



### Pen Picture of Impression Made By President Coolidge Delivering His First Message Before Congress

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—The galleries filled first and remained throughout the one part of the picture which was pleasing to the eye. Galleries were mainly filled by women, who, in their hearing, their choice of colors for their dresses, and the alert intelligence of their countenances, were rather the superior and certainly more distinct than the men of two houses who filled the floor.

As you looked at the congressmen and senators, you were convinced that for such achievement as comes out of them, we must rely on the capacities inherent in average men. In clothes they were conspicuous, so to speak, in their averages. There was hardly an outstanding head of face among them, as to clothes, the contrary was true. There were not five examples of the frock coat that was almost the indispensable uniform of the senate of 30 years ago. To the eye, it was like a meeting of the League of Nations, or a session of the main members of any small town church.

**Appearance for Cabinet.**  
Presently the cabinet appeared, led by Hughes. As they entered the hall, there was applause, which was meant for the cabinet as such. But when Secretary of the Treasury Mellon entered the hall, it was noticeable that the applause went to a slightly higher pitch for him personally. One of the most marked aspects of his position is the way this utterly unassuming man, unknown to the country at the time Harding selected him for the cabinet, has come to have a position of leadership. In a moment Coolidge appeared. There is something about Coolidge's fragile figure, his pale, boyish complexion, his blue eyes, his blonde hair, that make an ingratiating appeal. His appearance seems to say: "I am only a young fellow here, and I am new on the job, and I hope you will give me a kindly hand." The truth about it is Coolidge really has plenty of self-confidence and abundant faith in his capacity to handle his job. But while this appeal is not in Coolidge's mind, it will always be inherent in his personal appearance, and will be one of his great assets. Whenever he appears, the crowd will tend to feel: "This is a well-intentioned young fellow, and he will give me a boost." If Coolidge should be president for 20 years he would continue to make this mental impression. It may be as useful a message to him as was the challenging bluntness with which Roosevelt used to pound on the stage. Roosevelt always had an air of invited controversy. Coolidge's unobtrusive air always invites cooperation and helpfulness. He has some of the appearance of a youthful, small town clergyman or school teacher. Coolidge by his slender figure, and pale complexion, will always make the impression of a lightweight pugilist matched against a heavier weight; and will always be the beneficiary of a generous give-him-a-boost attitude on the part of the crowd. It is a considerable asset to look physically like a lightweight, but not to be abundantly able to take

congress. Some effort will undoubtedly be made to reimpose the excess profits tax.

There was again a sympathetic applause when Coolidge said, speaking in his reduction of the income tax in declaring that he had the paramount service, which congress can render to the country. To support the excess profits tax, to restrict it by annual proposals, is to become unworthy of public confidence, and untrue to public trust. The country wants this message, to have right of way over all others. In some respect this was the high point of Coolidge's speech. It was the place at which he was most direct and uncompromising, and the applause corresponded to this spirit.

**Opposed to Bonus.**  
The one other point at which Coolidge was equally direct and uncompromising was in his words: "I do not favor the granting of a bonus." On this point it was noticeable that the applause was slight. An overwhelming majority of the members and senators present are committed to voting for the bonus that the president here condemned. The legislative course of this proposal in the near future is now clear. It will be passed by large majorities through the house and through the senate. Coolidge, of course, having said what he said today, will veto it. Everybody now takes his vote for granted. To do otherwise now would make him a most foolish figure.

After Coolidge vetoed the bonus it will be passed over his veto in the lower house. Whether it will also be passed over his veto in the senate is the big question. The present writer is convinced that when Coolidge vetoes the bonus, there will be just enough votes in the senate to sustain his veto and to prevent the bonus. But it will be a real fight.

**Other Points Appealed.**  
Several other points stimulated applause. It came when Coolidge said: "Additional planes are needed for the army and additional submarines for the navy. We want no more war, but we need more peace that invites imposition. A peo-

### BORAH HAS ISSUED DEFIANT REPLY TO RECENT CRITICISM

#### SENTINELS OF THE REPUBLIC DEMAND HE CEASE AT- TACK ON COURT.

#### SAYS HE IS PREPARED TO SUSTAIN EVERY CHARGE

#### Willing to Meet Leaders of Organ- ization On Any Rostrom at Any Time.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—Senator Borah has issued a defiant reply to the demand of the Sentinels of the Republic, headed by Louis A. Coolidge of Boston, and Dr. David Jayne of Chicago, that "radical" news articles be suppressed to curb the powers of the supreme court to set aside acts of congress as unconstitutional by a majority of four decisions.

