Oakland True Blue Traveler, Oakland four wheel brakes are destined to be recognized as one of the greatest safety features ever incorporated in a motor car. It was stated.

The True Blue Traveler are the first models of the 1924 Oakland line to come out of the factories at Pontiac, Michigan, and so confident were the factory officials of the performance of the new models on which experimental work has been conducted for two years, that the first cars were dispatched to all points of the compass to demonstrate the performance under every road and climatic condition.

One of the main reasons for dispatching the cars was to demonstrate the safety features of the four wheel brakes, and in order to do this thoroughly, it is planned to offer a demonstration to police department officials in the more than 1,000 cities and towns through which these cars pass.

"As it is well known that the amount of braking power is governed by the friction resistance of the tires against the road, by distributing the braking effort over all four wheels, Oakland obtains not only more positive braking, but smoother deceleration. There is consequently less wear on brake bands and tires and less strain on the chassis mechanism.

"It is impossible to lock the front wheels on a dry pavement.

"The tendency to skid has been practically eliminated because the whole tendency of the car is not to skid, but to continue going forward in the original direction of travel. Even on wet pavement this holds true.

"The four wheel brake mechanism on the front wheels has been so arranged that turning, the outer front wheel brake is automatically released which insures perfect control of steering at all times. This means that even in turning a corner at high speed, when it is necessary to apply the brakes, there will be no danger of skidding.

"The brakes are easily accessible, being of the external contracting

THE MOTORISTS' PROBLEMS

By WILLIAM H. STEWART, JR.

Motor Department: When does the gas have more time to burn when the spark is retarded or advanced?—READER.

Gas has more time to burn with advanced spark. If spark is retarded too far there is very little left to the power stroke. The exhaust valve opens as soon as that of the power of the explosion is not exerted on the piston. The advanced spark gives more power and so makes the engine speed up. If advanced too far under load, however, it will cause a knock. The valve for setting the spark lever is to move it as far in the advance position as possible, just short of the point where it will cause knocking.

Motor Department: Can you tell me how I can tell whether the generator on my car is generating or not?—READER.

Work on the generator through one of the spark plugs.—OWNER.

If not provided with ammeter, run engine and disconnect one of the generator wires and see if a spark occurs there. If the battery does not charge properly the generator may not be working, although this would also be caused by dirty commutator brushes or a poor contact on some wire. You are either feeding too rich a mixture or inlet manifold leaks. Tighten that and also spark trouble should stop.

Motor Department: As I am overhauling my car I am told that I need new pistons and rings. These I got and find that the pistons have three rings above the wrist pin and set any below. The old pistons had three above and one below the wrist pin. Will these new pistons work as well as the old ones?—L. N.

The lower ring is placed on a piston for the purpose of scraping the excess oil and preventing it working up into the combustion space and causing carbon. Evidently the manufacturer has found that it is not necessary and so has left it off. Undoubtedly the new pistons will work as well as the old ones.

Motor Department: I have an old Studebaker and the motor has recently developed a slight knock. How much business do they quote when refitting over-size pistons? Is it advisable to renew all type and the only adjustment necessary being at the bands.

"The use of adjustable timing steel wheels on all models greatly facilitates any adjustment and also simplifies the work of changing tires.

a heavy misting of white lead in any advantage.—OWNER.

It is doubtful whether white lead would cure the trouble, since it would soon become hard and crack from vibration. If there is no reason available for filling the entire space between the rings with lead, this may help for the time being, but you should have it adjusted at the first opportunity.

Motor Department: My Ford differential is becoming noisy, possibly because I have not adjusted it recently. I put oil in the grease regularly. Is the differential oilled from the engine or must it be leak-d after assembly?—OWNER.

The oiling system on the Ford car merely takes care of the engine and gear. The plug on the differential housing must be removed and more grease inserted at frequent intervals. Use a medium cup grease. If this does not stop the noise, perhaps you will find it necessary to make repairs.

