"TOO MUCH SOCIETY" SAYS CAPT. PADDOCK

Prepares Article for Publication in The Veteran

HE QUOTES PAPERS

Appeals to Organ of U. C. V. to Plead With Richmond to Be Decent in 1907

Ascertaining that too much prominence is given purely social events at Confederate reunions, giving excerpts, quoting newspapers in New Orleans printed during the recent reunion there and emphasizing the contention that these reunions, as such, are not conducted in the interest of the veterans.

The veterans and other visitors to the reunion at New Orleans are still drifting back to their homes, many of them having an advantage of the reduced rates to visit their old homes east of the Mississippi and renew the acquaintance of places where they spent their boyhood days and from which they marched forth to war to the tune of "The Girl I Left Behind Me."

"Yes, I am just getting back," said W. R. Hodges, "and I had a pleasurable time. My command was Company H, Second Alabama cavalry, I was a stock farmer sure enough and believe that it is the most independent and profitable business that one can go into for a living."

"I live at Ranger in Eastland county and have 700 acres all about the town. I raise cotton, corn, milo maize and wheat and oats. From this I raise cattle, colts and hogs and sell the balance—if there is any balance. I have fifty head of Durham cattle, three good mares and Poland-China hogs."

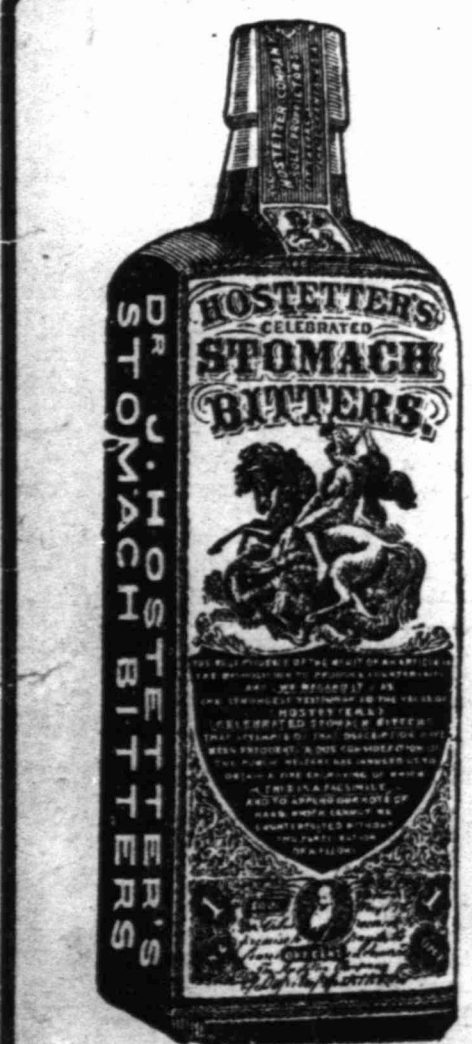
"Fruit is also one of my favorites and does well with us, generally, although this year it is not good. I have not been in the fruit business, but have not failed to make a full crop in seven years."

"For thirty years I have made my own money and raised my corn and never failed, and what I can do any one else can do. Why a man wants to farm and only raise cotton, milo and wheat and buy his meat from the packing house and his corn from Kansas, I cannot understand, when all he has to do is to try and he can have his own."

"It does not pay to raise only cotton, for it does not make any difference what price it is. You have to spend the money. It keeps your family alive and pays taxes and other incidentals, there is not much left and debt is a sure thing. If a future comes, I will kill four or six hogs every year and these keep me in meat until next killing time, and it is good sweet meat, too, and I have the satisfaction of knowing what it was from. My wife and I are all that is left of my family at home, all the children having left, married or looking out for themselves. I have a son 21 years old who is at the Texas Agricultural and Mechanical college and is perfecting himself in all that pertains to scientific and practical farming. He won a premium here at the fat stock show for judging cattle and is extremely proud of it."

"The Agricultural and Mechanical college is worth more to Texas than all the other educational institutions in the state, and to the farmers it is invaluable. My boy, besides learning what farming is scientifically, can make a tire or horseshoe or weld anything and he is taught to do his work so well that there can be no mark of the hammer be seen on the weld. All this is of practical good and enables a farmer, not alone to do the necessary work on his implements, but when his hands are doing it in proper manner. There is many a dollar saved in this manner and much time saved, when one recollects how, when something breaks, the plow stops and off some one has to go to the blacksmith shop and a day is lost that the weeds and crab grass take advantage of."

