### THIRTEEN ESCAPE PRISON IN KANSAS OLD TUNNEL USED

LANSING, Kan., Dec. 3.—Three of the 13 prisoners who escaped last night from the Kansas penitentiary here were sighted today in timber near Hixson station, 15 miles south of Lansing. Twenty-nine other prisoners are in a posse endeavoring to capture the fugitives.

LANSING, Kan., Dec. 3.—Poses were scouring the countryside today for 13 men who escaped from the Kansas penitentiary here yesterday by crawling more than 400 feet in mud and slime through a narrow, abandoned tunnel.

The escape was believed to have been led by Frank Castro, 27, serving five to ten years for burglary from Topeka.

Castro's knowledge of the tunnel supposedly was gained about 20 years ago when he was serving prior term. Existence of the sub-way was unknown even to the oldest prison official.

Woodhulms took up the trail at the mouth of the tunnel and followed it to the Missouri River where it was believed the fugitives scattered, some leaving in a row boat.

Later the posse picked up a trail to the water tanks on the Missouri Pacific railroad at Leavenworth.

Two south bound passenger trains had stopped at the tanks in the early hours of the night.

George Dean, 46, was said by prison officials to be the most notorious of the escaped prisoners. He was serving two to ten years for robbery of bank at Logg Island, Kan., September 7, 1922. He is said to have served two penitentiary terms in Oklahoma.

Most of the other prisoners were in for grand larceny, burglary of highway robbery and were serving sentences ranging from five to 21 years.

### PINCHOT PROPOSES STATE REGULATION OF COAL INDUSTRY

### DETAILS OF PLAN MADE PUBLIC BY PENNSYLVANIA GOVERNOR

### OUTLINE IS FORWARDED TO OTHER EXECUTIVES

HARRISBURG, Pa., Dec. 3.—Details of his plan for a compact of states to regulate the anthracite coal industry which Governor Pinchot proposed last Monday at a conference here of representatives of anthracite consuming states, were made public by the governor today.

The complete outline was sent last night to the other executives together with an invitation to another meeting here December 13.

The compact, the governor's outline said, after being ratified by the states, including Pennsylvania, which together constituted an aggregate percentage of the anthracite output in 1922, could become effective in the ratifying states when consented to by congress.

Pinchot proposed it to do, among other things, the following: The coal business within the ratifying states a public utility which Governor Pruesse of Minnesota last week asked that Pennsylvania alone do without the formalities of a compact.

Create a joint commission of five in the federal government to ratify the compact and seven if it does, the president in the latter case to appoint one member and the governor of Pennsylvania another.

The commission would have wide powers to investigate and regulate the industry.

He proposed to confer on the joint commission greater powers to control the industry, giving it the right to investigate all angles of the business, such as costs, profits, wages and salaries; authority to fix prices and to require uniform accounts and reports to fix standards of coal; power to license dealers and to repossess the coal supply and to repossess the Interstate Commerce Commission changes in freight rates and allotment of railway facilities.

The plan also would give the commission the right to raise revenue for salaries and expenses by a specific tax per ton.

The outline cited previous compacts between states and legal decisions upholding them and summarized what the governor declared would be the value of the proposed union, one feature being, he said, that it would give a uniform and unbroken system of control from the mine to the consumer's bin.

Officers convinced missing man kidnaped Monday Quarter Mile from his home.

Perry Stroud, the young farmer of near Tell, is dead and his body has been hidden somewhere in the Pease River bottoms or cedar brakes," was the opinion expressed Monday morning by Ranger Ferguson J. W. McCormick and Ranger W. W. Belcher, who returned from Childress Sunday night to attend court here Monday.

Officers in the Pease River bottoms and cedar brakes, where it is believed the body of Stroud has been hidden, the two state rangers state that it is one of the worst places he has ever encountered in their wide experience.

One of them explained it in this manner: "You could chase a jack rabbit down one at a point on the road and he would starve to death before he could find his way out."

Officers have established the fact that Stroud was quartered by his assailants and kidnaped at a point not more than a quarter of a mile from his home. This fact in their opinion is established because the mules which Stroud was driving at the time he disappeared were raised at a point on the road beyond reaching the first lane and each time the mules would turn in there, they being taken to a point beyond the first lane and turned loose they would return to the Stroud farm.