Motor Department: I have a four cylinder car, 1917 model, which at times will not start. The starting system, but will not turn the engine. This happens about every fourth or fifth time. I have had two mechanics examine the car without results. Can you give me any information regarding how to overcome this trouble?—OWNER.

The trouble probably is in your starting system. Inspect the battery and the wire from the battery to the starter terminal on ammeter.

does not improve its action have it taken apart. The rollers may be tight, or they may have worn slightly, or the motor may be too tight, which will need replacing.

Motor Department: I noticed on my Ford a small roller located on the front wheel to prevent dust. It was about six inches long with pointed end. Does such a device really prevent wheeling as the car is started?—READER.

Such devices cause delay and any slight tampering with it takes a big risk of being caught. A quick and efficient get-away is a thief's best protection.

Motor Department: I have an old model Ford with generator type block. Wash to use generator and battery for light only. Please explain how to install and wire up same.—READER.

Connect up as follows: Generator to ammeter. Ammeter to lighting switch. Switch to lights, which are grounded. Positive of battery to ammeter. Negative of battery to ground. Care should be taken to connect the wire from generator and the wire from lighting switch to same terminal on ammeter.

will stop the system. This applies particularly to oil pumps of the plunger type using check valves. An obstruction in the valve will cause the system to fall and may burn out a bearing.

Keep careful track of your oil consumption, as it means better efficiency of your engine. If you find you are using an excessive amount, it means that there is a leak, which is expensive, or that the engine is sucking it up into the combustion space, which means carbon and all the troubles which may follow.

Too much emphasis cannot be placed on lubrication. More trouble can be traced to lack of lubrication than to any other cause. Study your lubrication chart, and follow it carefully. If your instruction book is lost, make a special study of each part of your car. Find out what parts work in contact with some other parts, and see that oil or grease reaches them.

Remember that too much oil is almost as bad as too little. If the oil level is too high too much oil will get up on top of the pistons and a lot of trouble will follow. But too little oil is worse, as it may result in scored cylinders, seized pistons and a bent crank shaft. So watch your oil gauge and keep the system properly filled.

Do not neglect to change the oil

in the crank case because it is a dirty job. The manufacturer knows when it should be changed and his advice should be followed. If you would visit a repair shop and see a few engines that have suffered from neglect, you would be more careful of your own.