"Of course not all of our people are doing a stock farming business, but I think a majority of them are, and as they find out the great advantage it is there is no doubt but that they will all take it up. Crops never were better than they are now. Wheat, oats, corn, cotton and everything else is as good as the other. I experiment a good deal in things that I think will add to the productive capacity of the country. I have planted some Japanese wheat, and find it does well. It grows very tall and yields from fifty to sixty bushels per acre."

PACKERS TO ESTABLISH BIG LABORATORY HERE

John W. Maxey to Head Force of Chemists

WANT NEW IDEAS

Engineer Who Designed Filtration Plans Says Packers Are Willing to Pay

Special to The Telegram. HOUSTON, Texas, May 5.—John W. Maxey, the engineer who succeeded in placing a sewerage filtration plant in the big Fort Worth packery, has just returned from Chicago, where he conferred with the heads of the Swift and Armour packing companies.

### Refugees Hungry in Golden Gate Park

### ANOTHER SHOCK

#### More Buildings Collapse and Workmen Have Narrow Escape From Death

OAKLAND, Cal. May 5.—This has been one of the discouraging days in San Francisco's recuperation. The earthquake returned this morning to revive the terrible memories of three weeks ago, and the refugees in Golden Gate park were again hungry and begging for food.

A sharp, sharp shock was felt in San Francisco and Oakland at 10:30 this morning. It was followed by a Pacific Mutual Insurance Company's building, followed by a building carrying a number of

sidio, Cal. May 5.—Impossible to say more than San Francisco will need all the supplies and every dollar which the generosity of American hearts can contribute.

"We are perfecting through officers arriving daily a system which will shortly develop the situation as regards the number of destitute. The last figures of months to 100 rations. San Francisco cover Friday, when 261,000 were reported. Every effort is being made to eliminate repeaters and imposters, and I hope the number within a few days will be under 200,000. In Oakland and vicinity the estimate a few days since placed the number at 40,000, but I believe the number of destitute refugees will not exceed 30,000.

"The average cost of rations now being issued is estimated at 30c, which would amount to \$90,000 a day for the number last reported. The ration of the refugees has been cut to a basis similar to that of the army ration. The components are as follows:

"Meat, ten ounces canned meat or fish, or fourteen ounces fresh meat to the ration. Bread, fourteen ounces fresh bread or 12 ounces of flour to the ration. Coffee and tea, one pound of coffee to fifteen rations, or one and one-half pounds of tea to 100 rations.

"Vegetables, one and one-half ounces of beans, peas or rice or hominy to the ration; three-quarters of a pound of fresh vegetable, 80 per cent potatoes, 20 per cent onions to the ration.

"Dried fruit, one ounce to the ration.

"Miscellaneous, 15 pounds of sugar to 100 rations; three quarts of vinegar to 100 rations; two pounds of salt to 100 rations; four ounces of pepper to 100 rations; four pounds of soap to 100 rations; and one and one-half pounds of candles to 100 rations."

The noise of the explosion was so terrific that it could be heard half a mile distant. It came without warning, but luckily no person was near at the time of the accident. Little damage occurred to the building, but there was much inconvenience attending the absence of lights throughout the city.

The fire department, on hearing the explosion, rushed to the scene, but found it unnecessary to render assistance. A crowd numbering several hundred was attracted to the scene.

It was stated at the company's plant that an effort would be made to complete repairs to the boiler and joints Sunday.

