Public School Week Set Here March 3-9

The celebration of "Texas Public School Week" will be observed locally March 3-9.

"The district's personnel would like to extend a special invitation to parents and local residents to observe and experience the educational innovations that challenge and motivate today's students," says a spokesman for the district.

Residents are invited to enjoy lunch with the students during the week. Meal tickets cost \$2.50 for adults and \$1.10 for children. The tickets may be purchased in the cafeteria.

All classrooms will host Open House activities Tuesday, March 9. The district-wide schedule is: Primary, 6-7:30 p.m.; Elementary, 6:30-8 p.m.; Junior High, 7-8:30 p.m.; and High School, 7:30-8:30 p.m.

Refreshments will be served in the cafeteria by food service staff members. Parents who have children in the Chapter I/Migrant Program are encouraged to visit Mrs. Connie Johnson's room (elementary campus #209), Mrs. Kay Snead's room (elementary campus #212) or Mrs. Juanelle Jordan's room (junior high campus #18).

Primary school children have made articles about seeing Texas from a child's perspective. These children have made quilts, stick horses, hats, Texas maps, Texas flags and beef jerky. Other children will be displaying projects about animals.

The elementary campus will have a variety of student work in the hallways and in individual classrooms. The Science Fair will be held in the gym. The new Josten's Integrated Learning Lab will be operating for students and parents desiring a technology challenge.

On the junior high campus, students will be displaying sentence diagrams, adjective banners, published "Ghostwriter" stories, patchwork quilt interviews, circle designs, pie graphs, and approximately 100 science projects. Computer print-outs of student's projects and student's progress evaluations will be exhibited in the Chapter I and Computer Literacy Labs. The week of March 1-6 has been designated as Educational Diagnosticians Week by proclamation of Governor Ann Richards.

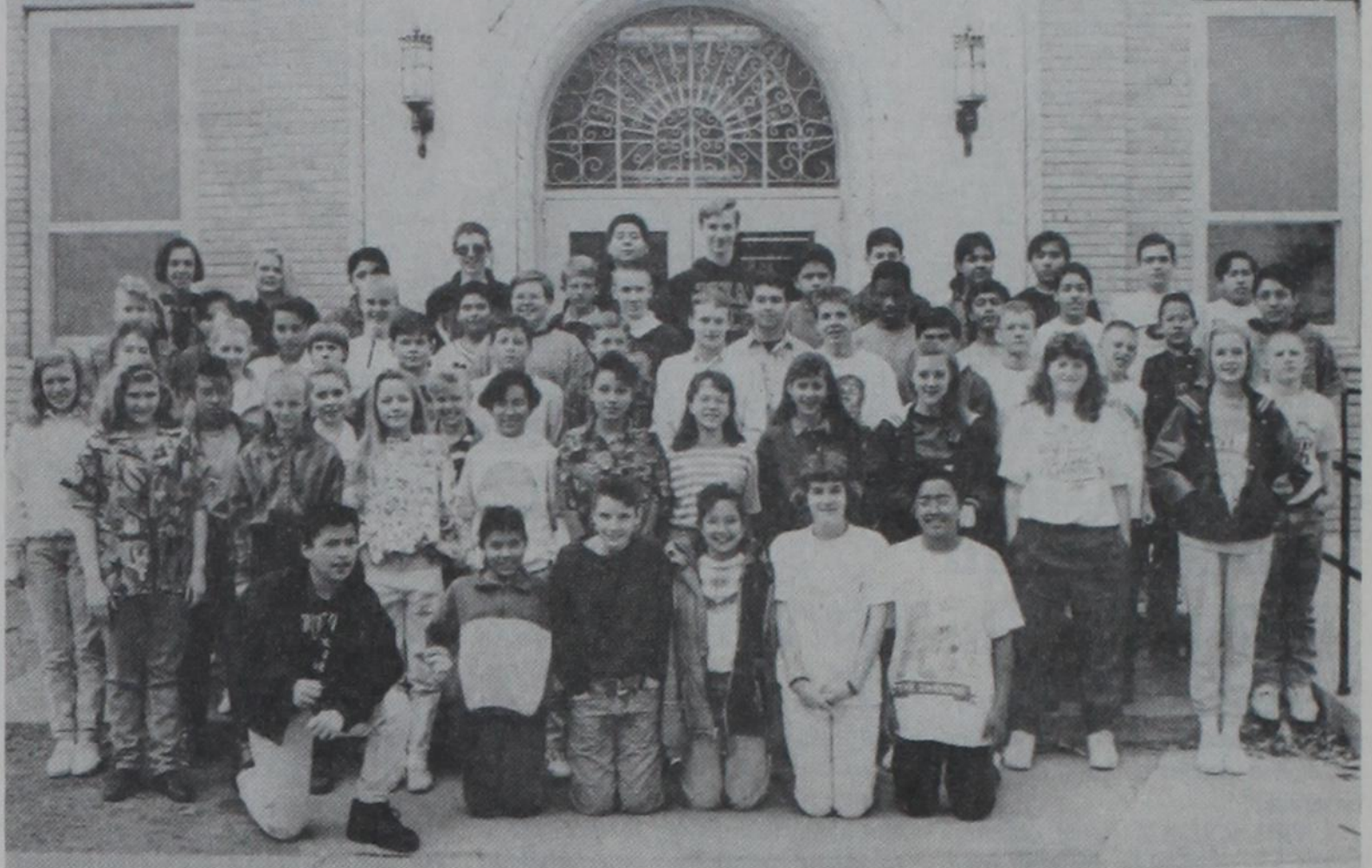
Governor Richards states in her proclamation: "Educational Diagnosticians in Texas are responsible for the assessment of students to determine eligibility for special education services; for the coordination of the development and implementation of the Individual Educational Plan for identified, eligible students; and for ensuring a school district's compliance with mandates for due process in federal and state law."