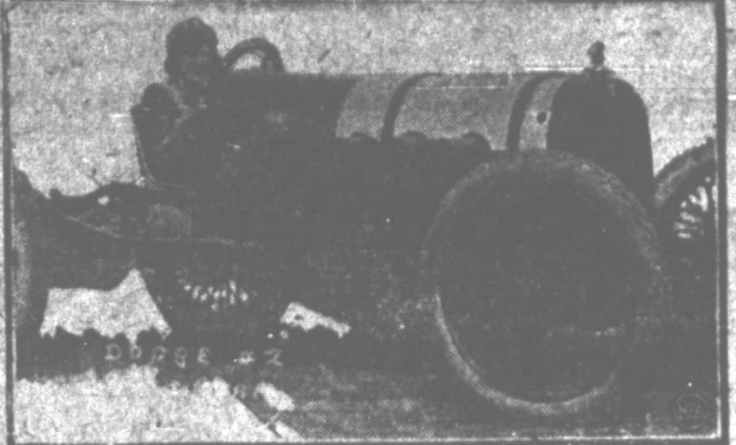

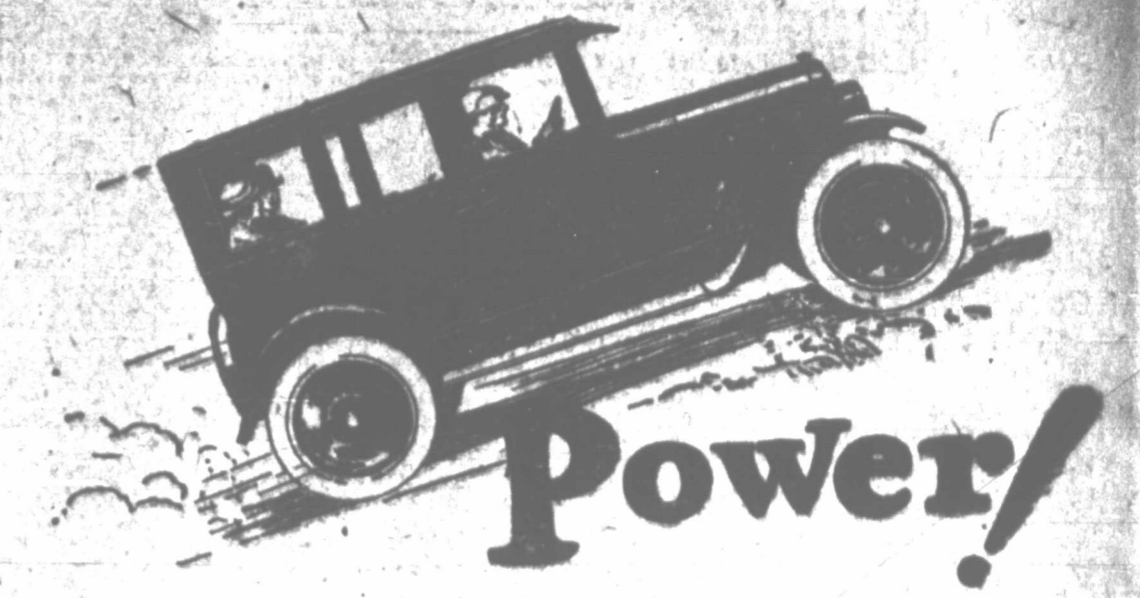

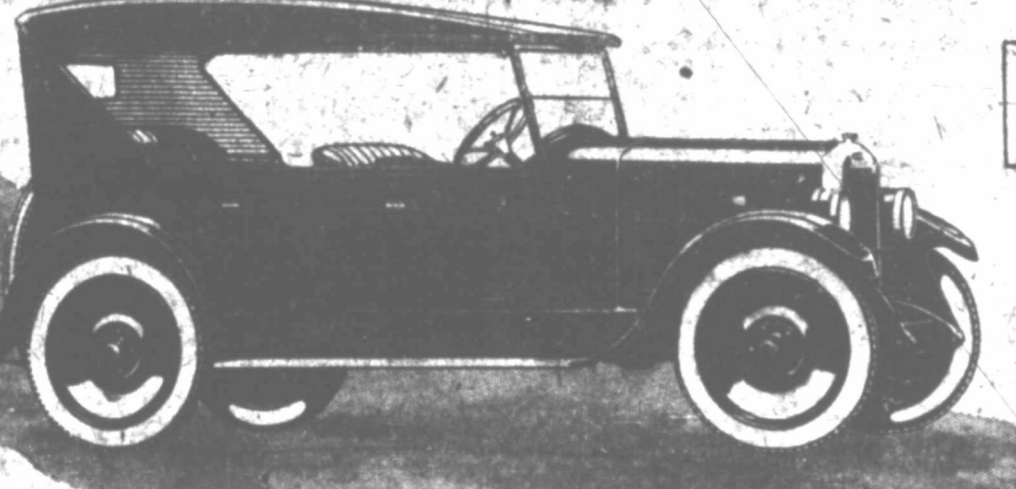
School Pupils to be Trained In
Habits of Highway Safety as Part
National Campaign, With 500 Prizes

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22.—Renewal of its annual safety contests, in which \$6,000 will be given away in prizes, was announced today by the highway educational board.

Training children in habits of highway safety is the principal task of the 1922 safety campaign, it is said, but through the children it is hoped that the principles of traffic regulation and safety education will be impressed upon adults, both pedestrians and drivers alike.