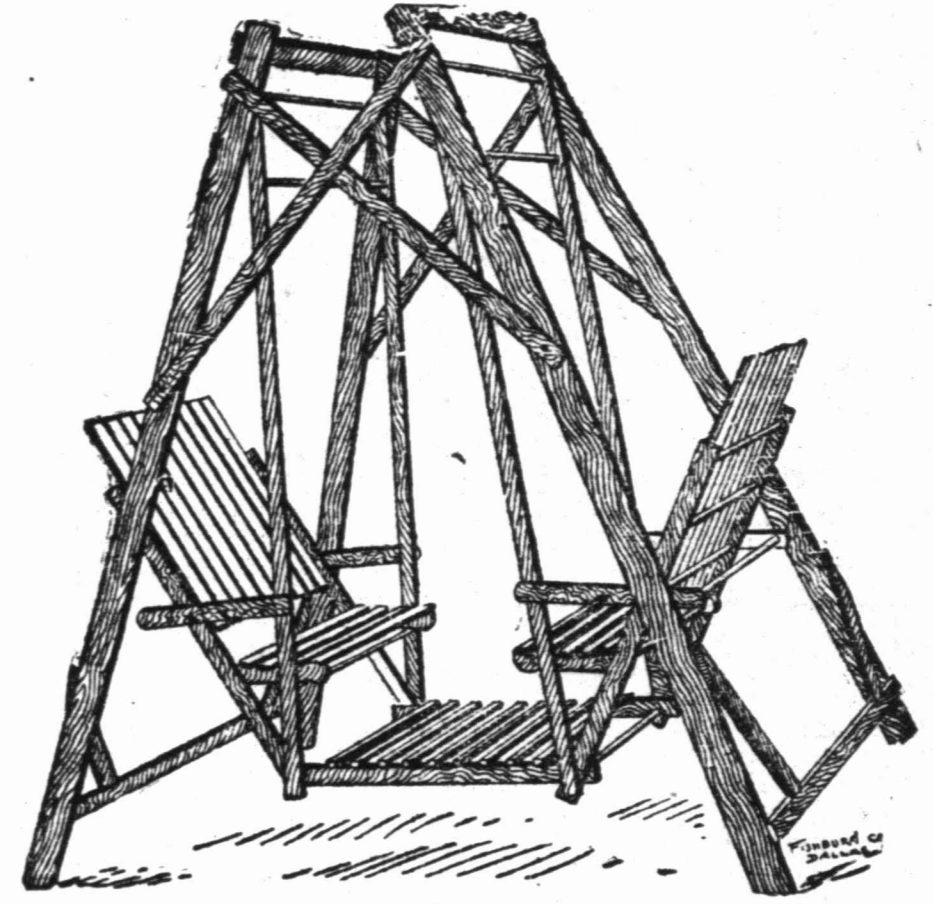

### KAISER'S PICTURE SEEN IN PARIS

Crowds of Parisians Admire Late Portrait

Special Cable to The Telegram. (Copyright, 1906, by Hearst News Service.) (BY PAUL VILLIERS.) PARIS, May 5.—Times and feelings have indeed changed during the last fifty-five years. Even ten years ago no one would have dared to exhibit in this city a portrait of the grandson of the man who, through Prince Bismarck and Field Marshal von Moltke, suppressed France of two of her provinces, but today a splendid portrait of Kaiser Wilhelm II is one of the principal attractions of the museum. The man, who very often expresses his admiration for...

German empire, although, of course, some adverse criticism is also heard. The portrait, which is declared to be an excellent likeness to the kaiser, is by Felix Borchardt, a Parisian painter, and shows the German war lord in hunting costume. It was ordered by the Figaro Illustré, which is forming a gallery of European sovereigns. The order was originally only for a crayon sketch, but having succeeded in getting sittings, the painter asked the kaiser to sit for a full length portrait in oil. The kaiser who, by the way, delights in having his picture taken, immediately granted their request and ordered a special studio fitted up for the artist on the roof of his palace in Potsdam. Instead of three sittings he gave the painter nearly a dozen, and personally suggested as well the pose as many details of the painting. The portrait shows the emperor clad in a gray hunting suit with green trimmings and a Tyrolean hat with oak feathers and high yellow hunting boots. He stands, leaning on his cane, on a heather crowned hill with a thoughtful and stern expression.

To Erect Labor Monument "To the Glory of Labor" is the inscription which will be placed upon a monument which it is proposed to erect in the heart of Paris. A movement is on foot to set up a monument glorifying not only labor as represented by the workman, but also to all great thinkers, scientists and others whose life work was devoted to the improvement of the laboring classes and the leading of humanity in general toward a higher ideal. A famous sculptor several years ago made a small model for such a monument and it is proposed to ask him to complete the work on a grand scale.

