calories and significant amounts of fiber, protein, calcium, iron and thiamin. Dry beans are low in fat and also contain potassium and :phosphorus.

Many bean dishes are often served wih rice, bread, tortillas or :an incomplete protein, meaning they do not provide all eight of the essential amino acids the body needs. However, combining legumes and grain products almost
