STATISTICAL, Oct. 25.—The farmers of the country on October the first had in sight as the increased value of sixteen of their crops, \$1,600,000,000, as shown by the Manufacturers Record, as compared with the same date last year. 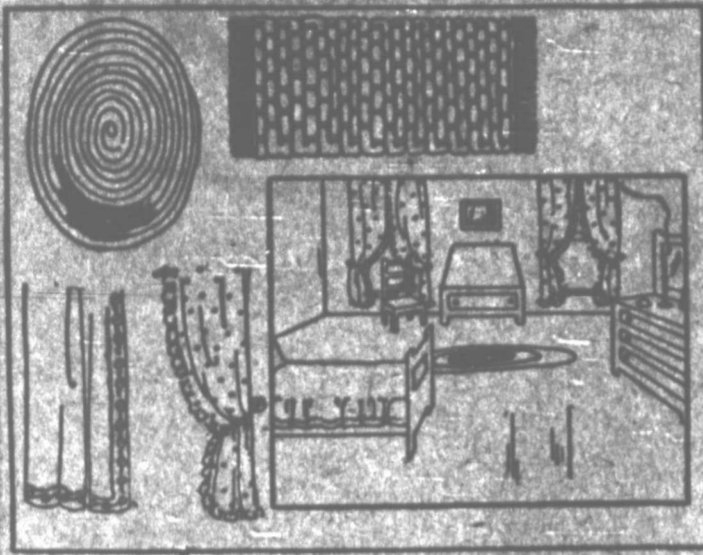

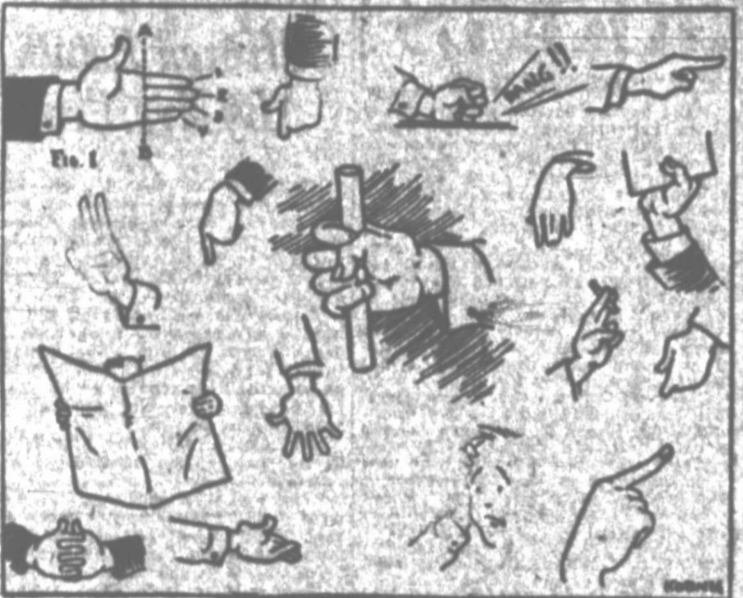

## SAFE EXPERIMENTS IN SCIENCE

The everyday workings of the world in large part depend upon scientific principles for their operation. This does not necessarily mean that the principles are complicated. In fact, some are so simple that boys and girls may easily understand them by experimenting with them. The articles here tell you how to perform some safe experiments with materials you may find in your own home.

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## FINDING GRAVE OF POCAHONTAS

Every boy and girl who has read history or stories of American heroes and adventures, the tale of how an Indian maiden, Pocahontas, saved the life of Captain John Smith, will be interested in knowing that a search is being made in England for her grave.

Pocahontas married an Englishman, Thomas Rolfe, and went to England, where she was received by Queen Anne, the wife of James I. As she was about to return to America, she became ill and died at the age of twenty-two.

Legend says that Pocahontas was buried in a church in Greenwald. The church burned in 1727 and a new one was built on the spot. An American has obtained permission from the church to dig for the remains of the Indian maiden, but he must also obtain the consent of the government before he may proceed.

The Greenwald church contains a pulpit of Virginia wood which was given by the state of Indiana in 1916. Later when the pulpit was a stained glass window given by Virginia women. An engraving in the glass tells us that the maiden was converted in 1613, four years before her death, and she took the name of Rebecca. It calls her a "friend of the earliest struggling colonists whom she nobly rescued, helped and protected."

## A Crown for Halloween

Proclaim yourself king of the Halloween party by wearing a Halloween crown hat. Make it yourself from a strip of paper twenty-four inches long and ten inches wide.

Fold the length in half and again in fourths so that the strip now measures ten by six inches. Keep the folded edges at the sides. Four inches from the base draw a straight line from fold to fold. An inch and a half from each folded edge on the new line, make a dot and from the dots draw a slant line to the center of the top of your paper to make the tongue.