Rameses' Heart Examined After more than 3,000 years a post mortem examination of King Rameses II's heart has been made by four French scientists. Four ancient Egyptian vases containing the viscera of Rameses were recently acquired by the national museum (the Louvre). The stomach, the liver and the intestines, contained in three of the vases, were reduced to powder enclosed in tightly bound aromatic bandages. But the fourth contained a hard oval slab, three inches long and one and a half inches broad. This is believed to be the heart of the ruler of ancient Egypt.

It was cut into sections with a saw, and thin slices were shaved off for microscopic purposes. Under the microscope the horny substance showed muscular fibres in a formation that is only found in the heart and tongue. Thus the nondescript horny object was identified as the heart of King Rameses II of Egypt, who died in 1253 B. C.

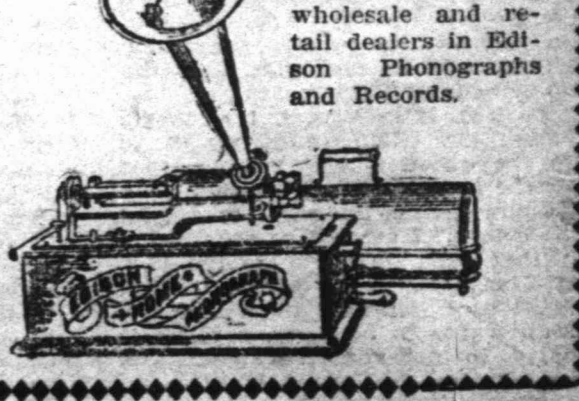

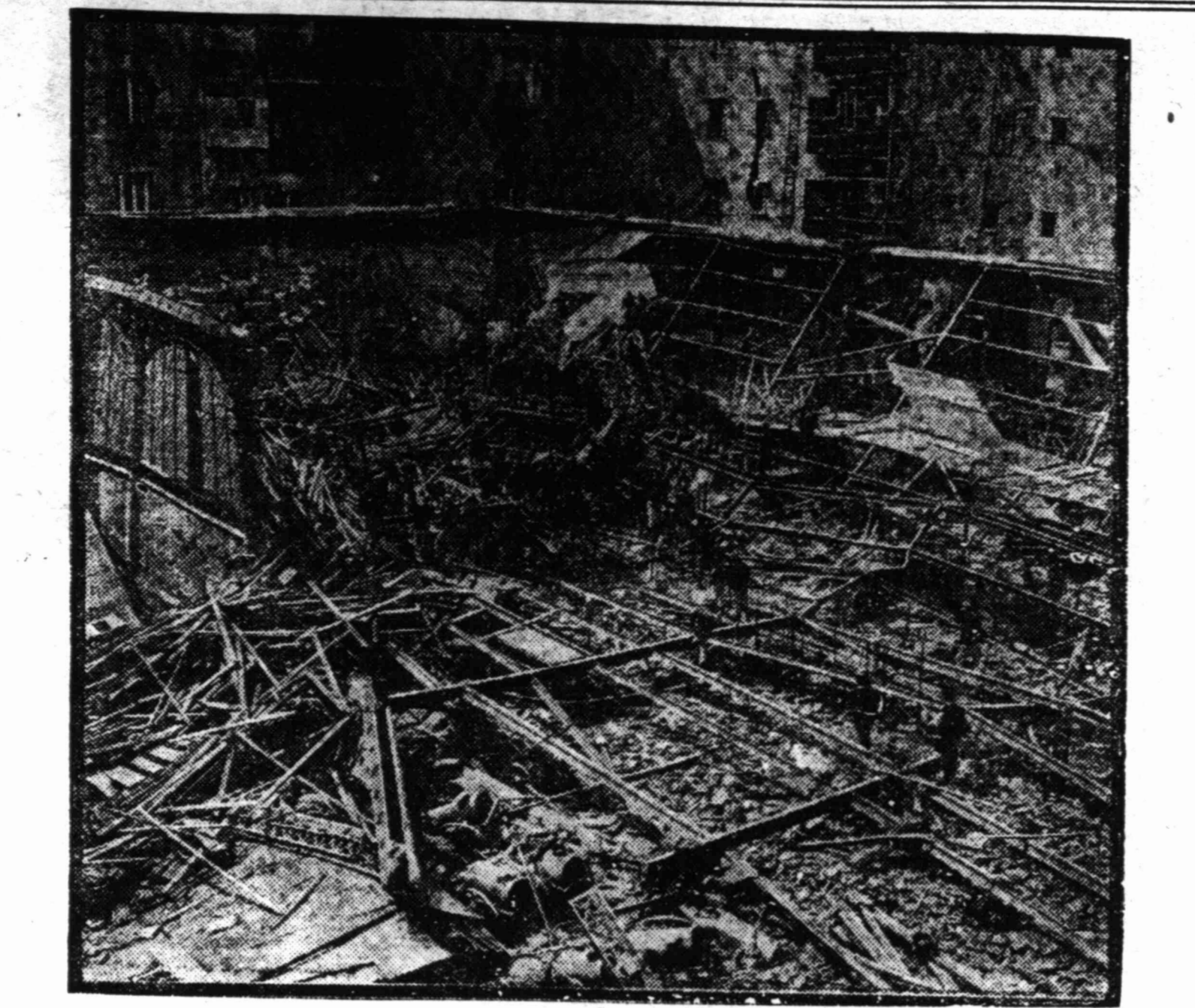

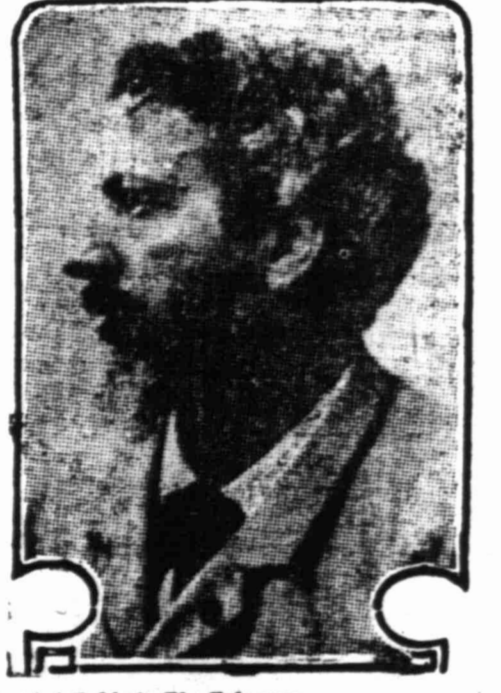

For the last few years we have witnessed the progressive dispersment of our most treasured collections of paintings, sculpture and other objects of art which had their origin in France during the eighteenth century.

The only things which were not carried away were the monuments, work of our great architects such as Gabriel and Servandoni, which were in the nature of things rooted to the soil.

Notwithstanding the fact that they cannot be taken away, these buildings attract the covetous glances of the wealthy foreigners, who are, after all, the only people who can afford to buy them.

IS DIVORCE LAW VALID

American Decision Causes Consternation in England

CHALLENGE LIKELY

