MEXICAN OFFICIALS PREVENT ATTEMPT AT GENERAL STRIKE

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 8.—The prompt action of the federal authorities in frustrating a movement for a general strike is regarded as the first step toward ending the critical situation that has arisen from the violence campaigns being carried on by the Calles and Delgado parties.

The government asserts that the strike plans which were slipped by a display of federal military forces represented an attempt to turn the working classes against the army and provoke a conflict that was intended to result favorably to the national cooperative party which is supporting Adolfo de Larrea in his campaign for the presidency.

Under orders issued by Ramon Ross, the new governor of the federal district, strong forces of police and military presented such a threatening front that the federation of street railwaymen in the federal district was forced to call off the strike which had scheduled for last night. At the same time plans for a general strike of the telephone employes, the bakers, the cotton mill workers and the street railway men in Tampico and San Luis Potosi were postponed until a delegation of leaders had had opportunity to confer with President Obregon.

The government's determined stand is also said to have frustrated plans for dynamiting the electric power cables that lead from the great power plant at Necaxa. A spokesman issued at the office of the governor of the federal district says:

"The inhabitants of Mexico City were about to become the victims of terrible attacks had not the authorities discovered opportunely the machinations of certain political elements which were attempting to take advantage of a strike provoked by the red elements among the street railway workers for the purpose of provoking bloody conflict between the workers and the police and federal forces."

Civil War In Germany Regarded As Logical Outcome of Rebellion; News Creates Sensation In France

LONDON, Nov. 8.—Civil war in Germany is regarded here as the only logical outcome of the rebel action and on the face of news hitherto received such a result is considered inevitable.

The ultimate purpose of the Hitler-Von Kahr-Ludendorff combination is not yet apparent, but all indications reaching London seem to point to an attempt to restore the monarchy in Germany with Bavaria proclaimed as the dominant state.

General Ludendorff, it seems, is to be the military dictator of the Reich and the republic is to be swept away. Whether he and his fellow conspirators are men of the right mettle to effect the change remains to be seen, but the reputation given Von Kahr and Hitler in dispatches to the English newspapers during the last few weeks do not suggest that these three men possess the necessary qualifications for carrying out such a momentous undertaking.

No words reaching London indicate the attitude of the Reichswehr toward the Munich revolt, but on the loyalty of these troops to the Berlin government, everything, of course, depends.

Rebellion in Bloodshed—Hitherto there has been nothing to show that any resistance was offered the Hitlerites in Munich and the indications are that the initial stage of the rebellion passed bloodlessly.

The names of Prince Rupprecht or other members of the Bavarian royal family do not appear in any dispatches reaching here and whether they are included in the plans of the conspirators can be only conjectured at present.

Little except official news is likely to get out of Berlin for many hours in view of the fact that a censorship established as soon as news of the putsch reached the capital.

Reports reaching London early this morning said that Berlin was swarming with troops last night and that the Reich cabinet was in continuous session.

It is assumed here that President Ebert and Chancellor Brüning will do their utmost to avert the crisis, but General Von Seeckt, who has been appointed commander in chief of the national army, is reported to have full military authority. He apparently has been given a free hand in disposing of the Reichswehr forces.

RUSSIAN CHURCH FIGHT CARRIED TO NEW YORK COURTS

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—The fight of the Russian soviet church to acquire control of the Russian Orthodox church in North America with its 250 buildings, 3,000 priests and \$1,000,000 worth of property was carried to the courts today.

John Kedrovsky, who armed with credentials purporting to show that he has been named soviet archbishop of North America, failed in an attempt to take possession of St. Nicholas cathedral yesterday through actions in the municipal court to remove Archbishop Platen, present head of the church, and his associates. The case is set for trial on November 13.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—As he lifted his fingers from the keys of his piano and the last poignant chords of the "Miserere" floated away, death laid a gripping hand on Richard Nicolia last night and he toppled from his bench dead.

A moment before he fell the pianist, what sounded like a ripple of laughter, too raucous for such a setting, and Segall, the dramatic soprano whose singing he had been accompanying, turned from the door as she was leaving the studio and asked "What amuses you, Maestro?"

When she reached his cramped form the stroke of apoplexy had subsided and Nicolia, the intimate and mentor of many great singers and other musical artists of this day, who composed and who conducted, had breathed his last. The late Enrico Caruso was one of his close friends.

