Raley, before either of them will carry out the course of action as outlined in orders passed by the county commissioners in session last Monday morning in connection with a contract made by the county commissioners court.

This action on the part of these two officials is the outgrowth of a certain contract entered into by the county commissioners with W. R. Anderson, for the collection of delinquent taxes, some of which have been outstanding since 1918.

This apparent rebellion against the county commissioners is not without cause. In their opinion, the contract in question is illegal. The two county officials have their belief that the contract is illegal on opinions rendered by one of the assistants in the attorney general's department, a decision from the state comptroller's department and an opinion rendered by Judge A. H. Britain, Mr. Raley's attorney.

Being therefore merely a difference of opinion it is quite improbable that Judge R. D. Griffin and the county commissioners will resort to a mandamus writ from a district court to compel these two officials to carry out the orders of the court of last week.

It is apparent that the pro-fact will await an opinion as to the legality of the contract which the attorney general's department has promised to furnish after a general session of all the assistants together with the attorney general will be held at which time the contract will be discussed.

Such a writ will be required by the county auditor and tax collector. The contract in question was made after Guy C. Raley, county tax collector, had completed his composite record of all delinquent taxes which have accumulated since 1918. On the roll there appears over a million dollars worth of delinquent taxes.

It is understood that the contract questions will be brought up and discussed at the regular meeting of the commissioners' court Monday morning at which time it is hoped that an opinion will be handed from the attorney general as promised.

No agreement was reached between the two parties and the county judge of Wichita county shall approve the same and such agreement shall not be modified or annulled without his approval in writing.

The second party shall execute and deliver to the first party a bond in the sum of \$2,000 signed by himself and a solvent surety company as surety for the faithful performance by the second party of the terms of this contract and all of the duties imposed upon him hereunder.

Fourth: First party agrees to pay second party, at Wichita Falls, Texas, as compensation for his services hereunder, a percentage of any and all taxes and penalties and interest upon such delinquent taxes, as and when collected, equal to the legally accrued penalties and interest which have accrued at the date of the collection and a percentage of all taxes and mineral rights in land in the county clerk's office, which is now being done by the first party, such supervision to be done in the office of the second party, and second party shall have free access to the records of the county clerk's office, pertaining thereto; the second party shall have the free services of the county clerk or his successor when not engaged in taking off the daily filings of conveyances as aforesaid, in consideration of which the second party shall assist the tax collector in arriving at the value of such oil leases and mineral rights, to be placed on such tax collector's supplemental rolls and second party shall furnish the tax collector with such description of such oil and gas leases and mineral rights, as are to be placed on

such rolls, as are to be placed on the tax collector's supplemental rolls from time to time as he may require.

Eleventh: Second party shall employ a competent and reputable attorney, by and with the consent of the first party to advise him in the collection of delinquent taxes and the preparation of the data relating thereto; and such attorney shall supervise the preparation of any and all suits for the collection of such taxes; shall file and try the same where contested and shall take such steps as may be necessary to enforce judgments rendered thereon.

Twelfth: No agreement may be entered into between the second party and any such attorney, until and unless the county judge of Wichita county shall approve the same and such agreement shall not be modified or annulled without his approval in writing.

LLOYD GEORGE TO SAY FAREWELL IN NEW YORK SPEECH

FINAL ADDRESS OF TOUR TO BE DELIVERED ON FRIDAY NIGHT.

TELLS OF IMPRESSION AMERICAN VISIT MAKES

Says in Lotus Club Speech Has Been Wonderful Experience For Him.

NEW YORK, Nov. 2 (AP)—David Lloyd George, the little Welshman whose services to Great Britain as cabinet minister and premier during the first two decades of this century have made him almost as well a historical figure as the dimunitive Corcoran who dominated France early in the last century, tonight delivered a parting message to the American people.

At the Metropolitan house on the eve of his departure for England Lloyd George, the little Welshman whose services to Great Britain as cabinet minister and premier during the first two decades of this century have made him almost as well a historical figure as the dimunitive Corcoran who dominated France early in the last century, tonight delivered a parting message to the American people.

Mr. Lloyd George addressed the Lotus Club yesterday night of the deep impression his American tour had made upon him, but intimated that he held in store for tonight's meeting the core of his message to these shores.

His tour here, he said, has been a very wonderful experience for him.

