



### STATE ENGINEERS COMPLETE SURVEY STAMFORD PROJECT

PLAN IS TO CONSTRUCT DAM ACROSS BRAZOS NEAR DOUBLE MOUNTAINS.

### PRELIMINARY SURVEY OF DIFFERENT SITES MADE

Expected That Report of Engineers Will Be Given Out Within Sixty Days.

Special to The Times. STAMFORD, Texas, Nov. 22.—Engineers from the state board of water control have completed the first preliminary survey of the different sites along the Brazos river, south of the Double mountains, with the object of constructing a dam across this stream for irrigation purposes. The engineering corps is composed of Dr. L. T. Patton, formerly with the geological research department of the University of Texas, C. S. Clark and A. H. Dunlap. Two sites were inspected Monday, one five miles southwest of Sageron and the other near the Hamilton-Asperment bridge. Tuesday the engineers inspected two other sites, one five miles east of the Double mountains in the Sam Tanner section, and the other eight miles south of the mountains in the Walter Scott ranch area.

The corps left Thursday for a point along the north branch of the Brazos river, near Rochester, where they will make a preliminary survey with the idea of damming that stream for irrigation purposes. From there they will go to visit the Peace river project in Pecos county and then to Childress to make a survey of a point on the Red river in Hall county. Dr. Patton will return at an early date to make an intensive study of the geological conditions at the various points which have been surveyed to determine whether the soil formation at the proposed sites

is favorable for the construction of dams. No definite knowledge was given out by the engineers after the completion of the survey of the four sites near this city. The men stated that figures gathered must be compiled and conclusions reached before a report could be given out. It is possible that Dr. Patton's report will be given out within 60 days and the complete report will follow his tests of the soil. Much interest is being demonstrated in this section over the possibility of a dam on the Brazos and the placing of a large area of the semi-arid section under irrigation with plenty of water.

### CLOSER COLLABORATION BETWEEN U. S. AND ITALY IN DEALING WITH LABOR

GENEVA, Nov. 22.—(AP)—Closer collaboration between American labor and industrial interests on the one hand and the international labor office of Geneva on the other is expected to be brought about through an extension of the work of the Washington branch of the labor office, establishment of which has just been decided upon. The labor bureau announced that more and more requests for information are reaching here from American organizations, hence the governing board has agreed to give more importance to the Washington branch by appointing one of its leading experts, L. Magnusson, as its representative there. Before joining the staff of the labor office as English editor of the International Labor Review, Mr. Magnusson spent 10 years in the bureau of labor statistics at Washington as a special agent for field and research work. Speaking of his new position Mr. Magnusson said his policy would be one of impartiality and detachment and that his aim would be to make the Washington branch of real service to those in the United States who are interested in the problems engaging the attention of the international labor office.

### TRIBUTE TO MEMORY OF JAMES FENNIMOR COOPER

BURLINGTON, N. J., Nov. 22.—(AP) Tribute to the memory of James Fenimore Cooper, universally beloved author of the leather stocking tales, will be paid today when his birthplace will be dedicated as a historic shrine by the Burlington County Historical Society. Perhaps another great American spirit will hover over the scene of the dedication for adjoining the Cooper homestead is the birthplace of the famous seaman, Captain James Lawrence, known by every American schoolboy for his command, "Don't give up the ship." The Cooper home has been restored to its original architecture and will be preserved in that form for posterity.

URBANA, Ill., Nov. 22.—(AP)—A generation of members, jammers and muddled thinkers is in sight if schools emphasize rapid silent reading to the exclusion of instruction in oral English. C. H. Wolbert said today in an address before the annual meeting here of the Illinois Association of Teachers of English. Much needs to be done to teach pupils how to read the printed page with understanding, Mr. Wolbert said. Reading and writing, he declared, as a study of literature and composition find their origin in speech.

### GRAHAM ACTIVE CANDIDATE FOR HOUSE LEADER

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22.—(AP)—The contest between Representative Graham, of Illinois, and Representative Longworth, of Ohio, for the Republican leadership of the house has not been relaxed and indications are that unless members of the progressive Republican bloc are satisfied with their representation on certain committees they will precipitate a vigorous fight over the speakership.