The Parmer County Special Education Cooperative utilizes the services of two Educational Diagnosticians.

Sue Beene serves as the Educational Diagnostician for the Friona I.S.D. and the county's Early Childhood Education Units.

Charlene Shafer serves as the Educational Diagnostician for the Bovina, Farwell and Lazbuddie school districts.

Both professionals have worked with the Parmer County Special Education Cooperative for more than ten years and have dedicated their professional lives in the service of helping special children.

Perry Is Speaker For Chamber Fete

Texas Commissioner of Agriculture Rick Perry will be the main speaker for the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture on Saturday, March 27 at 7 p.m.

Tickets for the 1993 banquet are on sale at the Chamber office on Main Street, or from members of the organization's board of directors. Advance tickets are \$15 for adults and \$10 for students. Tickets at the door will cost \$17 and \$10.

The menu will consist of prime rib from K-Bob's Restaurant in Hereford.

Perry was elected Commissioner of Agriculture in 1990. He had previously served as a three-term representative from District 64 (Callahan, Haskell, Hood, Palo Pinto, Shackelford, Stephens, Throckmorton and Young counties).

He was named one of the ten most effective lawmakers by the Dallas Morning News in 1989.

Perry is a member of the U.S. Trade Representative's Intergovernmental Policy Advisory Committee on International Trade, and is serving as president of the Southern Assn. of State Departments of Agriculture.

Since assuming his state agriculture post, he has been named to the executive committee of the Southern United States Trade Assn., and serves on the Advisory Committee of the Texas Legislative Conference.

Perry was named the "Man of the Year in Texas Agriculture" for 1990 by the Texas County Agriculture Agents Assn.

He is a life member of the National FFA Alumni Assn.; is a member of the 4-H Distinguished Alumni; the Texas Lyceum; and holds an honorary life membership

in the Texas Firemen and Fire Marshals Assn. He received the Distinguished Eagle Scout Award in 1992.

Perry holds memberships in the Haskell County Jr. Livestock Assn.; the Farm Bureau, and the Texas & Southwestern Cattle Raisers Assn.

He was born in Haskell, Texas, a fifth-generation farmer and rancher, and married Anita Thigpen. They are parents of two children, Griffin, nine and Sydney, six.

He attained the rank of Captain, as a C-130 Aircraft Commander in the U.S. Air Force, being honorably discharged in 1977.

He graduated from Paint Creek High School in 1968 and Texas A&M University in 1972 with a major in animal science.

"We feel that Perry will be an ideal speaker for our banquet, and urge members of the community to purchase their tickets and plan to be on hand for this gala occasion," says Terri Outland, executive vice president of the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

Highlighting the banquet will be the presentation of awards for Friona's Man and Woman of the Year; Teacher of the Year; Employee of the Year and Young People of the Year.