Officers believe the officers here found a witness who saw Tate the man under arrest, standing beside his automobile at a point just beyond the lane leading to the Stroud home late Tuesday afternoon.

Tate refuses to talk and ever since being in custody has answered no questions directed to him.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—The progressive bloc in congress today made good its threat to throw the house into a deadlock over election of a speaker. On the first ballot no candidate received the majority over all required to elect.

On the second ballot Speaker Gillett received 193 votes to 193 for Representative Garrett of Tennessee and 17 for Representative Cooper of Wisconsin. Representative Madden, Republican, Illinois, was given five votes.

Mr. Gillett had the support of the Republican fall short of the majority over all required to elect. The Democratic vote today for Representative Garrett and the bulk of the progressive bloc strength went to Representative Cooper.

Compromise offers were not permitted of an election within a day or two were expected by the Republican chiefs, but as the voting went on, the progressive bloc demanded for concessions in committee assignments and changes in the house rules.

On the second ballot Speaker Gillett received 193 votes to 193 for Representative Garrett of Tennessee and 17 for Representative Cooper of Wisconsin. Representative Madden, Republican, Illinois, was given five votes.

On the third ballot Garrett went into the lead with 193 votes against 193 for Gillett, 17 for Cooper and five for Madden.

When the roll call was taken during the taking of the fourth ballot that no candidate would receive a majority, Republican organization leaders declared they would defer the fifth ballot until tomorrow.

### REPUBLICAN LEADERS FAKE ORGANIZATION ROW

DEATH OF YOUTH PROVIDES LATEST PARIS SENSATION

FIRST REPORTS WERE TO EFFECT HE HAD COMMITTED SUICIDE

FATHER CLAIMS MURDER RESULT ATROCIOUS PLOT

Asks Investigation and Has Agreed to Prefer Charges in the Case

PARIS, Dec. 3 (AP)—Not in many years has Paris had a sensation comparable to that afforded by the death of 14-year-old Philippe Daudet, who died in a hospital several days ago from the effect of wounds received in a taxi cab. The newspapers of a week ago said that the boy had committed suicide, but Leon Daudet, leader of the royalist movement in France and father of Philippe, is of the opinion that his son was murdered "by an atrocious plot" and has asked the public prosecutor to act on an article printed in Libération, the anarchist paper, in which a visit of Philippe to the newspaper office was described.

Leon Daudet was told by the procurator-general that the boy's suicide had been established beyond a possible doubt and that it would be impossible for the judicial authorities to do anything further unless he had a charge against some definite person or persons or could make a charge of corrupting a minor or of criminal libel against Libération. The father agreed to prefer charges.

Among the points requiring clarification today were where the boy spent the two days that elapsed between his disappearance from home, Nov. 20, and his visit to the Libération office Nov. 22. George Vidal, editor of the newspaper, who wrote the article describing the arrival of Philippe at his office on Nov. 22, has been interviewed.

The newspaper story asserted that the lad, who described himself as an anarchist, but refused to give any name except Philippe, handed Vidal a letter which was to be used in case anything happened to him. The editor opened this communication after he learned of the mysterious taxi cab suicide and found that it was written to Mme. Daudet. In the letter Philippe spoke of his secret adherence to the anarchist cause, asserting:

"Now my cause summons me. I believe it is my duty to do what I am doing."

Libération Française, admitting that the communication is in Philippe's hand writing, suggests that it may have been written under duress and demands to know what occurred

in the offices of Libération while Philippe was there. The royalist publication says the death of the boy was an act of vengeance for Germaine Berthon, the young woman anarchist who killed Marius Plateau, of the staff of L'Action Française, last November.

Vidal told interviewers that he was amazed at the extravagant language used by Philippe when he visited Libération and that the boy seemed to him to be unbalanced. In the light of subsequent events, Vidal said to LeMatin he was convinced Philippe planned to kill his own father, but when his excitement wore off he was so overcome with horror at the idea that he could have entertained such a thought that he committed suicide.

Another uncertain point is where Philippe got his revolver. Leon Daudet maintains that the pistol was given him by anarchists who had kidnapped him, but the latter deny this.

One of Vidal's friends, the manager of a Montparnasse cafe, says that Philippe had borrowed money and that he lent the lad various sums amounting in all to 35 francs among the boy's intimates, intimates and high school instructors, all of whom agreed he was an anarchist and was fully imbued with royalist ideas, without, however, being argumentative on the subject.