The third annual safety campaign takes the form of two contests, one among elementary school pupils, and another among elementary school teachers. Approximately five hundred state and national prizes are to be given for the best essays and lessons written. The prizes offered are the gifts of the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce, which is desirous of reducing the number of accidents and fatalities due to traffic mishaps. In the two previous years approximately 400,000 pupils and 20,000 teachers have participated each autumn. It is believed by board officials that the cumulative effect of these contests, and the increasing attention given to safety education will result in even a greater number of participants this year. The subject of the essays which children are invited to write is "Highway Safety Habits I Should Learn." Essays, as last year, are not to exceed five hundred words in length. Those eligible are pupils of the fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grades, who are not more than fourteen years of age. The contest opens with the beginning of school, and closes December 4, 1922. Teachers are requested to submit safety lessons on the subject "Training Children in Habits of Safety on the Highways." The limit suggested is between 1,000 to 1,500 words. All elementary school teachers in the eighth and lower grades are eligible to submit lessons. In the teachers' contest the first national award is five hundred dollars and a trip to Washington with all expenses paid. The second national award is three hundred dollars, while the third award is two hundred dollars. The first national prize for the best essay by pupils is a gold watch and a trip to Washington with all expenses paid. The second and third prizes are each gold watches, one of slightly greater value than the other. Four hundred seventy-eight state prizes are offered pupils. The first state prize is a gold medal and a check for fifteen dollars. The second state prize is a silver medal and ten dollars. Third prizes, which vary in proportion to the elementary school population of the state, are bronze medals and checks for five dollars. 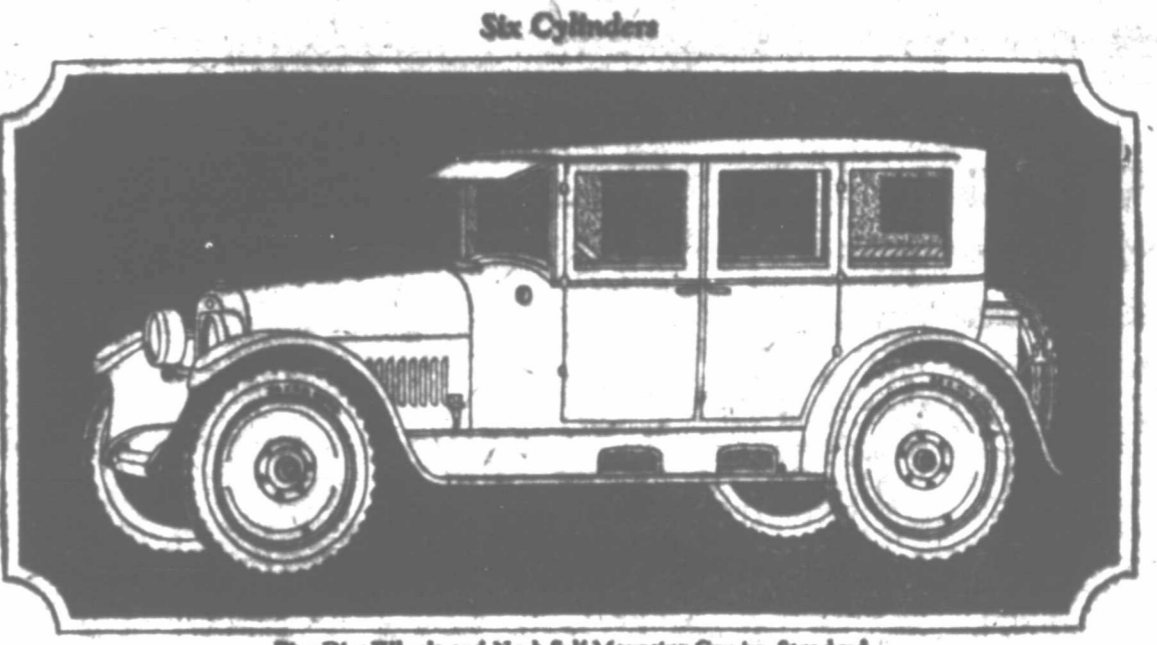

PREDICTS 50 MILES PER GALLON GAS TO BE REALIZED

By NEA Service. SUTTON, O., Sept. 22.—A few months ago, C. F. Kettering, president of the General Motors Chemical Company, a subsidiary of General Motors, predicted an average of 50 miles to a gallon of gasoline in four years.

Only recently, Kettering's firm came out with a new fuel which was produced by the result of the process.