Property May Be Attacked by Heirs Seeking for Advantage Over Children

Special Cable to The Telegram. (Copyright, 1906, by Hearst News Service.) (BY LADY HENRY SOMERSET.) LONDON, May 5.—Consternation was spread over many homes when the new decisions as to the divorce law in America became public.

There are several well known people here who have gone over to America to obtain a divorce, and have remarked on the strength of the decree so obtained, and if that marriage is not legal in any country the children are the sufferers. The situation is further complicated by a recent decision in the divorce court division in England, which has recognized the validity of a South Dakota divorce.

It is to be hoped that the law will not be made retrospective. The whole question points, in my mind, to the fact that divorce is at all times incompatible with the Christian idea of marriage. That it may be desirable occasionally is undoubted, but there are many things which appear individually expedient and yet are not compatible with the highest ideal of the individual and the nation.

England Has Some Rich Ones

A sordid view of marriage is only a part of the obscured vision of the man with the muckrake, who the president alluded to in his celebrated speech on the taxation of the millionaire, "typical," he says, "of the refusal of men to see the lofty ideal, having their vision fixed on what was vile."

The total income tax of 471,526 persons who pay income tax directly was, in 1905 and 1904, according to yesterday's return 128,290,267 pounds. Out of this at least nineteen must be millionaires, possessing an income of at least 50,000 pounds per annum, which capitalized at twenty years' purchase means a million.