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Find Skeleton Of Boy Missing For Eight Years

SCRANTON, Pa., Dec. 3 (AP)—Finding of a boy's skeleton, together with evidence making identification positive, in a swamp near Greely, Pa., today brought to an end a search of more than eight years for four-year-old Jimmy Glass, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Glass of Jersey City, N. J.

A pair of shoes on the feet of the skeleton and garters encircling the bones of the legs were identified by Mrs. Glass as those worn by her child when he disappeared from their summer home at Greely on May 12, 1915. Two brass snaps used to shorten and lengthen the straps on overalls found near the skeleton also aided in the identification.

The skeleton was found by a deer hunter in a marshy woods. It is about 500 yards from the boarding house where Jimmy and his parents were spending the summer. There were no marks of violence on the skeleton and no bones were broken.

On the day of his disappearance Jimmy was playing near the boarding house. His father now believes he wandered off, following a pet dog. When he did not return at dusk Mrs. Glass gave the alarm. The woods around Greely were tramped for days, a dam was dynamited and a pond drained, but without success. Gypsy bands everywhere were held up by the police and their caravans and camps searched and the parents traveled thousands of miles following clues that failed to bear result. County authorities estimate that the search cost \$100,000.

White House Is Declared Unsafe By U. S. Engineer

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3 (AP)—The white house has been declared unsafe. Conditions there are such as to require that immediate remedial measures be taken to prevent a possible calamity.

These disclosures were made today by Major General Lansing H. Beach, chief of engineers of the army. In his annual report to the secretary of war Congress is asked for \$100,000 for the work of reconstructing the interior portion of the famous building to make it secure.

A preliminary study of the situation in the interior upper portion of the executive mansion has indicated a condition which renders the building unsafe. The conditions are such as to require that immediate remedial measures be taken to prevent a possible calamity.