Friona Rates Highest On TAAS Tests

Information was received this week from the Texas Education Agency which showed Friona ISD had the highest percentage of students passing all TAAS (Texas Assessment of Academic Skills) tests taken during the 1991-92 school year of any AAA single-city school district in the Panhandle-South Plains area.

The information was contained in the TEA publication *Snapshot '92: 1991-92 School District Profiles*. The publication showed 52% of Friona students passed all portions of the TAAS at all grade levels compared to 47% statewide.

The publication also revealed Friona ISD had the lowest total equalized tax rate during the 1991-92 school year of all of the AAA school districts north of Midland. Tax rates ranged from \$.89 per \$100 value at Friona to \$1.30 per \$100 value in Littlefield.

"We are extremely proud of the hard work of our students and teachers in our school district" said Hal Ratcliff, Superintendent of schools.

Texans with mental illness and mental retardation will celebrate "Blue Ribbon Day" on March 2 to dramatize the message that they are winners and that they deserve a chance to live independent, productive lives.

Blue Ribbon Day will coincide with Texas Independence Day and will be recognized at rallies, news conferences and other special events at locations throughout the state. Consumers, advocates, family members, volunteers and employees of the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation, and other supporters will wear lapel blue ribbons to signify the event.

"Texans have always placed a high value on independence and people with mental illness and mental retardation are no exception," said Ann Utley, chairman of the TXMHMR board.

"With the support of the people of Texas and with funding from the Legislature, these individuals will have the help they need to be contributing members of our society," Mrs. Utley said.

Theme for the statewide observance will be "Blue Ribbon Day—Putting People With Mental Illness and Mental Retardation in the Winners' Circle."

TXMHMR has asked the Legislature for increased funding above the amounts recommended by the Legislative Budget Office for a number of programs designed to equip consumers to reach their potential. Among the proposals are:

*\$1.6 million so that more individuals with schizophrenia can be placed on Clozapine, an antipsychotic drug that causes a dramatic improvement in a person's

ability to function in the community.

*\$19.1 million for In-Home and Family Support so that more persons with mental illness and mental retardation can live by themselves or with family, using services they need to remain in the community and not in institutions.

*\$12.4 million for the Children's Mental Health Plan, so that more youngsters and adolescents can receive treatment and families can have the support they need while a family member is in recovery.

Immunization Clinics Are Set

Immunization clinics offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases are scheduled for March.

Protection is against polio, diphtheria, lock jaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella, mumps, and HIB (Haemophilus Influenzae Type B).

The Texas Department of Health is charging money to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. The amount of money charged will be based on family income and size, and the ability to pay.

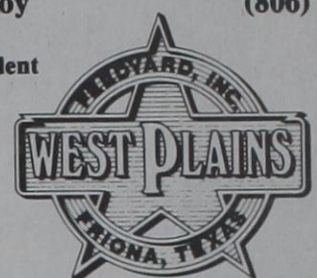

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Outstanding Shooting Typifies Squaws In '93

Some outstanding shooting was a trademark of the 1992-93 Friona High School Squaws, pacing the team to a 20-9 season record and 7-3 in district play.

Two members of the team, Angela Belcher and Tena Willard, made over 50 per cent of their field goal attempts.

Miss Belcher made 130 of 222 attempts, 59 per cent, and Miss Willard made good on 172 of 332 tries, a sparkling 52 per cent.

Otherwise, Kerri Reeb made 44 per cent of her field goal shots,

Renee Martin made 42 per cent, and Renee Downey made 41 per cent. As a team, the Squaws connected on 45 per cent from the field. That will assure a lot of success most years, if you put up enough shots.

In shooting from three-point range, Miss Downey hit 82 of 204, 40.2 per cent; and Miss Martin was good on 39 of 91 attempts, 42.8 per cent.

In free throw shooting, Tena Willard led again with 78 of 105 attempts, 74.2 per cent. Her twin sister Gena connected on 30 of 43

attempts, 70 per cent; Miss Martin made 33 of 48 attempts, 68.7 per cent, and Miss Belcher hit 72 of 106 at the line, 67.9 per cent.

Senior Tena Willard was the team's leading scorer, with 422 points, averaging 14.6 per game. Miss Downey scored 383 points, averaging 13.2 per game, and Miss Belcher scored 332 points, an 11.4 average. They were the only players averaging in double figures.

Tena Willard also led the team in rebounds with 213; Miss Belcher was next with 186, Gena Willard had 137 and Miss Downey 119.

