





### SOUTHERN TARIFF CONGRESS OPENS AT CHATTANOOGA

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., Dec. 7. (AP)—Regular sessions of the Southern Tariff Congress opened here this morning with delivery of the annual message of President J. H. Kirby of Houston, Texas. The afternoon program includes reports of state chairmen on the effect of the present tariff schedules on industries in their states; reports of representatives of state producers' organizations, state bankers' associations and other bodies on the effect of tariffs on their industries.

President Kirby said in part: "The removal of the tariff in 1922 would have opened the gates of this country to the soy bean and other oil sources from the orient and would have made a crop of peanuts which would have been worth \$100,000,000 in 1922 not worth the cost of their seed."

"The tariff is merely a levy. It is a law of the country imposed upon products imported. This question is most misapprehended in every walk of life; most abused in the industrial world and among the rank and file. After the levy is paid in to the treasury it is used for the purpose of reducing taxes, paying the national debt and lightening the burden."

### WANTS SPECIAL BUREAU FOR 'DRY' ENFORCEMENT

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7. (AP)—Enforcement of the prohibition laws would be placed in a separate bureau in the treasury department under terms of a bill which Representative Cranton, Republican of Michigan, announced today he had prepared for introduction.

The internal revenue bureau, now in charge of this work, Mr. Cranton said, was overloaded with duties in the administration of the tax laws.

"Prohibition enforcement," he declared, "involving as it does the great problem of supremacy of law and order in the nation, is a task sufficiently great to justify the organization of a bureau for that specific purpose."

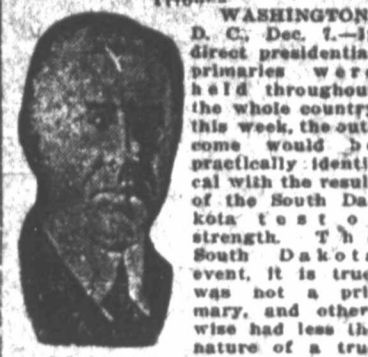

### Strength of Candidates Generally As Indicated In South Dakota If Primaries Were Held At This Time

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 7.—If direct presidential primaries were a reality throughout the whole country this week, the outcome would be practically identical with the result of the South Dakota event. It is true, again, that a primary, and otherwise had less the nature of a true political barometer than is the popular interpretation put upon it. Nevertheless, every well posted politician in both parties knows that just as Coolidge won over Johnson in South Dakota, and as McAdoo won over Ford as would they win in four out of five of the states if—and this is the important question—the test of strength came today.

Coolidge is far in the lead for the Republican nomination; McAdoo is far in the lead for the Democratic nomination. The whole problem of their opponents to head them off. All the initial momentum is in favor of these two men. They can be beaten only by the energy and organizing ability of their respective opponents or by their own mistakes, or by some turn of events beyond their control. The principal factor is the energy and resourcefulness of their respective opponents.

In the case of Johnson, his organization is just getting under way, and his fortunes depend chiefly on what he and his extremely energetic and resourceful political managers can do in six months.

In the case of the opponents of McAdoo, they are not going to try to beat Coolidge. The opponents of McAdoo will not attempt any thing very formidable in the way of a nation wide organization or intensive campaigning. They are going to rely on the well known two-thirds rule of the Democratic party, which makes it possible for McAdoo's opponents to veto his nomination by having one-third of the delegates, or 215 out of 645. McAdoo's opponents feel, and are justified in feeling, that in spite of McAdoo's great present lead, they can have, without necessarily working very energetically, the one-third necessary to veto his nomination. For this necessary one-third, McAdoo's opponents depend on those large states where the organization is strongly under the control of the local leaders, such as New York, Indiana and Illinois.

Nevertheless, if McAdoo makes much further gains beyond what he now has, he will have a prestige such as will cause the anti-McAdoo leaders some difficulty in holding their one-third together. McAdoo, to win must have 750 delegates. Today he has in sight close to 500. McAdoo's present strength is much greater than is generally supposed. Out of 44 states, McAdoo will have some delegates from 27 at least 40 states. From most of the states west of the Mississippi, McAdoo will have all the delegates solidly. Moreover, the trend is in McAdoo's direction. He is by far the most widely known of all the Democratic possibilities, except Henry Ford; and as the South Dakota event demonstrates, Ford is not to be taken seriously as a Democratic contender, and cannot be unless Ford personally goes into the fight in a spirit which so far he has refused to show. Ford has a very large personal

following, but the writer does not know of any state where this Ford following has political leadership or is so organized as to be effective politically. Senator Underwood is far more formidable as a contender against McAdoo than is Henry Ford, who has the largest number of delegates in sight.

### SWEEPING REDUCTION IN NUMBER OF EMPLOYEES IN WAR VETERANS BUREAU

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—A reduction of 2900 employees in the field and 200 in the central office, has been made since March 1. Director Hines of the veterans' bureau announced today in outlining the results of the general reorganization of the bureau's personnel structure.

The sweeping cut in the number of employees, Director Hines said, is in line with the policy of eliminating excess and inefficient workers to build up a "more compact and efficient organization."

The director also announced the approval of increases in salaries for 2131 employees in the field amounting to \$215,000 and for 1305 employees of the central office at a cost of \$187,000. The increases represent 50 per cent of the savings of the salary item of the various district budgets, through reduction in personnel.

The salary raises are effective December 1 and were made on the recommendation of the various district managers.

### TWO KILLED, TWO INJURED, WHEN TRAIN HITS AUTO

PITTSBURG, Kan., Dec. 7.—Two men were killed and two others injured when a Frisco freight train struck a car in which the four men were riding at Zinville, a siding near Carl Junction, Mo., this morning.

The dead are Albert Tennis and Lon Nesser, of Chittwood, a Joplin suburb. The injured are Jess Wright and E. H. Payne, also of Chittwood. The men, all miners, were on their way to work when the accident occurred.

### FRENCH NEWSPAPER COMMENT SARCASTIC

PARIS, Dec. 7. (AP)—President Coolidge's message is described by Partinax in L'Echo de Paris as an outline of American policy abusively directed toward attaining her own particular ends in some of the fine sounding phrases which to our ears smack rather of the pulpit than the forum.