President Coolidge, in the opinion of Mr. Graham, will pursue a hands-off policy in the leadership contest. The president, the Illinois representative declared, after a conference with him yesterday, expressed no preference as to the leadership and indicated he thought it was a matter for settlement by the Republican members of the house. Mr. Graham emphasized that his candidacy was a sane progressive movement for the best interest of the Republican party and the country, and contended that his selection as leader would stimulate the sectional aspect of control that would result if Representative Gillette of Massachusetts were continued as speaker with the Ohio member as leader. Supporters of Mr. Graham claim at least 80 votes for him in the party's organization conference December 1.

With reference to the speakership Representative Nelson, of Wisconsin, a spokesman for the progressive Republican bloc, said that while members of the group were likely to take collective action only on legislative and committee demands, many of them probably would support Representative Cooper, of Wisconsin, in opposition to Mr. Gillette. He intimated, however, that if the bloc was satisfied with its representation on the ways and means, rules, banking and commerce committees no attempt would be made to prevent the selection of Gillette as speaker.

### Armenian Girls Are Rescued and Brought to U. S.

CHICAGO, Nov. 22.—(AP)—Bearing on their faces the tattoo brands of Arabian slavery, Rose and Helen Maneran, two young Armenian girls, are in the Chicago Memorial Hospital where doctors are gradually removing the marks that had been a sign of servitude. The two were brought to this country from Arabia by their brother, Horhik, who learned of their whereabouts through English Tompkins, according to the story told to doctors and nurses at the hospital. It was in 1915 when trouble started for Rose and Helen. With their father, mother and older brother they resided among the mountains of Urfa, Mesopotamia. Then came the Turkish troops and fighting. The father and brother disappeared. No one knows their fate. The two children and their mother were herded into the desert where the mother died from exhaustion. A raid by Arabian cavalry carried the pair by camel caravan to the land of Dr. where a wealthy Arabian became their owner. Here it was that the tattoos were placed on the forehead, cheeks and lips of the girls as a token of possession. Their master put them to watching sheep and caring for the camel train as it moved over the country. After the armistice British soldiers learned of the two girls and getting in touch with their relatives helped to free them. Now in this country they hope to learn the language and to take their place as Americans in the household of their brother.

### Wife Former Tennessee Governor Declares Political Pendulum Will Swing to the Democrats Next Year

ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 22. (AP)—The political pendulum will swing to the Democratic party in the coming election, Mrs. Beulah McMillin, national Democratic woman from Tennessee, predicted in the opening address at the first session of the third regional conference of Democratic women here today.

"The election is but one short year off," she said. "The eyes of the nation are upon the Democratic party, for it is going to be a Democratic year. And the eyes of the Democratic party are upon the women of the party."

Mrs. McMillin assailed the Republican party, asking: "Will we set our face against the Republican program of Teapot Dome scandals, of trafficking in government oil lands, doling out postoffice patronage for campaign contributions, the flagrant disregard of civil service laws and shameful return to the spoils system with all its attendant evils?"

She stated the Democratic women's platform as "the peace of the world, justice to labor, laws revision of the tariff downward and strict enforcement of the law."

"We stand for recognition of the women of the party as an integral part of the Democratic organization and not as an ornament or a silent partner, nor an onlooker," the speaker declared.

"The biggest job that we have on our hands today is to avert another world war. War has a new and a terrible meaning. The two forces of the world are might and right. Might is sometimes necessary till right is ready. But we seem to be forgetting the right and are letting might have its way. To religiously foster a universal desire for peace will do more than years of argument, more than might could ever accomplish, peculiarly so in the women's work, for it's the sacrifice to which they must send their shin-