Miss Martin led in assists with 133 to 117 for Miss Downey.

Miss Downey had the most steals, 67, to 43 for Miss Martin. Miss Downey also led in fouls, 95, to 81 for Tena Willard.

Coach Lilley Has Rare Start For FHS Girls BB

Shirlene Lilley has just completed her third year as head coach of the Friona High School Squaws, and has compiled a three-year mark that compares with some of the best coaches who have served at F.H.S.

And as long-time fans realize, there have been some girls basketball coaches at F.H.S. who have recorded some remarkable records down through the years.

Coach Lilley's teams have won at least 20 games in each of her first three seasons at Friona High School.

It had been 19 years since the Squaws posted three consecutive seasons with at least 20 wins. The girls teams from 1971 through 1974, coached by F.G. Crofford, were the last ones to do that. Crofford had five teams in his eight seasons as coach of the Squaws to win at least 20 games.

The all-time leader in 20-win seasons is Baker Duggins, whose teams also won the most career games for an individual coach--227 wins in nine seasons. Duggins' teams won 20 or more games in eight of his nine seasons as an FHS coach.

Duggins had two teams to crack the 30-win mark. His 1959-60 team compiled a won-lost record of 32-3, losing out in the state finals, and his 1963-64 team was unbeaten in 33 starts, for Friona's only team state championship in any sport.

But Coach Lilley, with 63 wins in her first three seasons, edged out Duggins in his first three years at FHS. The popular retired FHS coach recorded 59 wins in his first three seasons, starting out with a

"modest" 13-8 record his first season. He hiked his mark to 20-6 in his second season, as the team won district, and was 26-2 in 1957-58, when the Squaws won bi-district.

Coach Lilley had the team in bi-district play as well in her second season, after opening at 22-8. Her 1991-92 team was 21-12, and the Squaws were 20-9 in 1992-93.

The latest Squaw coach was just a win away from having teams in the playoffs both this season and her first one at FHS. The team finished in a three-way tie with

Dimmitt and Muleshoe at 4-1 for the first round. But, they lost hard-fought games to both of these rivals in the second half of district play to lose out on the playoffs.

The team's 1993 record was achieved even though over half their games--15--were played against teams that made the playoffs. These were Panhandle, Gruver, Melrose (2), Muleshoe (3), Happy, Borger, Randall, Stephenville, Nazareth, Midland, Midland Lee and Dimmitt (2). The Squaws had a 9-6 record against these teams, four of whom are still alive.