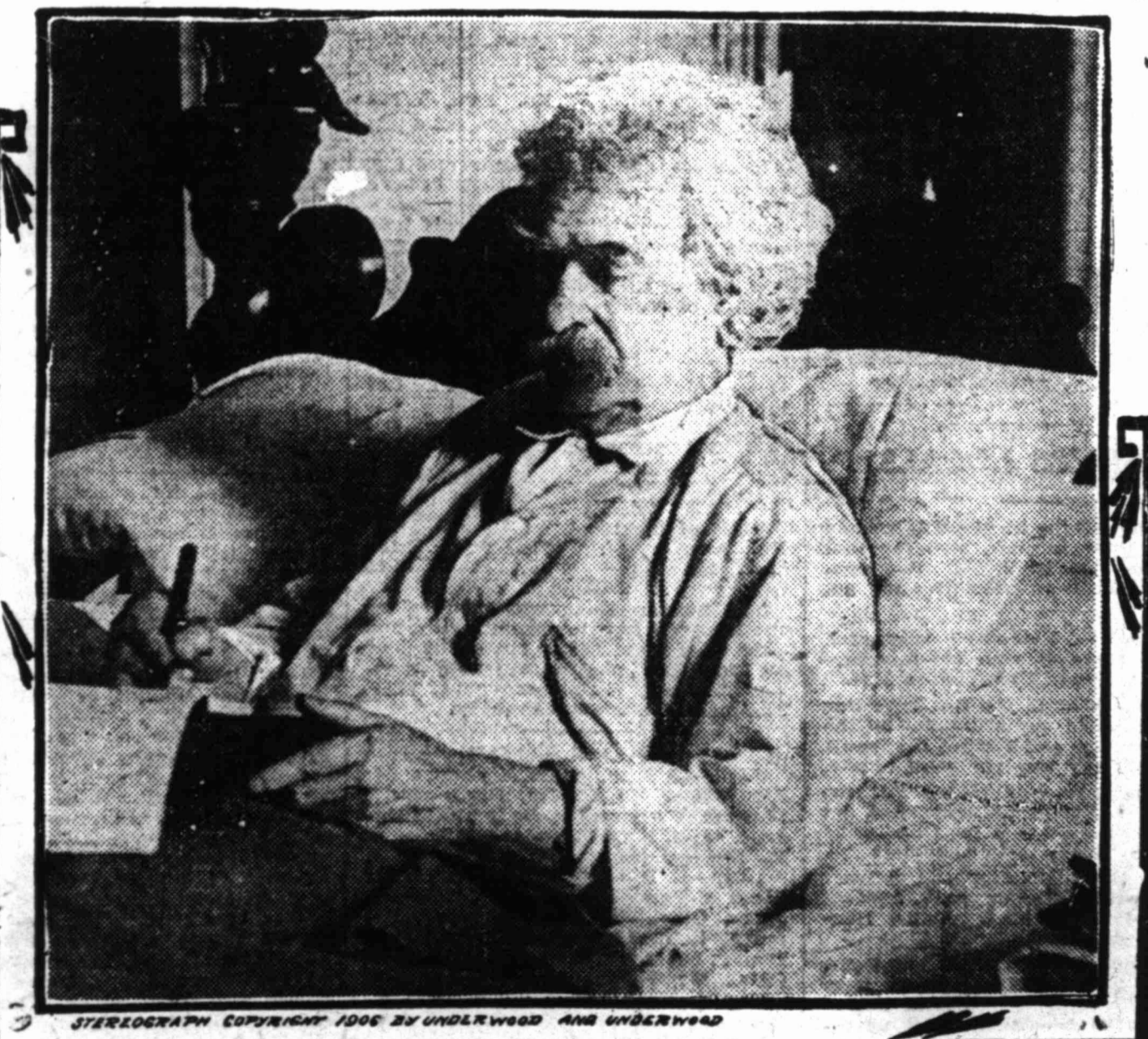

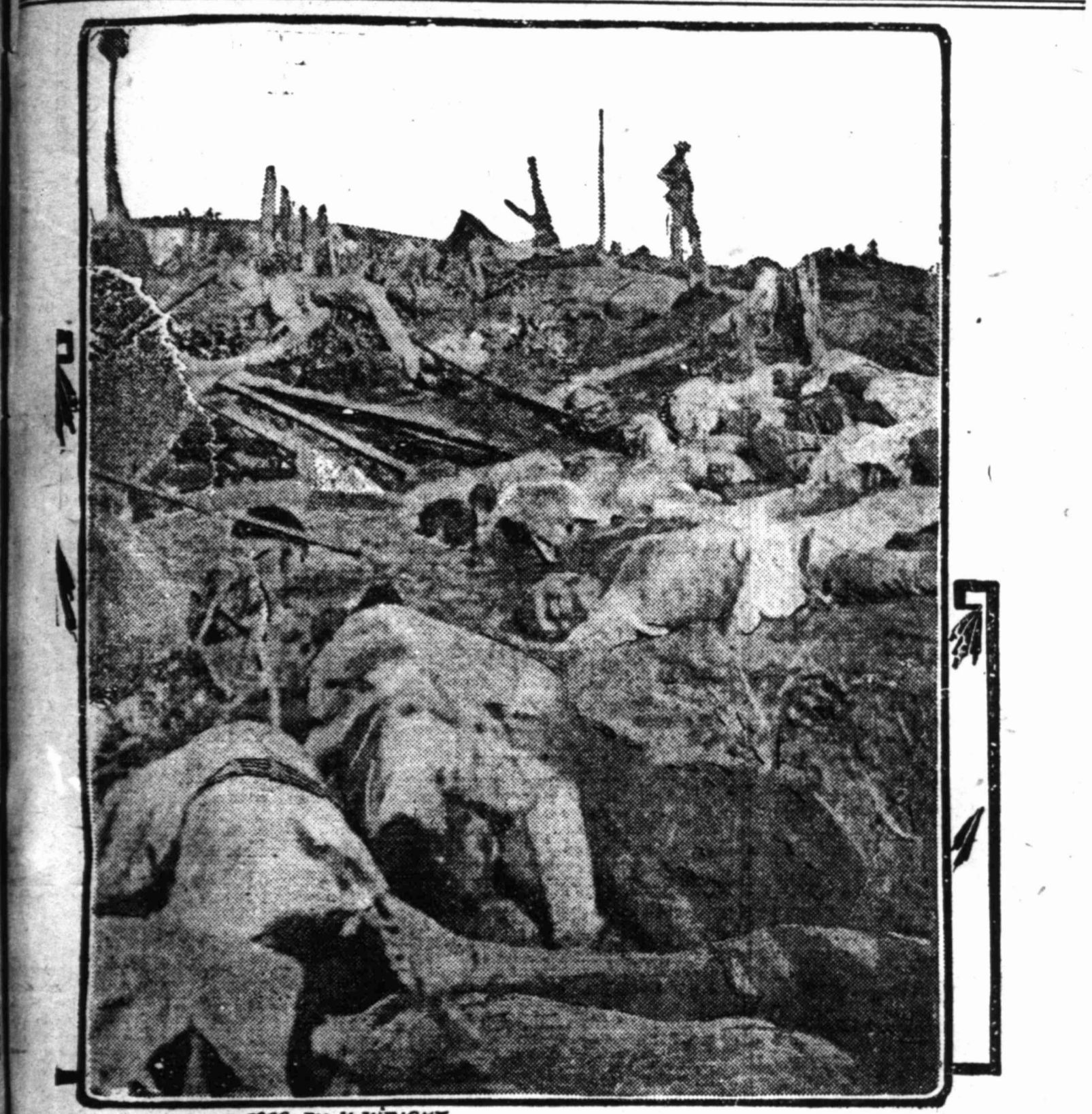

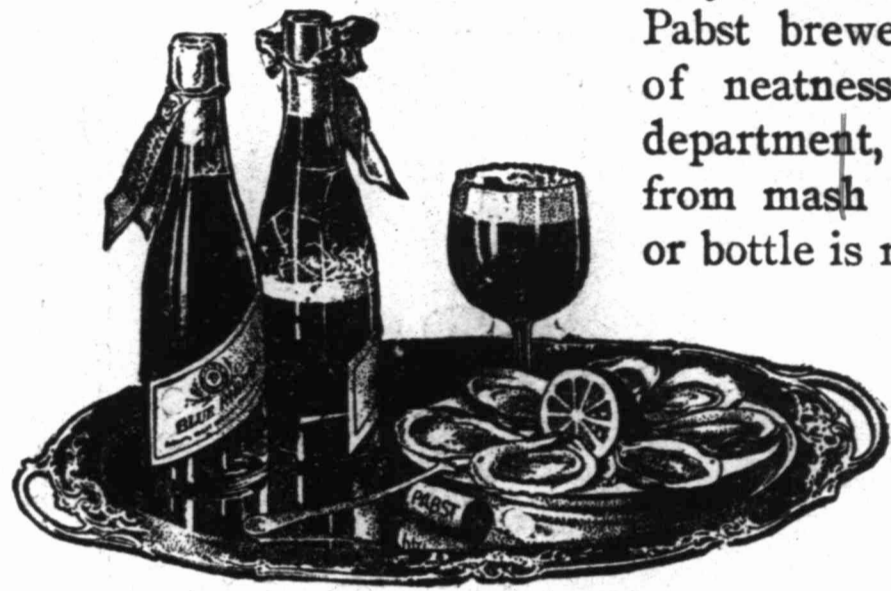

- MOROS Engaged between 800 and 1,000. Escaped—practically all. Surrendered—about seventy. Many Moro children and some women went through the battle unhurt. Many non-combatants were killed. AMERICANS Engaged—700, including portions of the Fourth Cavalry, Nineteenth Infantry, Sixth Infantry, Twenty-eighth battery, Sulu Constabulary, volunteers from the United States Army, signal corps and hospital corps. In close fighting—about 400. Killed—23, including three Moro. Wounded—100. Duration of battle—about sixty hours.

Religious Frenzy A terrible dramatic element was introduced into the combat by the fact that in addition to a natural love for combat, the Moro has taken the religion of Mahomet, and turned and wretchedly twisted it into a sort of wild, savage worship that teaches him that he who dies killing a Christian will go straight to the arms of the beautiful hours of paradise, cleansed of all sins whatever, so the American who did not want to die, but who was not afraid of death if it had to come, stormed the great hill against these Moros who had sworn to die, and who did not run away. Just before the battle the Moros all took the oath from their sacred Hadjis, or priests who had duly made their voyage to Mecca, then women as well as the men, bound up their heads in white rags and swore to die killing the Christian enemies.