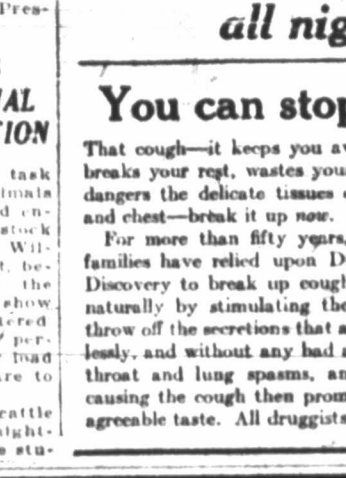

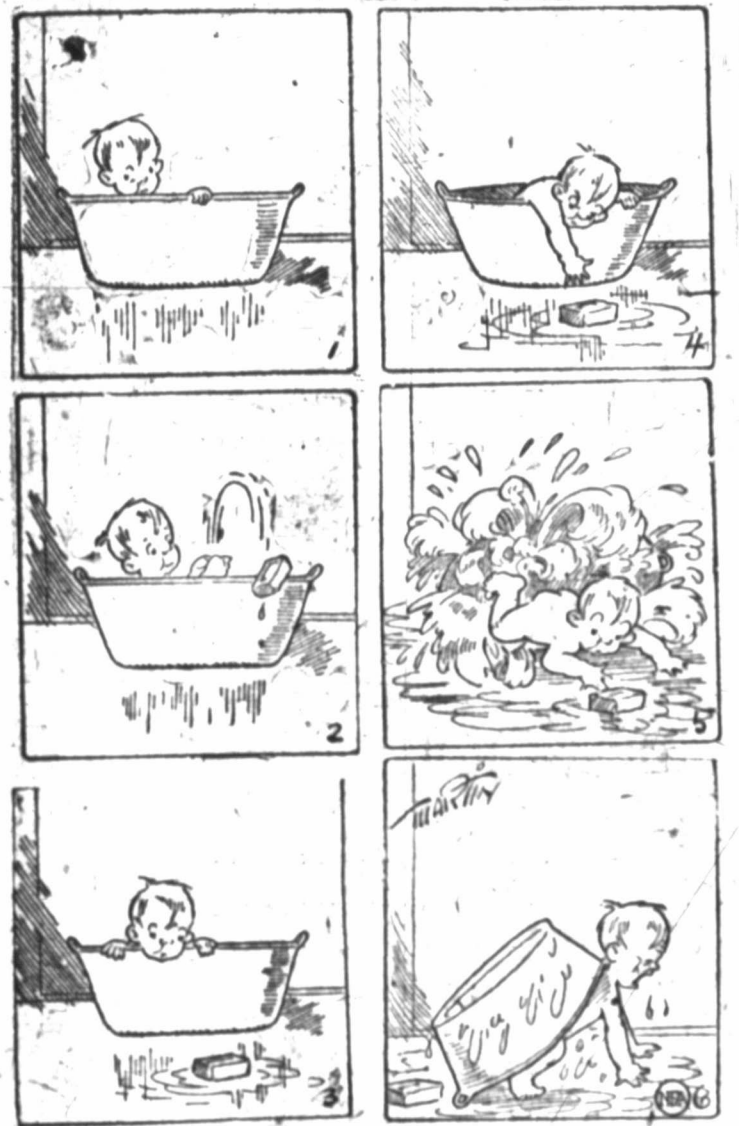

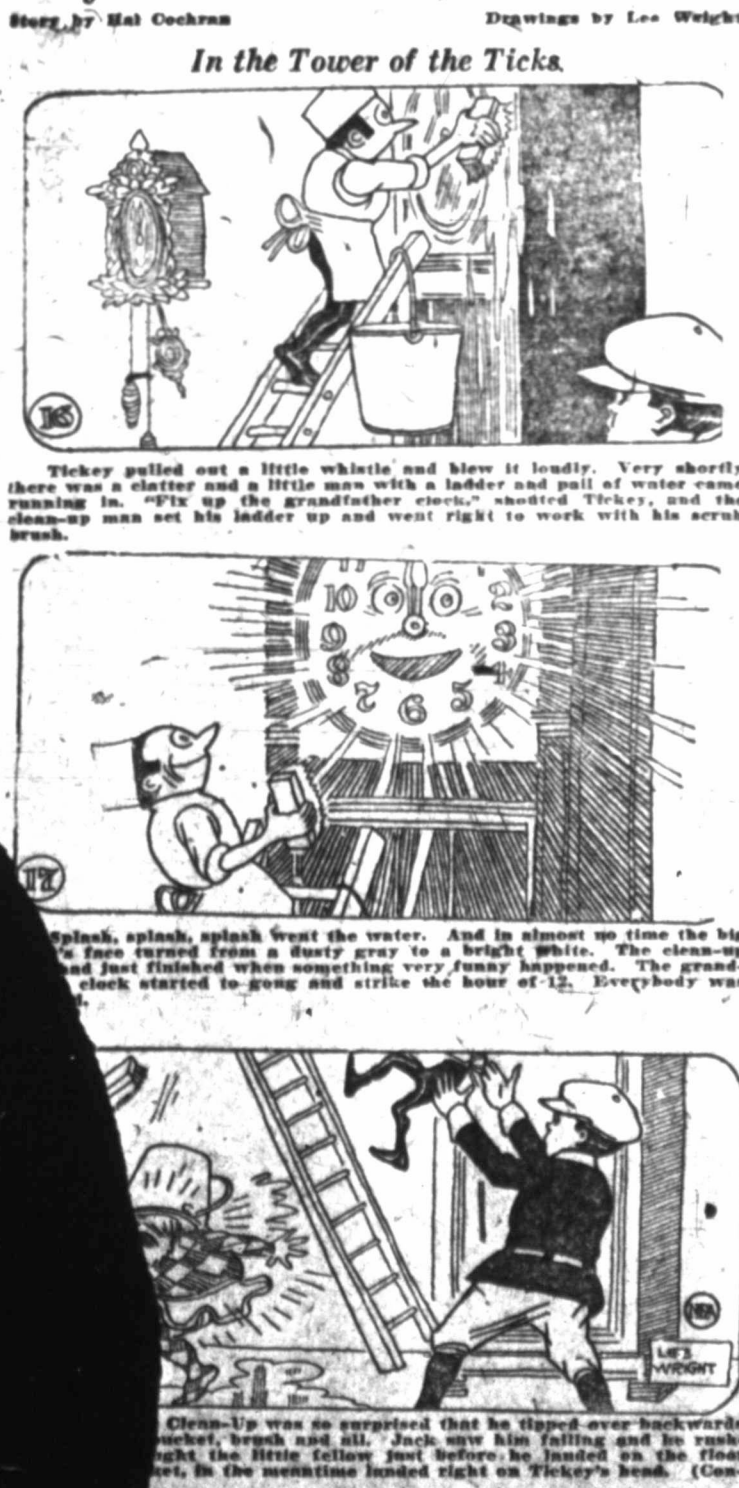

## Terms Reached Sunday Night And Texarkana Agrees to Come Here On a Guarantee of \$2,500

Coyotes vs. Texarkana High, Saturday evening, December 3, 8:30 p. m. at the ball park.