### MARKED BY CLEARNESS ON IMPORTANT SUBJECTS

LONDON, Dec. 7. (AP)—President Coolidge's message, the Times says, was marked by a clearness of statement on many important subjects that has not always distinguished the communications of his predecessors.

"It is an emphatic profession of the family creed of the president's party," says the Times, "chiefly remarkable for the precision with which it reaffirms the dogma of abstention from the chief questions that distract the old world."

Referring to Mr. Coolidge's remarks about the league of nations the newspaper says: "The day may perhaps come when the league will find full favor in American eyes with the permanent court."

### REVOLUTION BREAKS OUT IN FIVE STATES

(Continued from Page One.)

From Tampico to meet General Sanchez, while other government forces were instructed to converge at Mazatlan in order to assist in attacking Sanchez. Other troops were concentrated in the state of Tlaxcala under command of General Fausto Topete.

Officials quarters deny that there has been an outbreak in the state of Oaxaca. They also profess to have received no word of revolts in Michoacan, Chihuahua or San Luis Potosi.

**Fighting at Cordova.**  
Advices from Pueblo state that fighting occurred at Cordova when a part of the garrison there refused to join the Sanchez-Huerta movement.

A war department announcement quotes telegram from Iguala to the effect that the negotiations between General Maycotte and General Figueroa, who was recently in revolt against the government of Guerrero, state, have been successful. General Figueroa promised to abandon his campaign and proceed to Toluca for the purpose of surrendering. He is reported to have said that he was not opposed to the central government, but only sought to reform the state administration.

A popular demonstration against the hostilities in various parts of the republic is scheduled for today. It will be headed by former President Chazarra.

President Obregon has placed special transportation to Tlaxcala at the disposal of Colonel Porfirio Garza and family because the colonel said he did not wish to fight against his brother, General Jose Garza, who is General Huerta's chief of staff.

Like President Obregon, the secretary of war, General Francisco Serrano, expressed the opinion that the revolt soon would be put down.

"The Sanchez rebellion," he said, "is not a transient phenomenon, because it does not include elements in other regions of the country. I am sure the rebellion soon will be stamped out."

General Serrano declared that Sanchez commanded 11 battalions, of which three remained loyal.

**NOT EXPECTED TO END NEGOTIATIONS WITH V. B.**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7. (AP)—Although officials are unable to appreciate fully the extent of the revolutionary movement in Mexico, it is believed here the uprising will not affect plans for ratification of the two claims conventions negotiated with the Obregon government as the basis of restoring diplomatic relations between the United States and Mexico. The convention is expected to be placed before the senate by President Coolidge very soon with the request that ratification be expedited as much as possible.

Reports on the outbreak received at the state department today gave about the same picture of the revolutionary movement as was contained in press advices. Consul Boyle at San Luis Potosi reported that Mexican federal troops had disarmed the "entire armed forces of the Prieto government in that city."

Officials here attached great importance to the dispatch as Jorge Prieto Laurens, governor of the state of San Luis Potosi, also is president of the cooperatista party and among the most active of the revolutionary leaders in opposition to the Obregon government.

Charge Summerlin at Mexico City forwarded a report received by the British legation there from the British consul at Vera Cruz, which said the commander in chief of the federal forces in the state of Vera Cruz had been supported by the naval forces at that port.

The Vera Cruz state government had been deposed, he said, and all state authorities had been replaced by appointees representing the revolutionists. Railway services were said to have been suspended.

The British consul's report added that De la Huerta was in Vera Cruz and it was believed there that the "entire movement would be supported at once in the states of Oaxaca, Jalisco, Michoacan, San Luis Potosi and Tamaulipas."

A report sent by Consul General Claude I. Dawson from Mexico City said reports were current there that federal troops in the states of Guerrero, Michoacan, Oaxaca and Vera Cruz had revolted.

**VERA CRUZ COUP CAME SOMEWHAT PREMATURELY**

SAN ANTONIO, Dec. 7. (AP)—Rumors of a breaking point in the tense situation in Mexico have existed along the border for weeks, but the Vera Cruz coup came somewhat prematurely, according to observers here.

One thing seems apparent and that is that the "outs," the Pellicistas, Carranzistas, Villistas, Maderistas and the Conventacionistas have lined up behind Adolfo de la Huerta for the presidency. E. Elias Galles has the support of the socialists, the Zapatistas and the radical labor element.

It is understood here that President Obregon will send Andrew Almazan in command of the federal forces to attempt to retake Vera Cruz. Hipolito Villa, brother of the assassinated Pancho, has revolted at Cuatitlan with a band of well armed Villistas and General Emilio Madero is also reported to have proclaimed the cause of De la Huerta at San Pedro de la Cueva.

Cochulla, Novo Leon and Tamaulipas are said to be De la Huerta government in Chihuahua is restless and it is expected that the state will swing to the De la Huerta cause. San Luis Potosi has already a pro-De la Huerta government.

Interest centers on what General Salvador Alvarado will do in the state of Yucatan, where the rebels have their greatest strongholds in Mexico. The governor is reported to have had all churches painted red and has ordered the image of Christ replaced by a red flag on all altars. De la Huerta partisans here look for a coup by the military commander.

**URGE AN EXTENSION OF NATIONAL CIVIL SERVICE**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7. (AP)—The National Civil Service Reform League today asked congress to enact a general law giving the president power to classify under the civil service law at his discretion any places hitherto exempted by acts of congress, including prohibition agents, employees of the veterans bureau, the tariff commission and the shipping board, and some offices in the internal revenue bureau.

Such legislation, said resolutions adopted at the closing session of the saguaro convention, would enable the president "to avoid the gross scandals that invariably accompany spoils system appointments." William Dudley Foule, Richmond, Ind., was reelected president of the league.

