BERLIN, Nov. S .- General Ludendorff and Adolph Hitler, leaders of the Bavarian revolt, have been captured by federal troops.

The nationalist putsch staged in Munich, capitat of Bavaria, by General Ludendorff and Adolph Hitler, has been suppressed and Von Poshner, named premier by the revolutionists, is under arrest, according to advices received through various trustworthy channels. Ludendorff and Hitler, who last night proplaimed themselves, en-

spectively, military dictator and chancellor of all Germany, reported barricaded in the war ministry building in Munich which was surrounded by troops loyal to the government, were later said to have been captured. Advices from Berlin and other centers show that Dr. Von Kahr.

TEXAS CENTENNIAL.

While the time is too short to hold an exposition in 1924 of the breadth and scope suggested by Theodore Price, editor of Commerce and Finance, the Denison Herald believes that preparations should be b :un now for holding such an exposition at some suitable time in the future.

"The suggestion of a world exposition on the order of Chicago's great world fair," the Herald reminds us, "has repeatedly been made. The Houston Post on a number of occasions has given favorable mention to the idea but, if we mistake not, it was to be centered around the historic events at San Jacinto when the independence of Texas was wrested from Mexico by Sam Houston and his immortal band of patriots. So far as we know the thought of-making it a centennial proposition has not herefore been advanced, and for that reason Mr. Price is entitled to be regarded as the originator of an idea that must appeal to the patriotic pride of every loyal Texan. However, the idea of holding an exposition of

the character and extent suggested by Mr. Price in 1934 or even in the year following, is not within range of possibility. In order to have brought the plan to consummation, work on it should have begun ser eral years ago. An enterprise having a scope as broad as its importance demands would call for a campaign of financing without parallel in the history of the state. Such an exposition should be well advertised before the world, the several nations with which we are in harmonious accord interested in the plan and the United States government pledged to its support in a financial way.