Duggins Is Petitioned For Honor

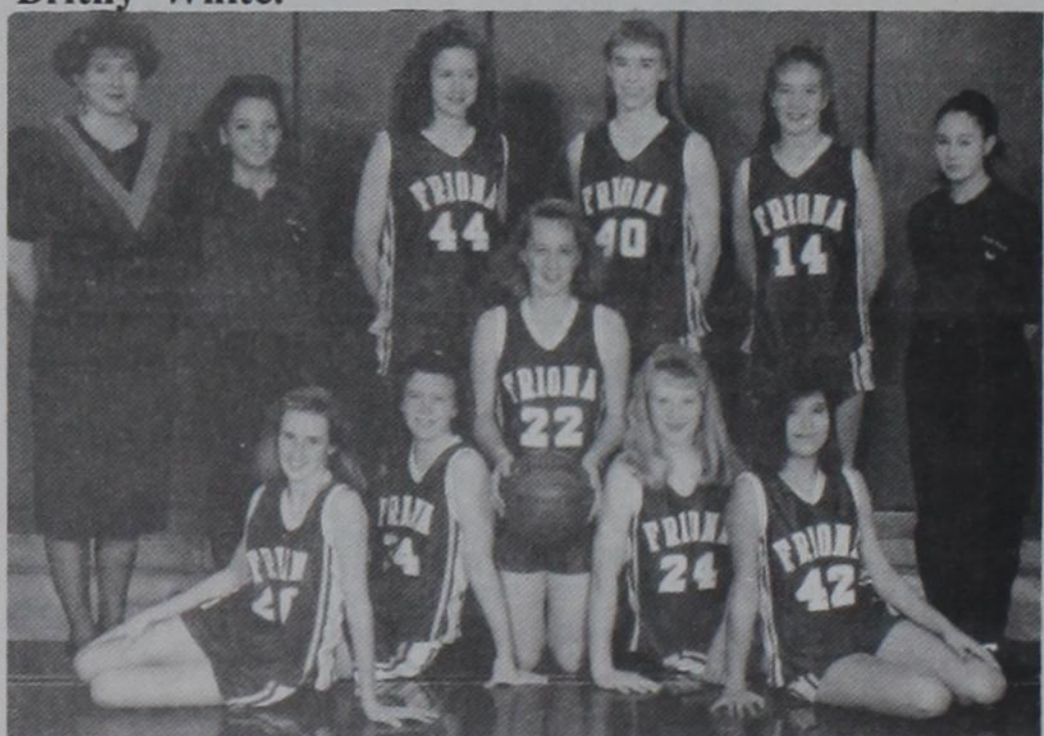

Dry Beans Are Nutritious, Economical Food Source

Even though there are quick methods to cooking a pot of beans, they seem better after having soaked all night and simmered all day.

Dry beans are an economical food—low in cost and high in nutrition. A pound of beans, when cooked, will make about nine servings. Dry beans are classified as legumes, a class which also includes dry peas, lentils and peanuts.

According to the Michigan Bean Commission, a cup of cooked dry beans contains about 225 calories and significant amounts of fiber, protein, calcium, iron and thiamin. Dry beans are low in fat and also contain potassium and phosphorus.

Many bean dishes are often served with rice, bread, tortillas or pasta. Legumes by themselves are an incomplete protein, meaning they do not provide all eight of the essential amino acids the body needs. However, combining legumes and grain products almost always creates a meal that supplies all of the essential amino acids.

Dry beans need to be soaked before they are cooked. The traditional method calls for placing a pound of dry beans and six cups of cold water in a large pot. Allow the beans to soak overnight or for about six to eight hours. Drain, rinse and cook the beans. Beans which will be left soaking for longer periods of time should be refrigerated.

If you're running short on time, use the quick-soak method. Bring a pound of beans and six to eight cups of water to boil in a large pot; cook for two minutes.

Cover the pot and let the beans soak for one hour. Drain, rinse and cook the beans.

Store dry beans in covered containers at room temperature. Do not store uncooked beans in the refrigerator. Keep cooked beans in a covered container in the refrigerator for no more than four or five days. To freeze cooked beans, put in a moisture and vapor-proof container and store in freezer for up to six months.

Try the following recipes:

HOT BEAN DIP

- 1-16 ounce can kidney beans, undrained and mashed
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 1 clove garlic, chopped
- 2 tablespoons bacon drippings
- 2 jalapeno peppers, minced
- 3/4 cup shredded Longhorn cheese, divided

In a medium skillet, saute onion and garlic in bacon drippings for 1 minute. Add kidney beans and cook, stirring constantly, until the mixture is thickened. Add peppers and 1/2 cup cheese; stir until cheese melts. Spoon mixture into a serving dish; sprinkle remaining 1/4 cup cheese on top. Serve dip warm with tortilla chips.

PINTO BEAN SALAD

- 2-16 ounce cans pinto beans, drained and rinsed
- 1 cup romaine lettuce, shredded
- 1/2 cup celery, chopped
- 1/3 cup purple onion, chopped
- 1/4 cup sweet red pepper, chopped
- 3 tablespoons red wine vinegar
- 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 2 teaspoons minced fresh cilantro
- 1/4 teaspoon garlic salt
- Lettuce leaves
- 1/2 cup shredded cheddar cheese

Combine beans, lettuce, celery, onion and red pepper in a large bowl and set aside. Combine vinegar, oil, cilantro and garlic salt in a jar; cover tightly and shake vigorously. Pour vinegar mixture over reserved bean mixture; toss gently to coat well. Cover and chill thoroughly. To serve, spoon bean mixture into a lettuce-lined salad bowl; sprinkle with cheese.

BAKED BEANS

- 1 pound (2 cups) dry Navy beans
- 1-1/2 quarts water
- 1 large onion
- 3/4 tablespoon salt
- 1/2 cup dark molasses
- 1/4 cup dark brown sugar
- 1/2 tablespoon dry mustard
- 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 1/4 pound salt pork
- 1/4 pound bacon pieces, raw
- 2 teaspoons whole cloves
- 2 tablespoons ketchup

Place the water and beans in a large saucepan. Bring to a boil, then remove from heat; set aside for 1 hour. Cut onion into large pieces and add to water along with salt and bring back to a boil. Turn down heat and allow to simmer for one hour. Drain beans and save liquid from beans in a separate bowl. Mix molasses, brown sugar, dry mustard and pepper. Stir into a paste. Add this paste to the bean liquid and stir until well blended. Add beans, ketchup and bacon to liquid. Stir lightly until all beans are well coated.