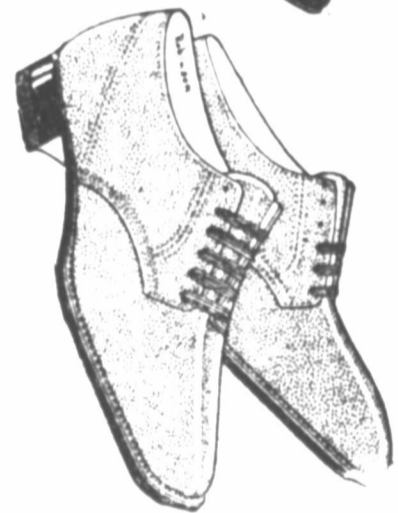
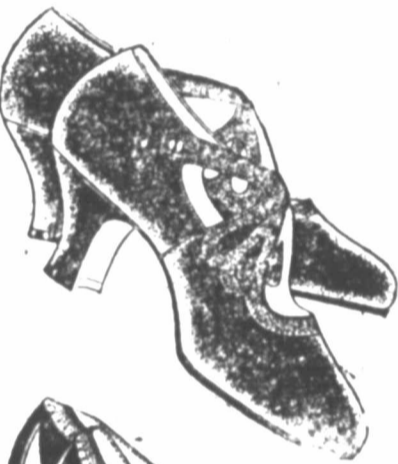

### FIVE APPLICANTS FOR TEACHERS' CERTIFICATES





# "NO MAN'S LAND" WILL BE STUDIED BY COMMITTEE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

The situation in "No Man's Land" ought to be cleaned up," W. B. Hamilton, chairman of the chamber of commerce committee appointed to solve the problem of the district, stated at the called meeting Friday morning of directors of the chamber of commerce and citizens to discuss the matter.

More than 30 people, including representatives of property owners and of citizens of the district, attended the meeting. Walter D. Cline, president of the chamber of commerce, stated that it was not the purpose of the meeting to hear and settle disputes and other legal technicalities, but only to clean up the district as a matter of community interest.

Mr. Hamilton urged land owners to clean up their property, the city to mark off streets, and stressed the need of better sanitary and living conditions in the district.

Judge A. H. Britton stated that, according to recommendations from a city planning expert, the district was suitable for a factory site and not a residential district. He pointed out the fact that on account of prevailing natural conditions, such as the nearness of the river and railroad, the district would never be suitable for a first-class residential district or a suitable location for wholesale interests. He declared that there is no reason why the health menaces and undesirable conditions could not be removed if the proper means were employed.

Taking the side of property owners whose rights are alleged to have been infringed upon by the squatters, and pointing out the fact that squatters' sovereignty should not prevail in "No Man's Land," Judge Joe Carrigan stated that the residents of the district were pugnacious and displayed a mean attitude toward property owners by continually harassing them. He pointed out the fact that if streets were graded, the squatters would probably remove from the streets.

**Squatters Organized.**

Mrs. R. V. Montgomery, a property owner in the district, on whose land are 25 alleged squatters, attended the meeting. Judge Carrigan stated that the settlers in "No Man's Land" had organized and employed counsel to get the lands and that when a suit was filed for damages against a squatter, a damage suit was immediately filed against the landowner by the organization.

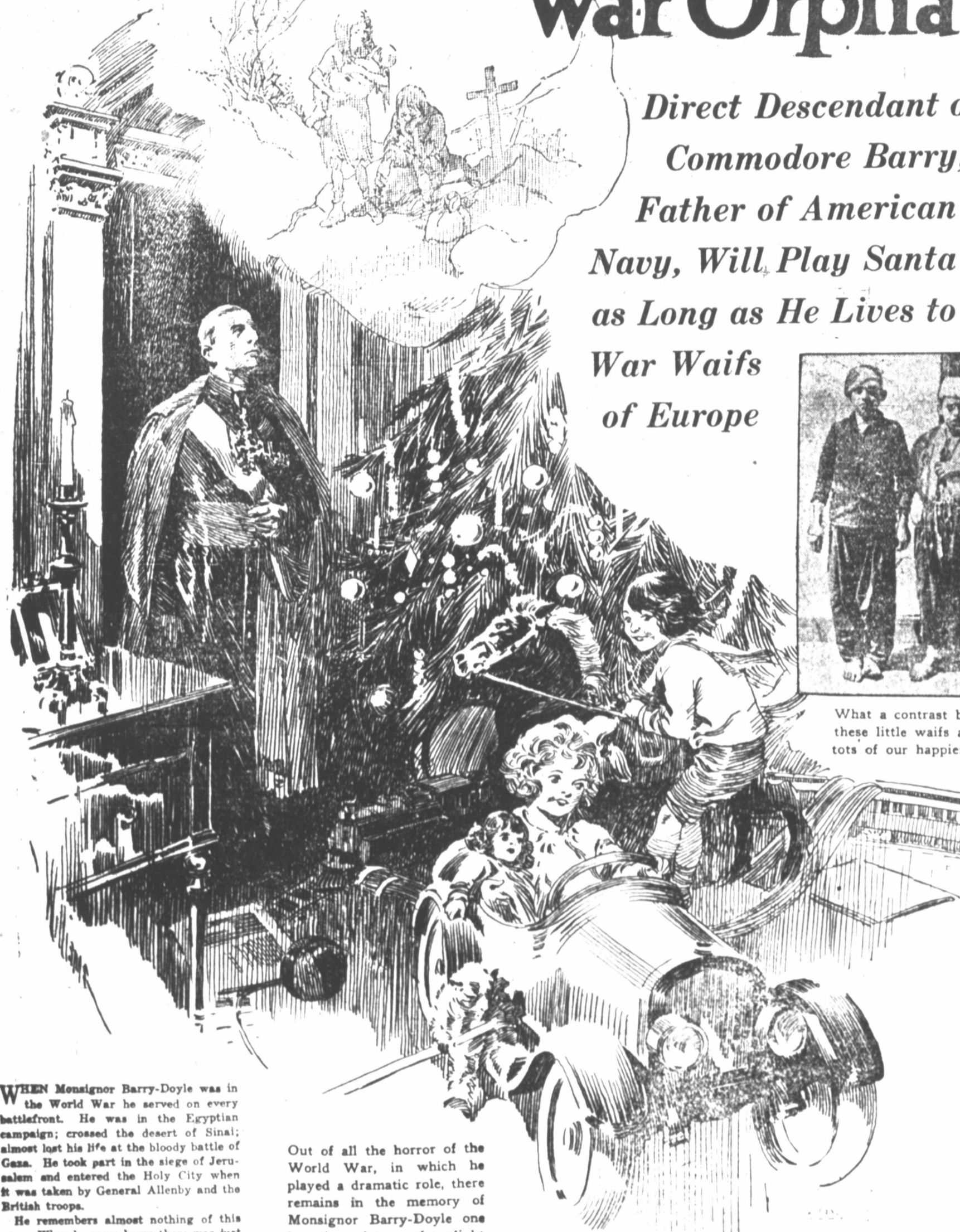

# Dedicates His Life to World War Orphans

*Direct Descendant of Commodore Barry, Father of American Navy, Will Play Santa as Long as He Lives to War Waifs of Europe*



What a contrast between these little waifs and the tots of our happier land!