The fuel is called Ethyl Gas and consists of ordinary commercial gasoline to which a small quantity of Ethyl Fluid has been added. It is the result of a long and patient experiment in the General Motors Research Laboratories here, during which automobiles were run hundreds of thousands of miles on this and other test fuels.

In the tests more than 250 substances were tried out, until the best was found. The fuel is called Ethyl Gas because it is produced by the action of ethyl alcohol on gasoline. The fuel is called Ethyl Gas because it is produced by the action of ethyl alcohol on gasoline.

What brought on the decision of the General Motors Chemical Company to develop a new fuel was the trouble motorists have been experiencing with knocking. Through research in this bureau of motoring by Thomas Midegley Jr., now general manager of the chemical company, he brought him to the conclusion that "knocking" was not caused by faulty ignition, or by carbon igniting the gas before the spark could be struck, but by the high velocity, striking the side of the combustion chamber or top of the piston. Considerable damage could be done by this wave, even by weakening the engine.

The chemists sought a remedy and finally came upon Ethyl Gas as the solution. They figured that if the compression of the engine could be increased, greater power and economy could be obtained. But increased compression produced the knock, which they finally have been able to forestall by the use of the Ethyl Gas.

Addition of only one-tenth of one percent by volume of Ethyl Fluid to the gasoline is said to be enough to produce the desired result. Its use is said to eliminate loss of power, waste of gasoline and carbonization.

It is a step toward the fulfillment of Kettering's prediction of 50 miles on a gallon of fuel.

New Models and Price Cuts Continue To Feature Automotive Industry, Production Constantly Increases

By ROY C. HAYES, Special Correspondent Universal Service. DETROIT, Sept. 22.—The automobile industry is fast on its way toward rounding out a production of close to 4,000,000 vehicles. September production will be in excess of August, in spite of the fact that many companies have slowed up operations to an appreciable degree to change over their machinery for new models that have already made their bow or will within the next few weeks.

In contrast to some plants are figures made public by the Ford Motor Company. Change to the new models by that concern was made with but very little delay. In fact production of the new type was made practically overnight and in every plant of the company. Eight new engines are being adapted for similar tasks for the Lincoln company. Several changes are being made at the Lincoln plant and at the same time production is maintained at the peak.

Certainly the 1929 season is off to a flying start, brought about through introduction of many new models and aided by price reductions. The Lincoln plant at Flint is producing at the rate of 100 cars daily, and one hundred Durant cars daily, officials report. Operations of the Mason Truck Company are to be shifted back from Bridgeport, Conn., to Flint, and W. O. Durant has let a contract for the construction of an administration building at Flint.

Hypmobile officials report a strong demand for new models, with every indication that record breaking production will be maintained. Rec- plans are running close to capacity, with the company receiving a large share of motor bus business. High volume of sales continues, according to Captain Eddie Richenbacher, with the company turning out around seventy cars daily.

Willis St. Clair is another company that is rapidly getting back to normal. Since reorganization production is gradually being increased. The company has spent much time building up its dealer organization.

Markets Unstable. Ford domestic production continues in excess of forty thousand weekly. Output for the week ending Tuesday was 46,555 cars and trucks. For the week 1,324 "tractors" were built and the Lincoln division produced 102 cars. August sales of the Ford Motor Company aggregated 157,500 automobiles and trucks, or 86.6 per cent greater than August, 1927. Ford trucks continue to be increasing in demand from business and agricultural interests with sales for last month reaching 11,441, a gain of more than 3,000 over last year.

Hudson is keeping up the good work. Reduction was made in price this week on all super-six models, cuts ranging from \$75 to \$100. Present selling price of super-six is \$53 less than the original price of the super-six in 1925.

Tire markets remain unstable. The Firestone company, being cut prices on Ford size tires from 11 to 13 per cent. This cut has been met by the United States Rubber Company, cutting prices on fabric and cord tires in Ford sizes from 15 to 22 per cent. Other manufacturers are expected to join. This is the outgrowth of dealers offering the size of tires in special lots at reduced prices.