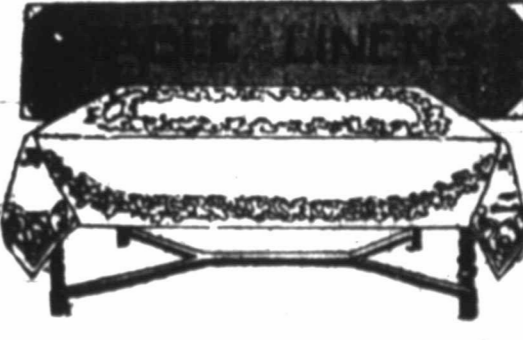

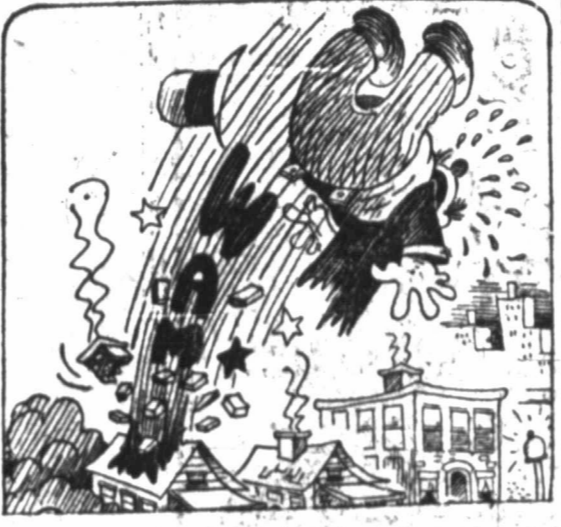

THE big bettors of Wall street are betting on the forthcoming presidential election.

Presidential Coolidge is an election favorite, not only for the Republican nomination, but for election—1 to 2 on the nomination, and 1 to 2 on the election.

But the only man who is believed to have a chance of defeating Coolidge—but he must get the Democratic nomination to do it.

The odds against Ford's getting the Democratic nomination are 4 to 1.

But if Ford is the Democratic nominee, he will become the odds-on favorite against Coolidge at 2 to 1.

However, Ford runs on a third ticket. Ford and Coolidge will be a close money; with the odds in each case at 2 to 1 against the field, and the Democratic nominee running 2 to 1.

These views do not necessarily reflect the political sentiment of Wall street, but they do reflect its betting judgment as voiced by Jean De Chadenedes, a Wall street broker, who, together with his brother, Guy, have handled some of the largest political bets made during the past ten years.

Many big wagers have already been made, the largest being \$1,000,000 that Henry Ford will not be the next president.

Lloyd of London has taken the long end of the bet, by insuring two policies of \$200,000 insuring his defeat; and a big western operator who has won millions in his time, is covering the short end by paying the premium of \$25,000.

Other heavy wagers are under way. At Wall street, which has never failed to be the pulse not only of big business, but national politics, is beginning to perk up interest in the election.

As the stock market forecasts future business conditions, said De Chadenedes in an exclusive interview with NEA Service, "just so Wall street predicts the political situation."

The stock market seldom mistakes the trend of future business; neither does the betting fraternity err in its judgment regarding political betwines.

Of all the sources of getting political information, the betting parameter is by far the most reliable. For politicians and editors are influenced by their own personal likes, or by party loyalty. They may form faulty conclusions by constantly associating with their own political kind. But not so with the bettor. He weighs every situation and forms his judgment without being influenced by anything except hard facts. And he backs his judgment accordingly.

There has been a tightening of the odds since the first money on the campaign appeared in Wall street last July.

Andrew W. Mellon, James E. Watson, Henry Cabot Lodge and Nathan T. Miller, former governor of New York, appeared among the leading Republicans. But they are not among the leading 11, either for the nomination or election, in the list now.

Among the Democrats Carter Glass, Bainbridge Colby, Senator Edward T. Edwards, and Joseph Daniels have dropped.

It is expected that the odds will show up further as the time of the nominating convention draws near. "It isn't human nature," says De Chadenedes, "to start big betting when the decision as to who will be the respective candidate is still very much clouded. But betting interest will soon start picking up. I think that this campaign will probably set a record for betting."

A greater interest is shown on the possibilities for the nominations than ever before.

Hughes, next to Coolidge, seems to be the strongest Republican possibility, with Gifford Pinchot, Herbert Hoover and Hiram Johnson, almost as strong. The shade between is so small that it isn't reflected in their odds.

Among the Democrats McAdoo and Senator Samuel M. Briston, whose strength seems to be increasing steadily, seem to have the best chance among the regulars.