Monsignor Barry-Doyle has put aside honors, both secular and clerical, and dedicated his life to the children of the Near East, who are tossed about like bits of pitifully torn wreckage on the flood tide of human hate

WHEN Monsignor Barry-Doyle was in the World War he served on every battlefield. He was in the Egyptian campaign; crossed the desert of Sinai; almost lost his life at the bloody battle of Gaza. He took part in the siege of Jerusalem and entered the Holy City when it was taken by General Allenby and the British troops.

He remembers almost nothing of this now. When he came home there was just one memory he could not lose—the hurt, wondering look on little children's faces.

All the joy and mischief that bubbles up in little boys and girls was gone from these faces. Small up-and-coming girls of three did not ask thirty-two questions a minute because no one had ever answered their first question—"Where is my dinner?" Throwing pillows at night and smart show-off tricks might just as well have never existed so far as lads of ten were concerned. You cannot play when hunger gnaws all day long. Pillows? There was none whereon to lay their heads.

THIS may or may not adequately explain to you why a world-famed British Army chaplain of distinguished ancestry and decorated by all the allied Powers; why an international personage whose brilliance and influence would have carried him far, should decide to count the world well lost and pledge the rest of his life to a group of the world's cheated children.

Love, peace, roses for their cheeks, all the rest of his days thinking, dreaming and working for them—these are the gifts this soldier-prelate of Santa Claus hopes to slip into the worn stockings of the little girls and boys of the Near East. Americans can, perhaps, specially thrill to this dedication of a life in knowing that the man who makes it is a direct descendant of Commodore Barry, founder of the American Navy. Monsignor Barry-Doyle is, in fact, the only male descendant of Barry now living.

At least 200,000 children among the Armenian, Syrian and Greek refugees are so desperately underfed that it makes the heart sad and sore to look at them. In Athens, the city where St. Paul preached Christianity on Mars Hill,

Out of all the horror of the World War, in which he played a dramatic role, there remains in the memory of Monsignor Barry-Doyle one haunting picture—the plight of little children, sick, starving and emaciated. To their relief he has consecrated his life. What a contrast he points out to the children of America who have full and plenty served them on a silver platter nowadays!

Little ones are dying of exposure and starvation.

"They need food, of course. That they must have. But they need more. They must have love and the benefit of education without propaganda. Racial hatred, the cause of all the great upheaval in their lands, must be taken from their hearts. These children are the hope of the Near East. What we sow in their hearts will blossom into the new people of the Near East. They need to be taught to love one another and forgive—for they must lead their people."

Monsignor Barry-Doyle spoke in a full, rich, beautiful voice that suggested both England and his homeland, Ireland. He has a soldier's face. Tall, of powerful build, flawlessly accoutered in the full uniform of the British colonel, he seemed every inch a soldier—the children's Richard Coeur de Lion, perhaps. The spirituality of his eyes, the crimson vest with which the Catholic Church invests its high dignitaries, showed he was a priest as well.

HE SPOKE almost immediately of the burning of Smyrna, burned unquestionably by the Turks and not the Greeks, in his opinion, and of the indescribable horrors and pitiable episodes that followed in the wake of the burning.

"I saw women dazed, dumb-struck,

swept away in the mad crowds forever from their loved ones; I saw men with the fire of revenge in their eyes, and little children—oh, the little children—most of all. They were hungry, naked, stricken down with fever, pleading for a little water. Imagine it; children, beautiful children! They died on the roadside without ever having harmed a human being."

Dedicating his life to the little brothers and sisters of these children who died on the Thracian wayside is, after all, a very logical matter to the mind of Monsignor Barry-Doyle. For a moment there was silence in the room. Then, with the

slight break quite gone from his voice, he said: "I could never have rested again if I did not do something to bring peace into the lives of the children of the Near East."

MONSIGNOR BARRY-DOYLE was born within a stone throw of the birthplace of his famous ancestor, Commodore Barry, in County Wexford, Ireland. He is a close kinsman of Sir Arthur Conan Doyle and a nephew of Lord North, of Roxham Abbey, Bambury. When the war broke out he was one of the many priests who joined the army

to minister to the Catholic troops. Soon he became a pal to soldiers of the colonies, Australia, Canada, South Africa and our doughboys as well. The late Pope Benedict made him a domestic prelate for his spiritual work. Decorations for distinguished service were conferred on him by England, Russia, Belgium, France, Italy, Portugal and Greece. He was made a Knight Commander and awarded the grand cross of the Sacred Constantinian Order of St. George, one of the most ancient of all orders of Christendom with an exclusive membership now of fewer than 200 knights, four of whom are kings, eleven princes and nine cardinals. After the armistice he was stationed for four years at Constantinople and there became a warm personal friend of the diplomats of all the allied nations.

This picturesque figure of a priest prefers, however, not to dwell on these matters. He much prefers to talk about the Christmas story he is trying to write

country to which the teacher happens to belong. The missionaries have done a tremendous amount of good in the Near East. Teachers, however, of American, British or of any other nationality are often unconsciously or consciously propagandists for their own country, and it is propaganda that has ruined the East.

BISHOP CALAVASSY is the Bishop of Constantinople. Until the fall of the Greeks before the victorious armies of Kemal Pasha, his work among the orphans prospered wonderfully and his schools, where the gospel of "Love one another" was being taught, had a bright outlook. The Bishop remained at his post there, but he was obliged to close his schools and transfer them to Athens. There every one is struggling now to save refugees from starvation and the typhus, but with not very satisfactory results.

"We shall get back to the matter of the schools as soon as it becomes possible. Our dearest plan now is to build one big orphanage school in Athens, for it is here the little ones are still dying of starvation and exposure. "Bean soup and black bread are rations fit for a queen, thinks the little child in Athens. I saw the most beautiful little girl I have ever seen, there, one day, in one of the shelters. Her beauty was wan and spiritual. The matron of the shelter told me the child was getting special treatment for tuberculosis. Do you know what this consisted of? A spoonful of cod-liver oil a day! They cannot even dream of milk.