Cut from the fold around the pointed tongue and go to the other edge of the paper. Fold in the four flaps to make the top of the crown. The hat will appear more crown-like if you now round the corners between the four sides, as in the diagram. Cut them in scallops or points if you wish a fancier crown. Paste the hat together, making a box and then catch the four points at the top. Finish with a black paper fringe pom-pom, or lantern or cat faces on the sides.

ON THE RUN

As the pass comes the eyes should be right on the ball. When possible it should be caught like a punt; that is, by extending the arms and letting the hands ease and guide the ball to the chest and hold it there with one hand under it and one above. When the pass has to be taken on the run, with the ball coming from the side or over the shoulder, or very high it should be pulled down, as a basketball player catches a ball without catching it against the body.

The receiver must never make the mistake of putting the hands up too soon, as this slows up his speed.

## HOW TO MAKE A HAT FOR HALLOWEEN

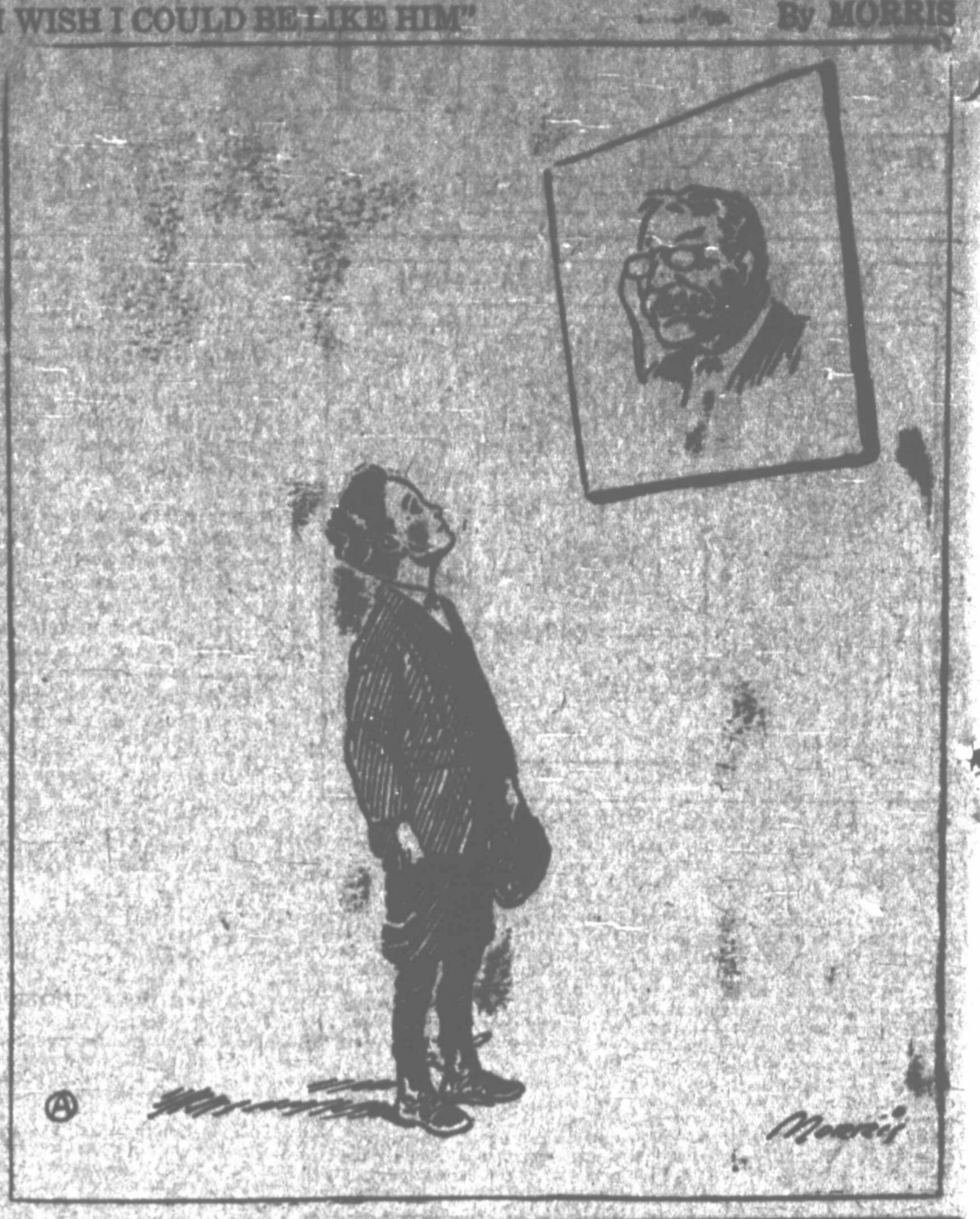

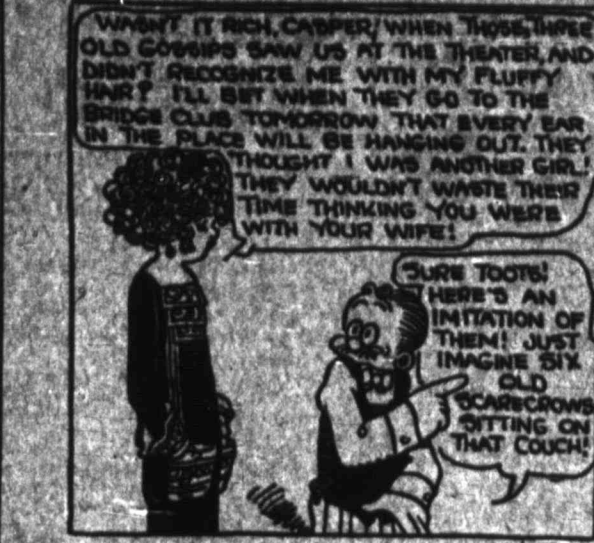

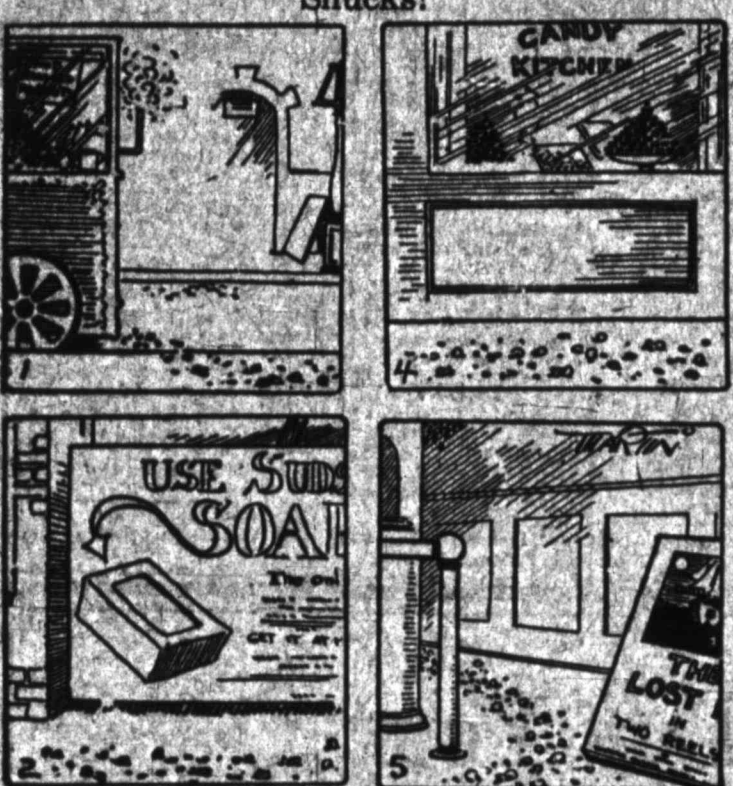