He is survived by his widow and four children.

MAYOR WAGES WAR ON ALL, BOOZE

COME BUT NOT FORGOTTEN NEVER DID

 IKA Service Writer
 CHICAGO, Nov. 8.—"Yes, we have no beer in Chicago."
 And the man responsible for that statement refrains from making this frank public announcement:
 "I would not have the people believe I am a prohibitionist, for I am not. I should like, indeed, if the law would permit that the people of Chicago might have the privilege of buying good, wholesome beer at a moderate price."
 He is Mayor William E. Dever, who, simply as a law enforcement proposition and without personal whim or flurry, has plugged the flow of bars and breweries, and made the Windy City drier than a bone.

Gene Are the Days
 The knowing ones need not tell of having bought 5 per cent beer without introduction only last summer. Times have changed, as the unwelcome thirst of thousands testified. In three weeks, Mayor Dever revoked the licenses of more than 1100 soft drink saloons, influenced the voluntary closing of 1800 more "for saloons," put guards over all the breweries, retired six police captains, cured thousands of cases of blindness on the police force—and he keeps on unabated.

A meeting of ministers adopts resolutions praising the drive, and the mayor, addressing them, explains simply:
 "Law enforcement by a public official should be part of his work-a-day life. It ought not to be a cause for comment or enthusiasm any more than the wearing of a hat. This is not a question of wet or dry, but simply of obedience to law."

When the most reliable and protected of bars began to report the death to their trusted customers, there arose a chorus, from merchant, customer and bystander alike of "What's his game?"
 One repeats the question to the mayor. That official, solid, gray-haired, square-shouldered, and square-jawed, takes off his glasses, gazes steadily with his large brown eyes, and answers:
 "No Am to Grand

"There is no exterior motive. If you are familiar with politics here, you know I didn't seek this office. And I am not now seeking either to gain another office or to raise a new issue. We are simply enforcing the law. We tried palliative measures, but they were ineffective. Absolute enforcement seemed the only solution."

"Policemen for years have been ordered to enforce strictly, and have gone out to overlook this place and that place. I think they are convinced by this time that this order is in earnest. When we get through I believe the department will function

 "Just this much more. The order is effective permanently. There won't be any more beer."
 There you have the story straight from Mayor Dever—the anti-Volstead, pro-law, champion saloon closer of America.

At Request of American Legion Retail Merchants Will Not Be Asked to Close Stores Monday

Following a conference with the executive committee of the local post of the American Legion, the committee appointed at the Friday luncheon of the business council of the chamber of commerce, to request retail merchants to close their places of business Monday, November 12, in observance of Armistice Day, which falls on Sunday, November 11, reported that the stores would not be asked to close Monday.

The Armistice Day program, arranged by Pat Carrigan, post of the American Legion, will take place on Sunday, and the legion committee requested the business council to take no steps toward asking merchants to close their stores Monday.

Some general offices, and the postoffice will be closed Monday, but the legion executive committee felt that it was not justified in asking retail establishments to close their doors on that day, as the fact that Armistice Day comes on Sunday will give every former service man an opportunity to attend the patriotic and memorial services to be held here November 11.

The committee of the business council appointed at Friday's luncheon which conferred with the legion executive committee was composed of Frank Quastner, A. A. Day and R. T. Burgess.
C. of C. Sevensen Stated that the Wichita Falls Chamber of Commerce was established "a point where an annual financial campaign for membership was a waste of time and effort, was the opinion expressed by Hubert M. Harrison, manager of the organization, in his report of the national convention of Commercial Organizations Association, at the Friday luncheon.

Mr. Harrison said that he feared at the convention that a number of cities that were on a no more stable basis than Wichita Falls had abandoned the annual financial campaign. He pointed out that the present revenue of the chamber of commerce from membership dues was above \$25,000 annually and that over 85 per cent of it was collected, adding that the membership was practically perpetual. He suggested that the matter be given consideration by the membership and intimated that it would be brought up for further discussion at an early date.
City Planning Work
City planning and zoning was the other important question which took much of the time of the convention, Mr. Harrison said. He added that supreme court action in many states had made municipal protection by ordinance impossible and city authorities frankly admitted that they did not know what course to pursue. He explained that various committees were at work and that work along this line was still being done with some hope of relieving the situation.
Wikitie Talbert, of the Wichita Building and Loan Association, outlined a plan which had been adopted by his company to enable property owners to borrow small sums of money to finance, paying without being taxed for the additional legal and other expenses which necessarily accrue. 