If beans seem a bit dry, add water to the mixture. Stir in cloves. Place beans in a ceramic pan or crock. (A crock works best for beans.) Score salt pork (make several cuts almost through the salt pork) and push it into the middle of the beans. Liquid must be about a half-inch above the beans or the beans will cook dry. Add water and stir in if the liquid level is too low. Cover beans with foil or a tight-fitting lid. Bake at 300 degrees for 3-1/2 hours. If beans are dry, add additional water to moisten. Sprinkle top of beans with brown

sugar and return to oven for one additional hour of baking at 250 degrees.

PINTO BEAN STEW

- 1 pound (2 cups) dry pinto beans
- 1 ham bone
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon hot pepper sauce
- 1/4 cup bacon fat or shortening
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 1 garlic clove, minced
- 4 medium tomatoes, chopped or 1-1/4 cup canned tomatoes
- 1/4 cup minced parsley
- 1/2 teaspoon ground marjoram
- 1 tablespoon chili powder

In a large pot, soak beans overnight in water to cover. The next day, add ham bone, salt and hot pepper sauce. Bring to a boil; reduce heat. Simmer covered, about 1 hour or until beans are tender. Drain beans and reserve liquid. Heat bacon fat in a large skillet; cook onion and garlic in fat until golden. Add all remaining ingredients. Cover and cook about 45 minutes, stirring frequently. Combine tomato mixture with beans. Simmer covered, over low heat, another 15 minutes. Remove ham bone before serving.

ASCS Provisions Given For '93 Crops

Curt Miller, executive director of the Parmer County ASCS, has announced provisions for the 1993 Farmer Owned Program.

The Agricultural Act of 1949, as amended, contains provisions for a farmer-owned reserve (FOR) program applicable to the 1992 crop of barley, corn and grain sorghum. Non-recourse regular 1992 crop barley, corn and grain sorghum price support loans are eligible to enter the FOR upon the maturity date of the loan if the commodity is currently collateral for a regular Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) non-recourse price support loan and the commodity had not previously been pledged as collateral for another CCC price support loan. The Secretary of Agriculture announced provisions of the FOR feed grain program on January 7, 1993, which includes a 600 million bushel maximum quantity for entry into the FOR.

The quantity of 1992-crop feed grains that may be placed into the FOR will be determined based on the respective quantities of eligible barley, corn and grain sorghum under loan that are offered for the FOR as of April 30, 1993, in relation to the 600 million bushel maximum. Commodities pledged as collateral for non-recourse loans

that have not been signed and disbursed by March 31, 1993, for barley and by April 30, 1993, for corn or grain sorghum will not be eligible for entry into the FOR.

If you wish to participate in the 1992-crop feed grain FOR program, you have until April 30, 1993, to file an intention to participate on form CCC-906-A. You must visit the County Office to file this intention to participate. An intention to participate is required for each 1992-crop regular barley, corn and grain sorghum price support loan. If you fail to file an intention to participate with respect to such a loan, entry into the FOR will not be permitted.

The intention to participate allows you to designate the number of bushels, or for grain sorghum, the number of hundredweights, under loan that you wish to place in the FOR. The loan quantity you may place into the FOR is limited to the actual loan quantity that is determined eligible to remain as a regular CCC non-recourse price support loan.

If a quantity of the commodity offered for entry into the FOR is determined to be ineligible for a regular CCC non-recourse price support loan, that quantity will not be eligible for the FOR loan program. If the quantity intended for entry into the FOR from all

producers exceeds the 600 million bushel maximum, all intentions will be reduced by a national factor. You may revise your intention to participate in the FOR up to April 30, 1993. The filing of an intention to participate does not require you to enter the FOR loan program when your loan matures, and the intention to participate may be withdrawn at any time.

To be eligible to participate in the FOR, it is very important that you:

*Contact the County Office for additional details;

*Obtain a regular CCC non-recourse price support loan by March 31, 1993, for any barley to be offered as collateral for a FOR loan; or April 30, 1993, for any corn or grain sorghum to be offered as collateral for a FOR loan;

*File an intention to participate in the FOR by April 30, 1993;

*Provide information to the County Office as soon as possible to make sure your commodity is eligible for entry into the FOR.