WASHINGTON, Oct. 26. - Washington read with interest but not with excitement the Detroit dispatch saying that a convention of Ford clubs is to be held in that city on December 12 with the object of organizing a Ford third party and to plan for a convention in a few days to elect a ticket.

Such third party conventions as these are prone to attract among the many good persons who are perfectly good and sincere but otherwise have rather unusual views about diverse subjects.

Washington does not underestimate the possibilities of the Ford movement. It has had a better sense of the number and the high quality of the mass of the persons who would like to make Ford president. It has had a better sense of the amount of information, judgment and surmise about Ford's political position in a few brief sentences.

Most of Washington believes Ford could be elected if he could get the nomination of either party. It believes Ford would be glad to have the Republican nomination, would be willing to take the Democratic nomination, but isn't much interested in any third party nomination.

There is good evidence that Ford personally is keeping his hands off the third party movement and taking little interest in it. 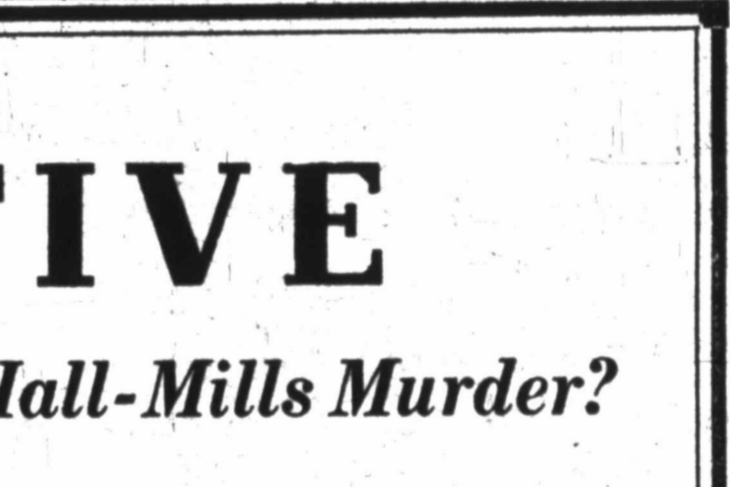