"I go away," he said, "with a feeling of the immensity of this great country, its resources, its unlimited possibilities, what it is capable of, not merely here on the soil of the United States, but of the influence which must have on the world now and in the ages to come."

America, he declared, had in many ways helped create the solidarity of the British empire which made the dominions flock to her aid in her hour of need.

"What happened in your war of independence," he said, "made that possible. In your great struggle for independence you started the British empire on the career which made it more powerful than ever, which made it more beneficent than ever, which made it an empire of liberty instead of an empire of oppression."

"I hope you will think of the British commonwealth as your friend. I am perfectly convinced that the future of civilization depends on our flags flying side by side, in comradeship, not by contrast, not by alliance, but by cooperation, by understanding, by good feeling, by pursuit of common aims and ideals. Standing together, that will be irresistible."

"Because he was sure England and America would never unite in a policy of aggression or oppression against neighbors, Mr. Lloyd George said he felt the future of humanity was safe with the two great English speaking nations standing on the cause of righteousness."

He praised the spirit of kindness with which he had been received everywhere in America.

S. M. U. WILL DON CRIMSON OUTFIT IN T. C. U. GAME

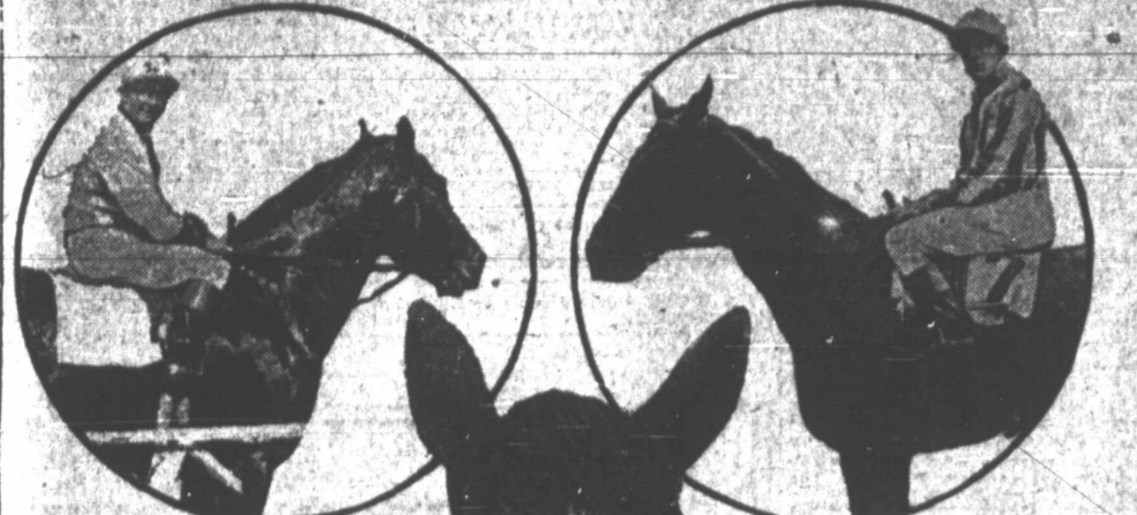

THREE STARTLING FACTS DEVELOPED IN INVESTIGATION

By COLLEGE MORGAN
Universal Services Correspondent.
 WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—The veterans' bureau has revealed three startling facts in connection with the payment of the \$2,000 claim of Matthew O'Brien, San Francisco architect.

The claim was allowed and payment made by the general accounting office on an ex-parte showing of attorneys for the claimant.

No effort was made to ascertain the facts on which Director Frank T. Zines of the veterans' bureau acted when he disapproved the claim and so notified the general accounting office.

President Coolidge, within 30 days, declined to arbitrate the controversy between O'Brien and the veterans' bureau on the validity of the claim, advising that it should take its course through general accounting office and the court of claims, since Director Zines had disapproved.

The findings of this clerk were approved and the payment was made on the authority of \$2,000 law clerk without reference to any higher authority in the general accounting office.

A mysterious pencil memorandum found on the file on this claim reads: "This memorandum was prepared by a calculation of 40 per cent of \$2,000. The result being \$1,200. Chairman Zines of the investigation committee said of this amount: 'The amount of this claim was \$2,000. Ten per cent of that is \$200. Somebody has been figuring on what is 40 per cent of this amount.'"