WELFARE BODIES SUBMIT BUDGETS FOR 1924 DRIVE

Budgets for funds for operation during 1924 were submitted by seven organizations at the meeting of the Municipal Welfare Board at the Wichita Falls Chamber of Commerce at 10:30 o'clock Friday morning.

Hobert M. Harrison, general manager of the chamber of commerce, who conducted the drive last year, was named to conduct the same drive for funds for the welfare council this year.

The citizens of Wichita Falls will be called on for approximately the same amount that made up the budget last year, about \$10,000, according to Mrs. E. D. Gosselin, secretary of the welfare board.

The following organizations submitted budgets: Red Cross, Salvation Army, Y. W. C. A., Our Herstory, Boy Scouts, Texas Children's Home and Aid Society and the Welfare Board.

Mayor Frank Collier, chairman of the board, appointed a committee to pass on the submitted budgets and to lay over the proposed funds with an executive officer of each organization.

VOICE OF THE PEOPLE.

Unpaid Taxes, Contract to Collect.

Editor The Times.

In connection with the general discussion of the county tax collecting question continued during last days, I submit the following:

1.—The discussion of any public law, and especially one that involves have given actual facts as to terms of contracts and rulings of the office of attorney general, is of large educational value for the public.

2.—All citizens are in a measure, as citizens and as taxpayers, concerned with handling of all public questions. Taxes evaded or not paid by some, without question serve to increase rates that do not in nominal degree affect all other taxpayers.

3.—In the main all agree that taxes should be collected, as is purpose of commissioners' court, and that collection should be within and in accord with requirements of law as checked by auditor and proper authority. Granting this, and as applicable to controversial issues in connection with contract for tax collections as published, we add the following:

First, it is generally agreed as understood by undersigned that no collection or attempts to collect delinquent taxes, in any manner whatever can hold over of lands in tax or unpaid taxes on oil and gas lease heretofore executed, and on which lease owners failed to render to pay taxes. Therefore no farmer is distinguished from lease owner, or in any manner liable for taxes of other persons as now unpaid.

Second, the total amount of the unpaid taxes on the rolls include considerable volume of money that will never be collected or that cannot be collected owing to absolute lack of any present value in leases now applied or otherwise without value, and record owners of which are either not the true owners, or have deserted and are without the jurisdiction of any court for any attempt by suit to collect.

This amount is made up primarily of oil and gas leases that have either not expired by limitation of term, or are otherwise without value, where value existed at time leases were placed on the rolls. There are also included in current

CHICAGO, Nov. 2.—"Between artists of equal ability, the American gets the contract every time." This policy of making the Chicago Civic Opera Company THE American company, shows itself in a roster of American-born and trained singers assembling here for the opening of this winter's season.

Not only the singers but principal roles, such as Edith Mason, Louise Homer, Cyrena Van Gordon, Florence Macbeth and the Chicago-reared Mary Garden, are United States products, and trained in the newer singers, the developing stars of the future.

The history of such singers shows American earmarks in the way of graduation from state universities,

singing in church choirs and teaching in small towns.

Kathryn Brown, for example, never has been outside the United States. The middle-western University of Illinois was her starting point in the musical world.

"I expect to go abroad someday, of course," she says. "But I like singing here and abroad, in another of the red-white-and-blue collection."

And Kathryn Meale, who makes her debut this year, has had absolutely no foreign training. The extent of her voyaging has been to compute from her home in Philadelphia to New York for music lessons.

tax rolls, assessments for oil and gas leases as placed on the unreturned rolls, where the lease was issued after January 1, 1922 (date of rendition of property) and on which wells were drilled that resulted in dry holes that eliminated all value from the oil and gas lease prior to January 1, 1923, when again subject to taxation. But such lease being found in the deed records as tabulated by assistants to the tax assessor, the same was placed on the unreturned roll on best possible assessment guess of value, and possibly only by reason of failure of fee owner to file or obtain for filing prior to time assessed, of formal surrender of lease. Such assessments are probably entirely uncollectable where leases have no value.

Third, Much of the so-called delinquent assessments for prior years were placed by the rolls during current or more recent years. There is probably difference of opinion as to whether such taxes are delinquent prior to expiration of the taxable year during which placed on the rolls. Such include also will-o'-the-wisp various leases (falling within clauses above mentioned).