"The Greeks must be extolled for their charity in their own lands, however. Although they were overriden with want and suffering they did not turn away the Armenian refugees when they knocked, homeless, at their gates. Their own were starving but they took their fellow sufferers in and the little they had they were willing to divide. "One of the most sublime things about a work that has its hard, discouraging aspects is the wonderful charity that is found in the hearts of the poor. That is one of the things I have marveled about in your America—the willingness of the poor to give. American charity is the most consoling charity I have witnessed. It doesn't even stop to consider or argue. It gives at once. Once you have touched the heart you have touched the pocket-book at the same time. The sacrifices the poor people make are boundless and astonishing."

Prospects For Final Legal Victory Considered Bright By County Officials.

HEMLOCK, Tex., Dec. 7.—Prospects for the construction of the Clay county highway through that county were considerably brightened by the recent decision of the court of civil appeals affirming the decision of the lower court, refusing the temporary injunction, restraining the commissioners court from selling bonds for the financing of the highway.

Supporters of the good roads movement are elated over the decision and are now confident that the plans will go through and that actual work will begin, not later than March 1924.

The complainants, J. F. Huggins et al. who filed the temporary injunction restraining County Judge J. F. Vaden and members of the commissioners court from selling the bonds voted on March 26, 1923, will have 15 days from the date of the decision in which to file a motion with the court for a new hearing. In the event the question is finally settled with the court by appeal and the only other hope of the complainants is that a writ of error will be granted by the supreme court. A writ of error has been denied in the supreme court on this same question prior to this case. It was stated by the attorneys Friday and no uncertainty is felt from this source.

The order for the construction of a cross country concrete highway from the Wichita county line to the Montague county line, a part of the Colorado-Gulf highway, in March 1923. Protest was filed by some of the property owners who opposed the bond issue and an injunction restraining the commissioners court from selling the bonds to finance the road has been in court for some time.

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—Numerous residents of exclusive districts have paid \$30 each for C. O. D. packages of liquor delivered to them by express men under the misapprehension that the parcels were ordered by some of their family. The packages contained directions for converting the liquid into alcoholic beverages. The money collected has been held by the company and the police hope the funds will try to collect the funds.

FEDERAL JUDGE IMPOSES PRISON SENTENCES WITH FINES \$150,500 TOTAL

SAVANNAH, Ga., Dec. 7.—Judge Barrett in the federal court today sentenced 21 defendants convicted of conspiracy and other prohibition charges to pay fines totaling \$150,500 and to serve time in the federal penitentiary. All of those convicted and sentenced figured in the wholesale round-up instigated by federal and state officers here in March, a month ago in which the government contended an international liquor plot had been brought to light.

CONFERENCE CALLED OFF AT MR. FORD'S REQUEST

DETROIT, Mich., Dec. 7.—At the request of Henry Ford the conference of delegates of the Allied Ford (or President) Clubs of the United States scheduled to meet here December 12 was indefinitely postponed. Announcement of the postponement of the meeting was made last night by Robert R. Pointer, chairman of the committee on arrangements.

LOUISIANA BAPTISTS WILL MEET IN SHREVEPORT

ALEXANDRIA, La., Dec. 7.—The 7th annual convention of Louisiana Baptists will be held at Shreveport next year. It was announced as the diamond jubilee session was nearing its close today. Nine hundred and twenty-five ministers and widows have been given aid, the report of the relief and annuity board declared. The board spent \$12,000 for relief during the past year.

Baptists of the south, another report showed, own and operate 22 hospitals with a total bed capacity of 2823 and property valuation of \$3,576,440.

Wichita County Can Collect \$1,184,000 In Delinquent Taxes If Proper Contract Is Made, Says Judge Sartin

Wichita county has on the books \$1,184,000 worth of delinquent taxes and some portion of this amount can be collected if a contract can be made by the county commissioners which will be approved by the attorney general of the state, County Judge R. D. Sartin stated in an address at the luncheon of the business council of the chamber of commerce Friday noon at the Kemp Hotel.

This county now owes the state of Texas more than \$500,000 in delinquent taxes and until recently there was no manner in which delinquent taxes could be collected. In 1908 a delinquent tax bill was passed by the state legislature, stating that contracts could be made by county commissioners with the approval of the state comptroller for the collection of delinquent taxes, but this law was repealed in 1917. In 1923 the legislature re-enacted the same law, with the change that instead of approval by the comptroller, all power was given to the county commissioners.

of the jury, and see the verdict which you will write in this case. I can see it distinctly. We the jury find the defendant not guilty. It is as plain as the handwriting on the wall at the time of the first of the trial.

I want you gentlemen to give the same careful attention to state's counsel who follows me as you have kindly afforded me. I want you to listen to everything he has to say. I want you to maintain your reason and not mistake his best for duty.

**Jurors Given Apples**  
A ten minute recess was declared by the court. During the recess the court bailiff, Harley Snyder, who is in charge of the jury, went outside the court room and appeared a moment later with a large box of apples which he carried into the jury room.

When asked who the donor was, he said, "They are six nice apples and some very good ones, too."

The jury was recalled in 10 minutes and District Attorney Martin began his closing argument.

He began in a slow and easy manner and told of the existence of a double standard in the enforcement of law in this United States. He said that the standard which includes those who are rich, those who possess power and influence. Then there is the standard which applies to the poor, the weak and the friendless.

"It is no trouble to bring a poor man, a friendless man, a man without power and influence, into a court room and secure a conviction. But it is entirely a different matter to secure a conviction for a wealthy man, a man of power and influence whose influence dominates the community where he resides."

"This is what the state faces in this very case. I realize that the defendant, regardless of whether he is poor or rich, should secure a fair and impartial trial in a court house, presided over by a judge and where he is given the benefit of a doubt."

"I want you men to look back over the testimony as given here on the stand and receive the organized effort of an organized society which has set up an invisible empire and which threatens the very foundation of our government."

**McDonald's Speech**  
Mr. McDonald made a very good speech regarding his own character and that of the defendant. And you remember, gentlemen, he ended by saying, 'and gentlemen, the reputation of this defendant and his character is no doubt better than mine.' Gentlemen of the jury, if this is true, I want to make this passing remark, 'God pity his poor soul!'