The Sentinels, in session here today, adopted four resolutions, opposing all efforts to curtail the jurisdiction of the supreme court; opposing federal aid legislation for education; child welfare; maternity, etc., such as contained in the Shephard-Towner act; opposing the sterilizing act; opposing the bureau system of federal government and endorsing the Wadsworth-Garrett bill to amend the method of amending the constitution. This last measure was introduced in the house today by Minority Leader Curtis.

In opposing efforts to curb the supreme court's broad powers, as demanded by Senators Borah, La Follette, Eads, Owen, Brookhart, Jones and others, these six being named specifically, the Sentinels issued a challenge to radical senators demanding that they prove or publicly withdraw repeated charges that the supreme court of the United States has usurped its power to declare unconstitutional legislation invalid.

Senator Borah, in accepting the challenge, addressed a letter to Louis A. Coolidge as president of the Sentinels, in which he declared: "I observe that my name is mentioned as one of the senators who is challenged to prove charges against the court. I take this opportunity to say that I am prepared to sustain every charge which I have made against the supreme court of the United States."

"I will meet either your honorable self or the Honorable David Jayne here upon any rostrum, at any time that you will designate for the purpose of sustaining all charges which I have made against the supreme court of the United States."

Another move was made in congress to check the unlimited powers of federal judges in contempt cases when Representative Thomas, Democrat, of Kentucky, member of the House Judiciary committee, introduced a bill to put a curb on the courts.

The measure would determine the jurisdiction of United States courts in matters of contempt and regulate trial and punishment of same.

### Dallas Man Who Kills Wife and Child Is Dead

DALLAS, Dec. 11.—Feyton Pierce, the carpenter who yesterday shot and killed his wife and his 14-year-old daughter, Ruth, died today from the effects of a bullet in his brain, which he fired after killing Mrs. Pierce and the girl. Four other children of the family are being cared for by neighbors pending arrival of relatives.

Pierce was virtually penniless from long unemployment, police said, and brooding over this probably caused his action.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Dec. 11.—Efforts to establish proof that he was indicted through a Ku Klux Klan conspiracy were continued here today by former Governor J. C. Walton at his preliminary hearing before a special district judge.

The deposed executive has summoned a number of witnesses whose testimony he will use in support of his motion to quash six indictments charging him with diverting state funds to his own use and preventing an assembly of the state legislature while in office. The evidence is to be presented in the form of depositions when the motion is heard on December 21.

Foremost of the witnesses who testified yesterday was N. C. Jewett, grand dragon of the Ku Klux Klan in Oklahoma. He was questioned by Walton's counsel in an attempt to lead strength to the charges in the motion that the jury commission, all three of whom are alleged by Walton to be Klansmen, used the roster of the local Klan to select a majority of names for the names of the grand jurors who returned the indictments.

Jewett, however, asserted there never had been any Klan membership lists and that only two of the jury commissioners were members of the organization. He created a mild sensation when he refused to answer questions as to the secret methods by which Klansmen were recognized by their officers.

### CONVICTS BRAVE RAIN OF BULLETS ESCAPE LANSING

#### FOUR SCALE NORTH WALL OF THE KANSAS STATE PENITENTIARY.

#### BREAK MOST DARING IN PRISON'S HISTORY

#### Leader Back in Prison Hospital With a Bullet Wound in Leg.

LANSING, Kan., Dec. 11.—Four convicts who braved a rain of bullets while they scaled the north wall of the Kansas state penitentiary here last night and jumped to freedom were still at liberty early today.

Their leader, Charles Kavanaugh, however, was back in the prison hospital with a bullet wound in his leg.

The break, probably the most daring in the prison's history, was the second within eight days. On December 3 inmates escaped by crawling through an abandoned tunnel and only four of them have been recaptured.

John Stitzel, Brazil Pratt, Cleon Rittenbarger and Walter Geary were the men who escaped last night. Kavanaugh and Stitzel, his cell mate, called to the night trusty, Edward Stewart, to come to their cell in the east wing where 250 prisoners were confined and when Stewart responded, forced him to open the door by threatening him with a smuggled revolver.

Then they compelled Frank Henderson, a guard, to unlock the door of the cell house. Stewart and Henderson were locked in a cell. Before departing the men released Pratt, Rittenbarger and Geary.

The five went to the power house where they found Aleo Smith, a trusty, who was ordered to cut the electric light wires, but refused. When he attempted to stop the men from entering a locker where a ladder was kept the trusty was stabbed in the side by Rittenbarger.