Fourth, There are a number of delinquent and unpaid taxes for period of years, where assessed tax was nominal, and which over period of years accumulate in penalties and interest, and delinquent roll fees as chargeable for some assessments, form the larger part of total now unpaid and delinquent taxes, with legal provisions of unquestioned legality. Where such totals exceed present selling value of city lots or other property, as in case in many instances, under the law the filing of suit and foreclosure could result in no other way than by the sheriff or others bidding in for the state as required by law. Under the contract, if held legal, the actual taxes can be paid and the adjustment of the excess penalties, etc., arranged between the contractor and the owner of the property, by waiving of penalties (that go to collecting contractor) to bring total taxes to be paid down to or below the selling value of property in liquidation. If legal, there are no doubt practical arguments for the settlement of such delinquent taxes, in lieu of property, as in case in many instances, where fixed penalties accumulate faster than unpaid taxes, and there is no practicable collection of but a part of present unpaid taxes, which greatly reduces the possible earnings under the contract.

LOUIS, Nov. 8.—A message that agriculture in America has proved itself to be a big profit maker by the fact that the farm investment in this country has increased nearly 500 per cent in 30 years was carried to the convention of the American Country Life Association here today by James E. Howard, president of the National Transportation Institute.

"It is unquestionable that agriculture is prosperous when the farm valuation of the nation has increased from \$35 billion to \$18 billion of dollars," said Mr. Howard in his address, which has been prepared for delivery by him, but he was unable to attend the convention.

"The present depression of the farmer is both real and serious," the address sets out. "But the long look ahead for agriculture was never so bright in view of the greater farm productivity and the huge market of the increasing city and industrial population."

Farm life offers the best opportunity open to men and women of high mentality, declared Mr. Howard, since the farmer must be a combination of business man and scientist. Rural consolidated schools are being established in increasing numbers throughout the country, he said.