Ford is the "unknown" factor. But the odds on him are closing up rapidly. They were about 11-1 when the \$200,000 bet was made, and now they are 4-1. Cox, Al Smith and Senator Underwood are close behind.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—The sun shines in the capital again! The White House social calendar has been made up, dispersing the clouds of doubt concerning "official" functions for the coming winter.

Beginning with a "cabinet dinner" on Dec. 6, President and Mrs. Coolidge will stage the full list of formal white house affairs during the "season."

Following the cabinet dinner will come the diplomatic reception on Dec. 13; diplomatic dinner, Dec. 20; judicial reception, Jan. 10; speaker court dinner, Feb. 7; anniversary dinner, Feb. 21; and the army and navy reception, Feb. 23.

There will also be a sort of "open house" reception on New Year's Day, from 11 to 1:30.

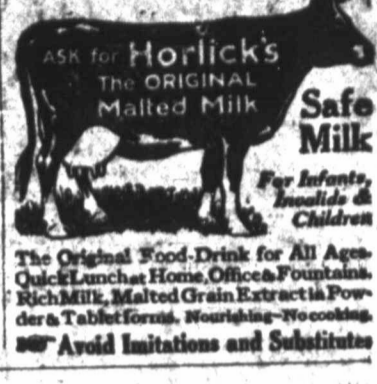

CUBS ACQUIRE HORNSBY AND GLEASON UNDER PROPOSED DEAL

Chicago Reports Deal Which Will Be Closed At Once Sends Cheeves To St. Louis; Is Spudder Property

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 22.—Sam Houston, president of the St. Louis Cardinals, today denied reports that the Chicago Cubs had acquired the services of Rogers Hornsby and William "Kid" Gleason.

Mr. Houston added that every indication that it was impossible to get a satisfactory trade involving Hornsby and consequently it was most likely that the deal would be closed at once.

CHICAGO, Nov. 22.—Rogers Hornsby, second baseman of the St. Louis Cardinals, and William "Kid" Gleason, late pitcher of the Chicago American League club, were today reported to have been traded to the Chicago Cubs.

Hack Miller, Marty Callaghan, Charlie Hollocher, Virgil Cheeves and Eddie Osborne and about \$100,000 will go to the Cardinals in the trade, according to the Tribune, which says that Branch Rickey, of the Cardinals, will give his official approval to the deal today.

The veteran "Kid" Gleason, who guided the destinies of the White Sox for a number of years, will be chief assistant to manager Bill Killebrew of the Cubs, and will spend most of his time coaching recruit pitchers.

All the players who will be traded to St. Louis for Hornsby in the proposed deal have been with the Cubs for two years or more. Cheeves, right hand hurler, was a 1929 purchaser from Eastland, Texas, and was released at the end of the last season to Wichita Falls, but will be brought back for the proposed trade.

Virgil Cheeves, right handed pitcher, mentioned in the trade which will take Hornsby to the Cubs, is the property of the Spudders and the last contract agreement expresses the belief that this part of the report is erroneous.

Cheeves comes to Wichita Falls as one of the players in the deal which sent Rip Wheeler and Osborne to the Cubs. The Cub management wired H. O. Hines, president of the Wichita Falls Baseball Association three weeks ago that Cheeves had been released to the Spudders and the papers had been approved.

With this same announcement from Chicago to Hines came the information that Art Wetts, outfielder, was another one of the players who would be sent to the Spudders.

Two more players, whose names have not as yet been announced, are to come to Wichita Falls in the deal made at the close of the 1932 playing season.

## TODAY'S RECIPES

**Boiled Ice-cream.**  
One and one-half cups granulated sugar, two-thirds cup milk, two teaspoons flour, few grains salt, one teaspoon vanilla.  
Put sugar and milk in a smooth sauce pan. Let stand until sugar and milk are well blended. Cook until a soft ball is formed when a few drops are tried in a saucer of water. Do not stir after the syrup begins to boil. Put the flour in a bowl. Just before the syrup reaches the soft ball stage pour a little over the flour, stirring to make a smooth paste. Add two tablespoons more of the syrup and stir until smooth. Return the syrup to the fire and finish cooking. Pour the flour and syrup mixture and stand until cool. Add vanilla and beat until creamy. Spread on warm cake.