Lawton's Attack About 1 p. m. on March 8, Captain E. P. Lawton's men started up the narrow path, a third of a mile long, to the top of the crater. The Moros could hardly have believed that out of the less than 200 men who were stepping off as gaily as though going to shoot pigeons, there would be ten killed and thirty-five wounded. It is a hard trail and weary. The red, volcanic rock break in one's hands as he endeavors to catch upon the soil and slip under one's feet. Now and then would grasp some huge root and pull themselves up through the forest. Again a man would stand upon his comrade's shoulders. On Colonel Bundy's trail the men say they had to form a pyramid to make the assault. But here it was gasping, choking work, and the hot sun suddenly burst from behind the three-mile climb.

How Steep it Was If a man showed himself for a moment upon the bare red and yellow path he was at once fired upon by the Moro snipers. So steep was the trail that one man was hit in the arm and a leg by the same bullet. Thus the men toiled up and up and on and on for a thousand feet, and it took them half an hour to reach the top. It was certain death to follow up the bare trail down which huge bowlers were constantly descending with frightful velocity. They had to cut their way with bolos through the woods at the side of the trail. The day before Captain Wetherill had made a reconnaissance to within twenty yards of the top. It was discovered by a Moro, who charged at him at close quarters. But the Moro was shot by a brave sergeant who was with Wetherill. Both Americans escaped with their lives from the Moro fire drawn by the shot.

At Close Quarters When Lawton's men were within forty or fifty yards of the cotta the Moros began a fierce rifle fire. They rolled down great trees and bowlers and a perfect shower of big stones and javalins, krisses, barongs and spears shot down on the hillside beneath. The Americans struggled into the brush to the left, cutting their way with bolos to avoid the cleared space below the fort, and firing back as best they could. One American was killed here and several were wounded. Avoided Entanglements About twenty-five feet below the edge of the hill the Moros had built a line of bamboo entanglements parallel to their trenches on the rim of the crater. Instead of trying to charge through these entanglements the men worked to the extreme left where, the hillside slanting up above them, they could see into most of the trenches. From their position they could inflame the entire fortifications. Two-thirds of the command was packed together in the bush below the fort like sardines. Those were desperate moments on that cliff-like hillside. They were there probably half an hour, working like madmen to mount a Colt's rapid-fire gun and prepare for the assault. Fancy that was a risky business.
