**WORKMEN ESCAPE BY RUNNING FROM FLAMES** 

Starts In Tanks Owned By the R. L. Smith Oil Company.

CORSICANA, Texas, Sept. 22. (F)-The fifth oil fire in he Corsicana deep field since its discovery occurred this evening when fire of undetermined origin set ablase the oil tanks of the R. L. Smith Oil Compan. At least 10,000 barrels of oil are estimated by officials to have burned. Workmen near the tanks escaped injury by running. The fire ontinues to burn.

As the heat of the fire became

nore and more intense the burst ing and exploding of the big tanks could be heard several miles dis-tant, similar to the roar of thunder r bursting of a barrage of artillery.