### FOOTBALL SEASON IS FEATURED BY BIG ATTENDANCE

Wichita Falls' pep; Wichita's enthusiasm; the people's loyalty; faith, upon which the city is founded, and a \$2,500 guarantee made it possible to stage the gridiron classic which will determine the championship of Districts 4, 5, 6 and 10 of the interscholastic football league in Wichita Falls next Saturday.

NEW YORK, Dec. 3. (AP)—The 1923 football season, featured by attendance figures that shattered those for any previous gridiron spectacle by a record array of inter-sectional battles, has added probably the most brilliant chapter of all time to the remarkable growth of the nation's favorite college pastime.

It appeared Saturday night as though at Dallas because it seemed at that time that no terms could be agreed upon. Texarkana wanted the game, but would not post a guarantee. Wichita Falls wanted the game, but Coach Jones had no intention of playing on his own lot or neutral territory.

The proposition finally slumped down to where Coach Jones wanted to determine the location of the game by the flip of a coin, but at the same time the city offered a guarantee if he should win the toss.

After dickered around at a \$2,000 guarantee if the game would be played in this city, Coach Callum raised his ante and quoted a figure of \$2,500, believing in the loyalty of Wichita Falls gridiron warriors.

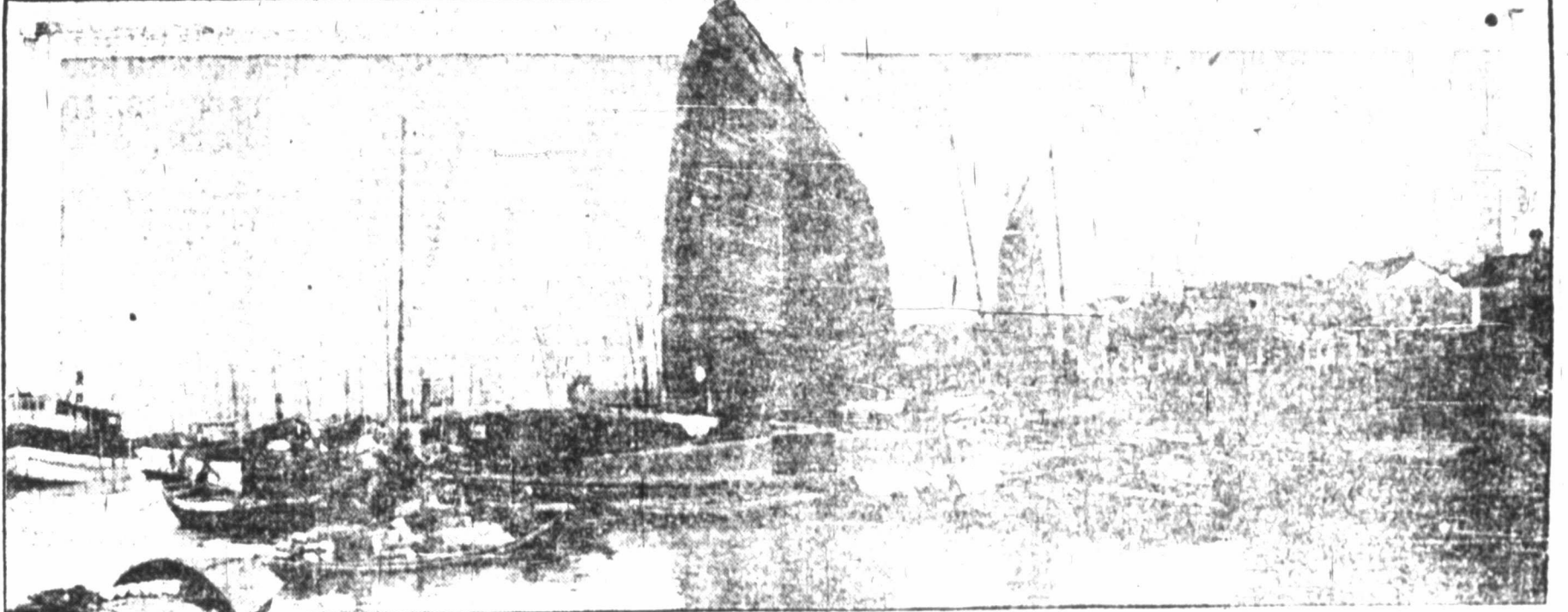

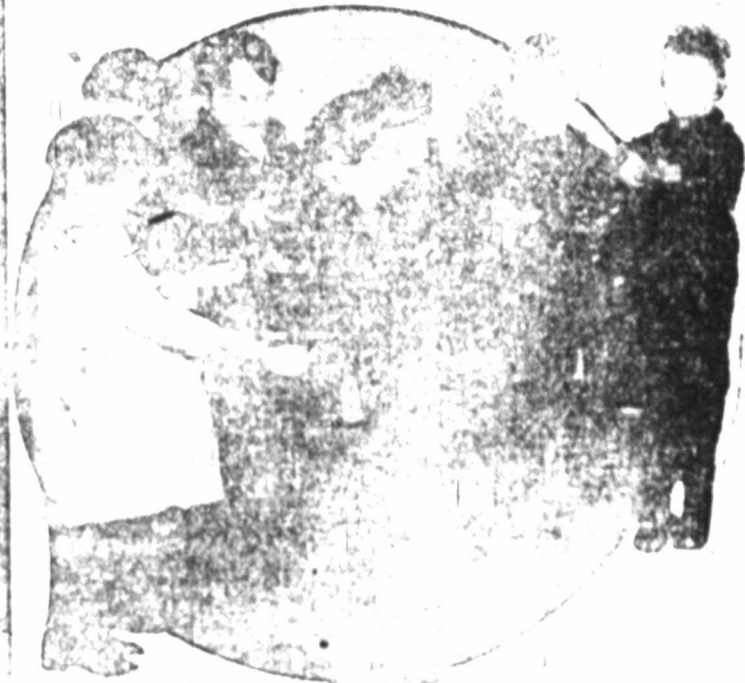

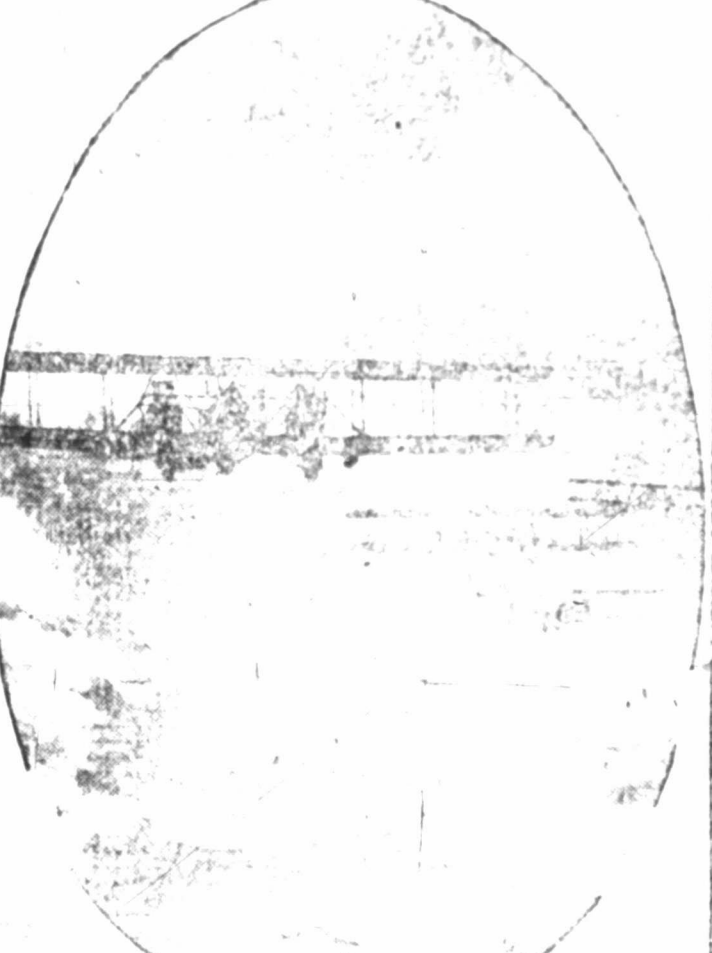