"Mr. McDonald's speech would undoubtedly have been more proper and still a better one if delivered not on the papers under the cover of darkness. But thank God we are now here under God's bright sunlight, within the sanctuary of a court room, presided over by a judge."

"I also want you to remember the remark made by counsel when he said, 'This defendant is an impostor, of the offense of perjury as his honor on the bench.'"

"Gentlemen, remember that statement. I am sure that you will give as much credit to that statement as you did to his entire address."

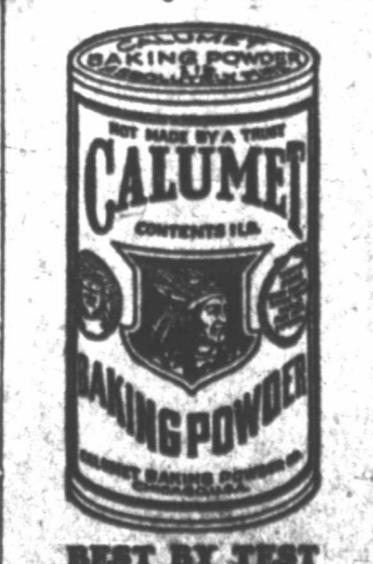

successful. Three of those rejected were laborites. Two were conservatives, one was a liberal and one an independent.

Laber's first woman M. P. Miss Lavrenko, will be a distinct acquisition to the party in the house. She is not young and has spent a large part of her life in public work.

Probably the most surprising aspect of the first day's returns was the defeat of Winston Spencer Churchill by F. A. Pethick Lawrence, laborite, in West Leicester, by 1,113 votes.

Sir Montague Barlow, minister of labor, also was defeated by a laborite, losing to J. J. Tools in the south division of Alford. Another defeat that occasioned surprise was that of Arthur Henderson, secretary of the labor party, who lost in East Warwick to Sir R. W. Asker.

Sir Alfred Mond, former liberal minister, was another prominent candidate who went down before labor. He was defeated in West Swansay by the laborite candidate by 115 votes.

Barber, Asquith, former premier and now leader of the liberal party, triumphed at Paisley, but by a rather narrow margin, over his laborite opponent, J. J. Blagden. Mr. Asquith's plurality was 1,748.

Lloyd George Re-elected. Former Prime Minister Lloyd George was re-elected from the Carnarvon district of Wales over Austin Jones, conservative.

Mrs. Margaret Baringham, liberal, was re-elected from his South division of Lincolnshire. Duchess of Athol, conservative, was returned to the Glasgow and Western division of Perth and Kinross over P. A. Molino, liberal. W. O. Ormsby-Gore, conservative, parliamentary under secretary of state for the colonies, was re-elected from Stafford.

Arthur Chamberlain, conservative, was re-elected in the west division of Birmingham. Neville Chamberlain, conservative, chancellor of the exchequer, was elected in the Ladywood division of Birmingham. Mrs. Margaret Bondfield, labor, the first woman and the second woman laborite to be elected parliament, was returned for Northampton. Mr. Robert Sanders, minister of agriculture, was defeated in the Bridgewater division of Somerset by W. E. Brown, liberal. Another woman elected was Lady Darlington, liberal, who was successful in her contest for the seat for the Wycombe division of Buckinghamshire. It was rumored today that Winston Churchill, defeated in yesterday's polling in West Leicester, would be asked to contest the seat for West Derbyshire, whose member has just died, against the Marquis of Blandford. discussed and careful studies made of the most of them, as for instance, alkali spots and their chemical analysis, the drainage requirements in managing such spots successfully, the alkalinity of the water to be used for irrigation, the chemical analysis and the necessity for guarded use of irrigation water, the natural fertility of the soils and how it may be retained or restored, and so forth.

The surveyors estimate that approximately 30,000 acres of the present mapped area will be subject to irrigation, though the present irrigation system will cover at first only about 1,000 acres. The area lies at an elevation above sea level ranging from 225 feet to 1,000 feet, but the higher land that can be watered from the present system is approximately 1,400 feet above sea level. The Wichita river drains the entire area, and empties into Red river about 25 or 30 miles northwest from the present outlined irrigation area. The channel of the stream is from 100 to 500 feet wide and is very crooked. The fall from where the river enters the area where it leaves it is about 125 feet. On an air line the distance from the diversion dam to where the river leaves the area is about 25 miles. The river travels some 62 miles to the same point. The main tributaries of the river are the Cimarron, from the north within this area are Deep, Buffalo and Pond creeks, while on the south enter Holliday, Pease, Antelope, Deer and Camp creeks. Some similar streams enter from both sides of the river. The creeks and smaller streams of the area overflow occasionally, and do so the lowland along the Wichita river, but these overflows are rarely so frequent or so damaging as to interfere with the utilization of the lands for agriculture.

**Soil Type Phases Mapped.**

When soil series were found in the area which were of sufficient importance to map and of these, thirty-three soil types and three type phases were mapped. Of the thirty-six soils mapped, only ten are important in areal extent and range in origin from material sediments to residual soils derived from the weathering of Red Beds material. Several of the soil series found in this area have been encountered in other mapped areas and they, therefore, bear the name of the area where they were first encountered by the surveyors. The series mapped in this area are: Vernon, Kirkland, Allendale, Calumet, Buffalo, Wichita, Bascom, Miller, Yehola and Midway. This is the first area mapped in Texas in which the Calumet series has been found and the "Wichita, Allendale, Buffalo and Midway" soils, which occur in considerable bodies in this area, have never been mapped before. These names are from local sources.