LOAN AVAILABILITY
The final day to request a 1992 crop loan is: corn, sorghum, cotton and soybeans--May 31, 1993; cotton and soybean loan deficiency payments--May 31, 1993; wheat, barley, oats and rye--March 31, 1993.

Macular Degeneration

The macula is the central portion of the retina that is responsible for fine visual detail. With age, it is not uncommon that the macula begins to deteriorate and patients develop blank spots or distortions in central vision; the spots

widen in time, but there is no pain. Some peripheral vision always remains.

It's vital to see an eye doctor as soon as symptoms appear, because one type of age-related macular degeneration can be arrested if treated promptly. Otherwise, there is currently no cure or correction available.

Symptoms to watch out for include:

*The appearance of a gray film in front of the eyes.

*A straight line looks wavy, curved or chopped up.

*Objects, or part of them, seem magnified or smaller than usual.

*When reading a line of letters or words, certain letters drop out and blank spots remain.

To all of you who have so graciously and generously offered your volunteer help and to all of you who were inconvenienced during my illness, we appreciate your patient understanding and support.

Due to Mary Rose's illness and recovery, we had hired two part-time workers with experience to help operate the Library. Unfortunately for us, one of these did not work out, and thus the Library had to be closed during my illness except for the hours of 4-6 p.m. when Julie was able to be there.

Together, we the citizens of this community, have supported the Library and made it what it is today--something of which we all can be proud and all can use. To all of you who use the Library and to all of you who don't, the forty hours we are open each week (and that's normally 45) to serve you, also helps us qualify for benefits from the Texas Panhandle Library System and thus to state and federal funding. Things like the electronic library network, the FAX machine and money to buy extra books would be impossible for our small Library to accomplish on our own. This is to say nothing of the reference backup, the interlibrary loan privileges, and the professional advisory service they also provide.

If our 23,000+ volume Library were open less hours per week, it would be being wasted; but since it is open 40 hours per week and people are using it, we need at least two librarians to handle the demand a quality Library should provide.

During the past three months, we have averaged loaning over 2250 items per month to 750 patrons per month. During 1992, we loaned 450 items interlibrary loan to patrons in other communities all over the U.S.

Also, in 1992, the City of Friona and the Friends of the Library collaborated to purchase the old Post Office building adjacent to the Library for future expansion. A building drive is currently underway to help finance this project.

Story Hour has averaged 25 children per session held each week on Thursdays from 10-11 a.m. My life-saving volunteers since November have been Dana Jameson and members of First Baptist's preschool program staff. We

appreciate their efforts very much.

Retirement Planning Is A Major National Concern

In 1990, there were 31 million senior citizens. That number will more than double to 65.5 million by the year 2030, according to one recent study. Unfortunately, many of these future retirees "could face indigence on a scale previously unseen in this country," according to Barry Vinocur, editor of *Investment Advisor*. As you can see, it is critical that investors understand the importance of retirement planning and know how to select investments that have the potential to fight inflation and provide the returns needed to maintain one's standard of living.

Individual Retirement Accounts (IRAs), for example, offer the potential for tax-deferred growth, one of the most important retirement savings benefits. Let's assume that an investor in the 28 per cent tax bracket invests \$2,000 per year in an IRA and in a taxable investment, both of which earn

eight per cent interest compounded annually. At the end of 30 years, the taxable investment would be worth \$115,435. A non-deductible IRA, on the other hand, would be worth more than \$176,000, and a fully deductible IRA would be worth nearly \$250,000. As you can see, whether or not your contributions are tax deductible,

IRAs still offer a convenient, potentially lucrative way to invest for retirement.

Another investment that provides growth potential to fight the effects of inflation is the annuity. An annuity is simply a contract between an individual and an insurance firm in which the person agrees to loan the insurance company a certain sum of money. In return, the insurance company agrees to provide him or her with either fixed or variable interest payments. Like IRAs, dollars invested in an annuity grow tax-deferred until the investor begins withdrawals.

IRAs and annuities are just two of the options available for retirement savings. Your plan may also include more typical investments, such as stocks, corporate bonds, municipal bonds, CDs, government securities, mutual funds, etc.

Whatever you choose, it's important to develop an investment strategy. The best one will probably include several of the options mentioned above. In addition, it should be started early. Don't put off planning for your retirement. Begin now so you'll be able to put a little more gold into those golden years.