Smith escaped and ran to the prison hospital, from which the alarm was spread.

The desperadoes obtained the ladder, threw off the power switch, plunging the whole prison into darkness and made for the north wall.

By the time they reached their objective the lights had been restored and searchlights on the walls brought into play.

Guards from two posts opened fire as the convicts placed the ladder against the wall. Kavanaugh climbed up first and the others scrambled after him. When Kavanaugh gained the top he was seen to leap into the air. He fell back into the prison yard wounded in the leg.

The others unmindful of the hail of bullets leaped off the wall and scurried out of the range of the searchlights.

The personnel of this committee is as follows: Republicans, Spencer (chairman) Missouri; Bureau, New Mexico; Ernst, Kentucky; Green, Vermont; Watson, Indiana; Democrats, Ashurst, Arizona; George, Georgia; King, Utah; Neely, West Virginia; Reed, Missouri; and Stevens, Mississippi.

Senator Spencer of Missouri was chairman of the sub-committee which heard the testimony in the Newberry contest and made a gallant fight for the former senator from Michigan. It has been indicated in some quarters, however, that he will not make such a hard fight for a Democrat from Texas, particularly since his stand on the Newberry case was said to have caused him much embarrassment in his home state.

Of the republicans it is said that Watson of Indiana is the only one who would "soft pedal" the Mayfield case. Among the Democrats George and Stevens are looked upon as friendly to Mayfield, while the others are counted upon to be either uncompromising in their opposition or neutral.

### FRANCIS DISCUSSES RIGHTS OF MARRIED WOMEN AT LUNCH

The present contractual rights of married women are in a meaningless state, said Charles I. Francis at the University Club luncheon at the Kemp hotel Tuesday. Mr. Francis, told of the legislation now in effect concerning the contractual rights of married women, and how these laws came to be made.

During the course of his address Mr. Francis cited from the law what was considered the man's property and what was considered the woman's property. He said that while the judgment of private property of man and wife was almost the same, and the management of this property for the woman was almost the same as that of the man, there were a few exceptions. Namely that the wife could not convey land, transfer bonds, or sign a check as a surety for another unless she was joined by her husband, and that in case of insanity on the part of the husband or here the couple was separated, the woman could go to court for this right.

He told of the resolutions presented to the legislature several years ago by a committee on which Judge P. A. Martin of this city, was a member and stated that if the legislation had been adopted just as it was presented there would have been no disagreement now, for the resolution was set out in plain terms, but that it had been butchered by the legislature until now it was almost without meaning.

Judge H. O. Kelsey, president of the club, introduced W. A. Woodward, Vancouver, B. C. Mr. Woodward extended to the University Club members the greetings of his own club, telling in a few words of the work of Canada in bringing the rights of Great Britain and America together. The program was opened with several vocal selections by Miss Vivian Bailey.

It was announced that election of officers would take place at the next meeting of the club, next Tuesday, and Guy Bailey and Harwood Stacy were appointed to act as a program committee for the next meeting. Reports were made by Dr. N. F. Grafton of the committee on the organization of the night school, who told of the work now taking place at the high school building, and by Dr. C. M. Simpson, chairman of the committee on the college library, who stated the committee would take action as soon as a report was made by Dr. J. W. Cantwell, superintendent of schools.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Dec. 11. (AP)—A plan for an evangelistic campaign which will extend throughout the entire Southern Methodist Church is expected to be the outcome of a conference on evangelism which opens here today, and which will be attended by chairman of the evangelistic committee of the 1935 general conference of the Methodist church.

More than 50 evangelists are expected to attend the meeting which will be presided over by Dr. E. R. Russell, home mission secretary, and head of the department of evangelism of the Methodist church, who will outline the purpose of the meeting in his opening address to-day.

### SEIZES TEN CARS WHICH HE TRACED TO MADILL, OKLA.

Deputy Constable K. F. Beak, a member of the force of Constable Frank Morgan, wired his chief Tuesday noon that he had tied up ten automobiles at Madill, Okla., and that present indications were that a regular automobile thieving ring had been uncovered.

Y., early Sunday morning with a loss of nine lives, came to Erie today to face officials of the road and tell what they knew of the fatal crash.

Among those was Charles Patterson of Buffalo, who for two score years had been at the throttle of many fast trains. His record was clear until Sunday when during a driving rain and heavy fog, his train slipped into a section of the limited which had halted momentarily to investigate an automobile accident. Railroad officials have stated that Patterson drove his train past warning signals.