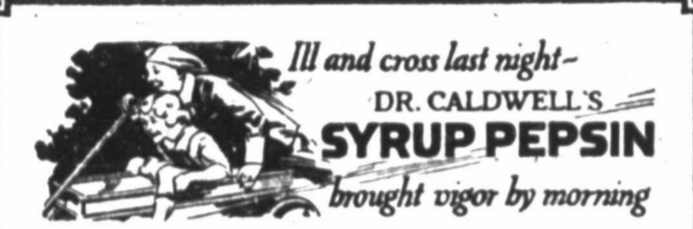

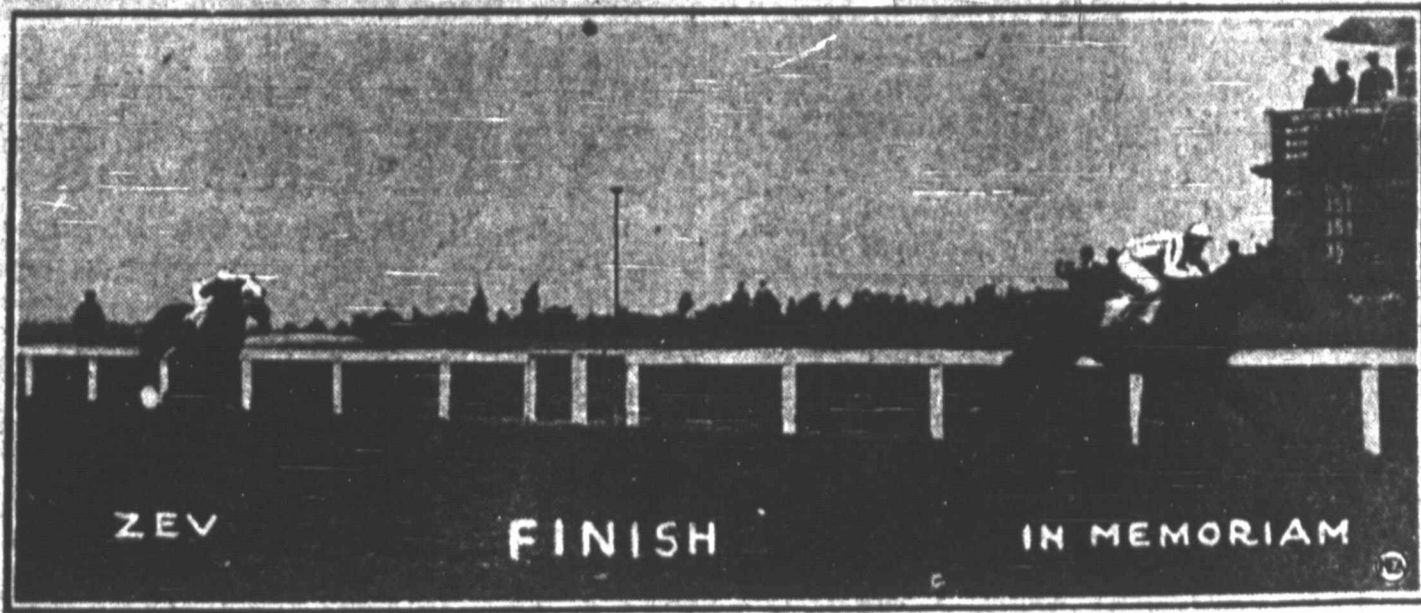

COOLIDGE SEEKS INFORMATION FROM EVERY SECTION

PROCEEDS METHODICALLY TO LEARN WHAT NATION THINKS AND WANTS.

MESSAGE EXPECTED TO REVEAL POLICIES

Reaction of Country to Message Will Determine Question of Nomination.

By MARK SULLIVAN
Political Correspondent of the New York Tribune and Wichita Daily Times

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—There is no subject about which Washington is more curious than the opening address that President Coolidge is going to deliver to congress at the beginning of his session, December 3. Everybody has known that this would be the first real revelation of Coolidge, both as to his policies and as to his personality since he became a president. Nearly everybody has estimated that the address and the reaction of congress and the country to it will

depend mainly on the question whether Coolidge will be nominated for another term. In addition to these fundamental reasons for curiosity the attitude Coolidge has seemed to have toward this address has tended to give rise to a quality of dramatic suspense in the atmosphere of Washington and among the political class. Everybody has observed that Coolidge has avoided making any public address whatever and has inferred that he is saving up whatever he has to say for the congressional opening. Everybody has observed also that so far as unofficial and informal things have come out of the white house they have been confined generally to the run of the day's business. It has been felt that it is conspicuous that on important matters like taxation, the world court, the railroad question and the like, Coolidge has been intentionally silent and has been reserving his utterances for the formal appearance before congress.

Picture Method Followed.
Today one of the Washington correspondents of the Boston Transcript, one of those New England papers which follow the president's activities with special closeness, sent his paper a dispatch which while it makes no predictions as to what Coolidge is going to say, pictures vividly the method he is following in making up his mind as to what positions he should take. It reveals the fact that while it was Harding who invented the phrase "best minds," it is Coolidge who is following that method in painstaking detail. What the Transcript dispatch says is borne out by the common observation of others.

It says that President Coolidge for the past three months has been sending for men from all over the country to come to the white house, each man being chosen for his capacity to give information and advice on a particular subject. The men summoned have been carefully and deliberately selected. The Transcript story says, for example, that President Coolidge asked Secretary Hoover to prepare a list of the best informed in the various parts of the country on different aspects of business; that this list was forwarded to the white house, and that letters were addressed to the individuals recommended advising them that the president desired to confer with them.

Officials Are Interviewed.
Aside from business men the cabinet members have included government officials, members of congress, members of state and national political committees, agricultural experts, railway executives, leaders of organized labor, newspaper editors, steamship owners, bankers, members of the diplomatic corps, army and navy officers, state officials, officers of patriotic societies and private organizations, leaders of civil service reform, officials of world war organizations and experts on the tariff.

Many of these summoned visitors having in mind the tradition about President Coolidge's silence, have come prepared to hear out an amount of information and advice to a listening president. What really happened, however, turned out to be a variation of this process. The president listened, but he took control of the stream of what he listened to. The visitors discovered that Coolidge knew exactly what he wanted to find out from each man and was prepared with a list of questions in each case.

According to the Transcript's story, at the close of each day's work the president has prepared careful memoranda of his information which he has stored away in manila envelopes on his desk. Today, according to the Transcript's story, there are 14 of these envelopes, each devoted to a single subject, from which the inference would be that the president will cover some fourteen topics in his address to congress.

