This coming Saturday, May 16th, Shady Oaks will hold a partnership handicap golf tournament. Two players will make up a team and their total gross score, minus their combined handicaps will determine the team score. Participants may play at any time during the day that they choose and with whomsoever they choose. Entry fee for the event will be \$1.00 per player.

This past Saturday, an individual handicap tournament was held at Shady Oaks. Everyone seemed to really enjoy the event, and 49 players were entered. We are very proud of the wonderful participation we have had in tournaments of this type in the past, and hope that everyone will come out in the future as well.

Babe Bynum and Kenneth McPherson were the winners of this tournament with each having a net score of 67 for the 18 hole route. Second place was also a tie, going to Joe Don South and Glynn Wood with 69. Third place went to Buck Whitehead with a 70, Jim Collier and Tex Cloud were in a tie for fourth place with 71. And Fuzzy Varner, Bo Pruitt and David Binkley tied at 72 for fifth place.

This month's Florida Scramble will be held Sunday, May 23rd, at 1:30 p. m. Don't forget that this month's tournament will be limited to the first 72 members signed up. Entries begin on Wednesday morning the week of the tournament and close at 5 p. m. Saturday. Entries will be limited to members only. Remember to sign up before the deadline.

Beginning Saturday May 16, daily green fees at Shady Oaks will be increased to \$2.00 on week days and \$3.00 on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays. AVercrowded playing conditions on the course have made this increase necessary.

We hope very soon to have lockers installed in the men's and ladies' locker rooms. We are now taking locker reservations for those who are interested in either a half or a full locker. Half lockers will be \$1.00 per month. This year, we will request that you pay one year in advance for your locker. Please sign up for yours at the shop now before its too late.

Here is a special request we have for all golfers. Our two par three holes, number 4 and number 8, will be courtesy holes in the future. This means upon arriving at the green, before you begin to putt, you should allow the group following you to hit their tee shots. By the time you have putted out the following group can be at the green and ready to putt. These holes have been bad bottlenecks on crowded days at Shady Oaks, and we hope to relieve this problem with this system.

Another courtesy note on the golf course: Please do not start on number 7 tee without permission from the proshop. Save yourself the embarrassment of having someone you cut in front of make a complaint at the pro shop, or being asked to stay aside to let normal play continue. Except under unusual conditions the first tee is the place to start your round. Remember also that the ropes in front of greens and alongside tee boxes are not just for electric carts. They were put there to stop pull carts too.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR31)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. The Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the annual salary of the Governor. Each other member of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed the annual salary paid to a district judge from state funds. Members of the Legislature shall also receive a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall receive a salary fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the salary of the Governor, providing that the Legislature shall fix the salary of the other members, not to exceed that received by a district judge from state funds; and removing the 120-day limitation on per diem for regular sessions."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR50)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 50b-1 to read as follows:

"Section 50b-1. (a) The Legislature may provide that the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or its successor or successor-in-interest, shall have authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in addition to those heretofore authorized to be issued pursuant to Section 50b of the Constitution. The bonds authorized herein shall be executed in such form, upon such terms and in such denomination as may be prescribed by law, and shall bear interest, and be issued in such installments as shall be prescribed by the Board, provided that the maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by such bonds may be fixed by law.

(b) The moneys received from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited to the credit of the Texas Opportunity Plan created by Section 50b of the Constitution and shall otherwise be handled as provided in Section 60b of the

Constitution and the laws enacted pursuant thereto.

(c) The said bonds shall be general obligations of the state and shall be payable in the same manner and from the same sources as bonds heretofore authorized pursuant to Section 50b.

(d) All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts, and the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under this Constitution.

(e) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such laws shall not be void because of their anticipatory nature.

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The Constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for additional bonds for the assistance of institutions of higher education under the Texas Opportunity Plan."

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PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR8)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be prescribed by the Legislature, for the assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services to or on behalf of:

(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or non-citizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years;

(2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;

(3) Needy blind persons;

(4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children.

The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation in these programs as it deems appropriate.

The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws

making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, or to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of state funds for such purposes, provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to or on behalf of any needy person shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; provided that the total amount of such assistance payments only out of state funds on behalf of such individuals shall not exceed the amount of Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) during any fiscal year.

"Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this Section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Clearance Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning September 1, 1969 and ending August 31, 1971: Three Million, Six Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$3,650,000) for Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, and Twenty-Three Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$23,900,000) for Aid to Families with Dependent Children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of equal monthly installments and otherwise shall be subject to the provisions of currently existing laws making allocations and appropriations for these purposes.

"Provided further, that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate federal laws, as they now are or as they may be amended to the extent that federal matching money is not available to

the state for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions on such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal matching money will be available for assistance to and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons.

"Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services, or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer or to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this state.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in August, 1969. At the election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "AGAINST" the proposition: "The Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of the needy aged, the needy blind, the needy dependent children and their caretakers; establishing Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) as the maximum amount that may be paid per year from state funds for assistance to and/or medical care; and appropriating additional sums supplementing current legislative appropriations for assistance grants; and authorizing the Legislature to enact such laws as may be necessary in order that federal matching money will be available for assistance to and/or medical care."

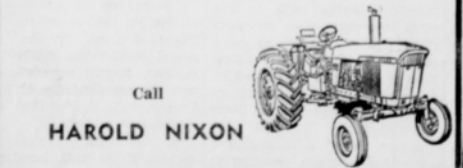


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MORE RAIN MEANS MORE WORK IN OPLIN COMMUNITY