The hearing was behind closed doors, but it was reported that an official statement to be issued by E. V. Brown, superintendent of the Erie division of the road would place responsibility.

All the injured passengers were reported improving at the Erie hospital with the exception of George Wagon, president of the New Haven baseball club of the Eastern League. Mr. Wagon, who received an injury to his back from which complications have developed, was described by hospital officials today to be in a "critical condition."

## SISTER MARY'S KITCHEN

**Rabbit.**  
There are the days when the poor little bunnies who jumped and scampered so merrily last summer as we drove through the country find nothing merry about their surroundings. Dogs and men hunt them eagerly and the rabbit scampers for their lives.  
The cook usually receives a rabbit skinned and dressed. She should be sure that the little sort of "kernels" under the forepaws have been removed as these secrete the wild taste and impart a strong, rather unpleasant flavor to the meat.  
If a wild rabbit is frozen for 12 hours the flavor is greatly improved. In any event let the rabbit stand in cold salt water overnight.  
No matter how the rabbit is to be cooked and served it should be parboiled in boiling water to cover with a medium sized onion. This destroys the wild unpleasant taste and does not make the meat taste of onion.

**Fried Rabbit.**  
After skimming in salt water to distill and parboiled for 10 minutes with onion. Remove from water and throw onion and water away. Put rabbit in frying pan with boiling water and simmer until tender. When rabbit is about half done add salt. It will take about an hour to cook. The meat from water, roll in flour and fry in half butter and half lard. Make a gravy in the frying pan using half rabbit stock and half milk or cream for liquid.  
From the southwestern part of the United States comes this recipe for "bunny sausage."

**Bunny Sausage.**  
After skimming the rabbit is soaked overnight in cold water. In the morning, the meat is cut from the bones and put through the food chopper. For every pound of meat add one tablespoon minced onion, two-thirds teaspoon salt, one-half teaspoon black pepper, one-eighth teaspoon cayenne, two tablespoons cracker crumbs, two tablespoons sweet cream, mix thoroughly and make into small balls. Fry slowly in a covered frying pan until well done. It will take about 45 minutes.  
A rabbit pie is good and goes further than fried rabbit.

**Rabbit Pie.**  
Soak the rabbit in salt water and parboil in onion water as in the first recipe. Boil in water with one small onion until tender. Strain and slice stock with butter and flour rubbed together. Put pieces of rabbit in baking dish, pour over gravy and cover with baking powder biscuit dough. Bake 30 minutes in a hot oven.  
Allow one tablespoon flour, one-half tablespoon butter and one-half

teaspoon salt for every cup of stock when making gravy.  
**Casserole of Rabbit.**  
Soak rabbit and parboil. Parboil for half an hour in onion water to more than cover. Drain and roll in flour. Fry in half butter and half lard until brown on all sides. Put rabbit in casserole with one cup diced carrots, one-half cup diced celery, one-fourth cup minced onion and one cup diced tart apple. Make a thin gravy in the frying pan with the rabbit and pour over rabbit and vegetables. There should be enough gravy to cover. Cover casserole and cook in a moderate oven for 45 minutes.