The Vernon soils are the typical chocolate-red soils with chocolate-red subsoils and are representative of very large areas of the rolling red prairie lands of the Red Beds region of Northwest Texas. The Allendale soils are very similar to the Vernon soils in color and are derived from the Red Beds but differ in that the subsoils are much tougher and sarry than those of the Vernon. The difference, therefore, between the types is mainly in the structure of the subsoil material. The Kirkland soils occur in close association with the Vernon soils and are derived from some formations of the Red Beds but they are brown surface soils having dark brown to chocolate-brown tough, heavy subsoils. The Kirkland soils occupy the smoother prairie areas while the Vernon soils are more rolling. The main areas of the Kirkland soils are nearly flat with surfaces which incline enough to allow ready irrigation. The Wichita soils represent very old materials sediments probably washed from the Permian Red Beds and associated formations and are chocolate-red to chocolate-brown surface soils with chocolate-red rather friable subsoils. The surface soils and upper subsoils of the Wichita series are not as a rule calcareous, but the lower subsoils are calcareous. These soils occupy flat terraces along the stream valleys though in places the old terraces have been eroded into a rolling topographic form. The Buffalo soils are very similar in color and origin to the Wichita soils, but differ in having tougher, heavier subsoils. The Buffalo soils occur in close association with the Wichita and Calumet soils on the terraces, and partake of the structural characteristics of the latter series. The Cal-

umet soils are dark brown or chocolate-brown on the surface, drying to a light grayish-brown and are underlain by heavy tough clays or chocolate-brown subsoils. The Calumet soils are also found on the flat high terraces along the stream valleys and are old water-laid soil materials washed from Red Beds and probably from some of the darker soils of the Red Beds such as the Kirkland soils. These soils (the Calumet) occupy the more poorly drained areas of the terraces, while the better drained portions consist of the Wichita and Buffalo soils. The alluvial soils of the area consist of the Miller, Yehola and Midway series of soils. The Miller soils are chocolate-red surface soils underlain by chocolate-red subsoils. The Miller soils are heavier than the surface soils, while in the Yehola series the soils, which resemble the Miller in color and surface conditions have subsoils that are lighter than the surface soils. That is, the Yehola soils are usually underlain at least 2 feet by very fine sand or very fine sandy loam. The Miller and Yehola soils are found in large areas along the Wichita river and are representative of large areas of soils of the same series found along the Red, Brazos, Colorado and Pease rivers, as well as along all other streams which rise or flow through the Permian Red Beds. These are very valuable soils in most cases, though the very lightest and sandy types are not very good.

**DETAILED SOIL SURVEY.**

Strong soils. These latter, however, are not extensive in this area. These soils are strongly calcareous. The Midway soils are the dark brown soils along the creeks and small streams of the area and are alluvial soils formed by sediments washed from local areas. They are not as a rule, very calcareous, but are very good soils.

**Dominant Soil Types.**

The types of soil comprising the greater portion of the area are the Vernon clay loam and very fine sandy loam, Kirkland clay loam and very fine sandy loam, Wichita very fine sandy loam, Calumet very fine sandy loam, Yehola very fine sandy loam and Miller silty clay loam. These soils are suited to a considerable number of crops ranging from many of the general farm crops to fruits and vegetables.

These soils are, as a rule, naturally strong, but in places have been turned rather substantially to the extent that the humus content is not large and the soils would be improved by the incorporation of organic matter by plowing under vegetable matter.

It does not appear that commercial fertilizers or lime to greatly needed at present, though intensive cropping under irrigation may develop some requirements in this direction. The needs of the soils along these lines would require careful study under experimental conditions.

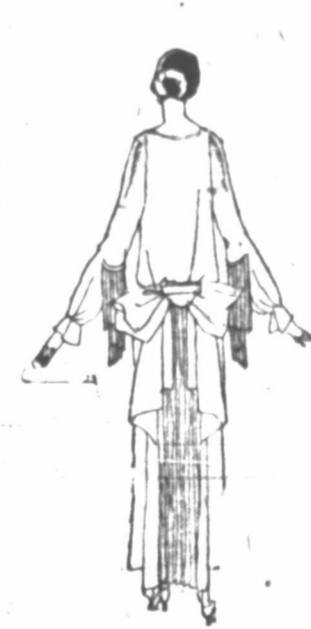

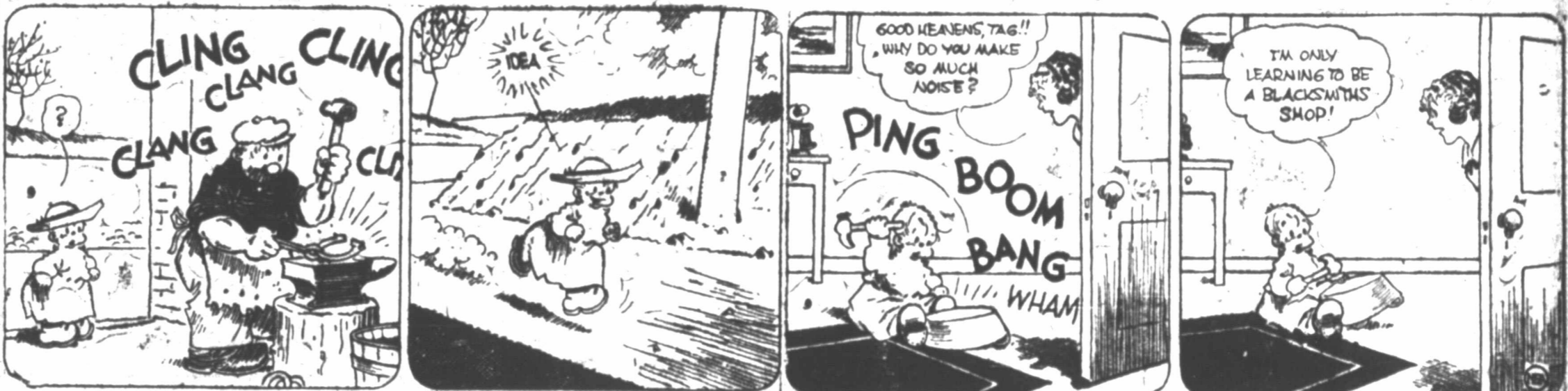

## TODAY'S RECIPES

**They Cooked**  
There are times when nearly everyone wants "just something" to serve to a large group of women in the afternoon. The hostess without a maid may find even a cup of tea too much of an undertaking for a large number of guests and will prefer something that can be prepared and placed on plates ready to serve before the meeting begins.

**Home-made candy** is always appreciated but this involves hours of tedious as well as hard work, so why not have one of the following delectable sweetmeats? These are about two bites more than candy but are quite rich and sweet enough to serve as a confection without tea.