Early Preparation.
From the information thus assembled the president certainly within the next fortnight, and prob-

ably early the coming week, will deny himself to callers for two or three days which he will devote to finally digesting the information and advice given him and to actually writing his address to congress. This will be a rather earlier preparation for the event than has been common with presidents. The chances of so early a time to finish his address is said to be due to the president's desire to have all the time he needs during the following two or three weeks before congress meets to receive all the members of the incoming congress who want to see him.

In fact, according to the Transcript's despatch if congress were to assemble tomorrow instead of four weeks hence, Coolidge would be prepared to address and enunciate in every particular the policies he will pursue during the remaining months of his administration.

GEN. PLANING INSPECTS CEMETERIES IN FRANCE; REPORT IS PROMISING
PARIS, Nov. 8.—General Pershing while motoring along the old battle front took occasion to inspect the cemeteries where American sol-

diers are buried and it is understood he intends to report to the secretary of war that he found them in excellent condition. The American commander's holiday in France has been spent quietly renewing old acquaintances and he had long conversations with Marshal Foch and General Saut, chief of the French general staff. President Pershing is to receive him unofficially today. With his sister, Mrs. Mary M. Butler, he is being entertained at small dinner parties, often afterwards going to the theatre. General Pershing has no definite plan as to when he will return, but expects to remain here some weeks.

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HITLER-LUDENDORFF COMBINATION HAD AMBITIOUS PLANS

PROPOSED TO OVERTHROW GOVERNMENT AND RESTORE MONARCHY.

WOULD HAVE BAVARIA SUPPLANT PRUSSIA

Premier Von Knilling Arrested By Hitler's Forces While at Meeting.

BERLIN, Nov. 9. (AP)—The fifth birthday of the German republic finds the forces of reaction in control of the government of Bavaria with General Ludendorff as commander in chief of the army and Adolf Hitler, who proclaimed the overthrow of the state regime, established as his political adviser. Several of the Bavarian ministers are reported to be under arrest.

The flight of fragmentary advice from Munich were to the effect that the rebellion was only against the Von Knilling government, but as other reports were received the impression grew and the revolt was also aimed at the central government and that the leaders of the coup and proclaimed the overthrow of the Ebert-Strösemann regime.

This impression gained strength when a proclamation to the German people was issued in which the government announcing that steps to restore order had been taken and would be carried out "with the utmost vigor" asserted that "an armed band" in Munich has arrested to itself the right to institute a government of the Reich had made Ludendorff commander in chief of the German army and had made Hitler "arbiter of the destinies of Germany."

Dr. Von Kahr, who several weeks ago was made military dictator of Bavaria, has accepted the governorship of the state "as a representative of the monarchy." General Von Lossow, commander of the Bavarian reichswehr, has been named minister of war, while Herr Von Poehner, former chief of police of Munich, has been made administrator.

When word of the revolt reached Berlin the central government severed all relations with Bavaria, appointed General Von Seeckt commander in chief of the national army and announced the withdrawal of all federal support from the rebellious state until constitutional conditions should be restored.

Manifesto is issued.

The government also addressed the following manifesto to the German people:

"At this moment of great tension

in the foreign and domestic situation, some foolish people are endeavoring to break up the German Reich.

"An armed band has overthrown the government in Munich, arrested Premier Von Knilling and arrogated to itself the right to institute a government of the Reich. It has made Ludendorff commander in chief of the German army and has made Hitler, who was naturalized only some days ago, arbiter of the destinies of Germany.

"There is no need to say that this decision to carry a coup d'état can have no effect. Whoever suggests this movement will be guilty of high treason.

"Instead of helping in the Rhineland and the Ruhr our brethren who are fighting in Germany's cause such persons are plunging the Reich into a catastrophe threatening its food supplies. They are exposing it to an enemy invasion and they are destroying all chances of economic improvement.

"The recent measures of the Reich government have had the effect of notably improving the position of the mark abroad within the last 24 hours. This will be lost if the attempt made in Munich succeeds. We exhort all patriots to defend the unity, order and liberty of the Reich. All steps to combat the coup d'état and to restore order have been taken and will be carried out with the utmost vigor."

Speech by Hitler.

The Wolff agency today gave out the text of the speech made at Munich yesterday by Hitler.

"The government of criminals sitting at Berlin," Hitler said, "is deprived of office as well as Ebert."

"I propose to take the direction of the provisional government of the German empire until the moment

when the treaty which is precipitating Germany into ruin today has been abolished.