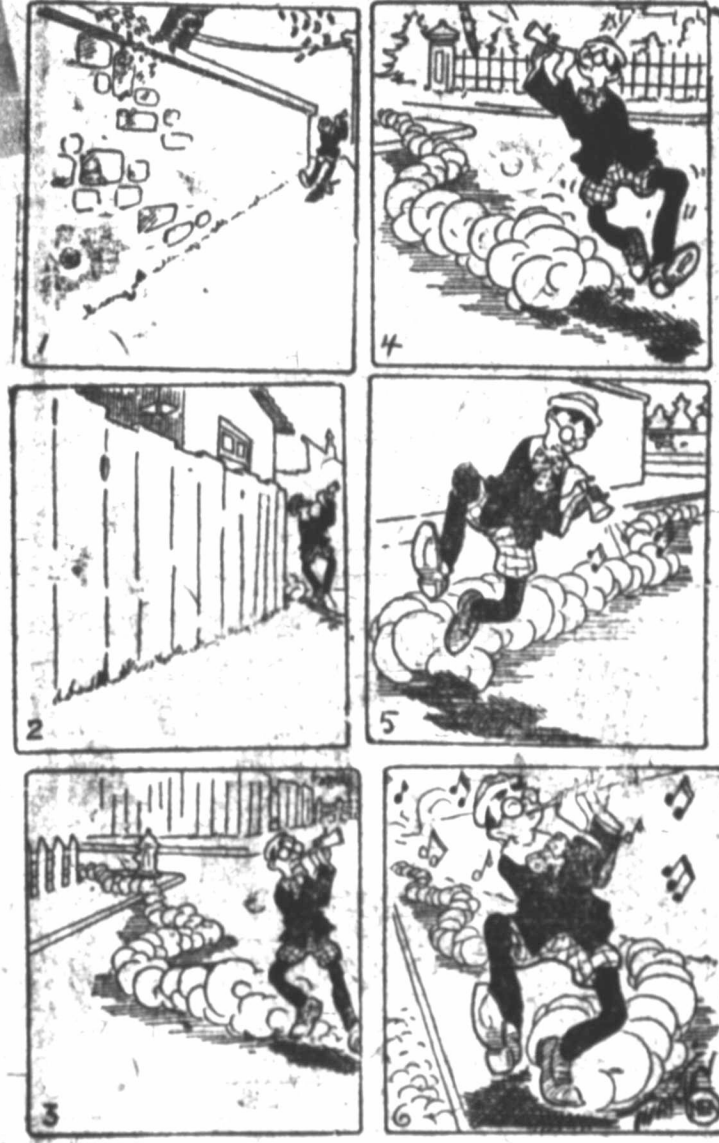

### One of Largest Paving Programs Ever Undertaken By City Is Authorized By Council at Monday Night Meet

One of the largest paving programs undertaken by the city in several months was started at the regular Monday night meeting of the city council when resolutions declaring paving on 17 city blocks a necessary and calling for plans, profiles and specifications and authorizing the city clerk to advertise for bids were adopted. The action was taken at the business meeting of the city council on Monday night, December 10, 1934.

A petition from property owners on Kemp boulevard from Tenth to Avenue 17, which was the largest project which was acted on favorably by the council. The other five streets on which paving was declared a public necessity and resolutions calling for bids were adopted were: On Scott avenue, Thirteenth to fourteenth; on Broadway, Eleventh to fifteenth, four blocks; on Marshall, Tenth to twelfth, one block; on Twelfth, Broad to Marshall, three blocks; on Fillmore, Avenue O to Avenue L, two blocks.

The bids of L. E. Whitham were accepted on the paving of Tilden street, from Avenue G to Avenue I, on Austin street from Fourteenth to Sixteenth streets, and for the continuation of Twelfth street in Southland addition. The contract for the paving of Elizabeth and Fourteenth streets for two blocks from Clarke to Grace was awarded to L. E. Whitham; the pavement will be of concrete. Ordinances ordering paving on Seventh street and Indiana avenue were passed at the second reading.

It was rumored that petitions for paving portions of Ninth, Broad and Brook streets would be submitted at the next meeting of the council. While no definite action has been taken, it is understood that the city will continue with the paving program that has been undertaken until the network of paving which had been planned for some time is completed. Some action toward the issuing of warrants to finance the work is expected at an early meeting.

Ordinance 478, which is unfavorable to park, rank or stand any public service vehicle used or operated for hire on the streets of Wichita Falls on certain portions of Eighth and Ninth streets was passed, with the emergency clause, to its third reading. It will become an effective ordinance on Wednesday, December 12. The ordinance was passed to regulate the parking of cars in the alley between Eighth and Ninth streets at the union station. A penalty of not less than \$10 or more than \$200 is stipulated in the ordinance for violations of the ruling.

Residents of front and neighboring streets, in the section of the city frequently referred to as "Man's Land," appeared before the council Monday night with a petition asking that front street be opened and that the residents of that section of the city be accorded the same consideration as those in other districts. The representatives of the petitioners expressed a desire to cooperate with the city authorities in improving conditions in that section. A committee composed of Commissioners N. M. Clifford, J. H. Patton and City Engineer F. M. Rowley was appointed to look into conditions and report to the council at the next meeting.

W. A. Hoffmann was given permission to erect several light poles on Taylor street from Fifth to Sixth and to supply a neighbor with electric lights from his private plant. It was stated that city lighting facilities were not available there. The permit was granted with the usual provision that the city reserved the right to have them moved at any time they might become objectionable.

Permission was granted to the Pioneer Refining Company to install a modern filling station at Seventh and First streets. H. C. Cole was given a permit to build a temporary chute to be used in converting a building at a new building at 418 Lamar.

Upon recommendation of Commissioner Burton Statton, the council authorized the extension of a water line of 600 feet of two-inch main on North Tenth street between Grand and North Broadway. The extension will be made at a cost of approximately \$300 and will serve 10 families. It was stated.