**Hard Tack**  
Two eggs, one cup sugar, one cup flour, one cup dates, one cup walnuts, one-fourth teaspoon soda, one-eighth teaspoon salt.  
Beat eggs until light with a Dover beater. Beat in sugar, sift soda with flour and salt. Beat into first mixture. Add dates stoned and cut in small pieces, and nuts chopped or cut in small pieces. Mix well and spread very thinly on the bottom of a well oiled and floured dripping pan or cookie sheet. Bake

15 minutes in a hot oven. Remove from oven, cut in long narrow bars and let cool on the cooling board. A plate of hard tack and coconut macaroons makes an attractive combination.

**Coconut Macaroons**  
Two eggs (whites), three-fourths cup shredded coconut, one tablespoon cornstarch, one teaspoon vanilla.  
Beat whites of eggs until stiff and dry. Beat in sugar. Put in top of double boiler over hot water. When lukewarm add coconut, cornstarch and vanilla. Mix well and drop from a small spoon onto sheets of oiled paper. Bake in a slow oven until tops are lightly browned.

**Hickorees**  
One cup hickory nut meats, one cup light brown sugar, one egg, one cup flour, one-fourth teaspoon salt, one-half teaspoon vanilla.  
Pecans or English walnuts can be used instead of hickory nuts.  
Chop nuts. Beat egg until very light with sugar. Add flour, salt, nuts and vanilla. Mix well. Roll and cut with a tiny cutter or form into small balls and flatten with the fingers. Bake in a slow oven.

**Crackers**  
These confections have crackers for foundation. They require even less work than the two little but affairs.  
Fresh crisp oyster crackers are split in halves and filled with jelly, candied fruit, a plump stoned raisin or half a teaspoonful of rich vanilla butter cream. Put halves together and dip in melted confectioner's chocolate. The small sized oyster crackers make the daintiest affairs. Perfectly fresh marshmallows can be cut in quarters and used for fillings.

**Saratoga flakes** are spread with an egg mixture and browned in the oven to make a "Marguerite."

**Margarites**  
One egg (white), three table-spoons sugar, one-half cup chopped nut meats, one-half cup chopped and seeded raisins, one-eighth teaspoon salt, one-half teaspoon vanilla.  
Beat white of egg until stiff and dry. Beat in sugar. Stir in nuts and raisins and spread on crackers. Bake in a hot oven until brown.

**Another cracker goodie** is made with marshmallows. Small square or round wafers are chosen for these. Cut marshmallows in halves. Put half a nut meat in the center of each wafer, cover with half a marshmallow and put in a hot oven or under the broiler to brown and puff the mallow. These are prepared, all but the browning, early in the day.

**DIG UP BONES OF MAMMOTH THAT WAS 12 FEET HIGH**  
MELBOURNE, Fla., Dec. 7.—The bones of a Columbian mammoth 12 feet high and 24 feet long were dug from the sand, shell marl and mud bed of Crane's creek yesterday by Professor R. H. Loomis of the geological department of Amherst College.  
The mammoth was mined down to the sand in the second glacier period about 10,000 years ago, according to Dr. Loomis. He expressed the opinion that it was forced south by the ice into a latitude where no proper food existed.  
The tusk of the mammoth showed that originally they were eight feet long and indicated an animal 25 per cent larger than the Asiatic elephant, Dr. Loomis said.

## TODAY'S RECIPES

**To Serve With Salad.**  
Many housewives like to serve the salad just before the main course of meat and vegetables rather than after it.

A vegetable or fish salad is very acceptable right after the soup, but a fruit salad seems to give a better balance to the meal if it follows the main course.

In any event a salad course properly served includes a wafer or something of the sort with the salad itself. The accompaniment may be served on the plate with the salad or on a large plate, each person helping himself.

These little wafers may be used with a fruit, vegetable or head lettuce salad which does not gain its pliancy from cheese.

**Cheese Crackers.**  
Four tablespoons grated American full cream cheese, 2 tablespoons butter, paprika, small square crackers.

Rub cheese and butter to a smooth paste. Spread mixture on crackers, dust with paprika and toast just before serving.

If the crackers are ready on the table it's a simple thing to pop them in the broiler while clearing the table and taking in the salad. This insures their hot crispness with the salad.

**Cheese Cups.**  
Bread 24 hours old, cheese, melted butter.

Cut bread in slices two inches thick. Cut in small rounds with an open top, small cutter. Hollow out a tiny cup-shaped depression in one end of each round of bread. Dip in melted butter, fill depression with grated cheese and put in a hot oven to melt the cheese and slightly brown the bread. Dust lightly with paprika before sending to the table. Cheese cups are served on the plate with the salad and eaten with the salad fork.

**Cheese Squares.**  
One cup soft cheese, 2 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons soft bread crumbs, 1/2 teaspoon mustard, 1/2 teaspoon vinegar, 1/2 teaspoon minced sweet pepper, few grains sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, paprika, squares of bread.

Cut bread not more than three-eighths of an inch thick. Cut off crusts and cut in two-inch squares. Toast quickly. Mix cheese, butter, bread crumbs, pepper, mustard, vinegar, sugar and salt to a smooth paste. Spread on toasted squares, dust with paprika and put in a hot oven to melt the cheese. Serve at once.

**Cheese Balls.**  
Whites 2 eggs, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon paprika, grated cheese.

**Beat whites until stiff and dry.** Beat in salt and paprika and add enough grated cheese to make the mixture the right consistency to form into marbles. Drop in deep hot fat and fry to a golden brown. Drain on heavy brown paper and heat in the oven to serve.

**Cheese Straws.**  
One cup grated cheese, 1 cup bread crumbs, 2/3 cup flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon onion powder, 1/2 teaspoon cayenne pepper, 2 tablespoons milk, dash mustard.

Cream butter, add flour, crumbs, cheese and seasoning. Mix thoroughly. Add milk and mix well. Turn onto a floured modeling board, roll one-quarter inch thick, cut in straws one-quarter inch wide and four inches long. Bake in a moderate oven for 15 minutes.

## SECRETARY MELLON URGES TAX REDUCTIONS IN ANNUAL REPORT.

### SAYS GENERAL BUSINESS IS "SOUND AND STABLE"

#### Declares Solder Bonus Will Postpone Tax Reduction For Many Years.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—Secretary Mellon in his annual report transmitted to congress today, described the nation's foreign debt had been reduced \$613,874,343 in the fiscal year 1933, and again urged a sharp reduction in taxation based on rigid economy and barring "authorizations for new and unexpected expenditures."