W. E. Gordon of the general accounting office, in a letter on the stand at this time, said: "I don't think it means anything. I hope it doesn't." He replied: "Through John E. Milliken, formerly attaché of the bureau and assistant to the director, but now of the collector's office of the internal revenue bureau, testimony of James H. Forber, a former associate of Charles R. Forber's trip to the Pacific coast in the summer of 1922 was in part substantiated.

Milliken testified he was sent on his trip as a business employee. He first met Mortimer and his wife on the train with Forber in Washington. He asked Forber why they were in the party, and he was informed they were friends of Forber who resided at the same hotel as he did. They had contemplated a trip to the Pacific coast and they had arranged to go together. Forber said.

Milliken said he saw no necessity for the Mortimer, not employed by the government, accompanying the head of a government bureau on a trip on official business and he had questioned the procedure.

In Chicago, the first stop, Milliken said, he met Mr. Thompson from St. Louis, where the Forber party stopped. In San Francisco at the Fairmont hotel he met a man named Hurley, who he understood was of the Hurley-Mason Company and a former business associate of Forber. He also met a man named Lindsey, who he understood was the owner or part owner of Rough and Ready Island, near Stockton, which the government had leased. Both, he said, appeared to be old friends of Forber.

RECOMMEND CONTINUANCE OF CHEMICAL WARFARE

PARIS, Nov. 2.—The league of nations committee appointed to inquire into chemical warfare, says Louis Chasseigne, editor of Le Journal, has concluded to recommend the continuance of this mode of war making at the same time advising the league of chemical disarmament the nations ought to accept and reject.

The authority of this statement, says M. Chasseigne, is Colonel Raymond Beyer of the United States chemical warfare service, and the announcement of the committee's decision appears in the Review Chimie at Le Havre. This publication observes that the committee's report finds the use of chemical agents in war more humane and less dangerous than other methods of combat.

M. Chasseigne concludes that France must not neglect the warning and must receive the chemical warfare section which she has allowed to fall into disuse.

WILL ENFORCE RULE TO LIMIT WELLS PENDING SUPREME COURT ACTION

AUSTIN, Nov. 1.—The rule prohibiting the drilling of oil wells within 100 feet of each other, and 150 feet of adjoining property will be continued in force until they are finally settled by the state supreme court, M. E. Walthall, chief supervisor of the oil and gas department of the Texas railroad commission, announced following a decision of Judge George Calhoun of the first district court which held that this rule was unconstitutional.

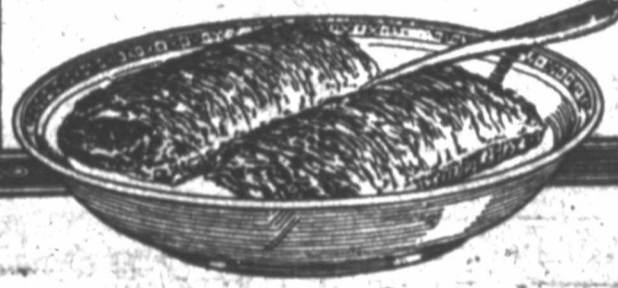

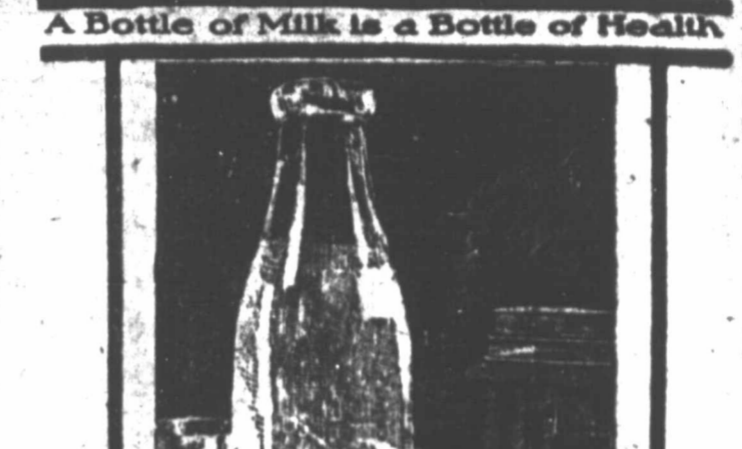

Plaintiff Given Judgment By Jury In Contract Case

Rufus W. Morton, Federal Agent, To Assist Here