Alterations costing \$1,000,000 are nearly completed at the Oakland factory at Pontiac, Mich. When completed, the plant will have doubled its capacity to 500 cars daily. King Motors, recently purchased by Buffalo Industries, is being moved to the Empire state city. Production is expected to start there about October 15.

CITIZENS URGED TO LEND AID TO CLEAN-UP WORK

Monday, September 24, has been designated by the chamber of commerce, the civic league and city administration as Clean-up Day. These three organizations are cooperating in a campaign to put the city in the best possible condition by the opening day of the Texas-Oklahoma Fair. An effort will be made to do as much of the work as possible on the day that has been set aside. Special facilities for cleaning up and removing rubbish from premises are being provided property owners by the street and sanitary departments of the city. Commissioner Patton has offered the cooperation of his department in the use of wagons and other available equipment in collecting trash and refuse.

The following suggestions are being made by the committees for the proper observance of clean-up day: First—See that all weeds are cut from property that you own or control. Second—Collect all trash and place in boxes or other receptacles at the rear of premises convenient for trash haulers. Do not take trash in piles and expect trash men to pick it up. 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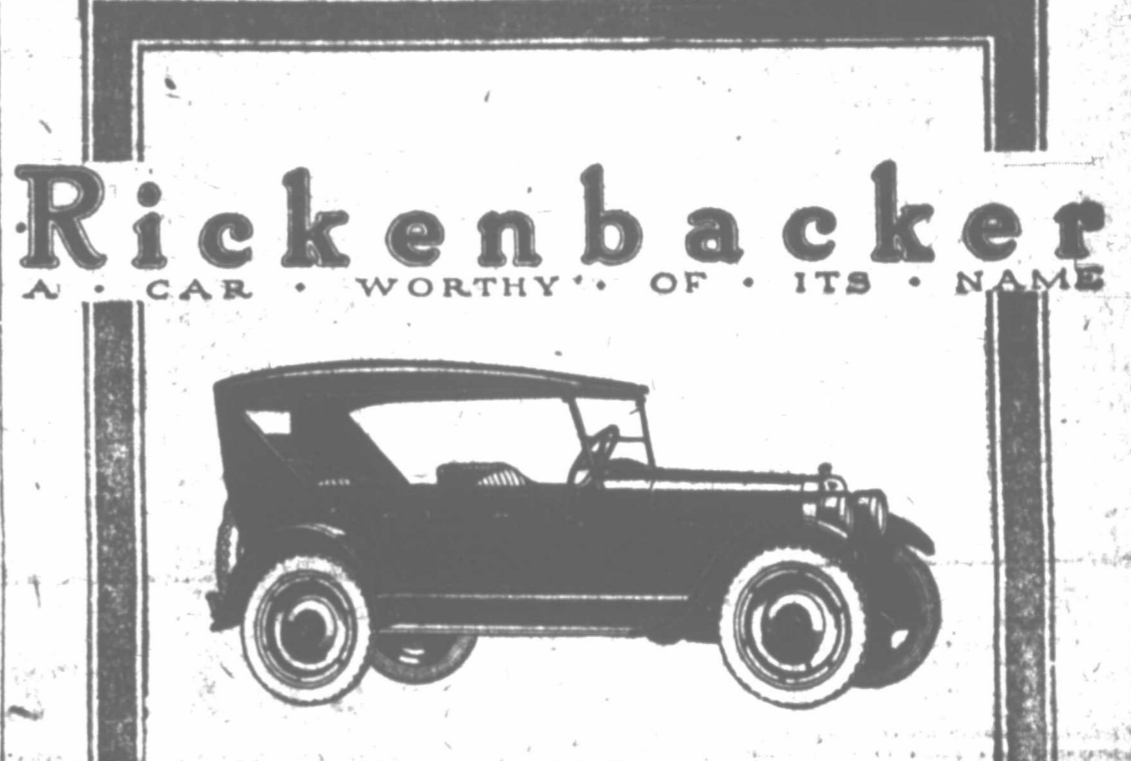