**Caramel Sauce.**  
One and one-half cups granulated sugar, one and one-half cups boiling water, one tablespoon butter, one dessertspoon cornstarch.  
Put sugar in an iron or aluminum frying pan. Put over a hot fire and stir constantly until melted. Add the syrup and water and stir until syrup is dissolved. Add butter and cook two minutes. Stir in a little cold milk and stir into boiling syrup. Let boil one minute and put over hot water to keep hot.

**Steamed Pudding.**  
Two tablespoons butter, four tablespoons molasses, four tablespoons milk, one-fourth cup white flour, two-thirds cup graham flour, one-fourth teaspoon soda, one-fourth teaspoon salt, one-fourth teaspoon each cinnamon and nutmeg, one-half cup stoned raisins.  
Melt butter. Add molasses and milk. Add graham flour and mix well. Mix and sift white flour, soda and salt and spices. Add to first mixture. Stir in raisins. Turn into buttered mold and steam one and one-half hours. Serve with lemon sauce.

**Lemon Sauce.**  
One and one-half cups boiling water, three-fourths cup sugar, two dessertspoons cornstarch, one tablespoon butter, one tablespoon grated lemon rind, three tablespoons lemon juice, few grains salt.  
Mix sugar and cornstarch. Slowly add water, stirring constantly. Boil until clear and thick, stirring to prevent sticking. Add butter, lemon rind and rind and cook two minutes longer. Remove from the fire and serve warm.

## Broadcasting By Man In Airplane Proves Success

OMAHA, Neb., Nov. 22 (AP)—Removal of that element of night flying which has cost the lives of not a few men who have braved the air whines over desolate places where a forced landing off the beaten trails meant isolation, is but one of the possibilities seen in the successful conclusion of two days' tests of broadcasting from an air mail plane under service conditions of the human voice.

When Pilot Jack Knight, veteran of the winged mail carrier, returned to earth at North Platte,

last night after a full hour in the air during which he was in almost constant touch with the Omaha mail hangar, nearly 100 miles away, it was proved conclusively that the one man broadcasting station for planes is a success, officials asserted.

Knight, with E. G. Muller, of Washington, air mail service radio expert, left Omaha yesterday morning. Keeping up a running report of their trip en route arriving at the western Nebraska city, they waited until 8:00 o'clock last night, and after preliminary ground tests went aloft for 43 hours at various altitudes and broadcasted messages.

With broadcasting station at required intervals along the air mail route and with each plane equipped for sending and receiving the air mail pilot can be called to make his position known at all times, can summon aid when forced to land and can be called back to his home stations, officials pointed out.

## CONVENTION OUTLINES DEFINITE PROGRAM FOR U. S. INLAND WATERWAYS

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Nov. 22 (AP)—Delegates attending the fifth annual convention of the Missouri Valley Association settled down to the task of formulating a definite program for improvement of inland waterways, particularly the Mississippi, Illinois, Ohio and Missouri rivers, for presentation at the coming session of congress.

Endorsement by the convention of the five-year budget proposal made yesterday by Congressman Cleveland A. Newton, of Missouri, for the improvement of the Mississippi river and its three principal tributaries appeared practically assured today. The proposal which Mr. Newton said would be incorporated in a bill to be introduced in the next congress calls for the expenditure of \$50,000,000 in five years exclusive of the annual river and

harbors appropriations and sums pledged for the improvement of smaller streams in the valley. The Newton project contemplated deeper channels in the four rivers, making them navigable the year around and affording direct service between St. Paul, Kansas City, Chicago, Pittsburgh and the gulf via St. Louis.

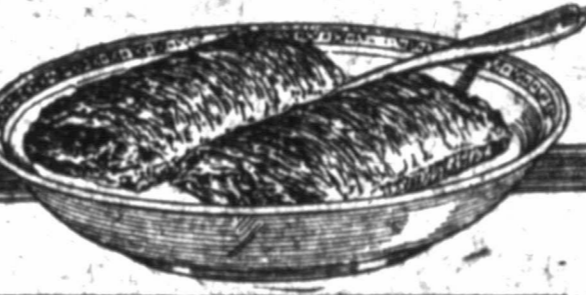