"His excellency, General Ludendorff takes supreme command of the German national army. General Von Lossow is appointed German minister of the reichswehr (national defense).

"We wish to build up an ultra-nationalist confederate state in which Bavaria will have the place due it.

"Tomorrow will see the constitution of a nationalist government in Germany or it will see us dead. There is no middle course."

After Dr. Von Kahr, the Bavarian dictator, had declared that he was taking a hand in the direction of the state and that he considered himself administrator of the monarchy which the "criminals" had overthrown five years ago, General Ludendorff said:

"I am going to re-raise the black, white and red flag throughout Germany, including on the Rhine."

Premier Von Knilling and minister of the Interior Von Schweyer, who were present at the patriotic meeting which was broken up by Hitler's proclamation, were arrested by Hitler's followers and conducted to the police station.

The ministers had been invited to the meeting by Dr. Von Kahr.

High Officials Salvation Army to Visit Wichita Falls Saturday

Colonel G. W. Wood, commander of the southwestern division of the Salvation Army, who will arrive in Wichita Falls Saturday morning for a three-day campaign in this city. At the musical festival at the Salvation Army Citadel Saturday evening at 8 o'clock Colonel Wood will make an address on "Modern Day Salvation Army Work."

Colonel Wood enjoys national fame, having been a commissioned officer in the Salvation Army for 27 years, and he is said to be one of the ranking officials of the organization. He came to Texas as commander of the southwestern division, including the states of Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana and Arkansas seven years ago, and the work of the organization in this division has trebled under his jurisdiction. Oklahoma work became so great that it was necessary to establish a state division, but the colonel is still in charge of work in Louisiana, Texas and Arkansas, and he handles all of the work from his office in Dallas.

When Colonel Wood arrived in Texas from Chicago, where he was formerly commander of the Illinois division, only six cities had Salvation Army posts in this district. Now in every town in the district except five the Salvation Army owns and operates property, and the property is clear of mortgages and debt. He has increased the value of the Salvation Army property in the division from less than \$50,000 to more than half a million dollars, according to Eugene L. Corlies, commander of the corps in Wichita Falls.

Under the leadership of this able officer, the southwestern district has come to be one of the leading divisions of the Salvation Army and Colonel Wood is recognized as one of the ablest officers of the organization.

While in this city Colonel Wood will inspect the local organization and discuss matters with the local advisory committee. He will also formally open the Boys' Club in Wichita Falls and the new corps headquarters at Electric. He has many friends in Wichita Falls.

Staff Captain H. G. Robb, general secretary of the southwestern division of the Salvation Army, who will arrive in Wichita Falls with Colonel G. W. Wood, commander of the organization, has many friends in Wichita Falls and was its commander for six years. He arrived in Wichita Falls from Kansas in 1912, when this city was still in its infancy and after carefully laying his plans, he realized them in the period of a few years.

When he arrived in this city, he often tells the story, that he spent the first day calling on business men to raise funds to maintain the institution and received only \$5 the first day.

The large Salvation Army citadel on Seventh street was built by Captain Robb and the funds to pay for the structure were raised by him.

In 1917, Captain Robb was promoted to major and called to the Dallas office as young people's secretary. He was later raised to the rank of staff captain and assumed the duties of general secretary. He is now second in command in Texas, being the assistant to Colonel Wood.

Captain Robb will arrive in Wichita Falls Saturday and will spend three days in this city.

5,500 TELEPHONES TO BE LISTED IN JANUARY DIRECTORY

New telephone directories of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company for Wichita Falls will go to press in January and present expectations are that the new directories will contain the names of more than 5,500 subscribers. The present directory, now in use, was issued in the spring. On October 1, 1922, there were 6,473 telephones in use in Wichita Falls and 145 rural telephones. Redemption and supplemental roll tax collections for the month of October, according to the report of Guy C. Raley, county tax collector, amounted to \$19,545.52. Part of the clothing had been recovered when a negro who had them in his possession was arrested by city officers. The negro is being held in the city jail for investigation in connection with a charge of receiving stolen property. He claims to have bought a dress valued at over \$150 from the man for \$18. A fur coat and other clothing were found in a suit case which is said to have belonged to the white man. Most of the clothing was stolen from a residence on Eleventh street several weeks ago. City officers have been working on the case for some time.
